Folsom Lake College faculty, classified staff, and administrators provided a report on the college's history, successes, partnerships, and growth from 1966 to today. The College celebrates its tenth anniversary of receiving its initial accreditation this year.

7. BOARD MEMBER REPORTS

Ms. Haynes reported her participation in the California Community College League's legislative conference. She commended the Los Rios Foundation for recruiting two new board members, and thanked Sacramento City College for their continued support of the annual MLK March.

Mr. Johnson reported his participation in Folsom Lake College's Convocation, an American River College event for past student body presidents, and the Steps to College event hosted by the Mexican Consulate.

Ms. Albiani participated in Cosumnes River College's Convocation and the Los Rios Foundation board meeting. She congratulated Babs Sandeen for being honored as the Metro Chamber's "Volunteer of the Year."

Mr. Lemus reported that approximately 30 students participated in Lobby Day, and is looking forward to attending a national conference to advocate on behalf of Pell Grants.

Chancellor's Report:

ARC: American River College's Paramedic and Respiratory Care programs both report that their graduates enjoy 100 percent pass rates. ARC's Paramedic program has earned a 100 percent pass rate on the National Registry licensing exam for several years now. This means that every paramedic student who becomes eligible to sit for the exam must have already demonstrated competency in several mandatory preliminary exams and internship opportunities. And the Respiratory Care program's 100 percent pass rate has held up for the past three years, while the national average is around 80 percent. In addition, 100 percent of the 2012 Respiratory Care class also passed an advanced credentialing or registry exam on their first attempt. Compare that with a national average in the 50 percent to 60 percent range. So, congratulations to these fine students and their instructors.

<u>CRC</u>: Nearly 100 participants representing Cosumnes River College, the Elk Grove Unified School District and the local community came together for a Linked Learning Community Stakeholders' meeting last week at the Winn Center. The purpose of the meeting was to validate the Elk Grove school district's Graduate Profile and assess the community's need for and capacity to implement a Linked Learning initiative. Linked Learning is an approach that helps students ensure that they are college- and career-ready. It requires new instructional practices, assessments, student support systems, school designs and organizational practices, community and workplace connections, teacher preparation and professional development.

<u>FLC:</u> Folsom Lake College's Harris Center hosted the Lenaea High School Theatre Festival from January 31 to February 2. Sacramento State had hosted the annual festival for the past 56 years, and it now resides at FLC. FLC theatre students gained valuable leadership experience by managing the festival, and serving as hosts and performance venue supervisors for the event. The festival welcomed more than 1,150 students from 58 west coast high school theatre programs, offering them the Harris Center's stunning and professional performance spaces for critiques of student performances of one act plays, monologues, scenes and songs. The festival provides the high school students with workshops and mentoring from statewide theatre professionals and faculty members.

<u>SCC:</u> The Phi Theta Kappa honor society has selected a Sacramento City College administrator and an exemplary student for two prestigious honors:

- Dr. Mary Leland, executive director of SCC's College Advancement/Foundation Office, was named one of Phi Theta Kappa's "Distinguished College Administrator Award" winners. Only 25 college administrators, nominated by their PTK chapter, are selected for this honor, and recipients will be honored at the honor society's annual convention in April.
- SCC student Rhea Gibbs was selected by Phi Theta Kappa as an International Scholar Laureate. The honor places Gibbs among the most highly accomplished college students. The International Scholar Laureate Program combines career-focused site visits with unique cultural exchanges, topical lectures and discussions with host nation students and professors around the world.

Course Deletions

American River College

1. ACCT 108 Careers in Accounting (2.00 units)

Justification: This course no longer meets the needs of our students.

2. FSE 1000 California Embalmer's Examination Review (0.50 units)

Justification: This course no longer meets the needs of our students.

3. JAPAN 401 Elementary Japanese (4.00 units)

Justification: This course no longer meets the needs of our students.

4. JAPAN 402 Elementary Japanese (4.00 units)

Justification: This course no longer meets the needs of our students.

5. NURSE 495 Independent Studies in Nursing (1.00 - 3.00 units)

Justification: Nursing has not/does not offer any independent study options for students...

6. PSYC 331 Introduction to Statistics For The Behavioral Sciences - Lab (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course no longer meets the needs of our students.

7. RC 113 Respiratory Care Fundamentals Laboratory (1.00 unit)

Justification: RC 113 is integrated into RC 111 and is no longer needed.

8. RC 120 Orientation to Clinical Externships (1.00 unit)

Justification: RC 120 is integrated into RC 111 and is no longer needed.

9. SPAN 408 Elementary Spanish I Multimedia Enhancement (2.00 units)

Justification: This course no longer meets the needs of our students.

10. SPAN 409 Elementary Spanish II Multimedia Enhancement (2.00 units)

Justification: This course no longer meets student needs.

11. SPAN 418 Intermediate Spanish I Multimedia Enhancement (2.00 units)

Justification: This course no longer meets student needs.

12. SPAN 419 Intermediate Spanish II Multimedia Enhancement (2.00 units)

Justification: This course no longer meets student needs.

13. WELD 123 Welding Certification to D 1.5 Bridge Code (1.00 unit)

Justification: Department chair and staff decided to delete Weld 123 because we are no longer working with Caltrans.

Cosumnes River College

1. FITNS 364 Snowboarding (1.50 units)

Justification: Upon review by the Kinesiology Department, it has been determined that this course no longer serves our long term goals.

2. FITNS 368 Mini Fitness Topics (0.50 units)

Justification: Upon review by the Kinesiology Department, it has been determined that this course no longer serves our long term goals.

3. **JOUR 150 Public Relations Media Techniques (3.00 units)**

Justification: This course was revised and approved as JOUR 351. JOUR 150 will no longer be offered, and is no longer needed.

4. NUTRI 330 Food Theory and Preparation (4.00 units)

Justification: This course has been replaced with CAM 301 to better serve our students.

5. PS 302 Introduction to Physical Science (4.00 units)

Justification: Upon department review, it has been decided that this course no longer meets the needs of students. While a popular general education choice a decade or more ago, recent expansion of physical science GE course offerings at CRC such as Astronomy, Conceptual Physics, Earth Science and Physical Geography have reduced demand for this course and left it no longer necessary.

6. PS 495 Independent Studies in Physical Science (1.00 - 3.00 units)

Justification: Upon department review, it has been decided that this course is not needed. The only regular course under the physical science (PS) designator, PS 302, is being deleted.

7. PS 499 Experimental Offering in Physical Science (0.50 - 4.00 units)

Justification: Upon department review, it has been decided that this course is not needed. The only regular course under the physical science (PS) designator, PS 302, is being deleted.

8. VIET 101 Conversational Vietnamese, Elementary (3.00 units)

Justification: Many of the course SLOs and topics in VIET 101 are taught in Vietnamese 401 and 402 and there is little demand for this non-transferable course. We recommend its deletion.

9. VIET 102 Conversational Vietnamese, Elementary (3.00 units)

Justification: Many of the course SLOs and topics in VIET 102 are taught in Vietnamese 401 and 402 and there is little demand for this non-transferable course. We recommend its deletion.

10. VIET 311 Conversational Vietnamese, Intermediate (2.00 units)

Justification: Many of the course SLOs and topics in VIET 311 are taught in Vietnamese 401 and 402. We recommend its deletion.

11. VIET 312 Conversational Vietnamese, Intermediate (2.00 units)

Justification: Many of the course SLOs and topics in VIET 312 are taught in Vietnamese 401 and 402. We recommend its deletion.

Folsom Lake College

1. ART 494 Topics in Art (0.50 - 4.00 units)

Justification: The department has agreed to delete this course. Due to the FTE reduction over the years the department was unable to offer this course. The department also agreed to delete this as part of the degree requirement from AA in Studio Art since the department does not foresee offering this in the near future.

2. KINES 413 Group Fitness Instructor Certification (3.00 units)

Justification: The Group Fitness Instructor Certificate has been deleted. This course was written solely for that certificate and is no longer needed.

3. NUTRI 307 Nutrition for Fitness (2.00 units)

Justification: NUTRI 307 with 2 units did not offer enough class time to adequately cover the material necessary for "sports nutrition." NUTRI 302 Nutrition for Physical Performance with 3 units is better suited for FLC programs with respect to lecture, activities, and projects used to teach the material.

New to District Courses

American River College

1. ECE 407 Curriculum and Strategies for Children with Special Needs (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: ECE 404 with a grade of "C" or better

54.00 hours lecture

This course covers curriculum and intervention strategies for working with children with special needs and partnering with their families. It focuses on the use of observation and assessment in meeting the individualized needs of children and families in inclusive and natural environments. Topics include the role of the teacher as a professional working with families, collaboration with interdisciplinary teams, and the importance of cultural competence.

Justification: This new course reflects the statewide effort in Early Childhood Education (ECE) for alignment of courses that prepare the California workforce. This is one of seven courses in the Curriculum Alignment Expansion Project (CAP Expansion). With ECE 404, it prepares ECE professionals for working with children with special needs.

2. ET 197 Introduction to Mechatronics (4.00 units)

Prerequisite: ET 302 with a grade of "C" or better

54.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This course introduces mechatronics, the combination of electronic and mechanical components and systems used in the control and transmission of mechanical power. Topics include the analysis of electric controls, programmable logic controllers (PLCs), electromagnetic devices, sensors, pneumatic devices, and electric motors.

Justification: This course is part of an update for the Mechtronics Degree and Certificate in order to meet the changing manufacturing and employment environment. The Mechatronic series ET 197 and ET 199 will replace ET 192 (Basic Robotics), ET 194 (Intermediate Robotics), ET 195 (Electrical and Mechanical Control Systems) and ET 196 (Sensors Measurement and Control) for a reduction of one unit.

3. ET 199 Advanced Mechatronics (4.00 units)

Prerequisite: ET 197 with a grade of "C" or better

54.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This course continues the study of mechatronics, the combination of electronic and mechanical components and systems used in the control and transmission of mechanical power. Topics include the analysis of electric circuits and controls, operator interface

terminals, programmable logic controllers (PLCs), electromagnetic devices, analog and digital measurements, sensors, pneumatic devices, and electric motors.

Justification: This course is part of an update for the Mechtronics Degree and Certificate in order to meet the changing manufacturing and employment environment. The Mechatronic series ET 197 and ET 199 will replace ET 192 (Basic Robotics), ET 194 (Intermediate Robotics), ET 195 (Electrical and Mechanical Control Systems) and ET 196 (Sensors Measurement and Control) for a reduction of one unit.

Cosumnes River College

1. AMT 130 Ford ASSET Advanced Automatic Transmission Diagnosis (1.50 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Students taking this course must be enrolled in the Ford Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program due to prerequisite Ford Motor Company training requirements.

27.00 hours lecture

This course is offered to students enrolled in the Ford Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program. This course provides a review of electronically controlled automatic transmissions and transaxles to include electronic control system theory, hydraulic/mechanical system theory, electronic testing procedures, hydraulic testing procedures, mechanical testing procedures, module programming and configuration, and adaptive shift strategies. Students who successfully complete this course may be eligible for Ford Service Technician Specialty Training (STST) certification.

Justification: This course enables students to earn a Service Technician Specialized Training (STST) certification from Ford Motor Company needed in order to earn Graduate status from the Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program from Ford Motor Company. This course is also designed to train students on advanced technologies currently in use in automatic transmissions and transaxles that are not covered in the AMT 378 (Ford ASSET Automatic Transmissions/Transaxles) course.

2. AMT 131 Ford ASSET Diesel Engine Performance (1.50 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Students taking this course must be enrolled in the Ford Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program due to prerequisite Ford Motor Company training requirements.

27.00 hours lecture

This course is offered to students enrolled in the Ford Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program. This course provides a review of light duty diesel engine performance systems to include diesel engine theory, air induction systems, fuel

systems, starting aid systems, emission controls, and exhaust after-treatment systems. Students who successfully complete this course may be eligible for Ford Service Technician Specialty Training (STST) certification.

Justification: This course enables students to earn a Service Technician Specialized Training (STST) certification from Ford Motor Company needed in order to earn graduate status from the Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program from Ford Motor Company. This course is also provided in response to strong industry demand for technicians with knowledge of light duty diesel engines and their associated systems.

3. AMT 370 Ford ASSET Automotive Fundamentals and Dealership Practices (4.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Students taking this course must be enrolled in the Ford Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program. Some training materials utilized in this course require access to restricted Ford Motor Company websites obtained via enrollment in the Ford Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program and establishment of a Ford/Lincoln dealership sponsorship.

72.00 hours lecture

This course is offered to students enrolled in the Ford Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program. This course provides an introduction into the theory and operation of major automotive systems including: gasoline engines, electrical systems, transmissions and drivetrains, steering, suspension, and brakes. Common automotive hand tools, power tools, and equipment will also be introduced and demonstrated to familiarize students with a typical automotive shop. Typical new-car dealership hierarchy and structure along with standard practices will be investigated. Students who successfully complete this course may be eligible for Ford Service Technician Specialty Training (STST) certification.

Justification: This course is being launched as part of a larger-scale curriculum project for the Ford Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program. In the past, the Ford ASSET program has shared the AMT 300: Automotive Fundamentals and Shop Procedures course with the traditional automotive program. This new course proposal will allow the department to better align each course with the needs of the department's two automotive programs. This course enables students to earn Web Based Training (WBT) certifications from Ford Motor Company needed in order to earn graduate status from the Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program from Ford Motor Company. This course is also designed to orient students to the Ford ASSET program and prepare them for the first cooperative work experience session at a Ford/Lincoln dealership. In addition, the course satisfies departmental objectives for maintaining National Automotive Technicians Education Foundation (NATEF) accreditation at the Master Automobile Service Technology (MAST) level.

4. AMT 372 Ford ASSET Automotive Brake Systems (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Students taking this course must be enrolled in the Ford Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program. Some training materials utilized in this course require access to restricted Ford Motor Company websites obtained via enrollment in the Ford Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program and establishment of a Ford/Lincoln dealership sponsorship.

36.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This course is offered to students enrolled in the Ford Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program. This course covers the theory, diagnosis, and repair of automotive brake systems, including anti-lock braking systems (ABS). Students who successfully complete this course may be eligible for Ford Service Technician Specialty Training (STST) certification.

Justification: This course enables students to earn a Service Technician Specialized Training (STST) certification from Ford Motor Company needed in order to earn Graduate status from the Automotive Student Service Education Training (ASSET) program from Ford Motor Company. This course is also required in order to maintain National Automotive Technicians Education Foundation (NATEF) accreditation as a Master Automotive Service Technology (MAST) program. In the past, the Ford ASSET program has shared the AMT 316: Automotive Brakes course with the traditional automotive program. This new course will allow the department to better align each course with the needs of the two different programs and will improve the department's cooperation with National Automotive Technicians Education Foundation (NATEF) accreditation renewal processes.

5. BUS 215 Entrepreneurial Opportunity and Business Planning (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

54.00 hours lecture

This course provides students with insight and knowledge into developing their entrepreneurial opportunity and creating a business plan for it. Students will research entrepreneurial ideas and determine how to turn an idea into a successful startup enterprise given the current and anticipated demographic, technological and social climates. Students will also be offered an organized, step-by-step approach to preparing a business plan. Once students are able to assess the feasibility of their own business ideas based on their personal strengths, skills, and financial goals, they will develop and produce a comprehensive business plan. Students will analyze the organization and management of a new business and map out how to execute a new business venture. The plan will enable the students to solve problems "on paper" before they become operational or money problems. Students with little entrepreneurial experience or have business idea they would like to pursue will benefit from this course.

Justification: The course is required for the newly created Certificate of Proficiency in Entrepreneurship/Small Business Management.

6. GEOG 392 Field Studies in Geography: Coastal Landscapes (1.00 - 4.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

6.00 - 24.00 hours lecture, 36.00 - 144.00 hours laboratory

This is a field studies course of the geography of coastal landscapes. Physical and cultural processes, characteristics and landscapes will be observed and analyzed. Specific content will vary by geographic region. A field trip is required.

Justification: In conjunction with the other Los Rios Geography departments, we propose developing a series of four courses that will be more specific to field studies in a particular environment, as opposed to the general 390 specification currently used. This is the first course at CRC in that series of courses.

7. SPORT 404 Pre-Season Conditioning for Volleyball (0.50 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Once enrolled, the student must demonstrate intercollegiate athletic skills as determined by the coaching staff to remain enrolled in this course. It is advised that athletes taking this course have participated at the varsity level in high school or competed on a club volleyball team.

27.00 hours laboratory

This physical education course involves a combination of skill development and strategy tactics with an emphasis on a fitness component for the sport of volleyball. The course will also offer a mental training component for peak performance. This course is designed to prepare students for intercollegiate volleyball competition and may be repeated a maximum of four times to meet California Community College Athletic Association requirements for eligibility.

Justification: This course meets title 5 requirements for out of season athletics.

PROGRAM PROPOSALS

Program Deletion(s)

American River College

1. Business Transfer

Justification: The AS-T degree has been approved. To have two transfer degrees in the catalog would confuse students.

Folsom Lake College

1. **Design**

Justification: The department agreed to delete the AA Degree in Art, Design for a number of reasons. The design degree was initially inherited from CRC. We currently do not have a discipline expert who could further develop the program and teach the courses. Due to a loss in FTE, we have not been able to offer some of the courses and students are currently taking the courses at other colleges in the district. Additionally, the department feels that the current degree requirements do not prepare students adequately for transfer in the discipline or for the industry at large.

New Programs

American River College

1. Anthropology

The Associate in Arts degree in Anthropology for Transfer provides students with a major that fulfills the general requirements of the California State University for transfer. Students with this degree will receive priority admission with junior status to the California State University system. The Associate in Arts degree in Anthropology for Transfer (AA-T) may be obtained by the completion of 60 transferable, semester units with a minimum 2.0 GPA, including (a) the major or area of emphasis described in the Required Program outlined below (earning a C or better in these courses) and (b) either the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California State University General Education Breadth Requirements. Anthropology is the study of humankind around the world and throughout time, with the goal of understanding our evolutionary origins, our biological distinction as a species, and our diverse manifestations of culture. A degree in anthropology provides the student with basic skills in critical analysis, application of the scientific method, and cross-cultural understanding.

Justification: This proposal is for a new AA-T degree in Anthropology, and meets district goals to offer associate degrees for transfer.

2. Training Instructor 1A

This certificate is the first of a three-certificate series. Topics include methods and techniques for training in accordance with the latest concepts in career education; selecting, adapting, organizing, and using instructional materials appropriate for teaching cognitive lessons; criteria and methods to evaluate teaching and learning efficiency; and an opportunity to apply major principles of learning through teaching demonstrations. Two (2) student instructor teaching demonstrations are required of all.

Justification: This certificate program meets the training needs of local fire agencies by providing additional skills in fire instructor training.

3. Training Instructor 1B

This certificate is the second of a three-certificate series. Topics include methods/techniques for training with the latest concepts in career education; selecting, adapting, organizing, and using instructional materials appropriate for teaching psychomotor lessons; criteria and methods to evaluate teaching and learning efficiency; and an opportunity to apply major principles of learning through teaching demonstrations.

Justification: This certificate program meets the training needs of local fire agencies by providing additional skills in fire instructor training.

4. Training Instructor 1C

This certificate is the third of a three-certificate series. Topics include methods and techniques for developing lesson plans, ancillary components, and tests in accordance with the latest concepts in career education. This course offers the opportunity to develop, receive feedback, and finalize instructional materials, and deliver a teaching demonstration.

Justification: This certificate program meets the training needs of local fire agencies by providing additional skills in fire instructor training.

Folsom Lake College

1. Geology

Geology is an interdisciplinary science that combines geological observations and concepts with those of biology, chemistry, physics, and mathematics. The goals are to study rocks, minerals, fossils, energy and water resources, and to understand geologic principles and processes that shape Earth and its environments. The Associate in Science in Geology for Transfer (AS-T) provides students with a major that fulfills the general requirements of the California State University for transfer. Students with this degree will receive priority admission with junior status to the California State University system. The AS-T may be obtained by the completion of 60 transferable, semester units with a minimum of a 2.0 GPA, including (a) the major or area of emphasis described in the Required Program outlined below (earning a C or better in these courses), and (b) either the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California State University General Education-Breadth Requirements. The GEOL AS-T degree does not require coursework in Physics but it is recommended that Geology students take physics coursework as they pursue their Geology degree.

Justification: This degree is being initiated to provide those students who are interested in pursuing a degree in Geology a streamlined path to transfer to the CSU system.

2. Nutrition

Folsom Lake College's Department of Nutrition offers an Associate's Degree Program to prepare the student for further study in nutrition and foods, or a program in dietetics. Note to transfer students: If your goal is to transfer to a four-year institution to obtain a Bachelor's degree in nutrition or dietetics, you must meet with a counselor and plan the courses for your major. Schools have different requirements for transfer and Bachelor degrees.

Justification: This new AS degree in Nutrition is designed for students with an interest in food and nutrition. The courses have been changed since first reading due to a new ADT that is currently being vetted in preparation for CI-D.

3. Theatre Arts: Technical

The program in technical theatre prepares students for an entry-level career in technical theatre arts. Career options include roadhouse stagehand, rigger, audio engineer, scene shop technician, scenic artist, property artisan, electrician, costume technician, or stage manager.

Justification: This certificate program intends to take advantage of the visual and performing arts center on the FLC campus. Students will have the opportunity to work alongside professionals in the industry while earning certification in stagehand practices.

Sacramento City College

1. History

The history major fosters an understanding of ourselves and our world through the study of the past, both remote and recent. The program develops critical thinking and a broad background in issues and ideas from our past. The major thus prepares students for transfer to BA programs in history. It also offers students fundamental preparation for careers in business, government, teaching, and a number of professional fields (for example, paralegal or law careers). The Associate Degree for Transfer student completion requirements (as stated in SB 1440 law): (1) Completion of 60 semester units or 90 quarter units that are eligible for transfer to the California State University, including both of the following: (A) The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California State University General Education-Breadth Requirements; (B) A minimum of 18 semester units or 27 quarter units in a major or area of emphasis, as determined by the community college district. (2) Obtainment of a minimum grade point average of 2.0. ADTs also require that students must earn a C or better in all courses required for the major or area of emphasis. A "P" (Pass) grade is not an acceptable grade for courses in the major.

Justification: This proposal for an Associate in Arts in History for Transfer degree program follows the statewide mandate issued by the legislature (SB 1440) to create transfer degrees in the community colleges that articulate with degree programs in the CSU system. The degree program proposed here conforms to the Transfer Model Curriculum developed by the statewide committee of CC and CSU history instructors in conjunction with the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office.

2. Philosophy

This program is intended to prepare students for transfer into baccalaureate philosophy programs at the California State University. It provides essential lower division work and offers a broad selection of elective courses. It also offers the opportunity to develop general skills, such as critical thinking, comprehending challenging reading materials, and producing clear and precise argumentative writing, which are useful in a broad range of endeavors. The Associate Degree for Transfer student completion requirements (as stated in SB1440 law): (1) Completion of 60 semester units or 90 quarter units that are eligible for transfer to the California State University, including both of the following: (A) The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the

California State University General Education –Breadth Requirements. (B) A minimum of 18 semester units or 27 quarter units in a major or area of emphasis, as determined by the community college district. (2) Obtainment of a minimum grade point average of 2.0. ADTs also require that students must earn a C or better in all courses required for the major or area of emphasis. A "P" (Pass) grade is not an acceptable grade for courses in the major.

Justification: This program proposal responds to the statewide mandate issued by the legislature (SB1440) to create transfer degrees in the community colleges that articulate with degree programs in the CSU system. The program conforms to the Transfer Model Curriculum developed by the statewide committee of CC and CSU philosophy instructors in conjunction with the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office.

3. Political Science

This program is designed to provide a clearly articulated curricular track for Sacramento City College students preparing to transfer in Political Science while also serving the diverse needs of students interested in the breadth and depth of the field. This program will expose students to some of the principles and techniques of political science and help students build a foundation for their personal, academic, or professional interests. Sacramento City College offers a unique political science experience that combines both the science and art of politics that can only be appreciated in the heart of California's capital. Faculty provide a strong orientation to the world of politics by blending theory and real-world activities, which students will value throughout their academic and professional careers. The Associate Degree for Transfer student completion requirements (as stated in SB 1440 law): (1) Completion of 60 semester units or 90 quarter units that are eligible for transfer to the California State University, including both of the following:(A) The Intersegmental General Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California State University General Education--Breadth Requirements; (B) A minimum of 18 semester units or 27 quarter units in a major or area of emphasis, as determined by the community college district. (2) Obtainment of a minimum grade point average of 2.0. ADTs also require that students must earn a C or better in all courses required for the major or area of emphasis. A "P" (Pass) grade is not an acceptable grade for courses in the major.

Justification: This degree program is being created to bring the college in compliance with the objectives of SB 1440.

BACKGROUND:

The Education Code regulates the procedures by which a community college district can dispose of real and personal property. Education Code section 81452 provides that the governing board may, by unanimous vote, dispose of items valued at \$5,000 or less by private sale without advertising or selling the items at public auction. The District has previously held an auction, at least annually and past auctions have generally cost more than they have netted for the District. In 1998, the District began transferring such surplus items to the State of California since the cost to store and sell such surplus items is greater than potential revenues.

STATUS:

The District has a quantity of surplus material, such as outdated desks and computers, which need to be disposed of. The State of California has accepted some of the surplus items but is not willing to take the entire surplus because they are unable to sell it. The District has located a scrap dealer who is willing to take most of our surplus items and recycle them.

All of the surplus items to be disposed of are either broken and/or not working, obsolete, in poor condition, or not needed for district/college operations: 25 audio recorders; 5 augers; 1 binding machine; 2 bookcases; 12 cabinets; 1 cart; 121 chairs; 4 computers; 1 display; 2 film dryers; 9 fluid/soil samplers; 5 hard drives; 7 keyboards; 2 keyboard trays; 3 monitors; 6 printers; 3 projectors; 3 psychrometers; 1 refrigerator; 3 scanners; 1 telephone; and 3 televisions. These items have a value of less than \$5,000.

BACKGROUND:

A subcommittee of the Board of Trustees recently reviewed its Policy on Legislative Matters and proposed changes.

STATUS:

The proposed changes have been vetted through the participatory governance process. The first major proposed change is to provide for the Board to adopt a statement of legislative principles annually and for the Chancellor to take positions on legislation consistent with that statement. If there are legislative issues that fall outside of that statement, the Chancellor will consult with the Board, or the Board President, as time permits. The proposed Policy does not require the Chancellor to consult with the Board where the position is consistent with prior positions taken by the District, time restraints prohibit consultation, or the matter is consistent with existing Policies, Regulations, or practice. Finally, the Board reserves the right to approve legislation that the District sponsors before the legislature.

RECOMMENDATION:

These proposed revisions are presented for First Reading.

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1.0 Intent

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- 1.1 It is the intent of the Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees that the Los Rios Community College District play an active and central role in influencing legislation that will have a significant impact on the District, its students and its staff.
- 1.2 The Board of Trustees shall adopt and annually review a Statement of

 Legislative Principles that shall provide the basic parameters to guide the

 Board and the Chancellor in taking positions on matters pending before the

 Legislature, the Governor, the Congress, and the President.
- 1.32 The Board of Trustees delegates to the Chancellor the responsibility to lead the District governmental relations program in alignment with the Board's Statement of Legislative Principles.
- 1.43 The Chancellor, and staff under the Chancellor's direction, shall have discretion in determining how best to attempt to influence such legislation.

2.0 <u>Implementation</u>

- 2.1 The Board of Trustees shall not may adopt official positions on specific legislative issues unless only when the outcome will have a significant impact on the District. The Board of Trustees may adopt resolutions in support of statewide and local education bonds.
- 2.2 The Board of Trustees shall participate in and direct the development of statewide budget priorities and a legislative agenda by offering guidance to those state and national organizations that request it.
- 2.3 The Chancellor, in carrying out the Board of Trustees' intent, shall operate under the following general parameters:
 - 2.3.1 The Chancellor shall generally adopt positions consistent with the Board of Trustee's Statement of Legislative Principles and shall generally adopt positions consistent with the legislative programs and recommendations of the California Community Colleges.
 - 2.3.2 For matters outside the parameters of 2.3.1, the Chancellor shall seek the Board of Trustees input prior to adopting positions on major legislative issues. Where timely action is required, the Chancellor shall consult with the Board President and take action in accordance with that consultation. In such cases, the Chancellor shall also seek input from relevant District constituent groups. The

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Chancellor may take a position on a legislative matter without prior approval when:

- 2.3.2.1 The Chancellor determines the matter is similar to a prior issue on which the District has taken a position; or
- 2.3.2.2 Time restraints make consultation infeasible; or
- 2.3.2.3 The legislative matter is consistent with existing District Policies, Regulations or procedures.
- 2.3.2 In the case of unusually controversial issues, the Chancellor shall be expected to seek Board of Trustees input prior to adopting positions on legislative issues. If the Chancellor deems an issue to be unusually controversial, the Chancellor shall consult with the Board of Trustees President prior to adopting a position. In such cases, the Chancellor shall also seek input from relevant District constituent groups.
- 2.3.3 The Chancellor shall seek direction from the Board of Trustees on items of extraordinary significance.
- 2.3.4 The Chancellor shall regularly report to the Board of Trustees on the Chancellor's activities in this area.
- 2.3.5 Any position taken by the <u>Board</u>, Chancellor or staff, under the Chancellor's direction, shall be the official position of the District and does not necessarily reflect the personal opinion of any member of the Board of Trustees, the Chancellor or of any staff member.
- 2.3.6 The Board may approve any legislation sponsored by the District before it is formally introduced into legislation.

BACKGROUND:

The Long Range Capital Plan includes funds to construct the Rancho Cordova Education Center. SKW Architecture was hired to work with campus and District staff to design this project. The estimated total construction cost for this project is \$11,180,296 and will construct the first phase building and associated parking lots and roadway improvements.

The building is funded from local bond Measure A and the parking lots and roadway improvements are funded from local bond Measure M.

STATUS:

The plans and specifications were publicly advertised for bids. Bidders were asked to provide a lump sum bid amount. A total of nine (9) bids, including nine (9) alternates, were received.

BACKGROUND:

The Sacramento Republic soccer franchise originally expressed an interest in using Hughes Stadium for its home games. Ultimately, however, the field was not compatible with their requirements and they have set their sights on a soccer-only field to be built at Cal Expo. That field will not be available in time for their Home Opener on April 26, 2014.

STATUS:

The Republic has asked to rent Hughes Stadium for three games planned for April 26, May 3, and May 17. Staff is currently working with the Sacramento Republic and Ovations as their food and beverage concessionaire (Aramark declined this contract). The Republic proposes to serve beer at the stadium at each of these three games. Under the District's Policy and the relevant Business and Professions Code provisions, this is allowed provided that Ovations secures the approval of the Board of Trustees for these events and obtains the appropriate liquor licenses to serve alcohol. Ovations has done business in Sacramento and has a long positive history at Cal Expo. Ovations has its own liquor license and the College will be working with them to obtain single day permits to sell alcohol at each of the soccer matches. Working with the Los Rios Police Department, the College and Ovations will implement safeguards that will include the restriction of alcohol to inside the stadium grounds (i.e., no tailgating), an appropriate cutoff for the alcohol service during the second half (well in advance of the end of the game), and ensuring that minors and intoxicated fans will not be served.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board approve the use and rental of Hughes Stadium for the Sacramento Republic soccer events in the spring of 2014.
