The District is fully funded for its OPEB obligations as of June 30, 2012. The current monthly contribution is \$216 and 860 retirees are currently receiving benefits.

Chancellor's Report:

The following updates from the colleges were reported:

ARC: ARC's men's cross country team won its second consecutive State title in the California Community College Cross Country Championship in Fresno. ARC finished with 84 points, bettering second-place Glendale. The Beavers' Matt Airola won the individual state title with an average mile of five minutes, two seconds. Airola has signed a letter of intent to run at the University of Alabama in spring 2013.

Works by ARC art students are on exhibit at the Crocker Art Museum through December 16. The exhibit is co-sponsored by the Fine Art Club at ARC and the Crocker Art Museum Education Center. A closing reception and awards ceremony is scheduled for December 16, 1:00-3:00 p.m. in the Crocker's ballroom.

<u>CRC</u>: CRC alumni Calvin Monroe will be featured on the Black Entertainment Television program, "An Evening of Stars!" This show is sponsored by The United Negro College Fund who referred Calvin and who will tell his story to a national audience. Since graduating from Morehouse, Calvin has been teaching 6th and 7th grade English at Atlanta Heights Charter School.

<u>FLC:</u> FLC adjunct faculty member Phil Hess was recently recognized by the California Association of Criminalists with the prestigious Paul Kirk Presidents award in recognition of contributions to the field of forensic science. Phil teaches administration of justice courses with special emphasis in crime scene investigations/forensics — while working full time in the lab of forensic services for the Sacramento County DA's Office. He will receive his award at a meeting of the Forensic Science Society in England.

<u>SCC:</u> In honor of Native American History Month, SCC's International Studies Program and the Cultural Awareness Center hosted guest speaker Brittani Orono at "Native Americans in the Public Eye: Depictions of Indians in Museums, Movies and Cultural Sites" on November 29. Orono is a member of the Hoopa Valley Tribe and was raised in Sacramento.

Examples might include four, five, six and eight week sessions and weekend courses, as well as other session lengths.

NOTE: Classes may be scheduled on all days during the Summer term including Friday through Sunday; the count of days, though, is Monday-Thursday only as those are the primary days when instruction is offered. Both the Fall and Spring terms have scheduled instructional days, such as Saturdays, that we not included in the number of days shown above. Those additional days ensure the district is in compliance with the requirements of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations, sections 58120 and 58142.

BACKGROUND

Education Code 76140 and 76141 requires governing boards to establish a nonresident tuition fee or the succeeding fiscal year no later than February 1st of each year. Since the District does not receive any State funds for the education of out-of-state and international students, the District is required to assess these students for the cost of their education.

During 2010, legislative changes to California Education Code Section 76140 expanded the options available to districts in setting their nonresident tuition fee. The two (2) new options, numbers 5 and 6 below, primarily increase the rates districts may charge nonresident students. Nonresident students will also continue to be assessed the same enrollment fee as resident students.

As prescribed in statute, the governing board may choose between these six (6) specified fee calculation options:

- 1. Los Rios' Current Expense for Education (CEE) per unit of Full-Time Equivalent Students (FTES) for 2011-12 increased by the projected compounded factor for the increase in the U.S. Consumer Price Index (USCPI) for the current and succeeding fiscal years (two-year-period).
- 2. The statewide average CEE per unit of FTES (2011-12) increased by the two-year projected USCPI increase.
- 3. A unit rate no greater than a contiguous district's established rate.
- 4. A unit rate greater than the statewide average and less than the district's calculated rate. (This option is only available to districts whose calculated rate is greater than the statewide average rate.)
- 5. Highest statewide calculated average rate for the succeeding, current and the past four years (highest calculated rate during these six years).
- 6. No more than the average of the nonresident tuition fees of public community colleges in no less than 12 states that are comparable to California in cost of living.

DATE: January 9, 2013

Districts may also elect to charge a capital outlay fee to nonresident students. In 2009, an amendment to California Education Code Section 76141 requires the capital outlay fee, if ssessed, to be applicable to any nonexempt nonresident student, effective beginning in academic year 2010-11. Previously, only international students were required to pay this fee.

On January 11, 2012, the Board of Trustees approved the current nonresident tuition fee for 2012-13 of \$190/unit which applies to out-of-state as well as international students, and a capital outlay fee of \$18/unit, also applicable to both out-of-state and international students.

Due to the early January Board meeting date, information for contiguous district rates proposed for 2013-14 is not available at this time.

Since 2003-04, the Board has adopted nonresident tuition rate which has been higher than Los Rios CEE (option 1). However, as discussed later, due to sensitivity about overall fee costs for students, the District's adopted Capital Outlay Fee has historically been significantly lower than the calculated (maximum allowable) rate and what could be enacted.

The calculated nonresident tuition rate for Los Rios CCD has increased from \$172 (for 2012-13) to \$184 (for 2013-14) due primarily to declining student enrollments at our colleges.

In order to maintain the current nonresident rate and not adversely impact nonresident and international students in these difficult economic times, it is recommended that the District set its 2013-14 nonresident tuition rate at \$190, based on option # 6, the highest statewide calculated average rate for the last six years (same option choice selected for 2012-13).

B. Capital Outlay Fee:

In addition to the nonresident tuition fee, Education Code 76141 authorizes districts to charge nonresident students a *capital outlay fee* not to exceed the prior year's expenditures for capital outlay per unit of instruction.

In 2009 California Education Code Section 76141 was amended, thereby requiring the capital outlay fee be assessed to any nonexempt nonresident student. Previously, only international students were required to pay this fee.

The District's capital outlay costs have increased significantly since 2003-04 due to the funding of various construction projects by the State and the District's general obligation bonds. The calculated capital outlay fee for 2013-14 is \$57 per unit. In order to avoid potentially significant variations in the capital outlay fee from year to year due to our building program, the District has moved to setting the fee to be more consistent with prior years and inflating cost increases.

In consideration of the current economic climate, it is recommended that the current capital outlay fee of \$18 be maintained for 2013-14.

Historical data regarding nonresident tuition and international student capital outlay fee and other informational schedules are attached.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt the nonresident tuition fee rate of \$190 per unit or implementation beginning with the summer 2013 term for out-of-state and international students. In addition, it is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt the student capital outlay fee of \$18 to be assessed to all nonresident students, both out-of-state and international students, also to commence in summer 2013. Thus, it is being recommended that both fees remain unchanged from their current rates.

In October 2012, the Board met in closed session to discuss the price and terms of payment for the pieces of real property known as 10235 and 10259 Folsom Boulevard, Rancho Cordova, CA, and 2764 El Caprice Drive, Rancho Cordova, CA (Assessor Parcel Numbers 076-0213-003; 076-0213-004; 076-0213-005; 076-0213-011; 076-0213-012), from the Successor Agency to the Community Redevelopment Agency of the City of Rancho Cordova (Successor Agency). The Board authorized the Chancellor to execute a purchase and sale agreement and on November 29, 2012, the District executed the purchase and sale agreement. BACKGROUND

In August 2012, the Board of Trustees formally accepted the Economic Development Conveyance of the Sacramento Regional Public Safety Training Center building and land located on the former Clellan Base from the County of Sacramento. As part of those conversations, Sacramento County and the District have engaged in negotiations for the County to lease additional property across Watt Avenue from the Center to provide for future additional parking.

STATUS

The terms of the proposed lease call for an initial thirty-year term with options for four five-year extensions. The District will pay no rent under the lease, but the District is obligated to pay all expenses of operating and maintaining the property. On the evening of Monday, September 10, 2012 at around 6:50 - 7:00pm, I parked my vehicle in parking lot C located at Consumnes River College 8401 Center Parkway, Sacramento, Ca 95823. I walked to the parking meter located in parking lot C, to get a parking ticket with my bag and school work in my hand. After paying for my parking ticket, I proceeded to walk back to my car when I suddenly tripped over a 2" pipe that was sticking from out of the ground next to the parking meter. I fell at an angle with my feet still on the 3 inch cement block that the parking meter sits on, and the rest of my body on the street pavement. When I fell, which seemed like in slow motion, I slammed into the pavement and hit my chest, my wrists, my knees, and my elbows on the ground. I had whiplash from the force of the fall. Another CRC student was there, an African American female, she helped pick up my things cause they flew in front of me from the fall. I was able to get up slowly, dazed from the impact. I felt a very sharp pain my right knee and elbow. My right elbow was burning because of the skin that was removed from slamming against the pavement. My wrists were throbbing from the force of the weight when I hit the ground, and I had throbbing neck & back pain. I gathered my things from the other student and slowly limped to my class which was really close to the accident site. I spoke with Professor Patricia Doris who saw the blood dripping my elbow and I explained what happen and she advised that I need to go to the ER immediately. I than proceeded to walk to the Police phone located by the stairs of the south entrance to call to see if a nurse was on duty. I was advised no one was available at the time and they are closed. I limped to my truck and drove my self with one arm(left) to the emergency room.

Attached are the photos of the pipe that I tripped on that evening. Also is attached a photo taken a few days ago showing STILL complete negligence by not sealing the hole that is left after removal of the pipe. It also has wiring hanging out of it for some one else to have an accident or someone's heel to fall in the whole. The pipe that was sticking out used to be a taller pole with a sign advising the parking meter is located there. I have a picture of all the parking meters that have no holes or no pipes sticking out the ground as all of them should be that way.

BACKGROUND

The Education Code regulates the procedures by which a community college district can dispose of mal and personal property. Education Code section 81452 provides that the governing board may, by animous vote, dispose of items valued at \$5,000 or less by private sale without advertising or selling the items at public auction. The District has previously held auctions, which have generally cost more than they have netted. In 1998, the District began transferring such surplus items to the State of California since the cost to store and sell such surplus items is greater than potential revenues.

STATUS

The District has a quantity of surplus material, such as outdated desks and computers, which need to be disposed of. The State of California has accepted some of the surplus items but is not willing to take the entire surplus because they are unable to sell it. The District has located a scrap dealer who is willing to take most of our surplus items and recycle them.

All of the surplus items to be disposed of are either broken and/or not working, obsolete, in poor condition, or not needed for district/college operations: 2 bookcases; 17 computers; 1 dresser; 40 drives; 1 drum cartridge; 54 keyboards; 1 kick bag; 2 lecterns; 9 monitors; 2 printers; 3 tables; 3 televisions; and 1 typewriter. These items have a value of less than \$5,000.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the disposal of the listed items per Education Code 81452.

BACKGROUND

In 2006, the Board of Trustees created a Policy enacting the general ban on alcohol on its campuses and facilities. In limited circumstances, the Policy also authorized the acquisition, use, possession d sale of alcoholic beverages in compliance with the Business & Professions Code.

STATUS

In 2011, the Legislature acted to enlarge one of the exceptions to the ban on alcoholic beverages on Community College campuses in the context of performing arts venues. This prompted a review and revision of the existing Policy. First, the Policy moves the existing authorization of the use of alcoholic beverages in the education programs of the colleges (i.e. public safety center courses; culinary arts programs) to the top of the list of authorized uses. Second, the Policy authorizes the Colleges' Culinary Arts Programs to use alcoholic beverages in sponsored dinners or meal demonstrations. Third, the Policy clarifies that the only entity that may authorize the use of alcoholic beverages for fundraising is the Los Rios family of foundations. Finally, in light of the new legislative authorization, the policy authorizes the possession, sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages in the College performing arts venues and Hughes Stadium for events that are designed for attendance by the general public. On this last item, staff is working with risk management and our food services vendor to design a program that will ensure that alcohol is provided at these events in a responsible manner by experienced staff. Further, staff will need to work with the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control to determine how the College spaces might be appropriately licensed for this activity. Other changes continue the process of updating Board Policies and Regulations to common language without substantive changes.

- 1.0 <u>Ban on Alcohol; Exceptions For Nonprofit-Events and Instructional Purposes (Business & Professions Code section 25608)</u>
 - 1.1 Except as provided in this policy, Nno person, group or organization may acquire, possess, ;-consume, ;-sell, ;-give,; distribute, or otherwise deliver any alcoholic beverage to any other person, group or organization; any alcoholic beverage in or on any of the Los Rios Community College District—College/District grounds, buildings or facilities or any of its Colleges. Any violation may be punishable as a misdemeanor violation of Business & Professions Code section 25608 or any successor statutes. Violations by District employees or students may be punished to the maximum extent allowed by law, and/or District Policy or Regulation including termination or expulsion.
 - 1.2 The following exception exists, pursuant to Business & Professions Code section 25608, subdivision (a)(2) or any successor statute: Alcoholic beverages may be acquired, possessed, or used in connection with a course of instruction (e.g. public safety courses) provided on College/District grounds, facilities or buildings, and the person has been authorized to acquire, possess, or use it by the Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees or designee.
 - 1.3 The following exception exists, pursuant to Business & Professions Code section 25608, subdivision (a)(14) or any successor statute: Wine or beer may be acquired, possessed, used, sold, or consumed in connection with a course of instruction, sponsored dinner, or meal demonstration given as part of a culinary arts program, and the person has been authorized to acquire, possess, use, sell or consume it by the Board of Trustees or designee.
 - 1.42. The following exception exists, pursuant to Business & Professions Code section 25608, subdivision (a)(10) or any successor statute.—: Alcoholic beverages may be acquired, possessed, or used during events at a College/District-owned or College/District-operated facility or grounds. As used in this subsection, "events" means fund raisers held to benefit a nonprofit corporation. -that has obtained Before an event may be held, the sponsor shall obtain an appropriate liquor license for the event. "Events" does not include football games or other athletic contests or other athletic events sponsored by any college or school. "Nonprofit corporations" includes, but is not limited to, means the Los Rios and College Foundations.
 - The following exception exists, pursuant to Business & Professions Code section 25608, subdivision (a)(15) or any successor statute: Alcoholic beverages may be possessed, consumed, or sold during special events at College/District regional performing venues. As used in this subsection, "special events" means events held with the permission of the Board of Trustees or designee that are shows, private parties, concerts, theatrical productions, and other events held on those premises for which the principal attendees are members of the general public or invited guests and not students of the District. Special events does not include events sponsored by Student Body Associations, their components, student organizations, or events sponsored by the officers of student life activities. Before an event may be held, the College shall obtain an appropriate liquor license for the event. As used in this subsection, "regional performing venues" means Folsom Lake College Harris Center

for the Arts; American River College Performing Arts Center; Cosumnes River College Visual and Performing Arts Center; Sacramento City College Hughes Stadium and Performing Arts Center.

- 1.3 The following exception exists, pursuant to Business & Professions Code section 25608, subdivision (a)(2) or any successor statute. Alcoholic beverages may be acquired, possessed, or used in connection with a course of instruction (including culinary arts and/or public safety courses) provided on College/District grounds, facilities or buildings, and the person has been authorized to acquire, possess, or use it by the governing body or other administrative head of the District.
- 1.64 The Chancellor shall develop administrative regulations to implement this policy. The District shall establish such regulations for use of alcohol.

This regulation establishes the parameters within which approval for use can occur and identifies administrative units responsible for permits and handling policy violations.

- 1.1. In the State of California, individuals twenty-one years of age or older may legally purchase, possess and consume alcoholic beverages. All State laws are applicable to Los Rios Community College District, and to all individuals on the properties of the District.
- 1.1.1.—The Business and Professions Code and related statutes control the acquisition, possession, use, sale, and -consumption, and possession—of alcoholic beverages. The California State Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) Board is responsible for interpretation and enforcement of these laws-regarding the consumption, sale, or possession—of—alcoholic—beverages. The College Police are responsible for exercising normal police powers in enforcing laws relating to alcohol on Los Rios Community College District and College property.

2.0. Limitations, Requirements and Restrictions

- 2.1. This Regulation is subject to all applicable State and Federal laws.—and Board Policy P-1414. Regulation R-1414 shall govern all activities involving alcoholic beverages on District property
- 2.2. No person, group or organization may possess;, consume;, sell;, give;, distribute or otherwise deliver to any other person, group or organization; any alcoholic beverage in or on any of the District/College grounds, buildings or facilities. Any violation may be punishable as a misdemeanor violation of Business & Professions Code section 25608 or any successor statutes. Violations by District employees or students may be punished to the maximum extent allowed by law, including termination or expulsion (Board Policy P-1414).
- 2.3. The following exception exists, pursuant to Business & Professions Code section 25608(a)(10) or any successor statute. Alcoholic beverages may be acquired, possessed, or used during events at a District owned or District operated facility or grounds. As used in this subsection, "events" means fund raisers held to benefit a nonprofit corporation that has obtained an appropriate liquor license for the event. "Events" does not include football games, athletic contests or other athletic related events sponsored by any college or school. "Nonprofit corporations" includes, but is not limited to, the Los Rios Foundation and its related College Foundation groups (Board Policy P 1414).
- 2.4. The following exception exists, pursuant to Business & Professions Code section 25608(a)(2) or any successor statute. Alcoholic beverages may be acquired, possessed, or used in connection with a course of instruction (including culinary arts and/or public safety courses) provided on College/District grounds, facilities

or buildings, and the person has been authorized to acquire, possess, or use it by the governing body or other administrative head of the District.

- The Chancellor has designated the General Counsel-or-designee to act in all 2.52 matters related to alcoholic beverages on College/District grounds, buildings or facilities. In conjunction with the General Counsel, tThe General CounselChancellor has also designated the College President as the person responsible for these actions at each College. The President may consult with the Vice President of Student Services or designee when an event may involve students. The President may consult with the Vice President of Instruction when authorization for the acquisition, possession or use of alcohol on the College/District grounds, buildings or facilities is sought in conjunction with a course of instruction.
- Persons who seek authorization for the acquisition, possession, sale, use or 2.63 consumption -or use of alcohol in conjunction with a course of instruction (including culinary arts and public safety courses), sponsored dinners, or meal demonstrations given as part of the culinary arts program on College grounds, buildings or facilities, shall submit a written request to the President of that College for authorization. Persons who seek that authorization for District grounds, buildings or facilities shall submit the written request to General Counsel. The request shall contain a brief description of the methods of acquisition, possession, sale, use or consumptionacquisition, possession or use of alcohol in that course, and the reasons for the need for the use of alcohol. -in conjunction with that course. The President or General Counsel shall only grant authorization for the acquisition, possession or use of alcohol when the President or General Counsel determines the course of instruction acquisition, possession or use of alcohol. At any time, the authorization so granted may be revoked by the Chancellor, the Board of Trustees, or the person who authorized the activity. The President or designee shall provide all such authorizations to the Director of General Services.
- FPersons who seek authorization for the acquisition, possession, sale, use or consumption of alcohol in conjunction with or fund raising events or special events held on College/District propertyon-College grounds, buildings or facilities, shall submit a written application (See Appendix A) to the President of that College and the General Counsel for authorization. Persons who seek that authorization for District grounds, buildings or facilities shall submit the written application to the General Counsel., -alcoholic beverages may be allowed only when tThe President and General Counsel-or designee shall only grant authorization when he or she determines an event and its location as being is appropriate for the consumption of alcohol. Applications to obtain a permit to serve alcoholic beverages must be obtained from President and shouldshall be submitted at least 30 days prior to the event, and forwarded to the General Counsel's office at least 20 days prior to the event for College events. -A copy of the application form is attached (See Appendix A). An

appropriate-proper permit must-shall be obtained from the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control and shall be submitted with theat least ten (10) days prior to the event; or the event shall be cancelled—District permit. See Where appropriate controls cannot be satisfactorily www.abc.ca.gov.. established, authorization shall not be given for the serving of alcohol. At any time, the authorization so granted may be revoked by the Chancellor, the Board of Trustees, or the person who authorized the activity.

- 2.8. Individuals and/or Oorganizations events must provide verification of insurance coverage as set forth in the District permit application.
- 2.59. When events are held on College/District premises and alcoholic beverages are made available as part of the event, the following requirements must be met-by the individuals or groups sponsoring the event:
 - Individuals or groups sponsoring the eEvent sponsors shall implement precautionary measures to insure that alcoholic beverages are not accessible or served to persons under age 21 or to persons who appear intoxicated. The use of a wristband system is encouraged where persons under 21 are present.
 - 2.59.22Direct access to events where alcohol is being served must be restricted to invited or ticketed participants only.
 - 2.5.3 Suitable non-alcoholic beverages and food shall be made available at all functions when alcoholic beverages are served. Non-alcoholic beverages should be of comparable quality and shall be featured as prominently as the alcoholic beverages.
 - 2.5.4 Servers and event assistants are prohibited from consuming any alcoholic beverages at the event.
 - Event sponsors may be required to discontinue the consumption of alcohol at a set time before the scheduled ending of the event.
 - 2.59.3.6 FFor College events, the College Police, in conjunction with the Vice Presidents of Administration, shall establish appropriate levels of police presence for an event. For District events, the College Police, in conjunction with the Director of General Services, shall establish appropriate levels of police presence for an event. Event sponsors may be required to pay for policing at campus events where alcohol is served or sold.

3.0. Infractions, Accountability and Sanctions

- 3.1. ViolationsInfractions by sStudents or sStudent gGroups. Students (or student groups) acting in violation of this Policy P-1414 or Regulation R-1414 shallwill be referred to the relevant Disciplinary Authorities (P-2441) for disciplinary action. In addition, alcohol related violations of the Business and Professions Code or the Penal Code will—shall be forwarded to the appropriate—law enforcement agency byaddressed by the College Police, when appropriate.
- 3.2. Employees of the District who violate this policy are subject to discipline pursuant to the District's established policies, California laws and the terms of any applicable collective bargaining agreement. In addition, alcohol related violations of the Business and Professions Code or the Penal Code shallwill be forwarded to the appropriate law enforcement agencyaddressed by the College Police, when appropriate.
- 3.3. Infractions by non-District Employees and Guests. The College Police are responsible for handling suspected violations of this policy, the Business and Professions Code or the Penal Code, by invitees, contracted workers, visitors or guests on District property and at District functions.

BACKGROUND

Complimentary tickets to events received by public employees usually qualify as gifts to the recipient d often must be disclosed on the recipient's Form 700. Where employees receive such tickets in order to do their jobs, typically those tickets are not considered gifts. The FPPC recently amended its rules for complementary tickets. Those rules allow donors to give complimentary tickets to the District and allow the District to document the receipt and use of the gifts. In order to use this provision, the District must have a policy concerning this issue.

STATUS

The enclosed policy and regulation are required by the FPPC to allow the District to receive undesignated tickets. The Policy appoints the Deputy Chancellor as the person responsible for receiving tickets generally; and the Chancellor for receiving tickets that may be distributed to members of the Board and/or the Deputy Chancellor. It specifies the types of public governmental purposes those tickets can be used for, the limits on the transfer of tickets distributed under the policy; the requirement that these tickets be placed on a public disclosure document filed with the FPPC and the numerous exceptions to these rules. The enclosed regulation details the Deputy Chancellor's managerial and reporting obligations under the Policy.

RECOMMENDATION

This new policy is presented for First Reading.

Complimentary Tickets

1.0 <u>Definitions</u>

8620

- 1.1 "Ceremonial Role" shall mean an act performed at an event by the official as a representative of the District/College at the request of the holder of the event or function where, for a period of time, the focus of the event is on the act performed by the official.
- 1.2 "FPPC" shall mean the California Fair Political Practices Commission.
- 1.3 "Official" shall mean every officer, agent, employee and consultant who is required to file an Annual Statement of Economic Interests (Form 700) pursuant to State law and the District's Conflict of Interest Code (P-8611).
- 1.4 "Ticket" shall mean: tickets or passes that provide admission to a facility or event for entertainment, amusement, recreation or similar purposes, and are obtained by the Los Rios Community College District or its Colleges through one of the following means:
 - 1.4.1 As owner or sponsor of a facility or event.
 - 1.4.2 Received by the District/Colleges from a third party who does not earmark the use of the ticket for a specific official; and the use of the ticket is in the sole discretion of the District/College.
 - 1.4.3 Purchased by the District/Colleges, or received pursuant to a sponsorship or similar contract.

2.0 Public and Governmental Purpose

- 2.1 The Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees delegates the authority to distribute any tickets and/or passes acquired by the District/Colleges for use by the District's Trustees or the Deputy Chancellor to the Chancellor. The District delegates the authority to distribute any other tickets and/or passes in accordance with this Policy to the District's Deputy Chancellor or his or her designee.
- 2.2 The District/Colleges may distribute complimentary tickets to appropriate recipients, including District/College officials, for the purpose of:
 - 2.2.1 Ceremonial occasions.
 - 2.2.2 Official welcoming of visiting dignitaries.
 - 2.2.3 Exchange programs with foreign officials and dignitaries.

- 2.2.4 Community or economic outreach and development.
- 2.2.5 Recognition for direct involvement in District/College related projects/programs.
- 2.2.6 Advertising and promoting the Los Rios Community College District and its four accredited Colleges (American River College, Cosumnes River College, Folsom Lake College, Sacramento City College).
- 2.2.7 Monitoring and evaluating value of District/College sponsored events to the District/College and their compliance with District/College policies, agreements and other requirements.
- 2.2.8 Intergovernmental relations purposes.
- 2.2.9 Supporting local nonprofit and educational activities in the community that support and complement the mission of the District/Colleges.
- 2.2.10 Sponsorship agreements involving private events where the District specifically seeks to enhance the District's/College's reputation.
- 2.2.11 All written contracts where the District, as a form of consideration, has required that a certain number of tickets/suites be made available for District/College use.
- 2.2.12 Employment retention programs.
- 2.2.13 Special outreach programs for students, veterans, faculty, teachers, staff and other civil service occupations.
- 2.2.14 Any purpose similar to those above.
- 2.3 Receipt of consideration of equal or greater value by the District from the official shall be presumed if the tickets and/or passes are distributed pursuant to this Policy.

3.0 <u>Ticket Transfer Limitations</u>

- 3.1 Tickets received by officials under this Policy are for the purpose of having that official participate in the event.
- 3.2 An official may transfer his or her ticket to a guest, as well as the official's immediate family, solely for their attendance at the event. All

- other transfers are prohibited, and no such transferred tickets may be resold.
- 3.3 Each ticket recipient may be offered one additional ticket for her or his immediate family member.
- 3.4 Any official, any member of the official's immediate family, or guest of the official may return any ticket unused to the District for redistribution pursuant to this Policy.

4.0 Public Disclosures

- 4.1 A record of each ticket distributed under this policy shall be completed and forwarded to the Fair Political Practices Commission on its form.
- 4.2 The form shall be a public record and is subject to inspection and copying.
- 4.3 Any District/College official who receives a ticket for an immediate family member must disclose that ticket as a gift on their annual Form 700.

5.0 Exceptions

- 5.1 Tickets provided to officials for an event at which the official plays a ceremonial role shall not constitute a gift and need not be reported on the official's Form 700, but must be reported under the Public Disclosure provision above.
- 5.2 The attendance of an official for the purposes of carrying out the employee's job duties or for the purpose of providing services on behalf of the District/College for the event shall not be considered the distribution of a complimentary ticket and need not be reported under this Policy or on the official's Form 700.
- 5.3 This policy does not apply to tickets provided to an official by sources other than the District/College.
- 5.4 This policy does not apply to tickets provided to the District earmarked for a particular official. Those tickets are considered gifts to that appropriate official. If these tickets are not returned unused to the donor within 30 days of receipt, the official must comply with the applicable FPPC gift limit and reporting regulations.
- 5.5 This policy does not apply to tickets for which the official pays the provider of the ticket the fair market value of the ticket and those tickets need not be reported under this Policy or on the Official's Form 700.

- 5.6 This policy does not apply to tickets to amateur events performed by the students of the District/College and those tickets need not be reported under this Policy or on the Official's Form 700.
- 5.7 Any ticket or pass that is acquired by the District by purchase, contract, or because the agency controls the event and is distributed to a public official, except for an elected official or member of the Board of Trustees, for: (1) the official's personal use, (2) to support general employee morale, (3) retention, or (4) to reward public service shall be deemed to be for personal use and is not reportable on the official's Form 700.

6.0 Administrative Regulations

6.1 The Chancellor shall develop administrative regulations to implement this policy.

1.0 Administrator

- 1.1 The Deputy Chancellor or designee shall be the ticket administrator responsible for implementing the complimentary ticket policy.
- 1.2 The ticket administrator shall be responsible for reporting the distribution of tickets required below.
- 1.3 The ticket administrator will establish procedures for the distribution of tickets in accordance with the complimentary ticket policy. At a minimum, the ticket administrator will:
 - 1.3.1 Manage the receipt, distribution and accounting for all tickets or passes subject to the complimentary ticket policy.
 - 1.3.2 Ensure tickets or passes distributed by the District/College under this policy serve at least one of the public purposes as defined in the complimentary ticket policy.
 - 1.3.3 Ensure tickets distributed pursuant to this complimentary ticket policy are disclosed on the FPPC Form.
 - 1.3.4 Each disclosure form shall include:
 - 1.3.4.1 The name of the person receiving the ticket or pass;
 - 1.3.4.2 A description of the event;
 - 1.3.4.3 The date of the event;
 - 1.3.4.4 The face value of the ticket or pass;
 - 1.3.4.5 The number of tickets or passes provided to each person;
 - 1.3.4.6 If the ticket or pass was behested, the name of the official who behested the ticket; and
 - 1.3.4.7 A description of the public purpose under which the distribution was made, or alternatively, that the ticket or pass was distributed as income to the official.
 - 1.3.5 Sign each disclosure form verifying that the distribution of tickets is in accordance with the provisions of FPPC Regulation section 18944.1.
 - 1.3.6 Ensure the disclosure form is provided to the FPPC in a timely fashion.
