Chancellor's Report:

ARC: American River College students and alumni were both on stage and behind the scenes during the recent Sacramento Fashion Week. Several current fashion students worked as volunteer interns – building runways, helping with VIP gift bags and helping with front-of-house meet and greet. Those students were assisted by several fashion graduates who were coordinating the show. In addition, current and former ARC fashion students Yennie Zhou, Michael Kouri, Joanna Durkee, Saul Ramirez and Jesus Medrano had their designs featured on the runway this year.

CRC: Four Cosumnes River College students were selected to attend NASA's National Community College Aerospace Scholars program that took place last week. Two of those students, Berenice Cervantes and Ivan Rodriguez, along with their team members, took home top prize in a competition to design and pitch their own mission to Mars. The students built a rover vehicle out of Legos and then had to use the rover to complete several tasks, including picking up rocks and performing a simulated rescue mission. Cervantes and Rodriguez's team won the competition because they designed the best rover for those tasks, and they created a budget and presented a marketing plan to "sell" their product to NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory. Rodriguez is majoring in Civil Engineering and will transfer to Sac State in the fall, and Cervantes is an Aerospace Engineering major.

<u>FLC:</u> Folsom Lake College Professor Matt Wright has been named California's Health Educator of the Year! Wright – whose winning attitude is to take any job you're offered and teach anything you are asked to teach – has done just that since he joined the California community college system in 1998. Most recently, his sincere, yet light-hearted, approach to helping students identify and overcome destructive behavioral health habits earned him the "Health Educator of the Year" honors from the California Community College Physical Educators. He will be honored at the group's annual convention in April. Congratulations to Matt!

<u>SCC:</u> Former Sacramento City College student-athlete Jeremy Briggs was a featured contestant on the season premiere of "The Voice." Briggs, now a state employee and Sacramento-area musician, sang in a blind audition before the show's panel of musical star coaches. Several coaches wanted Briggs, but he chose pop star Shakira's team. Briggs attended SCC from 2005 to 2008, and then transferred. He was an honor student and played on SCC's baseball team. In fact, during his segment on "The Voice," he mentioned "Sacramento City College" and they showed a photo of him playing on the baseball team!

And one other point of pride for SCC: Kakwasi Somadhi, professor and coordinator of the Learning Skills & Tutoring Center, will be recognized by the Association of Colleges for Tutoring and Learning Assistance at its conference in April. Current Association President Lisa Cooper said the group's success is directly attributable to individuals like Somadhi, who have selflessly given their energy, expertise and time to lead as presidents over the years.

The District Curriculum Coordinating Committee reviews college proposals for new, modified, or deleted courses and programs: general education guidelines, graduation competencies, grading policies, course placement into disciplines, and discusses and acts on other curriculum related issues. The enclosed curriculum was approved at the March 28, 2014 meeting.

COURSE PROPOSALS

Course Deletions

American River College

1. BIOL 330 Introduction to Entomology (3.00 units)

Justification: We are deleting the course from our catalog. In the future, we may choose to create a similar course with core to core transferability, but until then we will defer to our sister college to provide this area of specialization.

2. CHEM 480 Honors General Chemistry (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course has not been offered for a number of years. It most likely will not be offered in the future.

3. CHEM 482 Biology/Chemistry Honors Seminar (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course has not been offered in several years and it is very unlikely to be offered again.

4. DANCE 331 Modern Dance II (1.00 unit)

Justification: The content of this course is covered in DANCE 332.

5. ET 195 Electrical and Mechanical Power and Control Systems (3.00 units)

Justification: This course will be replaced with ET 197 basic Mechatronics.

6. ET 386 Fiber Optic Splicing, Connectivity and Testing (3.00 units)

Justification: This course will be replaced by ET 388 Fiber Optics.

7. ET 387 Advanced Fiber Optics (2.00 units)

Justification: This course will be replaced by ET 388 Fiber Optics.

8. HUM 481 Honors Classical Humanities (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course no longer fulfills student's needs.

9. HUM 482 Honors Modern Humanities (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course no longer fulfills student's needs.

10. MUIVI 442 String Instruction (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course is no longer offered by the ARC Music Department.

11. MUIVI 446 Percussion Instruction (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course is no longer offered by the ARC Music Department.

12. PHIL 353 Religions of the Far East (3.00 units)

Justification: Due to limited FTE, this course has not been taught in many years. Any increase of Philosophy FTE will be used to offer other courses required to support our upcoming Philosophy AA-T, making it unlikely that this course will be taught in the foreseeable future.

13. PHIL 354 Religions of the West (3.00 units)

Justification: Due to limited FTE, this course has not been taught in many years. Any increase of Philosophy FTE will be used to offer other courses required to support our upcoming Philosophy AA-T, making it unlikely that this course will be taught in the foreseeable future.

Cosumnes River College

1. ENGLT 309 Book Length Literature for Group Discussion (1.00 unit)

Justification: As a result of program review, this course was found to no longer meet degree or transfer goals; other literature courses exist that allow students to meet those goals.

2. ENGRD 13 Reading Center: Basic Reading Skills (0.50 - 3.00 units)

Justification: With the expansion of ENGLB 70 into both a Writing focus (ENGLB 70, 72, 73, 74) and a Reading focus (ENGLB 75, 76, 77, 78), the purpose of ENGRD 13 becomes redundant. Students can take ENGLB 75, 76, 77, and/or 78 for independent study practice in reading.

Folsom Lake College

1. DANCE 311 Urban Hip Hop (1.00 unit)

Justification: Due to Title 5 changes to repeatability and the subsequent creation across the district of dance families, this course has been replaced by Dance 351: Urban Hip-Hop I.

2. ECE 364 Fundamentals of Movement and Rhythm in Early Childhood Education (2.00 units)

Justification: A 3-unit course with similar content is currently being taught in the ECE program, rendering this course to be no longer relevant to our program.

Sacramento City College

1. ESL 92 ESL Center: Intermediate Independent Lab (0.50 - 4.00 units)

Justification: The ESL Department has renumbered its lab courses to meet the non-repeatability requirement. This course is no longer offered.

2. ESL 93 ESL Center: Advanced Independent Lab (0.50 - 1.00 units)

Justification: The ESL Department has renumbered its lab courses to meet the non-repeatability requirement. This course no longer is offered.

3. ET 15 Beginning Mathematics for Electronics (3.00 units)

Justification: This course is not being used any more due to the reduced number of course offerings in the Electronics Department. The mathematics that the course covered is available from the Mathematics Department offerings. The Electronics Department is focusing the use of FTE on the higher level mathematics needed for modern electronic circuit theory.

4. ET 145 Basic Computer System Repair I (1.00 unit)

Justification: ET145 content will be combined to ET146 to make a 4 unit full semester course covering the same material. Course to be called ET140 Smart System Repair I.

5. ET 146 Basic Computer System Repair II (3.00 units)

Justification: ET145 content will be combined to ET146 to make a 4unit full semester course covering the same material. Course to be called ET140 Smart System Repair I.

6. ET 147 Basic Computer System Repair III (3.00 units)

Justification: ET147 course title and content are being updated to be ET141, the next course after a new ET140 in a series of two Smart System Repair courses.

7. ET 300 DC Theory and Circuit Fundamentals (2.50 units)

Justification: ET300 content will be combined to ET301 to make a 5 unit full semester course covering the same material. Course to be called ET305 DC & AC Theory and Circuit Fundamentals.

8. ET 301 AC Theory and Circuit Fundamentals (2.50 units)

Justification: ET300 and ET301 will be combined into a full semester course ET305.

9. ET 310 Mathematics for DC Circuit Fundamentals, Part I (1.50 units)

Justification: ET310 content will be combined to ET311 to make a 5 unit full semester course covering the same material. Course to be called ET314 Mathematics for DC/AC Circuit Fundamentals.

10. ET 311 Mathematics for AC Circuit Fundamentals, Part II (1.50 units)

Justification: ET310 will be combined with ET311 to create a full semester course with the same content and rigor called ET314.

11. ET 490 Advanced Student Projects Laboratory (2.00 units)

Justification: Due to course repetition restrictions, two new special projects courses are being proposed to take the place of the old special projects laboratory course.

12. HCD 89 Study Strategies Lab (0.50 - 1.00 units)

Justification: HCD 89 was replaced with HCD 88.

New to College Courses

Folsom Lake College

1. DANCE 377 Musical Theatre Dance I (2.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

18.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This course provides students an opportunity to explore the musical theatre genre, including dance movement, audition techniques, singing and acting basics as well as analysis of fundamental theoretical concepts associated with the early American musical at the turn of the twentieth century. Lectures and movement activities will highlight the historical context of early musicals, and trace how musicals are reflective of society. Students will engage in basic dance technique exercises, as well as learn musical theatre choreography which will culminate in a formal presentation of group choreography. Previous experience with musical theatre dance is not required. Students must acquire appropriate dance shoes and attire.

Justification: This course is being developed as part of the Musical Theatre Dance family in coordination with our sister colleges based on the agreed upon Dance Family plan. Currently FLC offers Dance 378: Musical Theatre Dance II and Dance 379: Musical Theatre Dance III. This level I course is being adopted from ARC's model for Musical Theatre Dance I in order to offer a full range of levels for students. Dance 377: Musical Theatre Dance I is not yet part of the AA Degree in Dance Studies at Folsom Lake College, as this New to College course is being initiated in response to required Title 5 changes, eliminating repeatability. These courses will advance student success in this discipline with opportunities for several different and varied physical and academically rigorous experiences in the Musical Theatre genre. Ultimately, it is the goal of this developer to have all three levels of Musical Theatre Dance fulfill the 2-unit core course requirement for the AA Degree in Dance Studies so that students have a streamlined and clear pathway to degree completion.

2. **PACT 391 Tennis II (1.00 unit)**

Prerequisite: None.

54.00 hours laboratory

This course reviews and builds upon basic fundamentals, techniques, rules, and social courtesies of tennis. Intermediate level players are encouraged to take this course. A can of tennis balls, a racket, water bottle, and suitable tennis attire are required to be purchased by students.

Justification: This course fulfills the Associate of Arts Degree requirement in Living Skills (Area 3a), the CSU General Education requirement in Area E, and fulfills requirements for the Kinesiology AA-T Degree.

New to District Courses

American River College

1. ACCT 122 Sales and Use Taxes (1.00 unit)

Prerequisite: None.

18.00 hours lecture

This course covers the requirements for businesses to collect, report, and submit sales and use taxes in California. It also presents information on the exemption from sales and use tax requirements for non-profit organizations.

Justification: Businesses are required to collect, report, and submit sales and use taxes to California while non-profit organizations are usually exempt from sales and use taxes. This course prepares students to properly compute, report, and submit required sales and use taxes for their employers.

2. ARTNM 322 Beginning Digital Art (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

36.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This introductory digital art course focuses on digital media processes, including software and hardware tools that facilitate creative visual and conceptual approaches to digital art making. A wide range of digital imaging techniques are explored, and time-based processes are introduced, leading to the creation of digital images, animations/videos, and mixed media objects. The course also explores artists' uses of new technologies in contemporary art-making practices. A vocabulary of new media terms and practices is developed through discussions and critiques.

Justification: This course introduces the processes, techniques, and technologies used to create digital art. It is part of the Art New Media Department's goal to create a transferable Digital Art discipline. This course articulates with Sac State's Art37, and will be submitted for review against C-ID course descriptor of ARTS 250 Introduction to Digital Art.

3. ET 388 Fiber Optics (4.00 units)

Prerequisite: ET 302 with a grade of "C" or better

Advisory: ET 380

54.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This course in fiber optics covers optical theory and operation including the complete fiber optic communication system. It includes fiber optic terminology and instruction in the use of tools and equipment associated with fiber optic installation and maintenance.

Tests of the fiber optic systems are performed using sophisticated equipment such as optical power meters and optical time domain reflectometers (OTDR). It also includes system design and troubleshooting procedures. A field trip may be required.

Justification: This course provides fiber optic skills which are required in several industries hiring our students.

4. FITNS 302 Latin Aerobics (1.00 unit)

Prerequisite: None.

Advisory: Eligible for ENGRD 310 or ENGRD 312 AND ENGWR 300; OR ESLR 340 AND ESLW 340.

54.00 hours laboratory

This course combines a variety of rhythmic Latin-style dance movements into a form of cardiorespiratory training of low to moderate impact. It improves cardiorespiratory endurance, muscular strength and endurance, flexibility, and body composition.

Justification: This course allows students to examine and improve cardiovascular fitness levels through Latin aerobics. This course is part of the AS Degree in Physical Education and fulfills the P.E. requirement for graduation.

5. SPORT 332 Pre-Season Conditioning for Football (0.50 - 3.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

27.00 - 162.00 hours laboratory

This course covers advanced offensive and defensive strategies for football at the college level. Blocking schemes, tackling techniques, as well as offensive and defensive formations are discussed. Strength and conditioning drills are included to enhance football skills. This course may be taken up to four times for credit.

Justification: This course provides pre-season training to help student athletes develop skills and knowledge necessary to be successful in the intercollegiate sport of football.

Sacramento City College

1. ADMJ 332 Introduction to Forensic Anthropology (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: ENGWR 51 or ESLW 310 and ESLR 310 with grades of "C" or better

Advisory: ANTH 300; with a grade of "C" or better

54.00 hours lecture

This course provides an overview of forensic anthropology, which is an applied field of physical anthropology. Forensic anthropologists answer questions of medicolegal

significance by applying techniques designed for the analysis of human skeletal remains. This course will focus on the introductory techniques used for human skeletal identification and trauma analysis. This identification will provide understanding of the broader aspects of applied anthropology and its role in working with law enforcement agencies and human rights issues, as well as ethical considerations. Students will develop an understanding of skeletons not as assemblages of bones, but as individuals possessing names and identities, still connected to the social world in which they lived and died.

Justification: This course submission reflects a collaborative agreement between the Administration of Justice and Anthropology Departments to offer a cross-referenced course. This course will expand student access to the subfields within physical anthropology and help to provide understanding of the broader aspects of applied anthropology and its role in working with law enforcement agencies.

PROGRAM PROPOSALS

Program Deletion(s)

American River College

1. Kitchen and Bath Design

Justification: We are restructuring our curriculum based on input from our advisory committee.

Folsom Lake College

1. Personal Trainer

Justification: This program is being deleted due to a sustained lack of student completion.

Sacramento City College

1. Kinesiology-Athletic Training

Justification: This degree is being deleted because the Kinesiology--Exercise Science Degree as well as the Kinesiology AA-T Degree both meet student's needs to major in Kinesiology which is what an athletic trainer does. The difference in the existing degrees are a few electives in the athletic training degree.

New Programs

American River College

1. Art New Media: Interactive Design

This certificate focuses on understanding and designing compelling interactive screen-based graphics. It utilizes basic principles of interactive design and combines text, graphics, video, animation, and sound. It emphasizes visual considerations, context, work flow, and tools unique to the industry.

Justification: To add a new certificate for interactive design that includes designing for devices.

2. Basic Mechatronics

This certificate provides introductory training in the multidisciplinary field of mechatronics which combines mechanical and electronic technologies. Topics include introductory courses in electronics, programmable logic controllers, basic CAD design, and welding.

Justification: This new certificate will provide the training necessary to create opportunities for internships and entry level jobs in industries using mechatronic technologies. It will also add skills for electronics technicians to be more competitive and provide new opportunities.

3. Civil Engineering

This degree provides the foundation in mathematics, science, and engineering needed to transfer to a four-year institution as a major in civil engineering. The courses in this degree meet most of the lower division requirements for several nearby universities. Since each university has its own unique requirements, additional coursework will be required prior to transfer. Students should meet with a counselor to determine which additional courses are required for successful transfer to a particular institution.

Justification: This new degree is part of ARC's effort to offer transfer degrees to prepare students for transfer to four-year institutions.

4. Economics

The Associate in Arts degree in Economics for Transfer provides students with a major that fulfills the general requirements of the California State University for transfer. Students with this degree will receive priority admission with junior status to the California State University system. The Associate in Arts Degree in Economics for Transfer (AA-T) may be obtained by the completion of 60 transferable, semester units with a minimum 2.0 GPA, including (a) the major or area of emphasis described in the Required Program outlined below (earning a C or better in these courses) and (b) either the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California

State University General Education Breadth Requirements. Students interested in transferring to a CSU campus to pursue a bachelor's degree in Economics should meet with a counselor to confirm the courses required for lower-division preparation in the major.

Justification: This new degree is part of ARC's effort to offer ADT degrees to prepare students for transfer to CSUs and other four-year schools.

5. Electrical Engineering

This degree provides the foundation in mathematics, science, and engineering needed to transfer to a four-year institution as a major in electrical engineering. The courses in this degree meet most of the lower division requirements for several nearby universities. Since each university has its own unique requirements, additional coursework will be required prior to transfer. Students should meet with a counselor to determine which additional courses are required for successful transfer to a particular institution.

Justification: This new degree is part of ARC's effort to offer transfer degrees to prepare students for transfer to four-year institutions.

6. Mechanical Engineering

This degree provides the foundation in mathematics, science, and engineering needed to transfer to a four-year institution as a major in mechanical engineering. The courses in this degree meet most of the lower division requirements for several nearby universities. Since each university has its own unique requirements, additional coursework will be required prior to transfer. Students should meet with a counselor to determine which additional courses are required for successful transfer to a particular institution.

Justification: This new degree is part of ARC's effort to offer transfer degrees to prepare students for transfer to four-year institutions.

7. **Pipe Welding**

This certificate promotes competence in pipe welding with emphasis on power sources, electrode selection on various joint designs, techniques, and positions in welding. Instruction includes safety and proper procedures in making fillet and groove welds that are in compliance with structural and pipe welding codes. Training in math and workforce wellness is covered.

Justification: This certificate meets American Welding Society, American Society of Mechanical Engineers and American Petroleum Institute standards, for pipe welding.

8. Tax Specialist I

This certificate provides occupational training and education in small business accounting, computerized accounting and spreadsheet applications used in small business accounting, and basic federal payroll tax administration. It also includes federal and California individual income tax law, regulations, and tax return preparation.

Justification: This certificate program provides occupational training and continuing education in small business accounting, computerized accounting, and spreadsheet applications used in small business accounting, basic federal payroll tax administration, and individual federal and California income tax law, regulations, and tax return preparation.

9. Tax Specialist II

This certificate is intended for students who have completed the Tax Specialist I Certificate and need to obtain a higher level of competency in the field. It builds on the knowledge, skills, and abilities of the Tax Specialist I certificate by adding courses in corporate financial accounting, taxation of partnerships, corporations, estates, and trusts, payroll accounting, property taxation in California, and assisting individual taxpayers in the preparation of more complex federal and California income tax returns, as well as reviewing the income tax returns completed by other tax preparers.

Justification: This certificate broadens and deepens the occupational training, and continuing education of the Tax Specialist I certificate by adding courses in corporate financial accounting, taxation of partnerships, corporations, estates and trusts, California payroll accounting, property taxation in California, and assisting individual taxpayers in the preparation of more complex federal and California income tax returns.

Folsom Lake College

1. Heritage Interpretation

Heritage Interpretation involves conveying meaningful information about historical, cultural, and natural events or sites to a broad audience. One may have encountered interpretive prose in historical site markers, displays at parks or museums, and written park visitor guides. Park rangers, docents, and tour guides use oral and written interpretation skills. More recently, interpretive skills have been expanding into social media. Students completing this proposed certificate of recognition will be prepared to take an exam to be a Certified Interpretive Guide (C.I.G) from the National Association for Interpretation. Courses in this certificate may also be applied towards associate degree and/or transfer requirements.

Justification: Our college service area includes many cultural, historical, and natural resources that are accessible to the public. Interpretive guides present information about these sites to a broad audience. This certificate fills a unique niche in that it prepares students to work as interpretive guides, but it is sufficiently broad to appeal to students pursuing other academic goals.

Sacramento City College

1. Studio Arts

Completion of this degree will provide a foundation in studio art methods. Program offerings include course work in art history, 2-D, and 3-D studio practices. The Associate in Arts in Studio Art for Transfer provides students with a major that fulfills the general requirements of the California State University for transfer. Students with this degree will

receive priority admission with junior status to the California State University system. The Associate Degree for Transfer student completion requirements (as stated in SB1440 law): (1) Completion of 60 semester units or 90 quarter units that are eligible for transfer to the California State University, including both of the following: (A) The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California State University General Education –Breadth Requirements. (B) A minimum of 18 semester units or 27 quarter units in a major or area of emphasis, as determined by the community college district. (2) Obtainment of a minimum grade point average of 2.0. ADTs also require that students must earn a C or better in all courses required for the major or area of emphasis. A "P" (Pass) grade is not an acceptable grade for courses in the major.

Justification: This program will fulfill the general requirements for the Studio Art AA for Transfer to the California State University.

2. Theatre Arts

The Theatre Arts transfer degree is designed to facilitate successful transfer to baccalaureate theatre or drama degree programs. This degree provides students with lower division breadth and depth in the field of theatre arts. Additionally, this degree exposes students to the core principles and practices in the field. Students will learn the basics of acting, the basics of theatre technology and production, and where theatre fits in to both the historical and modern world of entertainment. The Associate Degree for Transfer student completion requirements (as stated in SB 1440 law): (1) Completion of 60 semester units or 90 quarter units that are eligible for transfer to the California State University, including both of the following: (A) The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California State University General Education-Breadth Requirements; (B) A minimum of 18 semester units or 27 quarter units in a major or area of emphasis, as determined by the community college district. (2) Obtainment of a minimum grade point average of 2.0. ADTs also require that students must earn a C or better in all courses required for the major or area of emphasis. A "P" (Pass) grade is not an acceptable grade for courses in the major.

Justification: This proposal is to create the transfer degree for Theatre Arts. We have followed the established transfer model curriculum.

BACKGROUND:

A subcommittee of the Board of Trustees recently reviewed its Policy on Legislative Matters and proposed changes.

STATUS:

The proposed changes have been vetted through the participatory governance process. The first major proposed change is to provide for the Board to adopt a statement of legislative principles annually and for the Chancellor to take positions on legislation consistent with that statement. If there are legislative issues that fall outside of that statement, the Chancellor will consult with the Board, or the Board President, as time permits. The proposed Policy does not require the Chancellor to consult with the Board where the position is consistent with prior positions taken by the District, time restraints prohibit consultation, or the matter is consistent with existing Policies, Regulations, or practice. Finally, the Board reserves the right to approve legislation that the District sponsors before the legislature.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposal revisions to Policy 3115 Legislative Matters.

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1.0 Intent

- 1.1 It is the intent of the Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees that the Los Rios Community College District play an active and central role in influencing legislation that will have a significant impact on the District, its students and its staff.
- 1.2 The Board of Trustees shall adopt and annually review a Statement of
 Legislative Principles that shall provide the basic parameters to guide the
 Board of Trustees and the Chancellor in taking positions on matters pending
 before the Legislature, the Governor, the Congress, and the President.
- 1.32 The Board of Trustees delegates to the Chancellor the responsibility to lead the District governmental relations program in alignment with the Board's of Trustees' Statement of Legislative Principles.
- 1.43 The Chancellor, and staff under the Chancellor's direction, shall have discretion in determining how best to attempt to influence such legislation.

2.0 Implementation

- 2.1 The Board of Trustees shall not may adopt official positions on specific legislative issues unless only when the outcome will have a significant impact on the District. The Board of Trustees may adopt resolutions in support of statewide and local education bonds.
- 2.2 <u>The Board of Trustees shall participate in and direct the development of statewide budget priorities and a legislative agenda by offering guidance to those state and national organizations that request it.</u>
- 2.3 The Chancellor, in carrying out the Board of Trustees' intent, shall operate under the following general parameters:
 - 2.3.1 The Chancellor shall generally adopt positions consistent with the Board of Trustee's' Statement of Legislative Principles and shall generally adopt positions consistent with the legislative programs and recommendations of the California Community Colleges.
 - 2.3.2 For matters outside the parameters of 2.3.1, the Chancellor shall seek the Board of Trustees' input prior to adopting positions on major legislative issues. Where timely action is required, the Chancellor shall consult with the Board President and take action in accordance with that consultation. In such cases, the Chancellor

shall also seek input from relevant District constituent groups. The Chancellor may take a position on a legislative matter without prior approval when:

- 2.3.2.1 The Chancellor determines the matter is similar to a prior issue on which the District has taken a position; or
- 2.3.2.2 Time restraints make consultation infeasible; or
- 2.3.2.3 The legislative matter is consistent with existing District Policies, Regulations or procedures.
- 2.3.2 In the case of unusually controversial issues, the Chancellor shall be expected to seek Board of Trustees input prior to adopting positions on legislative issues. If the Chancellor deems an issue to be unusually controversial, the Chancellor shall consult with the Board of Trustees President prior to adopting a position. In such cases, the Chancellor shall also seek input from relevant District constituent groups.
- 2.3.3 The Chancellor shall seek direction from the Board of Trustees on items of extraordinary significance.
- 2.3.4 The Chancellor shall regularly report to the Board of Trustees on the Chancellor's activities in this area.
- 2.3.5 Any position taken by the <u>Board of Trustees</u>, Chancellor or staff, under the Chancellor's direction, shall be the official position of the District and does not necessarily reflect the personal opinion of any member of the Board of Trustees, the Chancellor or of any staff member.

BACKGROUND:

In January 2014, the Board approved the granting of an option to purchase the property it owns at 8440 Poppy Ridge Road, Elk Grove, California 95757 (further identified as Assessor Parcel Number 132-0290-015-0000) (Poppy Ridge Parcel) for the ultimate purchase price of \$4.45 million. The option holder has up to three years to consummate the option and has agreed to allow the District to rent out the property in the interim.

STATUS:

Under Education Code section 81378.1, the District may lease district property upon terms and conditions agreed by the Governing Board for a period of less than five years. Before doing so, the Board must include a description of the proposed lease and an explanation of the methodology used to establish the lease rate and for determining the fair market value of the lease.

Staff recommends leasing the Poppy Ridge Property to Warehouse Christian Ministries of Elk Grove for a lease period of one year. The proposed rental rate is \$1,350 per month. The lease is subject to termination on 60-days' notice in the event the purchaser of the Option seeks to execute its right to purchase the property. The lessee will keep the property in good repair while leasing the property and is responsible for all utilities. The option holder has approved the terms of this lease.

General Services investigated the area and concluded that the fair market rental value for the property is between \$1,400 and \$1,600 per month for similar properties. In this case, because the land includes a home and acreage, staff believes it is a benefit to the District to have someone present on the property and keep the property in good repair. Further, the fact that the property is subject to sale on 60 days' notice reduces the value of the property as a rental property. It was for these reasons that staff chose \$1,350 as the rental rate for the property.

The Board must publish notice of the Governing Board's action once a week for three successive weeks prior to the Board meeting. The required notice has been published.

RECOMMENDATION:

BACKGROUND:

The Education Code regulates the procedures by which a community college district can dispose of real and personal property. Education Code section 81452 provides that the governing board may, by unanimous vote, dispose of items valued at \$5,000 or less by private sale without advertising or selling the items at public auction. The District has previously held an auction, at least annually and past auctions have generally cost more than they have netted for the District. In 1998, the District began transferring such surplus items to the State of California since the cost to store and sell such surplus items is greater than potential revenues.

STATUS:

The District has a quantity of surplus material, such as outdated desks and computers, which need to be disposed of. The State of California has accepted some of the surplus items but is not willing to take the entire surplus because they are unable to sell it. The District has located a scrap dealer who is willing to take most of our surplus items and recycle them.

All of the surplus items to be disposed of are either broken and/or not working, obsolete, in poor condition, or not needed for district/college operations: 26 audio recorders; 13 cabinets; 63 chairs; 16 computers; 13 desks; 1 EKG machine; 2 keyboards; 1 keyboard tray; 8 laptops; 1 mail machine; 26 monitors; 7 printers; 17 tables; 1 tablet; and 1 television. These items have a value of less than \$5,000.

BACKGROUND:

Recently, the Board of Trustees took a closer look at its Legislative Matters Board Policy P-3115 and proposed revisions to that Board Policy. Key among those revisions is the requirement that the Board of Trustees adopt and annually review a Statement of Legislative Principles.

STATUS:

Staff reviewed the bills that are currently pending in the State and Federal Legislatures that may have an effect on the District, its four colleges, its students, its faculty, its staff, and community colleges in general. In addition, staff reviewed the Statement of Legislative Principles for the System Office Board of Governors. A proposed draft Statement of Legislative Principles is attached. Initially, the draft lays down the ground rules for how the District will take positions on legislative issues. From there, the draft tracks the District's Strategic Plan's five Goal Areas of Student Success, Teaching and Learning Effectiveness, Access and Growth, Community, Economic, and Workforce Development, and Organizational Effectiveness. Under each Goal Area, the draft Statement of Legislative Principles identifies topics that support each of these Goal Areas for which the District may take legislative positions.

RECOMMENDATION:

The draft Statement of Legislative Principles is submitted for the Board of Trustees' review and discussion. Staff recommends that the Board of Trustees discuss the proposed draft and provide further direction for the approval of the final document at its next regular Board meeting.

Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees Annual Statement of Legislative Principles

This Statement of Legislative Principles is adopted by the Board of Trustees for the Los Rios Community College District on behalf of itself and its four separately accredited Colleges (American River College, Cosumnes River College, Folsom Lake College, and Sacramento City College) under Board Policy P-3115. This Statement is intended to support the District's Strategic Goals of student success, teaching and learning effectiveness, access and growth, community, economic, and workforce development, and organizational effectiveness.

This Statement of Legislative Principles provides guidelines for the Chancellor when addressing matters pending before the California and federal legislatures, and constitutes the core principles guiding the development of the District's position on legislation on behalf of the District.

The District shall not support or oppose legislation unless the outcome will have a significant effect on the District, its students, or its employees. The District will remain neutral on most matters affecting local collective bargaining; however, the District will take appropriate positions where that legislation will have a material impact on the District. The District will remain neutral on matters affecting only another single district or small group of district(s), except where policy precedents, or resource allocations, have the significant potential of affecting the Los Rios Community College District or the California Community College System generally. Where issues are raised in the budget process, the District shall seek legislative support or opposition in accordance with the principles established in this document. Where legislation is likely to impede the policy principles set forth, the District is likely to oppose that legislation unless there are significant countervailing reasons.

The Board of Trustees' Legislative Principles align with the District's Vision, Mission, Values, Goals, and Strategies, as enumerated in the District's Strategic Plan, as follows:

A. PROMOTE STUDENT SUCCESS: The District's and its Colleges' primary goal is to promote student success. This is defined as students achieving their educational goals. The District supports those legislative efforts that:

- Close the achievement gap.
- Implement the recommendations of the Student Success Task Force and other faculty-driven measures to improve student success.
- Support the provision of comprehensive student support services.
- Provide for realistic accountability metrics based on valid and verifiable data.
- Strengthen the academic preparation of K-12 students, to support success at a community college.
- Support collaborative efforts with four-year institutions designed to provide additional transfers to a four-year institution.
- Support the flexibility for advanced education students to enroll in District courses and remove any barriers.

- B. PROMOTE TEACHING AND LEARNING EFFECTIVENESS: The District and its Colleges are committed to providing the highest quality instructional programs in transfer, vocational, and general education, using the best current and emerging instructional methods and technologies. The District supports flexible teaching and learning methods to support the success of its diverse student population. The District supports those legislative efforts that:
 - Support professional development for faculty, staff, and administrators that is designed to support student success inside and outside of the classroom.
 - Support high quality distance education, while minimizing regulatory barriers and additional reporting requirements.
 - Support the enhancement of existing educational programs and the development of needed new programs.
 - Increase effective delivery of English, ESL, and mathematics basic skills education.
 - Support accreditation.
- C. PROMOTE ACCESS AND GROWTH: The District and its Colleges strive to be responsive to growing communities of the Greater Sacramento Region. The District and its Colleges pursue new delivery approaches that provide a high level of access to higher education and strive to provide comprehensive support services to assure access by reducing or eliminating significant barriers and promoting diversity. The District supports those legislative efforts that:
 - Enhance student financial aid opportunities and reduce the overall cost of attending college for students.
 - Assist students with the application process for attending a community college.
 - Support the Dream Act and efforts to expand the institutional capacity for diversity.
 - Support the passage of a Statewide Educational Bond.
 - Support the District's educational centers.
 - Enhance opportunities for underserved constituencies.

- D. PROMOTE COMMUNITY, ECONOMIC, AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT: The District and its Colleges seek to promote the health and economic vitality of the Greater Sacramento Region through partnerships, staff involvement in civic affairs, and programs open to the public. Further, the District and Colleges support economic development through their occupational programs and partnerships with business, labor, and industry. The District supports those legislative efforts that:
 - Develop effective and relevant career and technical programs in collaboration with external partners.
 - Increase efforts that align career technical education curriculum and program development between community colleges, K-12, and industry.
 - Integrate community colleges in the Workforce Investment Board and provide for community college courses to quality for state and federal funding of workforce development activities.
 - Create and support a regional P-20 council.
 - Support the efforts of the Foundation in its efforts to develop additional funding resources for the District, Colleges, faculty, staff, and students.
- E. PROMOTE ORGANIZATIONAL EFFECTIVENESS: The District and its Colleges strive to continually improve their institutional effectiveness to ensure fiscal accountability and integrity. The District supports those legislative efforts that:
 - Maintain local authority and control in the administration of the District and its Colleges.
 - Promote the health, safety, and welfare of students, faculty, staff, and administrators.
 - Support the District's and its Colleges' efforts to attract, recruit, and retain the most qualified employees, and assure appropriate staffing levels.
 - Support participatory decision-making.
 - Increase the District's efforts in sustainable practices, including energy and resource conservation, while retaining appropriate flexibility.
 - Strengthen the District's ability to use its capital outlay, infrastructure bonds, and property management funds efficiently.
 - Support the elimination of duplicative and/or needless regulatory oversight and reporting obligations and provide adequate funding for the oversight and reporting requirements that are necessary.
 - Protect the fiscal integrity of the system.

WHEREAS, an election will be held within the Los Rios Community College District that will affect Sacramento, El Dorado and Placer counties on November 4, 2014, for the purpose of electing Board of Trustees Areas 1, 2, 3, and 6; and

WHEREAS, a statewide general election will be held within the counties of Sacramento, El Dorado, and Placer on the same day; and

WHEREAS, Elections Code § 10403 requires jurisdictions to file with the Board of Supervisors, and a copy with the Registrar of Voters, a resolution requesting consolidation with a statewide election; and

WHEREAS, the Los Rios Community College District trustee boundaries have not changed since they were filed with the Sacramento, El Dorado, Placer, Solano and Yolo counties Registrar of Voters in 2011: Now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Los Rios Community College District requests the Board of Supervisors of Sacramento, El Dorado, and Placer counties to consolidate the regularly scheduled General District Election with the statewide election to be held November 4, 2014; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that pursuant to Elections Code § 13307, the candidate prepays for publication of the candidate's statement at the District Office for Sacramento County Election, and at the El Dorado and Placer counties election offices where each trustee area has multi-county boundaries. The limitation on the number of words that a candidate may use in his or her candidate's statement is 200 words; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that if a tie vote makes it impossible to determine which of two or more candidates has been elected to the board of trustees, the winner or winners shall be determined by lot by the Board of Trustees; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the District agrees to reimburse the Sacramento, El Dorado, and Placer counties Registrar of Voters for actual costs accrued, such costs to be calculated by the method set forth in the counties' current Election Cost Allocation Procedures.

The Long Range Capital Plan includes funds to expand the Student Services Building at American River College. HMC Architecture was hired to work with Campus and District staff to design this project. The estimated total construction cost for this project is \$2,798,400 and will add approximately 5,500 ASF of space to the existing Student Services Building. The project is fully funded from local bond Measure M.
