Chancellor's Report:

<u>ARC:</u> American River College student Lucia Gwarada has been selected to receive a prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship. Lucia is one of only 90 scholars selected nationally this year to receive the award. The scholarship is for up to \$40,000 per year and is intended to cover a significant share of the student's educational expenses – including tuition, living expenses, books and required fees – for the final two to three years necessary to complete a bachelor's degree. Lucia will be attending Sacramento State in the fall as an international student. She is a biochemistry major who is interested in becoming a nurse when she returns to her home country of Zimbabwe.

<u>CRC:</u> Two Cosumnes River College geography students shared a first place award at the 69th Annual Conference of the California Geographical Society. Amber Salmon and Alycia Evans cocreated a digital map titled "Empire Mine State Park: An Interactive Trail Guide to Historical Sites Within the Park." The students, along with six others – including two CRC geography professors – were able to attend the event at Humboldt State University thanks in part to a CRC Foundation mini-grant.

<u>FLC:</u> The Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges has selected Folsom Lake College's Rochelle Franco as a recipient of the 2015 Classified Employee of the Year Award. Rochelle is an evaluator/degree auditor in Admissions & Records and serves as president of the FLC Classified Senate. She is also active in the community, volunteering and fundraising for Folsom Blood Source, Sierra Donor Services, Donate Life California and military veterans. Rochelle, along with three additional members of the community college family, will receive their awards on May 19 during the Board of Governors meeting in Sacramento.

SCC: Four Sacramento City College students and a faculty advisor attended the 2015 Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) Capitol Forum in Washington D.C. While there, they were the first to represent Sacramento City College before the U.S. Congress as students from a newly minted Hispanic Serving Institution. The four students — Rose Shoen, Maria Medina, Jose Quezada and Mario Garcia — were chosen to represent SCC after a lengthy application process that included writing an essay and maintaining a high grade point average. In addition, the students had to be a beneficiary of some type of federal benefit, such as financial aid, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or other programs.

B. <u>Smoking on Campus</u>

Chancellor's Report:

<u>ARC:</u> American River College's men's cross-country team has been honored as a California Community College Athletics Association (CCCAA) Scholar Team. This special award emphasizes the academic achievement of all members of a particular team. The Scholar Team Award is the

highest academic team achievement given annually by the CCCAA. All team members must have excelled academically with a total GPA of 3.0 or higher. And the team needs to have demonstrated better than average success in intercollegiate athletic competition. The award will be presented April 1 at a luncheon in Ontario. Regarding that athletic success, ARC's cross-country team won the Big 8 conference crown for the 9th straight year and won 12 of 14 individual awards. ARC finished 2nd in the state – for its 5th straight top-2 finish) – and three runners were selected as All-State. Congratulations to Coach Rick Anderson and his scholarathletes!

<u>CRC:</u> Cosumnes River College Anthropology student Laura Roccucci has been honored with this year's Society for Anthropology in Community Colleges' Student Award for Academic Excellence. She wrote her award-winning paper on the ancient civilization of Pompeii as part of her course work for a World Prehistory course. She has been invited to accept the award in Hawaii.

FLC: Folsom Lake College's Multicultural & Diversity Committee and Associated Students presented a series of thought-provoking events in February to celebrate Black History Month and Social Justice Week. Highlights included the regional premiere of "Sacramento's Response to Ferguson," with Sacramento NAACP President Stephen Webb and Sacramento Police Lt. Roman Murrietta; Freedom Rider Karen Duncanwood describing her experiences in the Jim Crow South in the 1960s; and FLC's Annual Celebration of African-American Music featuring the Broun Fellinis, Afro-Cuban Funk, and the FLC Urban Jazz Project. This annual spotlight allows students, faculty and staff to dialogue and explore the meaning of multiculturalism and diversity at FLC.

<u>SCC:</u> More than 20 representatives of Sacramento City College attended the HSI – or Hispanic-Serving Institutions – Summit at UC Davis last month. SCC faculty, staff and administrators convened with educational leaders from throughout the state to share and refine ideas about advocating for student success at HSI-designated colleges. SCC students and alums played key roles in one of the discussion panels, co-moderated by SCC Economics Professor Sandra Camarena. They shared their experiences in seeking higher education, including how educators helped them succeed, the challenges they faced from their families and social circles, and how they are "giving back" to help other students. On one other high note, SCC stagecraft instructor Shawn Weinshenk got a glowing write-up in the Sacramento Bee on Sunday thanks to Ginger Rutland, a retired Bee editor. Rutland wrote about her experience returning to school at SCC as an older student in Weinshenk's stagecraft class.

BACKGROUND:

Nearly ten years after the implementation of the alcohol prohibition Board Policy and Administrative Regulation, the Policy and Administrative Regulation were again reviewed.

STATUS:

The special event section of the Board Policy is proposed to be amended. This section applies to "special events" at the campuses. Special events are shows, private parties, concerts, theatrical productions, and other events held on those premises for which the principal attendees are members of the general public or invited guests and not students of the Los Rios Community College District. Special events do not include events sponsored by Student Body Associations, their components, student organizations, or events sponsored by the officers of student life activities.

The proposed amendments explicitly expand the areas at which special events can be held on each campus. Further, it is explicitly stated that these areas include the outdoor areas immediately adjacent to each of the identified areas. Finally, the Chancellor is given authority to designate other areas where alcohol may be served at special events.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed revisions to the attached Policy.

- 1.0 <u>Ban on Alcohol; Exceptions For Events and Instructional Purposes</u> (Business & Professions Code, §section 25608)
 - 1.1 Except as provided in this pDistrict Policy, no person, group, or organization may acquire, possess, consume, sell, give, distribute, or otherwise deliver any alcoholic beverage to any other person, group, or organization in or on any of the Los Rios Community College District grounds, buildings, or facilities or any of its Colleges. Any violation may be punishable as a misdemeanor violation of Business & Professions Code, section 25608 or any successor statutes. Violations by District employees or students may be punished to the maximum extent allowed by law, and/or District Policy or Administrative Regulation including termination or expulsion.
 - 1.2 The following exception exists, pursuant to Business & Professions Code, section 25608, subdivision (a)(2) or any successor statute: Alcoholic beverages may be acquired, possessed, or used in connection with a course of instruction (e.g. public safety courses) provided on College/District grounds, facilities, or buildings, and the person acquiring, possessing, or using alcoholic beverages has been authorized to acquire, possess, or use it-them by the Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees or designee.
 - 1.3 The following exception exists, pursuant to Business & Professions Code, section 25608, subdivision (a)(14) or any successor statute: Wine or beer may be acquired, possessed, used, sold, or consumed in connection with a course of instruction, sponsored dinner, or meal demonstration given as part of a culinary arts program, and the person acquiring, possessing, or using wine or beer -has been authorized to acquire, possess, use, sell, or consume it by the Board of Trustees or designee.
 - 1.4 The following exception exists, pursuant to Business & Professions Code, section 25608, subdivision (a)(10) or any successor statute: Alcoholic beverages may be acquired, possessed, or used during events at a College/District-owned or College/District-operated facility or grounds. As used in this subsection, "events" means fund-raisers held to benefit a nonprofit corporation. Before an event may be held, the sponsor shall obtain an appropriate liquor license for the event. "Events" does not include football games or other athletic contests or other athletic events sponsored by any college or school. "Nonprofit Corporation" means the Los Rios and College Foundations.
 - 1.5 The following exception exists, pursuant to Business & Professions Code, section 25608, subdivision (a)(15) or any successor statute: Alcoholic beverages may be possessed, consumed, or sold during special events at College/District regional performing venues and other venues as described herein. As used in this subsection, "special events" means events held with the permission of the Board of Trustees or designee that are shows, private parties, concerts, theatrical productions, and other events held on those premises for which the principal

attendees are members of the general public or invited guests and not students of the District. Special events do not include events sponsored by Student Body Associations, their components, student organizations, or events sponsored by the officers of student life activities. Before an event may be held, the College shall obtain an appropriate liquor license for the event. As used in this subsection, "regional performing venues" means Folsom Lake College Harris Center for the Arts; American River College Performing Arts Center; Cosumnes River College Visual and Performing Arts Center; Sacramento City College Hughes Stadium and Performing Arts Center. Other venues at which alcohol maybe be served on campus include the Folsom Lake College Community Room, the Folsom Lake College Falcon's Roost, Folsom Lake College FL 1-8, the Cosumnes River College Winn Center, the Cosumnes River College Center, the American River College Culinary Arts Building, the American River College Student Center, the American River College Kaneko Gallery, the rooftop of the American River College parking garage, the American River College Mather Center, and the Sacramento City College Fischbacher Fine Arts Building. Venue includes the open space immediately adjacent to the described area. The Chancellor or designee may designate other venues where alcohol may be served under this section.

1.6 The Chancellor shall develop administrative regulations to implement this **District** p**P**olicy.

BACKGROUND:

With the advent of electronic cigarettes, staff conducted a review of the Los Rios Community College District's Policies and Administrative Regulations concerning smoking. This review was started in early fall 2014, but the presentation of Policy changes to the Board was postponed until after the information presentation at the March 2015 Board meeting.

STATUS:

Prior to these proposed Policy changes, the only Board Policy regarding smoking was that which prohibited smoking in the Board Room. The proposed changes elevate the general rule of no smoking inside District or College buildings to the Board Policy level, applicable to all District and College facilities. The proposed changes also empower the Chancellor and the Colleges to broaden this limitation. The Administrative Regulations that accompany this change in Policy further define smoking to include electronic cigarettes and provide that the Colleges may further limit when and where smoking is permitted.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed revisions to the attached Policies.

- 1.0 <u>Use of School Facilities, Public Purposes</u> (Ed. Code, § 82530 to 82548)
 - 1.1 The use of **Los Rios Community College** District property and facilities shall be granted under those sections of the Education Code pertaining to the public use, provided that such use shall not interfere with the instructional program and services. The educational program has priority in the use of **eC**ollege facilities at all times. No permit shall be granted for a use which interferes with the **eC**ollege instructional program or activities.
 - 1.2 The use of college facilities by community groups is expected to contribute to the educational, political, economic, cultural, recreational, or moral interest of the citizens of the community.
 - 1.3 The District shall establish Administrative #Regulations for use of public facilities.
 - 1.4 Smoking is prohibited in the indoor areas of all facilities of the District/Colleges and outdoors as required by law, the Administrative Regulations, and as implemented by the Colleges.
 - 4.31.5 The Chancellor shall develop Administrative Regulations to implement this District Policy.

1.0 Public Expression (Ed. Code, Section 76120)

- 1.1 The use of outdoor areas open to the public generally shall be granted under the Free Speech clauses of the United States and California constitutions, those sections of the Education Code pertaining to the use of such areas by student, employee, or public individuals/groups, and all applicable laws. Public expression in the form of freedom of speech and advocacy may be exercised on outdoor Los Rios Community College District property open to the public generally at such times and places and in such a manner as is compatible with the use of the property, and that: (a) assures orderly conduct; (b) avoids disruption or interference with District or College operations; (c) avoids disruption or interference with the ability of the District or College to carry out its responsibilities as an educational institution; (d) protects the rights of all individuals who use District or College property; (e) protects persons against practices that would make them involuntary audiences; (f) assures the safety of all members of the District or College communities; and (g) complies with all applicable laws.

- 4.2 In order for motions to be considered, a second to the motion is required.

5.0 <u>Public Information</u> (Ed. Code, § 72121-)

- 5.1 Meeting agendas shall be posted at the District offices and sent to news media and to the presidents of the Colleges and leaders of constituent groups.
- 5.2 Meeting agendas shall be mailed to interested parties who request this information in writing and supply self-addressed, stamped envelopes for this purpose. (See also **District Policy P-3211**, Section 6.0)
- 5.3 Members of the public shall be permitted to inspect detailed agendas and reports, when completed, in advance of meetings, at the District Office.

6.0 Smoking

6.1 Smoking is prohibited in the Board Room. Smoking is defined as inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, or any other lighted or heated tobacco or other product intended for inhalation, in any matter or in any form. Smoking also includes the use of e-cigarettes. An e-cigarette is any oral device that provides a vapor of nicotine or any other substance for inhalation. E-cigarettes do not include products approved by the United States Department of Food and Drug Administration for medical

BACKGROUND:

Education Code section 15278 requires the District to establish and appoint members to an independent Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee to satisfy the accountability requirements of Proposition 39. The Committee reviews the expenditures, informs the public of the expenditure of bond revenues, and presents an annual report to the Board. Pursuant to Education Code section 15282 and the Bylaws of the Committee, the Board appoints the members of the Committee to serve two year terms. The Board may not appoint the same member for more than three consecutive terms. The term of one of the Board Members has expired and the Board must appoint a new member.

STATUS:

Education Code section 15282 requires specific constituents to be represented on the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee including:

- One (1) member active in the local business community.
- One (1) member active in a senior citizen's organization.
- One (1) member active in a bona-fide taxpayers association.
- One (1) member active in a support organization for the college.
- One (1) student enrolled and active in a community college support group.
- Two (2) members of the community at-large appointed by the Board.
- The Los Rios Board of Trustees may elect to appoint more than seven (7) members.

Mr. Marty Katz is being recommended to fill the vacancy of a community college support organization representative. Mr. Katz is currently an active member of the Los Rios Foundation. His experience on our Foundation Board, combined with his involvement in our community will be beneficial to the committee. His appointment to the Board will meet all of the Proposition 39 requirements and bring the total Committee membership to 14.

BACKGROUND:

On September 10, 2014, the Governing Board adopted the 2014-15 maximum funding level (Z Budget) for the General Fund. The Board approved budget revision #1 on February 11, 2015. The attached Schedule I details further modifications to this funding level since the first revision. General Fund revenues and appropriations are budgeted \$8.8M higher and are comprised of \$5.6M in additional general purpose revenues and transfers, and additional categorical revenues of \$3.2M.

The final funding calculation for the 2013-14 year was received following budget revision #1. The District was funded for \$348,753 less in restoration (growth) than had been anticipated. The final deficit for 2013-14 came in slightly better than projected. The District had projected a 0.5% deficit on total funding and the final was 0.45%. Given the significant amount of revenue above projections that the State has realized, it would seem that districts should not have a deficit on funding in 2014-15. The current response from the system office is that the Governor, rather than fully funding districts, has indicated that the 2015-16 funding for past mandated costs activities can be used as backfill for the 2013-14 deficit.

For 2014-15, restoration was funded at \$9.4M at the 1st Principal Apportionment (P1) which is the amount the District is using for the Z budget revenue level. The deficit at 2014-15 P1 is 1.6% but the District is still using 0.5% as an estimate of the final deficit. The 2nd Principal Apportionment (P2), scheduled to be issued in late June, will provide a more accurate picture as far as enrollment fees and property tax revenues as well as the Chancellor's Office's projections of what the deficit may be when the 2014-15 calculation is finalized in February 2016. Resources include a draw \$4.3M of the reserves designated by the Board as available to support general fund operations, if necessary.

STATUS:

Revisions to the adopted budget for the General Fund are necessary for the following reasons:

1. Adjustments to general purpose and restricted/special programs as described above (Schedules I and II) including recognition of augmentations and new awards for restricted programs and re-alignment across major object codes as expenditure plans are finalized and,

Revisions to other District funds due to:

- 2. Instructionally-Related Activities (Schedule III): Primarily due to increase in local revenues; Changes in expenditure plan; and increases in transfer to other funds.
- 3. Child Development (Schedule IV): Increase in transfer from the General fund to support operating costs.
- 4. Capital Outlay Projects (Schedule V): Change in revenue and appropriations primarily the result of the termination of the option to purchase the Poppy Ridge property. Appropriations also reflect transfer to General fund of \$4.3M from reserves designated by the Board and transfer of \$1M to the Regional Performing Arts Center fund to support operational costs.
- 5. Other Debt Service (Schedule VI): Adjusted to reflect early payoff of bonds from accumulated funds to reduce future interest costs and reduction in projected interest income.
- 6. Self-Insurance (Schedule VII): Reduction in anticipated costs for property, liability and workers' compensation and increase in dental program.
- 7. Bookstore (Schedule VIII): Slight change in expenditure plan.
- 8. Regional Performing Arts Center (Schedule IX): Reflects transfer from capital outlay projects fund to support operational costs if necessary.
- 9. Student Financial Aid (Schedule X): Decrease in federal revenue for the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG) and reduction in transfers from State categorical programs for financial aid.
- 10. Student Associations (Schedule XI): Decrease in revenue items and modifications to appropriations.
- 11. Scholarship & Loan Trust (Schedule XII) Slight change in revenues and appropriations.
- 12. Los Rios Foundation (XIII): Increase in donations.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the 2014-15 Budget Revision № 2 for the General, Instructionally Related, Child Development, Capital Outlay Projects, Other Debt Service, Self-Insurance, Bookstore, Regional Performing Arts Center, Student Financial Aid, Student Associations, Scholarship and Loan Trust, and the Los Rios Foundation Funds shown on the attached schedules, and that the related documents be filed with the County Superintendent of Schools.

BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to Article XIII-B of the Constitution and Government Code Section 7900, all community college districts are required to compute an annual appropriation limit. That appropriation limit is adjusted annually for changes in price index, population, and other applicable factors.

Staff has calculated the 2015-16 appropriation limit as specified in the Government Code Section 7908. The calculated spending limit is \$357,471,683. The District's 2015-16 appropriations subject to this limit has been calculated as \$269,265,963 which indicates that the District's tentative budget is \$88,205,720 below its appropriation limit. For 2014-15 the District's appropriations subject to limit was \$86,392,822 below the appropriation limit of \$331,139,362.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the appropriation limitation of \$357,471,683 for 2015-16 by adopting the attached Resolution No. 2015-11.

BACKGROUND:

The State Chancellor's Office has a prescribed capital outlay process and calendar for requesting State funds for capital outlay projects. Each year the District must file a Five Year Construction Plan which lists all proposed projects, whether State funded or not. Final Project Proposals (FPPs), which are prepared to request State funding for projects that are listed in the Five Year Construction Plan, are also to be submitted with the Five Year Construction Plan each year by July 1.

Although a district may qualify for State funding, all districts are competing with each other for the limited funds available. There is currently a multi-billion dollar backlog of funding requests for capital projects on file with the State. Facility capacity/load ratios (enrollment growth) and local contribution of funds are key elements in the State's prioritization of funding capital projects.

STATUS:

The State has not placed a bond measure on the ballot for several years, so there is no funding available for new-start projects. This has caused a multi-year delay in the funding schedule for FPPs. The FPPs approved in previous years will be rolled forward. Therefore, no new FPPs will be submitted this year.

The Five Year Construction Plan has been prepared and is ready for submission to the State. This year's plan has only minor revisions – primarily changes in the schedules of projects due to lack of State funding. The attached executive summary describes the Five Year Construction Plan and possible sequencing of State funded projects.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the Five Year Construction Plan and supporting Resolution No. 2015-12 for submission to the State on July 1, 2015.

State Five Year Construction Plan And Final Project Proposals

Executive Summary

State Five Year Construction Plan:

The basic intent and purpose of the Plan is to analyze enrollment forecasts and determine the amount and type of spaces that will be needed to meet increases in enrollment and changes in the educational program. The Plan is used to determine overall estimated costs and identify possible funding sources.

The major components of the Plan are: Forecasted student load (enrollment/WSCH), facilities capacity to handle load, proposed new space, proposed modernizations and possible funding sources. The first three components are compiled into "capacity/load ratios". Capacity/load ratios represent, as a percentage, the capacity to handle forecasted student load (or demand). These capacity/load ratios are the primary tool used by the State to determine which projects will be approved. Also the State has a priority system, which causes districts to compete against each other to offer the State the least cost alternative. Because of this many of the projects have a local contribution indicated. The local contribution is intended to make our projects more competitive for scarce State funding.

This year's State Five Year Construction Plan is comprised mainly of new construction projects and modernization projects. Three of the listed projects are completed but need to remain in the plan until all State close-out processes have been completed.

Possible Sequencing of State Funded Projects

The State has not placed a bond measure on the ballot for several years, so there is no funding available for new-start projects. This has caused a multi-year delay in the funding schedule for FPPs. The next possible state bond will be in November of 2016. If there is a state bond in 2016 and the voters approve it, then the funding schedule for Los Rios FPPs could be as follows:

FPPs previously submitted and scheduled for 2016-17 new start funding

- ARC Natomas Center Phase 2 & 3
- FLC Phase 2.1 Instructional Buildings

FPP previously submitted and scheduled for 2017-18 new start funding

• SCC West Sacramento Center Phase 2

Following is a brief description of these FPPs:

ARC Natomas Center Phase 2 and 3 This project combines Phase 2 and 3 into one project and will provide approximately 35,400 ASF of new instructional and related support space at Natomas Center. This new building will be connected to the existing Phase 1 building at Natomas. The estimated total cost of this project is \$38,074,000. The total request for State funding is \$24,992,000 for portions of the Preliminary Plans, Working Drawings and Construction of this project. Los Rios is proposing to fund the remaining cost of this project, to include portions of the Preliminary plans, Working drawings and Construction and all of the Equipment; for a total District contribution of \$13,082,000.

FLC Phase 2.1 Instructional Buildings This project will provide additional instructional and student services spaces for Folsom Lake College. This project will provide 26,600 ASF of lab space, 8,800 ASF of lecture space, 13,600 ASF of office space (primarily for student services) and approximately 10,425 ASF of related spaces; for a total ASF of 59,425 of new space. The estimated total cost of this project is \$64,290,000. The total request for State funding is \$36,867,000 for portions of the preliminary plans, working drawings and construction of this project. Los Rios is proposing to fund the remaining portions of the preliminary plans, working drawings and construction costs and the entire equipment cost, totaling \$27,423,000.

SCC West Sacramento Center Phase 2 This project will construct the second phase of the educational center in West Sacramento. It will provide 15,806 ASF of instructional, office and related spaces in a new multi-story building near the current Phase 1 building. The estimated total cost of this project is \$15,086,000. The total request for State funding is \$9,169,000 for portions of the preliminary plans, working drawings and construction of this project. Los Rios CCD is proposing to fund the remaining portion of the preliminary plans, working drawings, construction and all of the equipment, totaling \$5,917,000.

BACKGROUND:

The Education Code regulates the procedures by which a community college district can dispose of real and personal property. Education Code section 81452 provides that the Board of Trustees may, by unanimous vote, dispose of items valued at \$5,000 or less by private sale without advertising or selling the items at public auction. The District has previously held an auction, at least annually, and past auctions have generally cost more than they have netted for the District. In 1998, the District began transferring such surplus items to the State of California since the cost to store and sell such surplus items is greater than potential revenues.

STATUS:

The District has a quantity of surplus material, such as outdated furniture and computers, which need to be disposed of. The State of California has accepted some of the surplus items but is not willing to take the entire surplus because they are unable to sell it. The District has located a scrap dealer who is willing to take most of its surplus items and recycle them.

The surplus items to be disposed of are either irreparable, obsolete, in poor condition, or not needed for district/college operations and include the following: 1 balance; 2 book shelves; 2 book cases; 12 cabinets; 1 camera; 7 card readers; 4 cash boxes; 6 centrifuges; 3 chairs; 6 computers; 1 computer mount; 33 computer storage shelves; 3 copiers; 1 data filter; 5 desks; 1 desk top; 2 display cases; 1 drill; 2 embossers; 2 gates; 5 hotplates; 8 laptops; 11 lockers; 25 monitors; 21 monitor stands; 1 newspaper stand; 7 panels; 1 pottery wheel; 12 power supplies; 4 printers; 2 projectors; 1 pump; 3 refrigerators; 4 scanners; 3 sensors; 26 servers; 1 spectrometer; 1 stirrer; 4 switches; 4 tablets; 1 television; 5 typewriters; 1 typewriter stand; and 2 USB interfaces. These items have a value of less than \$5,000.

BACKGROUND/STATUS:

Per Section 3547.5 of the Government Code, prior to entering into a written agreement with an exclusive representative covering matters within the scope of representation, all public school employers are required to disclose the major provisions of the agreement, including but not limited to, the costs associated with the agreement. Although the State Chancellor's Office has stated community colleges are not covered by this statute, we are required on the quarterly financial reports to the Chancellor's Office (1102 Q Street) to disclose agreements entered into and an estimate of the costs resulting there from. Given the significance of these agreements, public disclosure, even if not specifically required, is still appropriate and prudent.

In spring 2015, the Los Rios Supervisors Association and district representatives met to discuss the establishment of a new collective bargaining contract for the next three year period (2015-18). Negotiations were conducted in accordance with Government code 3457, regulations of the Public Employment Relations Board, and Los Rios Board policies and administrative regulations.

The District has reached a tentative agreement with LRSA for the contract effective July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2018. Throughout the agreement, references to dates and district locations have been updated as well as clarification to language when necessary. In addition, provisions from memorandums of understanding (MOUs) agreed to during the current contract term have been incorporated. A summarization of the major provisions of the agreement, including estimated costs to implement, where applicable, is as follows:

Article 5: Personnel Policies

<u>Article 5.2 Appointment/Probation</u> – Relocated article 5.2.4 which addresses promotion to article 5.3.5.3 to ensure consistency of each section.

<u>Article 5.3 Transfers/Reassignments/Promotions</u> – Added language to define "classification." Added and clarified promotional procedures and language, including relocating article 5.2.4 to this section. Specific procedures clarified included reassignment/transfer to a position of the

same classification (position), reassignment/transfer to a different classification in the same salary range, and conditional (probationary) period when promoted.

<u>Article 5.9.1.1 Professional Growth</u> – Increased release time for Mentorship Program from six hours to twenty-six hours annually.

<u>Article 5.9.3 Professional Growth</u> – Increased college/university tuition fee reimbursement from \$1,000 to \$1,100 per member per year, with a lifetime maximum of \$2,200.

Article 5.9.4 Professional Growth & 5.10 Professional Development Leave Program – In conjunction with Appendix A 1.9, will appropriate \$20,500 annually for the Professional Development Leave Program, which was previously \$41,000 annually. The remaining \$20,500 will be included as an annual continuing resource for the unit's compensation formula. Increased the maximum carryover of unused professional development funds to \$61,500. Increased unit member lifetime maximum use of professional growth funds for tuition reimbursement from \$4,000 to \$7,800.

<u>Article 5.12 Job Classification Review</u> – Agreed to a new job classification review process which includes annual review of select job classifications/families.

Article 7: Work Schedules

Article 7.3.5 Year Round Calendar – Deleted outdated language.

Article 8: Leaves with Pay

<u>Article 8.3.4 Personal Necessity</u> – Added language to address California Kin Care law and personal necessity leave.

<u>Article 8.5.2.2 Other Sick Leave (Five Month Law)</u> – Removed this language to allow for immediate use of other sick leave (five month law) when appropriate.

<u>Article 8.10 Catastrophic illness or Injury Leave Program</u> – Removed outdated language (addressed initial program dates).

<u>Article 8.20.1 LRSA Conferences</u> – Incorporated this language into article 4.6.3 to avoid redundancy.

Article 10: Compensation Salary and Benefits

<u>Article 10.5 Longevity Increments</u> - Updated and clarified language on longevity increments. Added a 2% twenty-five year longevity increment pending funding criteria (approximate cost \$15,000 annually).

Article 11: Fringe Benefits and Insurance Programs

<u>Articles 11.2, 11.3 and 11.4 Medical, Dental and Vision</u> – Updated language to reflect current district contributions and plans.

<u>Article 11.5 District Contributions for Less Than Full-Time Unit Members</u> – Added language to address contributions for less than full-time unit members.

<u>Article 11.10.7.2 Disability Income Protection</u> – Removed redundant language/section.

<u>Article 11.13 Health Care Benefit for Retirees</u> – Language was updated to ensure retirees have access to health care benefits when possible and appropriate, and to comply with the Affordable Care Act.

Article 13: Safety

<u>Article 13.10 Police Uniforms</u> – Minor modifications to the Police Captain/Lieutenant uniform issue.

Appendix A: Salary and Benefits

Combined Appendix A and B into Appendix A. Provided for a limited amount of lottery funds to be used as a continuing resource vice one-time only. New language to address Mandate Block Grant funds, if elected by the district, to be used as one-time only funding. Language and terminology was updated to reflect current budgetary programs and procedures as well as current health plans. Modified language for the Staff Development Leave Program in conjunction with article 5.10.2, and to ensure a minimum of \$41,000 and maximum of \$61,500 will be carried over annually for other professional growth activities. Added layoff provision language.

BACKGROUND:

Los Rios Community College District staff determined that Board Policy 2212 required revision regarding rules for advanced education students and student leadership. Because advanced education students are specially admitted students (as opposed to regularly admitted students), they are already typically in a school with a student body organization. They make up a small portion of the District's students. The District's student body associations require some travel and the District is not equipped to care for students who are minors during travel.

STATUS:

Policy 2212 has been amended to state that advanced education students are not eligible to serve as the student trustee or as a member or officer of a College student body association.

BACKGROUND:

In 2012, Governor Jerry Brown passed Senate Bill 1456 and signed into law the Student Success Act. This established the Student Success and Support Program (SSSP), which aims to enhance student access and success at California community colleges by providing direct assistance throughout the admission, orientation, assessment and testing, counseling, and follow-up processes. Resulting revisions to Title 5 require that the Los Rios Community College District update its Board Policies and Administrative Regulations pertaining to matriculation and the SSSP.

STATUS:

In all of these Policies and their corresponding Regulations, the term "matriculation" has been updated to "Student Success and Support Program." Policy 2811 incorporates new language that defines the goals of SSSP as increasing student access and success through services including orientation, assessment and placement, counseling, advising, and other education planning services. Language is also added to allow special accommodations for Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS) students and English language learners. Policy 2821 adds language specifying components of the program from which certain students can be exempt. Policy 2831 contains no substantive changes.

Policy 2841 is broadened to "Student *Rights and* Responsibilities." It clarifies that under the SSSP, the time frame during which students shall receive assistance includes the time during and prior to enrollment. Additionally, it adds language stating that all students shall be required to identify an education and career goal, diligently engage in course activities and complete assigned course work, and complete courses and maintain progress toward an education goal and completing a course of study. Once a student has identified a course of study and completed fifteen semester units of degree applicable course work, the student shall be provided with an opportunity to develop a comprehensive education plan.

1.0 District Policies and Procedures

The bBoard of Trustees recognizes that, if these prerequisites, co-requisites, advisories, and limitations are established unnecessarily or inappropriately, they constitute unjustifiable obstacles to student access and success and, therefore, the bBoard of Trustees adopts this District pPolicy, which calls for caution and careful scrutiny in establishing them. Nonetheless, the Bboard of Trustees also recognizes that it is as important to have prerequisites in place where they are a vital factor in maintaining academic standards as it is to avoid establishing prerequisites where they are not needed. For these reasons, the bBoard of Trustees has sought to establish a District pPolicy that fosters the appropriate balance between these two concerns.

2.0 Open Courses

- 2.1 Unless specifically exempted by statute or regulation, every course, course section, or class reported for state apportionment funding, whenever offered and maintained by the Los Rios Community College District, shall be fully open to enrollment and participation by any person who has been admitted to the eCollege(s) and who meets such prerequisites as may be established pursuant to regulations contained in Article 2.5, Section 55200 of Subchapter 1 of Chapter 6 of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations. In addition, the District may also limit enrollment under the following conditions:
 - 1.1.12.1.1 Health and safety considerations, facility limitations, funding limitations, constraints of regional planning, or legal requirements imposed by statute, regulations, or contracts.

BACKGROUND:

Recently enacted legislation established a new system of indicators and goals intended to encourage improvement in institutional effectiveness at all California community colleges. On March 16, 2015, pursuant to Education Code section 84754.6, the Board of Governors adopted a goals framework to measure the ongoing condition of a community college's operational environment which requires that as a condition of receipt of Student Success and Support Program funds, each college develop, adopt and post a goals framework that addresses at a minimum: student performance and outcomes, accreditation status, fiscal viability, and programmatic compliance with state and federal guidelines. In addition, it requires the state Chancellor to post by June 30, 2015, and before each fiscal year thereafter, the annually developed system wide goals adopted by the Board of Governors, and the locally developed and adopted college/district goals.

STATUS:

On March 17, 2015, representatives from each of the colleges and the district office attended a regional institutional effectiveness workshop held at American River College to learn how to implement the new framework. Due to the short timeline to discuss and select the 2015-16 goals, the colleges and the district decided to limit their goals to those required for the first year of the initiative: course completion rate and accreditation status by college; and ending fund balance and overall audit opinion by the district. Adoption of additional goals will be considered for 2016-17. The proposed 2015-16 college and district institutional effectiveness goals are provided in the attachment, as are the current list of optional goals that are likely to be required in future years.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the institutional effectiveness goals for American River College, Cosumnes River College, Folsom Lake College, Sacramento City College, and the Los Rios Community College District for submission to the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office by the June 15, 2015 submission deadline.

BACKGROUND:

The State of California is statutorily required to enact a State Budget by June 30th. Similarly, the Board of Trustees is required by law to adopt a tentative budget for the upcoming fiscal year no later than July 1st for all district funds. This requirement is in place regardless of whether the State budget has been finalized. For 2015-16, the Governor has issued the May Revise budget proposal and the normal process of review and amendment by the legislature is occurring. Given the timing for preparation of the budget prior to a formal budget proposal from the legislature, the May Revise is the basis for the tentative budget.

The May Revise proposal for California Community Colleges (CCC) retained the basic structure of the Governor's January proposal. As anticipated, significant augmentations were made to the January proposal as a result of the strong revenue growth reported in recent months. The Governor continues to be conservative in the allocation of those revenues by recommending some appropriations as one-time rather than on-going. This approach lessens the reliance of the State on revenues dependent on the incomes of a relatively small number of Californians.

The major augmentations include Growth (Access) increased from 2% to 3%. The Revise proposal reduced the COLA by \$31.3M, in line with the statutory requirement which went from 1.58% in January to 1.02% in May. The proposal includes an additional \$141.7 million to increase the base funding rates bringing the total for this line item to \$266.7 million. The Governor had already proposed increasing the Student Success and Support Program (SSSP) and the Student Equity Program (SEP) by \$100 million each in his January proposal. In May, he proposed an additional \$15 million for SEP. A new line item in May was \$75 million proposed to increase the number of full-time faculty in the community college system. The proposal is structured as unrestricted funding except for a requirement to increase the number of regular faculty based upon the ratios of full-time to part-time faculty. Districts with a lower ratio of full-time faculty will be required to add more positions than those with a higher ratio. The actual structure is still under discussion at this time. Los Rios has one of the highest ratios in the State and will project the number of positions to be added once the legislation is finalized.

In the Governor's January proposal, he did not fund Scheduled Maintenance/Special Repairs (SMSR) nor State Instructional Equipment and Library Materials (SIEF&LM). Rather, he

proposed a large one-time allocation toward the payment of past claims for mandated activities with the comment that districts could use those funds for SMSR or SIEF&LM if desired. However in May, he proposed funding at the same level as 2014-15, \$148M total. In addition, he increased the one-time allocation for past mandated cost claims to \$626 million.

The May Revise reflects one of the largest increases in funding in memory. It is most welcomed but also reflective of California's budget history of boom to bust. The one time funds are an opportunity to shore up infrastructure and reserves to prepare for the next potential downturn.

The budget proposal will help with addressing the increased pension costs, especially for both the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS) and the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS). The challenge is trying to designate funding for those increases while also improving salaries for employees. Another challenge is achieving our growth goal. To qualify for available growth funding in 2014-15, the District will need to shift some attendance from summer 2015 to the 2014-15 year. This is because the District's enrollment in 2014-15 was essentially flat. The District is closely monitoring enrollment and may add more sections if demand is present. Because the summer term had been dramatically reduced during the downturn, there is good potential for growth in that term. Summer 2014 increased almost 10% and summer 2015 is on track to grow by 15%. Total additional faculty for the instructional program is 38. The District is also hoping to grow its apprenticeship programs to capture some of the proposed increase for apprenticeships. The budget retains the enrollment fee at \$46 per unit. With the exception of Student Success and the Student Equity program, categorical programs are funded at essentially the same level as 2014-15, although the major programs will receive the 1.02% COLA.

Although it appears that the enacted budget will likely be very close to the May Revise, any changes will be incorporated into the Adopted Budget in September.

STATUS:

The budget scenarios for the General Fund are titled the X, Y, and Z budgets. The X budget is the worst case revenue scenario, predicated on receipt of COLA, a basic allocation increase for the Elk Grove Center, and the increase in the base allocation as well as one time funds, including the allocations both current year and past claims for mandated costs. The Y and Z budgets both include additional lottery and growth. The Y Budget reflects growth funding at 2%. The Z budget is the most optimistic with another 1% in growth, which could be in play if other districts do not achieve their growth cap.

The 2015-16 budget is balanced. There is no draw on reserves projected at this time and there is no reliance on one-time funds to support on-going costs. The budget includes an appropriation for the STRS increase. The variations in the X, Y and Z budgets are captured in the appropriation area entitled Program and Salary Improvement and the three budgets are summarized on the attached General Fund schedule. The District will start the year operating at the X budget level.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt the 2015-16 tentative budgets for the General Fund (Z budget), Instructionally-Related Sub-Fund, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, Debt Service, Enterprise, Internal Service, Fiduciary, Trust and Auxiliary Funds of the District for filing with the appropriate County/State agencies.
