Chancellor's Report:

ARC: American River College is excited to put its new Culinary Arts Building in the spotlight on January 29 and 30. On Thursday evening, January 29, the college will host a special thank you event for donors who have generously supported the project. This is an opportunity to show appreciation for those who have given their support. The next morning, on January 30, ARC will hold a public ceremony with speakers, a ribbon cutting and self-guided tours of the facility.

CRC: Cosumnes River College Music Professor Kurt Erickson has been invited to perform later this month at UCLA at the Gala Concert of the Voice Studies Now Conference. The event, on January 28 and 29, is co-sponsored by the Oxford Handbook of Voice Studies. Professor Erickson will be performing several of his original compositions with internationally renowned countertenor Brian Asawa. Asawa was the first countertenor to ever win the New York Metropolitan Opera's National Council Award. Professor Erickson has also been chosen from among nearly 100 entrants around the country as the winner of the Emerging Composer Competition, which is sponsored by the Berkeley Community Chorus and Orchestra. He has been commissioned to write a new work for the organization's 50th Anniversary Celebration. The work will be finished this summer with rehearsals and performances scheduled for the fall.

FLC: The Folsom Lake College women's soccer team clinched its second consecutive Bay Valley Conference Championship in December. Many of the team members were also recognized individually for their efforts this season. Two Lady Falcons received national accolades from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA). Captain Rozzlyn Sovereign was selected to the 2014 NSCAA Women's Junior College Division Scholar All-American 2nd Team, recognizing her dual accomplishments on the field and in the classroom. Additionally, Michelle Kimbell was named to the 2014 NSCAA/Continental Tire Junior College Division III Women's All-West Region Team. The California Community College Athletic Association's Bay Valley Conference named its 2014 Women's Soccer All-Conference teams, as well as the conference's Players and Coaches of the Year. Those honored included 10 Folsom Lake College players and head coach Donny Ribaudo.

<u>SCC:</u> Aeronautics Professor Scott Miller has developed into our region's go-to aviation expert for the news media. Numerous news outlets have interviewed him regarding the recent AirAsia flight 8501 that vanished in the South Pacific with more than 150 on board. Professor Miller

expects that weather played a major role in the plane's disappearance. He has personally flown on AirAsia before, and said the carrier's reputation is a good one.

20. SILA 330 Introduction to Deaf Culture (3.00 units)

Justification: A new designator has been created in place of SILA; the new curriculum will use the designator DEAF.

21. SILA 332 Educating Deaf People (3.00 units)

Justification: A new designator has been created in place of SILA; the new curriculum will use the designator DEAF.

22. SILA 344 ASL Numbers 1 (0.50 units)

Justification: A new designator has been created in place of SILA; the new curriculum will use the designator DEAF.

3. BUSTEC 303 Computer-Keyboard Formatting (2.00 units)

Justification: This course is being replaced by BUSTEC 307.2.

4. HORT 498 Work Experience in Horticulture (1.00 - 4.00 units)

Justification: The RE programs have been revised, this course is no longer included in the course list as an elective in these programs.

1. ENGWR 480 Honors College Composition (3.00 units)

Justification: ENGWR 480 will be replaced by ENGWR 488.

2. JOUR 402 College Newspaper Production (3.00 units)

Justification: JOUR 402 is no longer taught because the course has been replaced by JOUR 410.

3. **JOUR 404 Editing and Production (3.00 units)**

Justification: The course is no longer taught.

4. JOUR 405 Publications Production Skills Lab (0.50 - 3.00 units)

Justification: The course is no longer taught.

5. **JOUR 406 Online Production (3.00 units)**

Justification: The course is no longer taught.

6. MUIVI 300 Beginning Instruments (1.00 - 2.00 units)

Justification: The course has not been offered or included in the Music Department schedule for many years.

7. MUIVI 376 Popular Electric Guitar and Bass Practice Lab (1.00 unit)

Justification: Our other course offerings in this area are sufficient and this course has not been offered in some time.

8. MUSM 340 Introduction To Desktop Audio (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course is no longer current with modern audio production techniques.

9. MUSM 351 Analog Recording Consoles and Tape Machines (1.50 units)

Justification: This course has been replaced by MUSM 350.

10. MUSM 355 Advanced Microphone Techniques and Analog Session Outboard Gear (1.50 units)

Justification: This course has been replaced by MUSM 350.

11. MUSM 359 Analog and Digital Recording Consoles and Techniques (3.00 units)

Justification: Course is no longer current and material is covered in other courses.

New to College Courses

Folsom Lake College

1. ART 391 Intermediate Ceramics (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: ART 390 with a grade of "C" or better

36.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This is an intermediate course in wheel-throwing and sculpture techniques. It explores the technical and creative processes of ceramic pottery making and sculpture including surface treatment and various firing processes. Focus is placed on an in-depth examination of contemporary ceramics. The student will be given a materials/supplies needed list by the instructor, which the student must purchase and use in order to succeed in the course. Field trips outside of class time may be required.

Justification: FLC Visual Arts Department is planning a certificate in Clay Arts as reflected in the Art Department's Program Review and Annual Department Plan (ADP). ART 391 will be a core course in this certificate program and build upon ART 390 currently offered at the college.

2. SPORT 316 Basketball, Intercollegiate-Women, Fall (1.50 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Prior to enrollment, the student must demonstrate intercollegiate athletic skills as determined by a try-out conducted by the coaching staff.

88.00 hours laboratory

This is an advanced course designed to provide specialized training for competition with other community college teams. Demonstration of fundamental and advanced skills, adherence to the rules and etiquette of basketball, and execution of team strategy will be expected of all students. This course will encompass the pre-season, tournament, and non-league portion of the season. Students will travel to away games and will need to provide appropriate basketball attire and shoes. This course may be taken up to four times.

Justification: This course provides a competitive intercollegiate experience for female student athletes in the sport of basketball and continues to support the roll out of intercollegiate athletics as per the Athletics Master Plan.

3. SPORT 317 Basketball, Intercollegiate-Women, Spring (1.50 units)

Prerequisite: SPORT 316 with a grade of "C" or better

87.00 hours laboratory

This is an advanced course designed to provide specialized training for competition with other community college teams. Demonstration of fundamental and advanced skills, adherence to the rules and etiquette of basketball, and execution of team strategy will be expected of all students. This course will encompass the regular season, tournament, and non-league portion of the season. Student will be required to travel to away games and will need to provide basketball appropriate clothing and shoes. This course may be taken up to four times.

Justification: This course provides a competitive intercollegiate experience for female student athletes in the sport of basketball and continues support for the roll out of athletics as per the Athletics Master Plan.

New to District Courses

American River College

1. DCDT 107 Hybrid Diesel Power Trains (4.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

54.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This course covers diesel hybrid power trains found in current hybrid technology. Topics include basic diesel hybrid power trains, hybrid power modes, and power electronic carriers.

Justification: This course introduces hybrid diesel power trains to support courses in the clean diesel technology industry. Current technologies include hybrid diesel, and this course will allow students to enter the profession with basic hybrid vehicle skills.

2. DCDT 108 Hybrid Diesel High Voltage Systems (4.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

54.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This course covers high voltage power systems on diesel hybrid powered vehicles. Topics include high voltage main component identification and inspection, inspection of high voltage cables, testing, re-use, and end-of-service decisions.

Justification: This course introduces new electronic control systems and tools to familiarize the technician with full authority engines, troubleshooting, and repair.

3. DCDT 109 Hybrid Diesel Component Application (4.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

54.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This course covers testing and replacement of diesel hybrid components. Topics include electronic shifting theory and diesel hybrid component application.

Justification: This course introduces new electronic control systems and tools, preparing the technician to be familiar with hybrid diesel components and their application.

4. DCDT 113 Diesel Hybrid Motor Generators (4.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

54.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This course covers diesel hybrid motor/generator found in current hybrid technologies. Topics include basic diesel hybrid motor/generator, hybrid power modes, and power electronic components.

Justification: This course introduces new electronic control systems and tools. It prepares technician to be familiar with full authority engines and explains the ways to perform troubleshooting and repair.

5. DCDT 163 Industrial Software and Systems (4.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

72.00 hours lecture

This course covers the skills needed to adequately retrieve and apply Cummins INSITE and Eaton diesel engine information using Internet-based technical manuals specifically geared toward diesel tractor emission control systems.

Justification: This course introduces Cummins INSITE and Eaton diesel engine software to support clean diesel technology and provide entry level skills in retrieval and application of hybrid diesel information.

6. FIRE 1634 Fire Command 2C (2.00 units)

Prerequisite: FIRE 1622 and 1627

33.00 hours lecture, 7.00 hours laboratory

This course is approached from a system basis and is applied to both small and large high-rise buildings. Topics include: Prefire planning, building inventory, problem identification, ventilation methods, water supply, elevators, life safety, strategy and tactics, application of the Incident Command System (ICS), and specific high-rise responsibilities. Case studies and simulation are used. Pass/No Pass only.

Justification: This is a contract course that is the third of a ten-course series for Chief Fire Officer Certification through California State Fire Training.

7. AT 334: BAR Specified Diagnostic and Repair Training

Prerequisite: None.

72 Hours lecture

State law currently requires that applicants for a Smog Check Repair license possesses Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) certifications in the following areas: A6 – Automotive Electrical/Electronic systems; A8 – Automotive Engine Performance; L1 – Advanced Engine Performance. This course is an intensive review of automotive electrical/electronic systems, engine mechanical systems, emission control systems, and computer control systems as they relate to automotive emissions controls. It satisfies the ASE certification requirement when applying for a Smog Check technician license and may be used by the applicant in lieu of the ASE certifications.

Justification: Many technicians that apply for the state Smog Check Repair licensing exam lack the technical expertise to successfully pass the required Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) exams required to apply for the license. This course provides an alternative path to licensing.

Folsom Lake College

1. COMM 498 Work Experience in Communication and Media Studies (1.00 - 4.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Advisory: ENGWR 101 and ESLW 320

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be in a paid or non-paid internship, volunteer opportunity or job related to career interests.

76.00 - 316.00 hours laboratory

This course provides students with opportunities to develop marketable skills in preparation for employment or advancement within their current job. Course content will include understanding the application of education to the workforce; completing required forms which document the student's progress and hours spent at the work site; and developing workplace skills and competencies. During the semester, the student is required to attend a weekly orientation. Additionally, students must complete 75 hours of related paid work experience, or 60 hours of related unpaid work experience, for one unit. An additional 75 hours of related paid work experience or 60 hours of related unpaid work experience is required for each additional unit. The course may be taken four times for credit, when there is new or expanded learning on the job, for a maximum of 16 units. Students should have access to a computer, the Internet, and some computer media such as a USB drive to store data files. Online students must have an e-mail account. First time students are required to attend a weekly orientation and a final meeting. Returning participants are required to attend the first class meeting, a mid-semester meeting and a final meeting and may meet individually with the instructor as needed. This course may

be taken up to four times when there are new or expanded learning objectives. Students may take up to 16 units total across all Work Experience course offerings. Only one Work Experience course may be taken per semester.

Justification: This course is replacing the Communications Media Work Experience class since the CMED designator has been subsumed by Communication and Media Studies (COMM). The new course will continue to provide students with a work experience option within the discipline. The Cooperative Work Experience Education and Internship program is a unique academic program in which the student, employer, and college cooperate to combine study and practical work experience to develop students' marketable skills in preparation for employment or advancement within their current job.

Sacramento City College

1. JOUR 407 College Magazine Production II (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: JOUR 302 and 403 with grades of "C" or better, or placement through the assessment process.

54.00 hours lecture

This course builds on the experience gained in JOUR 403. During this second-semester course, instruction in leadership is provided for students who function as editors and manage a staff that produces a non-fiction, journalistic college magazine once a semester. This course is designed for students interested in managing a non-fiction publication with writing, graphics, page layout, art, photography, and editing.

Justification: The course allows students to serve as editors of the magazine.

2. JOUR 408 College Magazine Production III (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: JOUR 407 with a grade of "C" or better, or placement through the assessment process.

54.00 hours lecture

This course builds on the experience gained in JOUR 403 and JOUR 407. Instruction in leadership is provided for students who function in top leadership positions (editor-inchief and managing editor) for the non-fiction, journalistic college magazine, which is published once a semester. This course is designed for students interested in managing the staff who produce the publication using the skills of writing, graphics, page layout, art, photography, and editing.

Justification: JOUR 408 is for students who are interested in learning top leadership skills on a magazine production staff, such as managing editor and editor-in-chief.

3. MET 250 Introduction to Mechanical-Electrical Technology (1.00 unit)

Prerequisite: None.

18.00 hours lecture

This introductory course is designed for potential heating, ventilation, and air conditioning/refrigeration (HVAC/R) career professionals such as stationary engineers, commercial refrigeration technicians, commercial HVAC/R control technicians, and residential air conditioning technicians. In this course, students will explore the available career opportunities, be introduced to the fundamentals of refrigeration and technical math associated with this field, and learn the requirements for a certificate in Commercial Building Energy Auditing and Commissioning Specialist, Mechanical-Electrical Technology, Mechanical Systems Technician, and completing the Associates of Science

degree in Mechanical-Electrical Technology. A final grade of "C" or better is necessary to move on to MET 256, 257, 351, and 352.

Justification: This course is aimed at improving the MET program's retention rate by offering students the opportunity to evaluate the program without a major investment of time and FTE.

4. MUP 356 Advanced College Choir (2.00 units)

Prerequisite: MUP 355 with a grade of "C" or better

18.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This course provides continued study in the rehearsal and performance of choral music covering a wide variety of styles. Advanced ensemble members may conduct pieces and sectionals, perform in small ensembles, and lead the choir in vocal exercises.

Justification: This course is needed for the continued study of choral literature and performance opportunities in a choral ensemble. MUP 356 parallels the course offerings at CSUS, where the course is repeatable for four semesters. It is planned that this course will be a required course in the A.A. Commercial Music Degree - Performance Emphasis and the A.A. General Music Degree at Sacramento City College.

5. OTA 123 Fundamentals of Clinical Documentation (0.50 units)

Prerequisite: See enrollment limitations

Enrollment Limitation: Enrollment in the Occupational Therapy Assistant Program and completion of BIOL 100, OTA 100, FCS 324 or PSYC 370 and AH 110 with grades of "C" or better and a cumulative GPA of 2.5 in these four (4) courses. Completion of ENGRD 110 or eligibility for ENGRD 310 as determined by the reading assessment process for all applicants who do not have an A.A. Degree or higher.

9.00 hours lecture

In this course, the Occupational Therapy Assistant student will develop basic skills in clinical documentation. Students will be introduced to various documentation formats as required by different treatment settings and reimbursement systems. Students will be required to distinguish between subjective and objective reports and development of the clinical opinion and a plan based on these reports. The "Occupational Therapy Practice Framework" will be used as a tool critical to developing fluency in documentation terminology.

Justification: With a 2014 federal mandate to incorporate electronic documentation into health care practice, the existing OTA curriculum is out of date. While we have been able to introduce electronic documentation, our content is insufficient to provide basic skills expected by employers and required by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education. By adding this course early in the program sequence, students can develop basic skills related to documentation. This would free class time in a more advanced course where basic skills in electronic documentation can be addressed.

6. OTA 162 Practice Skills for First Rotation OTA Level II Field Work (0.50 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Corequisite: OTA 160

27.00 hours laboratory

This course, taken in conjunction with OTA 160, provides the OTA student with structured lab activities to support success in clinical activities during Level II fieldwork. Students will practice the occupational therapy assessment and treatment needs of various populations through the lifespan. To ensure currency in a range of topics, this lab will also include activities related to OTA scope of practice, documentation, regulations, productivity, and reimbursement. National certification exam preparation activities will also be included. This course is graded Pass/No Pass.

Justification: Revisions are being made to the way Level II seminar hours are offered, better enabling faculty to support students during this final and critical phase of the required program. These revisions will provide focused time for skills practice and face-to-face support while the student is completing their required 320 hours of clinical work. Overall, these changes result in a 1-unit increase in total units required. There has not been an increase in required units for over ten years, yet the number of content accreditation standards has increased from 66 in 1998 to 88 in 2011.

7. OTA 163 Practice Skills for Second Rotation OTA Level II Field Work (0.50 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Corequisite: OTA 161

27.00 hours laboratory

This course, taken in conjunction with OTA 161, provides the OTA student with structured lab activities to support success in clinical activities during Level II fieldwork. Students will practice the occupational therapy assessment and treatment needs of various populations through the lifespan. To ensure currency in a range of topics, this lab will also include activities related to OTA scope of practice, documentation, regulations, productivity, and reimbursement. National certification exam preparation activities will also be included. This course is graded Pass/No Pass.

Justification: Revisions are being made to the way Level II seminar hours are offered, better enabling faculty to support students during this final and critical phase of the required program. These revisions will provide focused time for skills practice and face-to-face support while the student is completing their required 320 hours of clinical work. Overall, these changes result in a 1-unit increase in total units required. There has not been an increase in required units for over ten years, yet the number of content accreditation standards has increased from 66 in 1998 to 88 in 2011.

American River College

1. Sign Language Studies: Business

Justification: The program title of Sign Language Studies is currently being changed to Deaf Culture and ASL Studies with a new designator, DEAF.

2. Sign Language Studies: Business

Justification: The program title of Sign Language Studies is currently being changed to Deaf Culture and ASL Studies with a new designator, DEAF.

Sacramento City College

1. Liberal Arts

Justification: The Liberal Arts A.A. degree pattern is being deleted so that three of the five "areas of emphasis" listed within can be constructed as separate degree patterns under the catalog heading, "Interdisciplinary Studies" and two of the current "areas of emphasis" should be terminated due to lack of student interest.

2. Liberal Studies for Elementary Teachers

Justification: The Liberal Studies for Elementary Teachers is being replaced by the Elementary Teacher Associate Degree for Transfer. The new degree is updated with the coursework to be articulated with the four year colleges. The Liberal Studies is being deleted to avoid confusion for students and to reflect the new transfer degree emphasis.

3. Stock Photography

Justification: We are deleting this certificate due to the collapse of the Stock photography market. We also do not offer the Stock photography courses associated with this certificate.

New Programs

American River College

1. Clean Diesel Hybrid Technology

This program covers hybrid-diesel components. Topics include heavy duty hybrid-diesel component application, diesel-hybrid motor generators, clean diesel software, and industrial software and systems.

Justification: This curriculum proposal incorporates four courses into a certificate. These courses include hybrid and clean diesel courses. With emerging and current hybrid diesel technology, there are various entry-level positions in the hybrid diesel repair industry, such as entry-level technician and hybrid service.

2. Clean Diesel Management Systems

This program covers hybrid diesel technology. Topics include hybrid diesel power trains, hybrid diesel high voltage systems, clean diesel software support, and industrial software systems.

Justification: This curriculum proposal incorporates four courses into a certificate. These courses include hybrid and clean diesel courses. With emerging and current hybrid diesel technology, there are various entry-level positions in the hybrid diesel repair industry, such as entry-level technician and hybrid service.

Cosumnes River College

1. Economics

The Associate in Arts degree in Economics for Transfer provides students with a major that fulfills the general requirements of the California State University for transfer. Students with this degree will receive priority admission with junior status to the California State University system. The Associate in Arts degree in Economics for Transfer (AA-T) may be obtained by the completion of 60 transferable, semester units with a minimum 2.0 GPA, including (a) the major or area of emphasis described in the Required Program outlined below (earning a C or better in these courses) and (b) either the Inter-segmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California State University General Education Breadth Requirements.

Justification: This new degree is part of CRC's effort to offer ADT degrees to prepare students for transfer to CSUs and other four-year schools.

Folsom Lake College

1. Commercial Music: Music Entrepreneurship

This program is designed to provide students with an entry level preparation in the diverse set of skills required of musicians in the rapidly evolving music industry, including performing, recording, promotion, marketing and management.

Justification: The current proposal represents the first entry level certificate in commercial music. Based upon the recommendations of the Los Rios music departments' convergence meeting, Folsom Lake College was advised to create commercial music certificates in five areas, beginning with this initial certificate in Music Entrepreneurship.

2. Economics

The Associate in Arts degree in Economics for Transfer provides students with a major that fulfills the general requirements of the California State University for transfer. Students with this degree will receive priority admission with junior status to the California State University system. The Associate in Arts degree in Economics for Transfer (AA-T) may be obtained by the completion of 60 transferable, semester units with a minimum 2.0 GPA, including (a) the major or area of emphasis described in the Required Program outlined below (earning a C or better in these courses) and (b) either the Inter-segmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California State University General Education Breadth Requirements. Students interested in transferring to a CSU campus to pursue a bachelor's degree in Economics should meet with a counselor to confirm the courses required for lower-division preparation in the major.

Justification: To add a new transfer ADT degree to our catalog in order to prepare students for transfer to CSU's and four-year schools.

Sacramento City College

1. Web Production Specialist

Web Production Specialists are proficient at creating simple Web site structure with images, lists and links. The Web Production Specialist certificate requires students to use web creation and image editing tools and custom applications to design, code, and test Web sites. There is emphasis on learning the basics of creating web pages for a client with a cascading style sheet.

Justification: This certificate is first of three short, stackable certificates that lead to a higher certificate. At this level, students will be able to create websites for customers.

2. Front-End Web Developer

Front-End Web Developers are proficient at creating Web site structure with some interactivity. There is emphasis on learning HTML, CSS, JavaScript, and user interface, user experience design.

Justification: This certificate is the second of a group of three short, stackable certificates (Web Production Specialist, Front-End Web Developer, and Web Developer) that lead to a higher certificate. At this level, students will be able to create websites for customers using client-side scripting and industry accepted design elements.

3. Interdisciplinary Studies: Arts and Humanities

The Interdisciplinary Studies degree is designed for students who seek a greater understanding of disciplines within the arts and humanities. This program is a good choice for students planning on transferring to the California State University or the University of California. The student will be able to satisfy general education requirements and focus on transferable course work that relates to a specific major and/or individual interest. It is highly recommended that students consult a counselor to determine the classes within each area that will best prepare them for their intended transfer major.

Justification: This degree pattern used to be listed as one of five "areas of emphasis" within the Liberal Arts A.A. degree. However, instead of listing these five patterns under one degree it was decided that it would be more appropriate to have each area of emphasis listed as a separate degree pattern under the designator "Interdisciplinary Studies."

4. Interdisciplinary Studies: Math and Science

This Interdisciplinary Studies degree is designed for students who wish to develop a greater understanding of the theories, methods, and analytical techniques commonly employed in the fields of math and science.

Justification: This degree pattern used to be listed as one of five "areas of emphasis" within the Liberal Arts A.A. degree. Instead of listing these five patterns under one degree, however, it was decided that it would be more appropriate to have each area of emphasis listed as a separate degree pattern under the designator "Interdisciplinary Studies."

5. Interdisciplinary Studies: Social and Behavioral Sciences

The Interdisciplinary Studies degree is designed for students who seek a greater understanding of disciplines within the social and behavioral sciences. This program is a good choice for students planning on transferring to the California State University or the University of California. The student will be able to satisfy general education requirements and focus on transferable course work that relates to a specific major and/or individual interest.

Justification: This degree pattern used to be listed as one of five "areas of emphasis" within the Liberal Arts A.A. degree. Instead of listing these five patterns under one degree, however, it was decided that it would be more appropriate to have each area of emphasis listed as a separate degree pattern under the designator "Interdisciplinary Studies."

BACKGROUND:

The City of Rancho Cordova ("City") has requested an easement for storm drain purposes, including installing, constructing, reconstructing, improving, operating, maintaining and repairing a storm water drainage pipeline, and several easements for public utilities for the installation and maintenance of water, gas, sewer, and drainage pipes, traffic control devices and for poles and overhead wires and conduits for electrical, television and telephone services. In order for the City to provide these services the City requires easements to access, operate, maintain, restore or repair these utilities.

STATUS:

To grant the easements to the City of Rancho Cordova, Education Code section 81311 requires the Board of Trustees to first adopt a resolution, by a vote of at least 2/3 of its members, declaring its intent to grant an easement. That resolution must describe the property to be conveyed, specify the purposes for which and the terms upon which the property will be conveyed and must establish a date and time for a subsequent public hearing to consider granting the easement(s). At the subsequent meeting, a public hearing is conducted and the Board may adopt a resolution granting of the easement unless 10% or more of the qualified electors of the District sign a petition protesting the conveyance. Under the Education Code, a majority of the Board Members must sign the initial resolution which must be posted and published in accordance with the Education Code.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution No. 2015-02 declaring its intent to grant to the City of Rancho Cordova the easements described above.

Intent to Dedicate Easements To The City of Rancho Cordova

WHEREAS, the Los Rios Community College District is the owner of all real property located at Folsom Lake College, Rancho Cordova Center and identified by Sacramento County as APNs; 076-0212-008, 076-0212-011, 076-0212-012, 076-0212-013, 076-0212-014, 076-0212-015, 076-0212-017, 076-0213-003, 076-0213-004, 076-0213-005, 076-0213-011, and 076-0213-012 (the Folsom Lake College Rancho Cordova Center Property); and

WHEREAS, in order to facilitate the installation, construction, reconstruction, improvement, maintenance and repairs of a storm water drainage pipeline, and installation and maintenance of water, gas, sewer, and drainage pipes, traffic control devices and for poles and overhead wires and conduits for electrical, television and telephone services, the City of Rancho Cordova must encroach on the Folsom Lake College Rancho Cordova Center Property; and

WHEREAS, the City of Rancho Cordova requires a Drainage Pipeline easement and several utility easements to provide services on the Folsom Lake College Rancho Cordova Center Property; and

WHEREAS, granting the easements is to the District's benefit, and it will not adversely affect the District in any respect and will not have a significant adverse effect on the environment; and

WHEREAS, the District is required by Education Code section 81311 to declare its intention to dedicate the easements and to hold a public hearing regarding the proposed dedication: Now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Los Rios Community College District declares its intention to convey easements on the real property described in Exhibits 1 through 4 to the City of Rancho Cordova at no cost for the purposes of facilitating the installation, construction, reconstruction, improvement, maintenance and repairs of a storm water drainage pipeline, and installation and maintenance of water, gas, sewer, and drainage pipes, traffic control devices and for poles and overhead wires and conduits for electrical, television and telephone services.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a public hearing on the question of making the dedication shall be held on March 11, 2015 at the regularly scheduled Board Meeting in the Board Room (or such other room as provided for in a public notice prior to that meeting) at District Office, 1919 Spanos Court, Sacramento, California.

Installation of all other improvements within the easement area or that may extend into the easement area, shall first require permitting by the Sacramento County Water Agency, or its successor agency. Damage to said herein authorized or permitted improvements caused by the CITY'S use of the easement shall be either repaired or replaced, or the costs therefore shall be paid by the CITY to the GRANTOR, as the CITY in its sole discretion shall elect. Any use of the easement area which is not compatible with, or interferes with, the rights herein granted shall not be allowed. Improvements installed in violation hereof may be removed and the cost of removal shall be at the expense of the GRANTOR or successors in interest.

BACKGROUND:

Education Code §§ 15278, 15280, and 15282, as well as the bylaws of the District Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee, require the Board of Trustees to appoint committee members. BACKGROUND:

On September 10, 2014, the Governing Board adopted the 2014-15 maximum funding level (Z Budget) for the General Fund. The attached Schedule I details modifications to this funding level since adoption. General Fund revenues and appropriations are budgeted \$6.1M higher than the adopted level primarily due to recognition of additional restricted/special programs revenues.

General fund unrestricted revenues continue to reflect the adopted budget projections. The first principal apportionment (P1) has not been released as of February 3rd. The P1 is based upon attendance reporting submitted Jan. 15th along with projected enrollment fee and property tax revenues. It provides an initial projection of growth revenues for the year as well as potential funding shortfalls. With the P1, the final calculation for the prior year, also known as "the Recalc," is issued. The Recalc will provide the actual amount of growth revenues earned for 2013-14, which in turn becomes the base level for 2014-15. It also finalizes the funding shortfall (deficit). Indications are that the shortfall for 2013-14 will likely be around 0.5% at Recalc which is the estimate the District used when it closed its records last June. The Z budget revenue scenario for 2014-15 includes the potential for additional growth revenues above cap. Therefore, the primary adjustments to the budget following the P1 release will be recognition of additional growth and/or backfill of the deficit from 2013-14. Those could be offset by any additional funding shortfall for 2014-15 over the 1% the CCCCO projected last August. Any adjustments will be included in budget revision No. 2 which is scheduled for the June meeting. As usual, the District continues to operate at the X budget level.

STATUS:

Revisions to the adopted budget for the General Fund are necessary for the following reasons:

Schedules I and II detail adjustments to categorical revenues primarily from new awards
for State programs, as well as general purpose revenue increases primarily in other local
and inter-fund transfers. The changes in appropriations reflect the allocation of those
additional resources as well as re-alignment across object codes as expenditure plans
are formalized. The increase in committed fund balance is the set-aside for future
increases in STRS/PERS; and,

Revisions to other District funds due to:

- Instructionally-Related Activities (Schedule III): Increases to general fund transfer and realignment of appropriations; reduction of estimated revenues for various student sales activities.
- Child Development (Schedule IV): Primary change is in State revenue reflecting the increase in reimbursement rates included in the enacted budget. Appropriations reflect that change as well as additional resources from the program development funds (PDF) process.
- 4. Capital Outlay Projects (Schedule V): Decrease in revenue primarily from reduced transfers from the general fund as a result of the finalization of the allocation of program development funds. The change in revenues between State and Local is primarily due to a correction to the schedule from the Adopted budget for SMSR and Proposition 39 revenues.
- 5. Bond Projects Measure A (Schedule VI): Minor change in appropriations for bond service costs.
- 6. Bond Projects Measure M (Schedule VII): Minor change in appropriations for bond service costs.
- 7. Self Insurance (Schedule VIII): Minor changes in funding and appropriations.
- 8. Bookstore (Schedule IX): Minor increase in spending plan offset by decrease in anticipated transfer out to instructionally-related activities.
- 9. Student Financial Aid (Schedule X): Increase in State Categorical programs transferred from the General fund.
- 10. Student Associations Trust (Schedule XI): Changes in spending plan.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the 2014-15 Budget Revision № 1 for the General, Instructionally Related, Child Development, Capital Outlay Projects, Bond Projects – Measures A & M, Self Insurance, Bookstore, Student Financial Aid, and the Student Associations Trust funds shown on the attached schedules, and that the related documents be filed with the County Superintendent of Schools.

BACKGROUND:

Since 1998, the District and Foundation adopted a Master Agreement whereby the Foundation became an auxiliary organization of the District. All college foundation investment activities were combined under the Los Rios Foundation. UBS Financial Services Inc. is the investment consultant for the Foundation.

As an auxiliary organization, the Foundation is not required to operate under GC 53600 investment restrictions. The Foundation Board has adopted a Statement of Rules, Objectives and Guidelines to govern the investment of funds. The funds should be invested with care, skill, prudence and diligence with the goal of producing returns equal to or exceeding prevailing standards among foundations of similar asset size, as well as for the protection of funds held in perpetual duration. The Statement defines the investment guidelines for specified asset classes for endowed funds as follows: equities, defined as common stock, convertible preferred stock, convertible bonds, and convertible stock, shall represent 15-70% of the total fund assets; fixed-income securities, defined as investments with maturities greater than one year that pay a fixed rate of return, shall represent 20-50% of the total assets; alternative investments, defined as fund-of-fund investments, shall represent up to 20% of the total fund assets; and cash, defined as maturities shorter than one year, shall represent 2-10% of the total fund assets. In addition, the Statement provides guidelines for investing non-endowed funds based upon the purpose of the donation and the horizon of time for the use of funds. The three non-endowed portfolio funds available are cash management, fixed income and balanced funds.

STATUS:

This report represents the investment activity for the quarter ended December 31, 2014. The investments are directed by the Los Rios Foundation Finance Committee and realized and unrealized earnings are shown in the accompanying schedules. The return for the endowed portfolio of \$7.5 million for the quarter ended December 31, 2014 was -.02% compared to 1.47% for the composite benchmark. The yield for the quarter ended December 31, 2014 for the total managed portfolio of \$9.9 million is 0.07%. This compares to the composite benchmark of 1.16% for the same period. In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, investments are restated to market value as of each fiscal year-end.

RECOMMENDATION:






Los Rios Foundation Account Summary as of December 31, 2014

BACKGROUND:

The Education Code regulates the procedures by which a community college district can dispose of real and personal property. Education Code section 81452 provides that the governing board may, by unanimous vote, dispose of items valued at \$5,000 or less by private sale without advertising or selling the items at public auction. The District has previously held an auction, at least annually and past auctions have generally cost more than they have netted for the District. In 1998, the District began transferring such surplus items to the State of California since the cost to store and sell such surplus items is greater than potential revenues.

STATUS:

The District has a quantity of surplus material, such as outdated desks and computers, which need to be disposed of. The State of California has accepted some of the surplus items but is not willing to take the entire surplus because they are unable to sell it. The District has located a scrap dealer who is willing to take most of our surplus items and recycle them.

All of the surplus items to be disposed of are either broken and/or not working, obsolete, in poor condition, or not needed for district/college operations: 1 astroscope; 18 batteries; 11 chairs; 20 computers; 11 defibrillator trainers; 2 defibrillators; 1 desk; 1 ethernet hub; 22 human models; 9 laptops; 2 lifts; 15 light stands; 4 medical backboards; 3 medical sensors; 5 microscopes; 22 monitors; 1 power supply; 19 printers; 1 radiation analyzer; 1 router; 1 shelving unit; 1 switch; 1 video player; and 1 white board. These items have a value of less than \$5,000.

BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to Government Code Section 3547, et seq., all initial proposals of exclusive representatives of recognized employee groups and of the District are required to be presented at a public meeting of the District.

The Board and representatives of the Los Rios Supervisors Association (LRSA) have agreed to engage in an interest–based collaborative approach to negotiations. The collective bargaining agreement with LRSA expires on June 30, 2015. The parties wish to commence negotiations as soon as possible, with the goal of attempting to reach agreement as early as possible before the contract expires.

Consistent with the applicable code sections, the public has a right to be informed of those areas that the parties will be negotiating and to invite public comment at a meeting of the public school employer.

STATUS:

BACKGROUND:

The District's facilities program includes plans for improvements to the existing athletic fields at American River College. The proposed athletic field's project will provide a new competition soccer field, a new full practice football field, a new hammer throw diamond, and improvements to the existing partial football practice field and two existing practice soccer fields. The portable bleachers currently used on the fields will be replaced with permanent bleachers with seating for 1,000 spectators. The fields will also have a press box, one restroom building, a ticket booth, field lighting, a concession building, and drinking fountains. Minor revisions to the adjacent parking lot will also be completed. The development will include new concrete flatwork, pavement sections and associated landscaping including fifty-four new trees.

STATUS:

This proposed project requires review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The first step in this process is to perform an Initial Study (IS) to determine what type of environmental document is required. If the IS shows that any possible significant impacts can be avoided or substantially mitigated to insignificance, a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) is the appropriate environmental document. Here, the IS was conducted in November 2014 and concluded the appropriate environmental document for this project is a MND. A MND is a document that describes the proposed project, evaluates the potential environmental effects of the proposed project, and states the reasons why the Board has concluded that there will be no significant effect on the environment provided the mitigation measures identified in the MND are incorporated into the project. A completed IS must be attached to the MND to support these conclusions. Where a MND is allowed, the District is not required to prepare an environmental impact report.

The draft IS/MND was prepared and made available to local agencies and the public for comments. The public review period for the IS/MND is over. Only a few comments were received. Each comment and response is included in the Final IS/MND. Based on the analysis performed in the IS/MND, this project will result in less than significant impacts on the environment, with the implementation of the mitigation measures identified.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution No. 2015-03, adopting the American River College Athletic Fields IS/MND; and approve the Athletic Fields Project.

BACKGROUND:

Many of the District's Policies and Regulations delegate particular jobs or responsibilities to the Deputy Chancellor. The recent retirement of the District's former Deputy Chancellor, Jon Sharpe, leaves the District without a Deputy Chancellor. Thus, a series of changes must be made to allow the Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration to act when there is no Deputy Chancellor, and in some instances, changes must be made designating the Associate Vice Chancellor, Human Resources, as the responsible party.

STATUS:

A series of changes have been made to this group of Policies and their corresponding Regulations. P-1312, P-3221, P-8252, and P-8323 have altered the language to read "Deputy Chancellor (or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, if there is no Deputy Chancellor)". P-6211 has added language to specify the Associate Vice Chancellor, Human Resources as the responsible party in certain instances. As is sometimes the case with non-substantive changes, these Policies are brought to the Board directly for Action and approval.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed revisions to the attached Policies.

1310 Relations with Public

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1.0 Campus Visitors

- 1.1 Campus Visitor Defined An individual who is neither an employee of the Los Rios Community College District, nor a currently enrolled student of a particular Ceollege, nor an employee of the Los Rios District, shall be considered in this and other sections of the Board District Policies and Administrative Regulations as a visitor to the campus.
- 1.2 Visitors and telephone callers, whether business person, parents, students, alumnius, or others, should receive a cordial and courteous reception on each campus. A well-informed receptionist should greet all campus visitors and provide every assistance possible in directing them to the person or information they desire.
- 1.3 Visitors are welcome on all campuses at any time during business hours, so long as they do not interfere in any way with the conduct of classes, student or campus activities, and/or school business. Visitors that commit any act likely to interfere with the peaceful conduct of the activities of the District or its facilities, or have entered the campus or facility for the purpose of committing any such act, the College President, Deputy Chancellor (or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, if there is no Deputy Chancellor), or designee, may direct the person to leave the campus or facility. Visitors may attend classes only with the permission of the instructor conducting the class, or club meetings with permission of the advisor.
- 1.4 Visitors are welcome at all public meetings held on campus but may not attend classes, meetings or convocations intended only for faculty, staff and/or students unless permission has been obtained from the College President of the Ceollege pursuant to Section 1.3 above.
- 1.5 Unsupervised children shall not be permitted on the campuses or inside the District/College buildings.

2.0 Construction Sites

- 2.1 Unauthorized personnel shall not be permitted on construction sites on Ceollege campuses.
- 2.2 The Chancellor may establish regulations to permit entry on a limited basis to employees and/or the general public for the purpose of observing the progress of the construction. (See also R-8451).

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1.0 Remuneration (Ed. Code, § 72024.)

1.1 Compensation for Services

- 1.1.1 Compensation for services rendered shall be determined by legal provisions governing such payment.
- 1.1.2 Each member of the Los Rios Community College <u>District</u> Board of Trustees, except the <u>sS</u>tudent <u>tTrustee</u>, shall receive as compensation for services the full amount as provided for in Education Code, section 72024.
- 1.1.3 The Board of Trustees may increase the compensation beyond the limits delineated in this section, in an amount not to exceed five(5) percent based on the present monthly rate of compensation.

1.2 Absence from Meeting

- 1.2.1 Any member Trustee who does not attend all meetings held by the Board of Trustees in any month may receive no more than a pro rata share of the number of meetings actually attended based upon the compensation established in Section 1.1.2 above.
- 1.2.2 A Board of Trustees member Trustee shall be paid for any meeting when absent if the Board of Trustees adopts a resolution that at the time of the meeting the Board of Trustees member Trustee is performing other services for the Los Rios Community College District.
- 1.2.3 A Board of Trustees member Trustee, including the sStudent tTrustee, may be paid in any calendar year for the first two absences in a calendar year if the Board of Trustees adopts a resolution that, at the time of the meeting, the Board of Trustee member Trustee was ill, on jury duty, or the absence was due to a hardship deemed acceptable by the Board of Trustees.

1.3 Payment

1.3.1 Warrants for the payment to <u>Board of Trustees membersTrustees</u> for services rendered shall be paid in the same manner as all other service is paid.

2.0 Reimbursement Authorization

- 2.1 The Los Rios Community College District provides the reimbursement of expenses incurred by Board of Trustees members Trustees for the following:
 - 2.1.1 Travel to and from Board of Trustees meetings.

- 2.1.2 In-District travel to perform District business relating to assignments delegated by the Board of Trustees.
- 2.1.3 Out-of-District travel and accommodations for conferences and professional meetings.
- 2.2 Authorization to attend meetings and to conduct District business shall be in accordance with approval given at the organization meeting held in conjunction with the first regular meeting in December each year.

3.0 Reimbursement Guidelines

- 3.1 A member of the Board of Trustees Trustee shall receive reimbursement for necessary and reasonable expenses as follows:
 - 3.1.1 Payment of mileage on personal cars for travel to and from Board of Trustees meetings shall be at the per mile reimbursement rate established by the Internal Revenue Code.
 - 3.1.2 Payment for <u>i</u>In-District travel to perform District business relating to assignments delegated by the Board of Trustees shall be paid at a monthly rate. This payment shall be considered as reimbursement for mileage on personal cars and incidental expenses related to performance of assigned responsibilities. Monthly payment rates are as follows:
 - 3.1.2.1 Board of Trustees President: \$120.00 per month
 - 3.1.2.2 Board of Trustees Vice President: \$70.00 per month
 - 3.1.2.3 Board member Trustee with a delegated assignment: \$60.00 per month
 - 3.1.3 Payment for travel related to attendance at official out-of-District conferences or professional meetings shall be in accordance with District Administrative Regulation (R-8341).

4.0 Heath and Dental Coverage

- 4.1 Coverage for health, medical, and dental insurance is provided for members of the Board of Trustees, including the <u>sS</u>tudent <u>tT</u>rustee, through plans adopted by the District.
- 4.2 The District makes a monthly contribution toward the cost of premiums in accordance with the contribution level for management employees.
- 5.0 Public Employees Retirement System (PERS)/Social Security

- 5.1 Board members Trustees compensated for services and elected prior to July 1, 1994 may elect to become members of the retirement system. Eligible Board of Trustee members Trustees who wish to participate in PERS should complete the attached Election of Optional Membership form and return to the Deputy Chancellor (or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, if there is no Deputy Chancellor). Board of Trustees members Trustees elected after July 1, 1994 are not eligible to participate in PERS (SB 53).
- 5.2 Board of Trustees members Trustees are automatically covered under Social Security and Medicare.

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1.0 <u>Purpose</u>

1.1 The purpose of the Los Rios Community College District investment of funds <u>District Ppolicy</u> is to delineate the responsibility for investment of District funds between the County Treasury and the District. The purpose also is to establish cash management and investments guidelines for District officials responsible for the stewardship of District funds maintained outside the County Treasury.

2.0 Funds held at County Treasury

- 2.1 Pursuant to provisions of the California Community Colleges <u>Budget and Accounting Manual (BAM)</u>, the District shall use the County Treasury for deposits and disbursements of moneys except for those funds noted below:
 - 2.1.1 Agency funds
 - 2.1.2 Enterprise funds
 - 2.1.3 Moneys held for payment of security of bonds or other indebtedness
 - 2.1.12.1.4 Fund designated for retiree health benefits
 - A) Agency funds
 - B) Enterprise funds
 - C) Moneys held for payment or security of bonds or other indebtedness
 - D) Funds designated for retiree health benefits
- 2.2 To facilitate depositing and transfer of funds to the County Treasury, the District may establish clearing bank accounts. All moneys in such accounts shall be moved to the County Treasury within a reasonable time period. Certain refundable deposits may be held in clearing accounts until they are refunded or forfeited.

3.0 County Treasury Investment

- 3.1 Investment of funds maintained in the County Treasury shall be delegated to the County Treasury and invested by the County Treasurer following appropriate Government Code and investment policies adopted by the County Board of Supervisors.
 - 3.1.1 In accordance with County procedures, District funds may be pooled with other local agencies and invested by the County Treasurer in accordance with Government Code, section 53635.

3.1.2 The County Treasurer may separately invest in accordance with Government Code, section 53601, District funds deposited in the County Treasury not required for the immediate needs of the District, such as General Obligation Bond proceeds and Tax Revenue Anticipation Notes.

4.0 <u>District</u>--Directed Investments

- 4.1 District officials responsible for the stewardship of District funds have fiduciary responsibility and are subject to prudent investor standards for all investment decisions. District investments shall be made with care, skill, prudence and diligence.
- 4.2 Agency and Enterprise funds not required for immediate needs.
 - 4.2.1 Agency and Enterprise funds not required for immediate needs may be invested in the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) per Government Code, section 16429.1.
 - 4.2.2 The College President or Vice President of Administration are is authorized to invest Agency and Enterprise funds at their his/her College.
 - 4.2.3 The Chancellor, Deputy Chancellor (or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, if there is no Deputy Chancellor), and Associate Vice Chancellor-of, Finance are authorized to invest all Agency and Enterprise funds.
 - 4.2.4 Funds deposited with the LAIF shall be invested by the State Treasurer in securities prescribed by Government Code, sections 16430 and 16480.4.
 - 4.2.5 Funds invested with LAIF shall not exceed fifty million dollars at any one time or the maximum amount as specified by the State Treasury guidelines, whichever is greater.
- 4.3 Moneys held for payment or security of bonds or other indebtedness
 - 4.3.1 The Chancellor, Deputy Chancellor (or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, if there is no Deputy Chancellor), and Associate Vice Chancellor of, Finance are authorized to invest moneys held for payment or security of bonds or other indebtedness.
 - 4.3.2 Moneys held for payment or security of bonds or other indebtedness, including certificates of participation, may be deposited with the County Treasury or invested separately under the provisions of Government Code, section 53601.5, subdivision (l).
- 4.4 Funds designated for retiree health benefits
 - 4.4.1 Funds designated for retiree health benefits shall be invested pursuant to Government Code, sections 53620-53622 and District_Policy.

- 4.4.2 Authority to Direct Investments of Trust Assets.
 - 4.4.2.1 The Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees serves as the administrator of the Plan and has designated that the Chancellor or designee(s) shall oversee the investment of the Trust assets.
 - 4.4.2.2 The Chancellor or designee(s) is responsible for the selection of an investment manager. The investment manager shall be approved by the Board of Trustees.
 - 4.4.2.3 The Chancellor or designee(s) shall provide a copy of the District Policy governing the investment of the funds to the investment manager. In addition, the Chancellor or designee(s) may further define investment objectives and limitations within District Policy.
 - 4.4.2.4 The Chancellor or designee(s) shall review investment activity no less than monthly.
 - 4.4.2.5 The Chancellor or designee(s) shall meet no less than semiannually with the investment manager regarding investment activity and returns.
 - 4.4.2.6 The Chancellor or designee(s) shall establish, with the investment manager, benchmarks for measuring the relative performance of the manager in managing the assets. The benchmarks should measure both return and risk.
- 4.4.3 Investment Objectives for Retiree Health Benefit Trust Assets
 - 4.4.3.1 The specific objectives for the investment of Trust assets are as follows:
 - 4.4.3.1.1 Safety of Principal The preservation and safeguarding of principal is the primary investment objective.
 - 4.4.3.1.2 Liquidity The investment portfolio should remain sufficiently flexible to meet cash requirements that may be reasonably anticipated.
 - 4.4.3.1.3 Public Trust District officials shall avoid any transactions that might impair public confidence in the District. Investments shall be made with precision and care, considering the probable safety of the capital as well as the probable income to be derived.
 - 4.4.3.1.4 Rate of Return The investment portfolio shall be designed to attain a rate of return at the market average or better through budgetary and economic cycles,

consistent with the risk limitations, asset allocation, prudent investment principles, and cash flow characteristics identified herein.

4.4.4 Asset Allocation

4.4.4.1 The table below provides the maximum asset allocation for each type of investment instrument. The asset mix may vary within the maximum limits based upon market conditions and the recommendation of the investment manager. At times, the asset allocations may exceed the maximum due to changes in market values. In those cases, the investment manager will re-balance the portfolio within the allocation limits expressed below within fifteen calendar days.

Asset Category	Maximum %
All Stocks (Domestic and International)	35% (International Stocks may comprise up to 10% of total assets)
Fixed Income	85%
Cash Investments	100%

4.4.4.2 Within each category, the investments shall be adequately diversified consistent with the prudent investor standard.

Diversification should include geographic and sector diversity and also include limiting concentration in groups of securities subject to a single significant economic, social or political event.

4.4.5 Investment Restrictions and Prohibited Investments

- 4.4.5.1 The Chancellor or designee(s), subject to Board of Trustees approval, may restrict specific investments from the portfolio on grounds other than economic risk and reward. Should the Chancellor or designee(s) restrict security investments, a list of the prohibited investments shall be given to the investment manager. This list may be periodically updated.
- 4.4.5.2 The investment manager shall not make any investment jeopardizing the tax-excluded purposes of the Trust within the meaning of the Internal Revenue Code, or engage in any prohibited transaction based on federal, state or other governing regulation.
- 4.4.5.3 Investment in the following types of assets is prohibited:
 - Speculative, non-hedging transactions involving stock options, futures, or similar investments
 - Commodities

- Letter stock, private placements, or direct placements
- Intra-state stock offerings
- Real estate
- Closed-end investment trusts
- Purchase of securities on margin, or lending or borrowing money
- Short <u>Ss</u>ales, or substantially similar transactions
- Exotic derivatives that would materially change the duration, leverage or risk characteristics of the portfolio
- Investments with limited market liquidity

5.0 Annual Investment Activity Report

- 5.1 No later than October 1 following the fiscal year end, the Chancellor or designee(s) shall prepare and present to the Board of Trustees an annual report of investments.
- 5.2 The annual report shall include all District_directed investments including earnings from funds maintained and invested by the County Treasury and the Local Agency Investment Fund.

6.0 Internal Audit

6.1 The Internal Auditor may be directed to review the investment portfolio for compliance with the Board of Trustees investment <u>District pP</u>olicy on a periodic basis.

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1.0 Equal Opportunity

- 2.2 The Board of Trustees seeks in every case to purchase, for the least expenditure of funds, optimum quality for the function to be served.
- 2.3 The Board of Trustees is guided by appropriate legal provisions for purchase of supplies and equipment, and for work to be done. (Ed. Code, § 81641-81656 and Pub Cont. Code, § 20651)
- 2.4 Other things being equal, purchases shall be made within the area served by the Los Rios Community College District.

3.0 Bidding and Quotation Procedure

3.1 Where it is legally required or if it is determined by the Deputy Chancellor (or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, if there is no Deputy Chancellor), to be in the best interest of the District to do so, supplies and work to be done shall be purchased on a competitive bid or quotation basis.

<u>Resources</u>, the Chancellor/<u>Superintendent</u> or designee shall allocate every position in the classified service to one of the classes established in the classification plan.
