6. INFORMATION

A. <u>NextEd Update</u>

To support NextEd, an affiliate organization of the Sacramento Metro Chamber, in their current leadership transition, Los Rios has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding to "loan" Cosumnes River College Dean Brian Bedford to serve as Interim CEO of NextEd. An overview of NextEd and the potential opportunity for improved alignment between K-12 school districts, Los Rios, and its four-year college and university partners and the business community, was presented by Chancellor King and Brian Bedford to the Board of Trustees for information and discussion.

B. <u>Access and Enrollment Management Update</u>

Chancellor King provided an update on the districtwide dialogue that engaged approximately 50 participants from all four colleges and the district office on August 6, 2015 to continue the process of developing strategies to fully utilize the District's capacity to serve more students. This item was presented to the Board of Trustees for information and discussion.

7. BOARD MEMBER REPORTS

Trustee Haynes recognized American River College for receiving three TRIO grants. She noted her upcoming participation in the ACCT Leadership Congress in San Diego, and encouraged her colleagues to participate as well if they can. She also invited the Trustees to join her at the Land Park amphitheater fundraiser on August 13.

In response to the enrollment management presentation, Trustee Scribner discussed the concept of students being our best ambassadors, noting she would like to challenge our community partners to do the same. She also reported her attendance at the Sacramento Shakespeare festival of "As You Like It," and wished everyone a wonderful start of the school year.

Trustee Albaini recently met with new Cosumnes River College President Edward Bush.

Trustee Weaver reported the student leaders are drafting a master list of district-specific issues to address, rather than only focusing on the individual colleges.

Chancellor's Report:

ARC: American River College has been awarded three \$1.1 million federal Department of Education grants under the TRIO program, which provides intensive support to low-income, first-generation degree/transfer-seeking college students. In 2010, ARC received its first federal TRIO grant, which created the college's Journey program that provides services and support to low-income, first-generation degree/transfer-seeking students. Last year, ARC re-applied for and was awarded another five-year, \$1.1 million grant to continue the Journey program, which ensures the continuation of the important work being done by the faculty, staff and administrators. At the same time, ARC applied for and was successful in acquiring two other TRIO grants, one focused on supporting low-income, first-generation college students who are interested in STEM fields and another focused on Veterans. With the resources from each of these \$1.1 million grants, ARC will be able to triple the number of underrepresented students who receive intensive, wraparound academic and student support essential to the timely

completion of their educational goal. If TRIO programs like Journey and now STEM and Veterans are successfully implemented, they are likely to receive continued funding in subsequent years. That means these programs add long-term capacity to key student support programs while at the same time help establish alternative funding sources for such services.

<u>CRC</u>: The Cosumnes River College women's volleyball team participated in a fundraiser last weekend. The Hawks hosted a two-day grass volleyball tournament. The doubles competition was open to all ability levels. More than 70 individuals participated. The team raised \$1,000 and will spend the money on equipment and uniforms.

<u>FLC</u>: Folsom Lake College student Chanelle Sadler is featured in the latest California Community Colleges "I Can Afford College" campaign. Chanelle overcame enormous obstacles, including homelessness while being a single mother to two young daughters, to get to where she is today. She credits much of her growth to her experience as a student at FLC. Chanelle is currently a communications major and plans to transfer to UC Davis. She also works as a student clerk in the Financial Aid Office, where she helps her fellow students get the information they need about applying for financial aid.

<u>SCC:</u> Sacramento City College Biology Professor David Wyatt was featured in a recent Sacramento Bee article about researchers turning to crowdfunding instead of applying for traditional government grants. Wyatt and his team were able to raise nearly \$8,000 from 78 backers, which funded the launch of an exotic insect exhibition to be used for academic research.

COURSE PROPOSALS

New to District Courses

Cosumnes River College

1. PACT 391 Tennis II (1.00 unit)

Prerequisite: None.

Advisory: PACT 390 with a grade of "C" or better; Tennis II students should have some playing experience and basic tennis knowledge and skills.

54.00 hours laboratory

This course reviews basic fundamentals, techniques, rules, and social courtesies of tennis. Intermediate players are encouraged to take this course.

Justification: This course levels the tennis curriculum as required by repeatability standards.

2. **PACT 393 Tennis III (1.00 unit)**

Prerequisite: None.

Advisory: PACT 391 with a grade of "C" or better; Tennis III students are recommended to have significant experience, preferably at the high school varsity level.

54.00 hours laboratory

Tennis III focuses on improving and refining the competitive physical and mental skills and techniques of the sport. Particular attention will be given to the strategic development of the overall player while refining racket strokes that set up and finish points. Hitting patterns, serving placement, and tactical movement will also be introduced and developed.

Justification: This course levels the tennis curriculum as required by repeatability standards.

BACKGROUND:

The State Legislature provided California community college districts with the authority to allow nonresident high school students to attend community colleges without paying nonresident tuition. It also mandated this rule for students who were deported with their parents and wish to return and attend a California community college. The latter class of students must have attended a California High School for three (3) years, demonstrate financial need, have a parent who was deported or was permitted to depart voluntarily, have moved abroad with their parent, and file an affidavit that they intend to establish California residency as soon as possible.

STATUS:

The proposed amendments to Board Policies 2242 and 2251 enact both of these changes and clean up language related to exemptions from resident tuition generally. The proposed policies incorporate all of the many exemptions from nonresident status by itemizing the statutes that authorize the exemptions. Existing college procedures already implement each of these statutory exemptions.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed revisions to the attached policies.

1.0 Resident Student Defined

- 1.1 A resident for community college admissions is a student who had legal residence in California for more than one (1) year immediately preceding the residence determination date or who is entitled to residency classification under the Education Code and California Code of Regulations, Title 5. All other students are nonresident students. (Ed. Code, §§ 68017, 68018, 68060-68075, 68076-68080, 68082-68085, 68100, 76140.5) Nonresident students who are both citizens and residents of a foreign country are international students.
- 1.11.2 -Students who are exempt from the Nonresident Tuition Fees—pursuant to theunder Education Code, sections 68130.5, 76140, subdivision (a)(5), 76140.5 and/or Title 5 Regulations shall be exempt from the Nonresident Tuition Fee, the Student Capital Outlay Fee, and the International Student Application Fee. - 4.21.3 The Chancellor of the Los Rios Community College District or designee is authorized to evaluate information presented by an applicant for admission and to make determination of residence. (Title 5, §§ 54000—-540723)

3.0 International Student Capital Outlay Fee

- 3.1 In addition to the tuition feeNonresident Tuition Fee established for nonresident students per Section 2.0, nonresident students who are both citizens and residents of a foreign country (International Students) who are not exempt from the payment of the Nonresident Tuition Fees and all international students shall be charged a Student Capital Outlay Fee. (Ed. Code, §§ 68130.5, 76140, subd. (a)(2), & (a)(5), (Ed. Code, '76141)
- 4.0 Establishment of Nonresident Tuition Fee and Student Capital Outlay Fee
 - 4.1 The Nonresident Tuition Fee and the International Student Capital Outlay Fee shall be established annually and no later than February 1 for the succeeding fiscal year.

5.0 Student Enrollment Fee

5.1 In accordance with State policy, student enrollment fees established shall be collected from nonresident students and international students enrolled in credit

5.2 The amount of the student enrollment fee is determined by the State of California. The District has the responsibility to collect such student enrollment fees on behalf of the State.

6.0 Deferment or Installment Payment of Fees

6.1 Payment of fees may be deferred as prescribed in Districthe- Administrative Regulations.

7.0 Refund of Fees

7.1 Refunds to students for fees including student enrollment, nNonresident tTuition Fees, and/or international sStudent eCapital eOutlay Ffees shall follow guidelines established by the District.

ASSOCIATES DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

1.0 Degree Earned

- 1.1 The degree of Associate in Arts, Associate in Arts for Transfer, Associate in Science, or Associate in Science for Transfer can be earned through any College in the Los Rios Community College District.
- 1.2 The Associate in Arts degree and the Associate in Science degree may be conferred upon students qualified to transfer to a four-year college or university as well as upon those completing their formal education in a two-year vocational program as outlined in the catalog of any of the Colleges of the District. The Associate in Arts for Transfer degree and the Associate in Science for Transfer degree were created by SB 1440 (2010) to allow students to transfer to the California State University with junior status upon the completion of prescribed requirements.
- 1.3 In accordance with law and with the rules and regulations of the California Community College Board of Governors and the Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees, the requirements for the degree Associate in Arts, Associate in Arts for Transfer, Associate in Science, or Associate in Science for Transfer are defined below.

2.0 Associate in Arts or the Associate in Science Graduation Requirements

2.1 Number of Units

- 2.1.1 Satisfactory completion of a minimum of **sixty** (60) units of collegiate work with a "C" (2.0) grade point average in a curriculum which the District accepts toward the degree, provided that **twelve** (12) units must be earned in residence at the College recommending the degree.
 - **2.1.1.1** All reference to "units" in this policy is to "semester units."
- 2.1.2 Units of credit are assigned to courses based on the "Carnegie unit," which assigns one unit of credit for three (3) hours of work by the student per week. Usually this means one (1) hour of lecture or discussion led by the instructor and two (2) hours of outside preparation by the student. In laboratory courses, three (3) hours of work in the laboratory are normally assigned one (1) unit of credit which may include some additional preparation outside of class time.

2.2 Major Field of Study

2.2.1 Satisfactory completion of a minimum of **eighteen** (18) units in a major field of study or an area of emphasis from those specified in the catalog of each College. Each College shall establish a minimum grade of "C" or the

equivalent for any class in a major field of study or a 2.0 grade point average for classes taken in the major field of study.

2.3 General Education Requirements

Each College of the District will publish in its catalog a specific philosophy of general education. The following will serve as a pattern for the Colleges in the development of their individual philosophy statements.

The primary function of education is to transmit from each generation to the next the knowledge and skills requisite to enlarge the comprehension of our place in the universe. Los Rios Colleges are committed to the principle of providing general education which includes: Natural Science, Social and Behavioral Science, Humanities and the Arts, Language and Critical Thinking, and other courses that provide for life-long learning and understanding, and that explore the significance of work, production, consumption and leisure in the lives of individuals. All of these are basic and necessary to participate in and contribute to a balanced life in a democratic society that is diverse in its social, cultural, and educational backgrounds.

A comprehensive education serves to develop the creativity, critical thinking, ethical behavior, and self-understanding which are essential to the attainment of personal goals and to participate in a society characterized by increasing global interdependence and by rapid and significant change.

Therefore, the purpose of general education is to give breadth to the college experience, enhance the ability to learn, and insure an appropriate level of competency. The general education program thus provides coherence to under-graduate education and affords students the opportunity to develop an integrated overview of the diverse fields of human knowledge.

- 2.3.2 The courses allowed by the Colleges of the District for the fulfillment of the general education requirements shall be introductory in nature and usually without course prerequisites. The content of the courses should encompass broad fields of knowledge, covering major principles and their applications to a wide field or fields. The intent should be to provide the students with an understanding and appreciation of a significant body of knowledge and give to the students a basis for evaluating the physical environment, the culture, and the society in which they live.
- 2.3.3 Students receiving an Associate Delegree must satisfactorily complete twenty-one (21) units in general education selected from the following areas as indicated:
 - 2.3.3.1 Natural Sciences (three [3] units minimum)

Courses in the natural sciences are those which examine the physical universe, its life forms and its natural phenomena. To satisfy the general education requirement in natural sciences, a course should help the student develop an appreciation and understanding of the scientific method, and encourage an understanding of the relationships between science and other human activities. This category includes introductory or integrative courses in astronomy, biology, chemistry, general physical science, geology, physical geography, physical anthropology, physics and other scientific disciplines.

2.3.3.2 Social and Behavioral Sciences (three [3] units minimum)

Courses in the social and behavioral sciences are those which focus on people as members of society. To satisfy the general education requirement in social and behavioral sciences, a course should help the student develop an awareness of the method of inquiry used by the social and behavioral sciences. It should stimulate critical thinking about the ways people act and have acted in response to their societies and should promote appreciation of how societies and social subgroups operate. This category includes introductory or integrative survey courses in anthropology, economics, history, political science, psychology, sociology and related disciplines, exclusive of those which fulfill the American Institutions requirement.

2.3.3.3 <u>American Institutions Requirement</u> (three [3] units minimum)

Courses in American Institutions are those which focus on the historical development of American institutions and ideals, the operation of representative democratic government under the Constitution of the United States, and the principles of state and local government established under the Constitution of this State. To satisfy the general education requirement in American Institutions, a course should help the student develop an appreciation and understanding of the basic institutions, ideals, knowledge, and skills necessary for intelligent and loyal citizenship. It should stimulate critical thinking, problem solving, and literacy skills in regard to American historical, political, governmental, economic, social, and intellectual issues as they relate to both domestic and foreign affairs. This category includes introductory or integrative survey courses in history and political science which qualify under the guidelines of either "a" or "b" below.

(a) Any course which addresses the historical development of American Institutions and ideals, inclusive of the following:

- 1. Significant events occurring in the entire area now included in the United States of America, including the relationships of regions within that area and with external regions and powers as appropriate to the understanding of those events within the United States during the period under study.
- 2. The role of major ethnic and social groups in such events and the contexts in which the events have occurred.
- 3. The events presented within a framework which illustrates the continuity of the American experience and its derivation from other cultures including consideration of three or more of the following: politics, economics, social movements, and geography.
- (b) Any course which addresses the U.S. Constitution, representative democratic government operation, and the process of California State and local government, inclusive of the following:
 - 1. The political philosophies of the framers of the Constitution and the nature and operation of United States political institutions and processes under that Constitution as amended and interpreted.
 - 2. The rights and obligations of citizens in the political system established under the Constitution.
 - 3. The Constitution of the State of California within the framework of evolution of Federal-State relations and the nature and processes of State and local government under that Constitution.
 - 4. Contemporary relationships of State and local government with the Federal government, the resolution of conflicts and the establishment of cooperative processes under the constitutions of both the State and nation, and the political processes involved.

2.3.3.4 <u>Humanities</u> (three [3] units minimum)

Courses in the humanities are those which study the cultural activities and artistic expressions of human beings. To satisfy the general education requirement in the humanities, a course should help the student develop an awareness of the ways in which people

throughout the ages and in different cultures have responded to themselves and the world around them in artistic and cultural creation and help the student develop an aesthetic understanding and an ability to make value judgments. This category includes introductory or integrative courses in the arts, foreign languages, literature, philosophy, religion, and related disciplines.

2.3.3.5 Languages and Rationality (six [6] units: three [3] units each from (a) and (b))

Courses in language and rationality are those which use and examine principles and guidelines of clear and logical thinking and communication. Courses in this category should build upon rather than remediate verbal and quantitative skills.

- (a) English Composition. Courses fulfilling the written composition requirement should include both expository and argumentative writing.
- (b) Communication and Analytical Thinking. Courses fulfilling the communication and analytical thinking requirement include oral and written communication, mathematics. logic, statistics, computer language and programming, and related disciplines.

2.3.3.6 <u>Living Skills</u> (three [3] units minimum)

One physical education activity course (with ADAPT, DANCE, FITNS, PACT, SPORT, or TMACT designators) must be taken in this area and a minimum of two (2) units from the other courses included in this category. Adapted physical education courses are available for students with documented physical disabilities. These Adapted courses will fulfill the graduation requirement.

Courses in this area may be selected from a number of different disciplines that help students to acquire skills and knowledge to understand themselves as whole persons (integral to their environment). This category includes the study of courses that develop and maintain personal, social, physical and emotional well-being. It is the intent that this area include such courses as health education, human sexuality, marriage and family, nutrition, and personal adjustment.

2.3.3.6.1 Students with medical excuses may petition to be exempted from the physical activity course requirement when appropriate adapted physical education classes are not offered at the location where the student takes the majority of their course work.

Students not completing a physical activity course on the basis of this exemption shall be required to complete a minimum of three (3) units in other courses in the Living Skills area.

- 2.3.4 While a course might satisfy more than one (1) general education requirement, it may not be counted more than once for these purposes. Courses which are a part of the major requirement and meet the intent of these general education guidelines may be used to satisfy both requirements.
- Ethnic studies will be offered in at least one (1) of the required general 2.3.5 education areas (2.3.3.1--2.3.3.5).
- 2.3.6 Each College shall set up a process that will involve the review of courses submitted to meet the objectives and criteria of general education.
- 2.3.7 Students who show proof of a baccalaureate or higher degree completed at a college or university accredited through a CHEA (Council for Higher Education Accreditation) recognized Regional Accrediting Agency will have satisfied general education and competency requirements for the Associates of in Arts or the Associates of in Science degree. Degrees from accredited institutions outside of the United States will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis. All Associates Ddegrees from institutions accredited from CHEA Regional Accrediting Agencies will be evaluated on a caseby-case basis. Degrees or courses from non-accredited institutions will not be considered.

2.4 Basic Skills Competencies

- All students granted an Associate in Arts or Associate in Science degree shall have demonstrated college-level competence in reading, written expression, and mathematics.
 - 2.4.1.1 Examinations used to assess competency in any one of these areas will be uniform throughout the District and will be recommended by committees composed of members as provided in District Regulation (R-3412).
 - 2.4.1.2 The Chancellor shall adopt **Administrative** FRegulations establishing specific competency standards.

2.5 Ethnic/Multicultural Studies

One (1) three (3) -unit Ethnic/Multicultural studies course must be completed within the sixty (60) unit graduation requirement. The course may be completed as part of the twenty-one (21) unit general education pattern, as a course required by the major, or an elective course.

- 2.5.1.1 Courses in Ethnic/Multicultural studies examine significant aspects of the culture, contributions and social experiences of underrepresented ethnic/racial groups in the U.S., or the history and cultural traditions of non-western societies. Non-western courses should focus on non-Eurocentric cultures.
- 2.5.1.2 All courses should be comparative among multiple social groups and should include analysis of concepts of ethnicity, ethnocentrism and racism, and how they shape and explain ethnic experience.

3.0 Credit by Examination

- **2.63.1** Any specific course requirement may be satisfied by the procedures established for credit by examination.
- 3.04.0 <u>Associate in Arts for Transfer & Associate in Science for Transfer Graduation Requirements (SB 1440):</u>
 - 3.14.1 For curricula approved pursuant to SB 1440 (2010) by the Board of Trustees (approved curriculum), the graduation requirements for the Associate in Arts for Transfer and Associate in Science for Transfer degrees shall consist entirely of the following requirements which also satisfy all basic skills competency requirements:
 - 3.1.14.1.1 Successful completion of **sixty** (60) semester units eligible for transfer to the California State University, which shall include satisfaction of the following two (2) requirements:
 - 3.1.1.14.1.1.1 Completion of one (1) or the following General Education Patterns:
 - 3.1.1.1.14.1.1.1 The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC): or
 - 3.1.1.1.24.1.1.2 The California State University General Education-Breadth Requirements.
 - 3.1.1.24.1.1.2 Completion of at least **eighteen** (18) semester units in a major or area of emphasis identified in the approved curriculum
 - 3.1.24.1.2 A minimum grade point average of 2.0.

5.0 Courses Specified

3.25.1 Each College within the Los Rios District shall specify in its eCollege catalog the courses that may be taken by a student in each of the required areas listed above. Requirements satisfied at one eCollege will be accepted by any other eCollege within the District.

BACKGROUND:

Sacramento-Valley Partnership, d/b/a Verizon Wireless (Verizon) is a private corporation engaged as a telephone utility. Since 1991, Verizon has had a lease to maintain and use a tower on the CRC Campus with access to the tower. Verizon has requested an extension of that lease.

STATUS:

Under Education Code, section 81311, the Board or Trustees may grant an easement to a private corporation engaged in a public utility business upon such terms and conditions as the parties may agree. Verizon's cellular telephone service qualifies as a public utility. An easement is an interest in real property (the right to use it for a particular purpose) that is broader than a leasehold interest (the right to possess property for a period of time). As a result, under this Education Code section, it is permissible for the Board to extend this lease.

To do so, the Education Code requires the Board of Trustees to first adopt a resolution declaring its intent to extend the lease by a vote of at least 2/3 of its members. That resolution must describe the property to be conveyed, specify the purpose for which and the terms upon which the property will be conveyed, and shall establish a date and time for a subsequent public hearing to consider extending that lease. At the subsequent meeting, a public hearing shall be conducted and the Board may adopt a resolution extending the lease, unless 10% or more of the qualified electors of the District sign a petition protesting the conveyance. Under the Education Code, a majority of the Board of Trustees members must sign the initial resolution, which must be posted and published in accordance with the Education Code.

Verizon seeks to extend the lease for a five-year term with four five-year extensions with a yearly rental rate of \$24,203.52 which will be adjusted on August 1, 2016 by 2.5%.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution No. 2015-16 declaring its intent to extend the lease, and set the October 15, 2015 Board meeting as the date and time at which it will hold a public hearing on this conveyance.

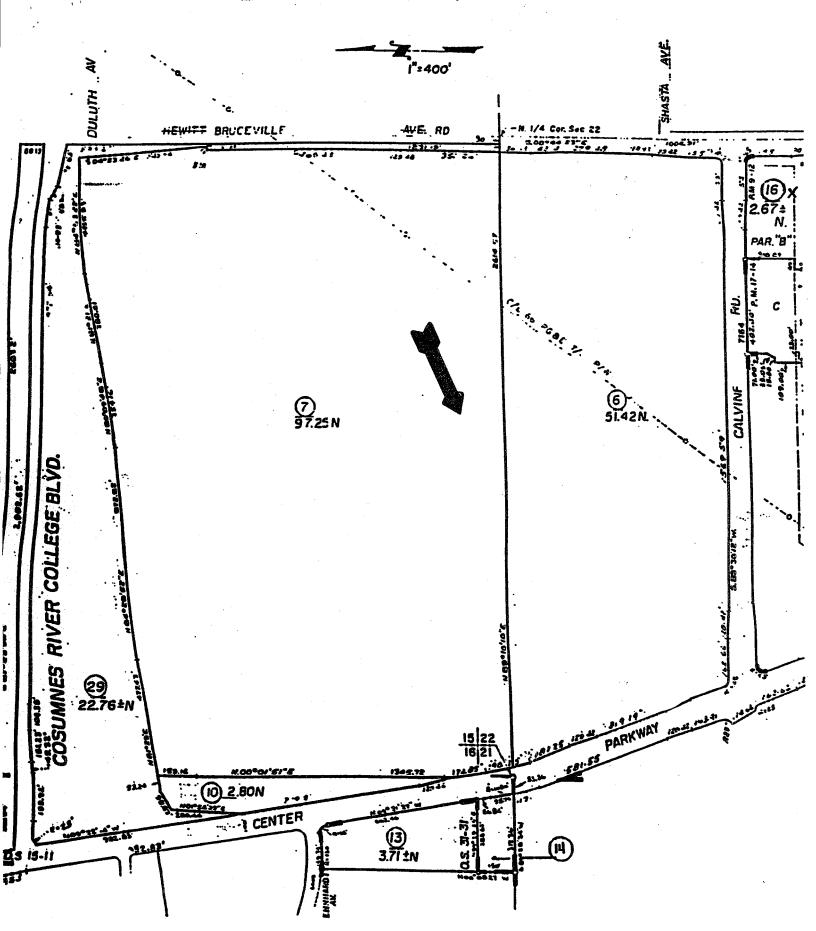

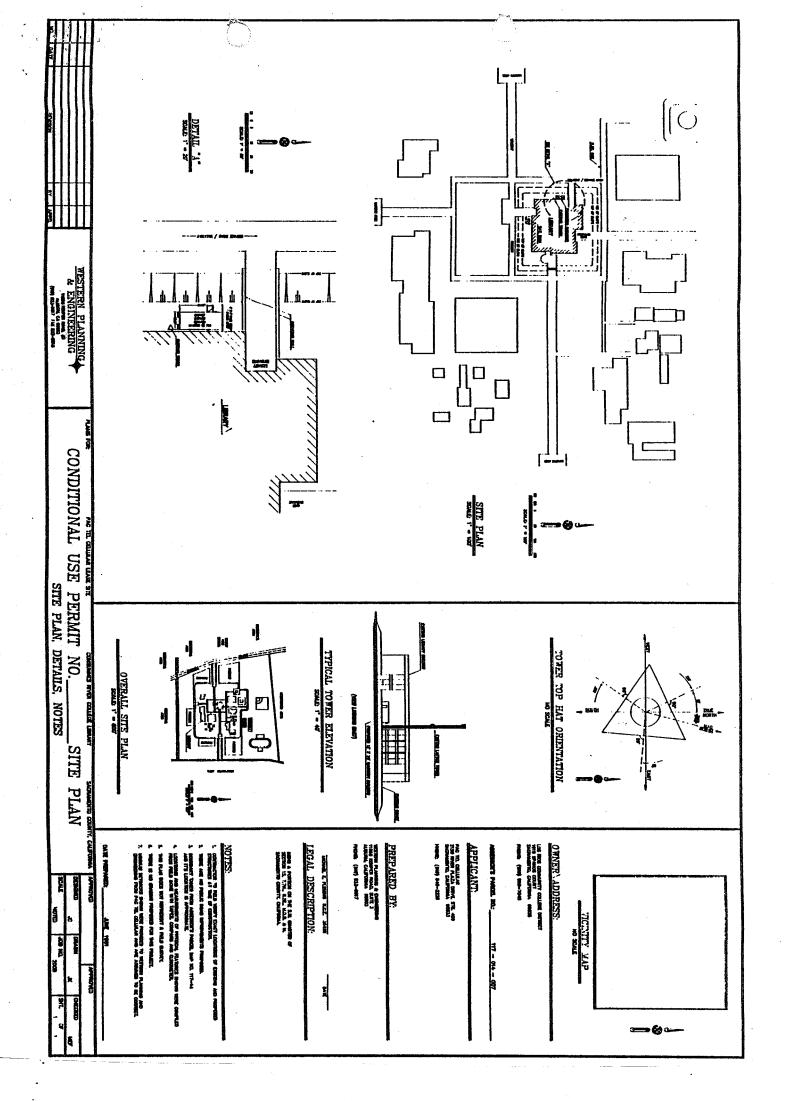

- From the date it receives the property and throughout the time period(s) imposed by Sections B and C (as applicable) remain in effect, the Donee shall not sell, trade, lease, lend, bail, cannibalize, encumber, or otherwise dispose of such property, or remove it permanently, for use outside the State of California, without the prior approval of GSA or the CSASP. The proceeds from any sale, trade, lease, loan, bailment, encumbrance or other disposal of the property, when the GSA or the CSASP authorizes such action, shall be remitted promptly by the Donee to GSA or the CSASP, as applicable. If the Donee takes action in ignoring or disregarding the foregoing restrictions after the date the Donee received the property and before expiration of the time periods imposed by Sections C or D as applicable, at the option of the GSA or the CSASP, the Donee shall pay to the GSA or the CSASP any proceeds derived from the disposal, and/or the fair market or rental value of the property at the time of such unauthorized disposal as determined by the GSA or the CSASP as applicable.
- 2) If at any time, from the date the Donee receives the property throughout the time periods by Sections B and C as applicable, the Donee determines that some or all of the property is no longer suitable, usable, or further needed for the purpose(s) for which it was acquired, the Donee shall promptly notify the CSASP and shall, as directed by the CSASP, return the property to the CSASP, or release the property to another Donee or another state agency, or a department or agency of the United States, or sell or otherwise dispose of the property. The Donee shall remit the proceeds from the sale promptly to the CSASP.
- 3) The Donee shall make reports to the CSASP which shall state the use, condition, and location of the property, and shall report on other pertinent matters as may be required from time to time by the CSASP.
- 4) At the option of the CSASP, the Donee may abrogate the conditions set forth in Section B and the terms, reservations and restrictions pertaining in Section D by payment of an amount as determined by the CSASP.

E) The donee Agrees to the Following Conditions, Applicable to all Items of Property:

- 1) The property acquired by the Donee is on an "As Is," "where is" basis, without warranty of any kind.
- 2) If the Donee carries insurance against damages to or loss of property due because of fire or other hazards, and the damage to, loss or destruction to donated property with unexpired terms, conditions, reservations or restrictions, occurs, the CSASP will be entitled to reimbursement from the Donee out of the insurance proceeds, in an amount equal to the unamortized portion of the fair value of the damaged or destroyed donated property.
- F) Terms, conditions, reservations and restrictions set forth in the Conditional Transfer Document executed by the authorized Donee representative are applicable to the donation of Aircraft and Vessels of 50 Feet or more in length having an acquisition cost of \$5,000 or more in length or more, regardless of the purpose for which acquired.

I was on the Natomas ARC campus on April 16th to attend the Sactomofo event in the parking lot. We were at the event for less than an hour. Unfortunately, during that time someone broke into my car and stole my husband's gym bag which had his wedding band (\$600), running shoes (\$140) and his workout clothes inside ofit. They also stole my necklace (valued at \$1,600) from my vehicle. The total damage of the vehicle was \$1861.My car was in the shop for 26 days due to the incident. I am not only upset that they violated and invaded my personal space but that the police officer at that location caught it all on tape. What is upsetting about this situation is that he could have prevented it if he was doing his job but he was nowhere to be found when the incident occurred. The couple that was parked next to us noticed the broken glass and when to look for the police officer. They stated it took them some time to find him. When we arrived at the vehicle we were told by the officer to not touch the vehicle because it was a crime scene and that he was waiting for the police to arrive from the main campus. I was shocked to hear this because by the time the police officer had arrived the crime offenders were nowhere to be found. They took an extensive report from us and I was hoping that they would find the crime offenders and find our personal and valuable belongings. The officer clearly caught the crime offenders on tape and watched them do the crime. The officer had informed me that I can request for reimbursement of the damages that took place. I believe Los Rios District needs to do a better job with screening and hiring highly trained and qualified officers. Clearly the officer was not doing his job. This situation has caused a lot of heartache and I truly believe it could have been avoided if the officer would have been doing his job accurately and thoroughly. For the record the suspects were identified on tape and below it states that the suspects were not identified.

BACKGROUND:

As specified in Board Policy P-8252, within three months of the close of each fiscal year, an annual investment report of all District directed investments shall be presented to the Board of Trustees.

The purpose of the investment report is to inform the Board regarding District directed investments, consisting primarily of assets of the Retiree Health Benefits Trust, Bookstore, and certain fiduciary funds. The majority of the District's monetary assets — cash, cash equivalents, and investments — are required to be held in appropriate Sacramento County Treasury accounts and investments of such assets are directed by the County. For comparative purposes and a complete overview of investment and interest income earned by the District in 2014-15, the attached annual investment report shows both District and County directed monetary assets and their earnings.

STATUS:

District directed assets were invested in compliance with Board Policy P-8252. Detail regarding those investments for the year ended June 30, 2015 follows.

Other Debt Service Fund (ODSFD):

Most ODSFD monies are required to be deposited in the County Treasury. However, Certificate of Participation's (COP's) regulations require that a reserve account be maintained in an amount equal to or greater than the debt service cost of principal and interest payments in the final year of the notes. To meet this requirement, approximately \$490,000 (market value of \$564,000) is invested in Federal Farm Credit Bank (FFCB) bonds held in custody by The Bank of New York Mellon Trust Company, N.A., San Francisco, under District direction and Sacramento County Treasury's approval. The COP's were issued in June 2006 to help finance the construction of the Sacramento City College's parking garage.

Retiree Health Benefits Trust (Trust):

On November 7, 2007 the Board established this irrevocable trust in response to accounting requirements of Governmental Accounting Standards Board, specifically GASB 43 and 45. Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. was appointed trustee and investment manager of the Trust. As the sponsor and sole contributor of monies to the Trust, the District has primary responsibility for the management of the Trust for the benefit of its current and future retirees. Under review by the Oversight Committee, established by the Board, and within investment guidelines and restrictions of Board Policy P-8252, the Wells Fargo Bank investment manager has invested Trust monies in various mutual and index funds. As of June 30, 2015, approximately 64.8% of the \$104.0 million portfolio was invested in bond funds, 34.4% in equity funds, and .80% in a money market account.

Due to the continued improvement in the stock market and the consistency of the bond market during the past fiscal year, the Trust had a net gain of nearly \$3.1 million or approximately a 2.6% gain in asset value. The District goal for average return is currently 5%; the return since inception of the trust is 5.10%. An actuarial study is required every two years which allows for current economic conditions to be factored into the goal for annual returns.

Annual Investment Report:

The first page of the attached report summarizes both District and County directed investment balances as of June 30, 2015 and the related earnings during fiscal year 2014-15. Only \$7.3 million of the total District funds (excluding Retiree Health) of nearly \$260.1 million is directed by the District. District funds have earned a weighted average annual percentage rate (APR) of 0.57%. Most of the District directed assets are invested in the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF).

The second page provides more detailed information about District directed investments. The Retiree Health Benefits Trust assets have been professionally managed by Wells Fargo Bank since inception. The investment advisor meets regularly with the Retiree Health Benefits Trust Oversight Committee.

The third page of the report shows similar information regarding County and Escrow directed investments. Except for the Bond Projects and Bond Redemption Funds, County directed assets are invested in the County's pooled account, which earned 0.24% in 2014-15. Proceeds from the District's sale of GO Bonds are separately invested by the County in commercial paper, government agency notes and other authorized investment instruments. Earnings on these separately invested GO Bond monies ranged from 0.06% - 0.18% in fiscal year 2014-15. Investment earnings for the Bonds Projects or Bond Redemption funds may only be expended for bond project costs or bond debt service, respectively.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees accept the District's Annual Investment Report for fiscal year 2014-15.

BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to Education Code section 81655, and Board Policy 8315, all agreements to which the District is party must be approved by or ratified by the Board of Trustees. STATUS:

Staff seeks the Board's approval/ratification of the following agreements.

- The Memorandum of Understanding Agreement between ARC/SCC, Sierra Community College, and California State University Sacramento (CSUS) regarding the Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) to Bachelor in Science Degree in Nursing (BSN) program. The program will be offered as a cohort based learning environment and offered as a selfsupport program through CSUS's College of Continuing Education – Special Sessions (CCE).
- The customer participation confidentiality agreement listed with Oracle America
 effective August 7, 2015 through August 7, 2018. The agreement incorporates the terms
 of customer participation and confidentiality in activities to provide input and
 suggestions for Oracle products and/or services for the agreed upon disclosure period
 and term.
- 3. The District and Regional Transit (RT) letter agreement to authorize a monthly parking permit for the CRC parking areas for RT patrons. RT and Los Rios have entered into a five (5) year agreement where RT agreed it will pay Los Rios fifteen dollars per month per pass for the first year (\$15/month/pass). For the remaining four (4) years, RT will pay Los Rios twenty dollars per month per pass (\$20/month/pass). The number of passes will be estimated based on counts conducted twice each month.

- 4. The Product Assurances Agreement with Pearson Education effective June 1, 2015. The agreement provides for distribution, hosting and support for applications such as Pearson's MyLab and Mastering online course applications made available through Desire2Learn to the Los Rios Community College's faculty and students.
- 5. The attached list of Allied Health Agreements for clinical placements and Internships for Los Rios students. While the District is obligated under these agreements to cooperate and provide educational services pursuant to these agreements, none of them require payment or receipt of funds.

BACKGROUND:

The Education Code regulates the procedures by which a community college district can dispose of real and personal property. Education Code section 81452 provides that the Board of Trustees may, by unanimous vote, dispose of items valued at \$5,000 or less by private sale without advertising or selling the items at public auction. The District has previously held an auction, at least annually, and past auctions have generally cost more than they have netted for the District. In 1998, the District began transferring such surplus items to the State of California since the cost to store and sell such surplus items is greater than potential revenues.

STATUS:

The District has a quantity of surplus material, such as outdated furniture and computers, which needs to be disposed of. The State of California has accepted some of the surplus items but is not willing to take the entire surplus because they are unable to sell it. The District has located a scrap dealer who is willing to take most of its surplus items and recycle them.

The surplus items to be disposed of are either irreparable, obsolete, in poor condition, or not needed for district/college operations and include the following: 1 balance; 1 bindery machine; 6 biology models; 1 braille writer; 1 bulletin board; 4 cabinets; 3 capacitors; 9 carts; 40 chairs 204 computers; 6 desks; 2 fax machines; 1 hotplate; 1 induction coil; 8 laptops; 1 microwave; 2 mixers; 150 monitors; 1 oven range; 251 phones; 1 podium; 16 printers; 23 projectors; 9 projection screens; 1 refrigerator; 2 servers; 1 sphygmomanometer; 4 stands; 10 stirrers; 3 suitcases; 2 switches; 5 tables; 6 televisions; 1 transformer; 4 treadmills 4 typewriters; 1 video camera; 3 video recorders; 2 view screens; 1 wall rack; 1 wave tank; and 1 whiteboard. These items have a value of less than \$5,000.

BACKGROUND:

Staff has negotiated a tentative agreement with Sacramento Regional Transit (RT) over the terms that will extend the Universal Transit Pass (UTP) program for Los Rios students for five more years. The Los Rios students will vote on whether they seek to extend this program and assess for themselves this benefit at a special election on September 23-24, 2015. Upon the students' approval, Staff will bring the agreement forward to the Board of Trustees for its ultimate approval.

While the program has been successful since its inception in 2004, RT has historically been concerned about the low level of the UTP fee and also with the potential for students to enroll in a single class and then drop a single class to get this pass. As a result, under the new agreement, the pass will only be available to students taking more than three units at any single College. Those taking less than three units will not pay the UTP fee. The fee in the tentative agreement is based on the number of units a student takes and is proposed at \$2.10 per unit to a maximum fee of \$31.50 (for 15 units) per semester. The rate will be adjusted for inflation over time. The agreement also provides that if the legislature increases the maximum fee for parking and transit passes that the rate could be adjusted upwards as well. The agreement provides for a summer pass for a flat rate of \$10 per student and provides for a 50% discount on the regular pass rate (50% of \$100/month) for students who are taking less than three units.

This proposed agreement continues the outstanding program that places an RT pass worth \$500 in every student's hands each semester and assists students in overcoming the third highest obstacle to college access behind tuition and books. RT's board approved the tentative agreement at RT's July meeting subject to the students' vote. The Los Rios Board of Trustees will be asked for its approval after the student vote.

STATUS:

Education Code section 76361 provides that the Board of Trustees may require all students to pay a fee for transportation services if the majority of the students approve that fee in a student election. Where the fee only applies to students that take more than a minimum number of units, the Education Code further requires the Board of Trustees to determine the specified number of units for which all students taking that number of units (or more) must pay

the fee. Upon the Board of Trustees' determination, only those students who are taking that number of units or more are allowed to vote in the election to approve the fee.

Based on the tentative agreement, only students taking more than three units in a semester are required to pay the fee and thus would have the right to vote on the proposed contract. Students taking less than three units would not pay the fee and will not be able to vote on this proposition in the special election. This number is based on the number of units at each College (i.e. if a student does not take more than three units at any one College, they are not eligible for the pass and cannot be assessed the fee).

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees set the number of units a student must take per semester to qualify for and pay for the UTP pass as those students enrolled in more than three units at any single Los Rios College during the semester.

BACKGROUND:

Assembly Bill 86 (AB 86), passed in July 2013, provided \$25 million in grant funding to the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges and the State Department of Education for regions to rethink and redesign their educational systems to better serve California adult education students. In the Sacramento region, the Capital Adult Education Regional Consortium (CAERC) was formed to include the 4 Los Rios colleges, 11 school districts, 2 county offices of education, and 22 partners. CAERC's AB 86 Comprehensive Regional Plan was completed in spring 2015 and approved by the California Community College Chancellor's Office.

The 2015-16 state budget includes \$500 million in new funding for adult education, allocated from Proposition 98 General Fund revenue. Assembly Bill 104 (AB 104) outlines requirements for distribution of the Adult Education Block Grant Funds. For this fiscal year, approximately \$337 million will be distributed to school districts and county offices of education based on maintenance of effort (MOE) from their 2012-13 funded programs and services, and the remaining amount will be distributed to consortia. CAERC member school districts and county offices of education received \$5,024,847 MOE funds. In order for CAERC to qualify to receive the remaining consortium allocation of \$5,496,881 "beyond MOE funds," each member institution must have its governing board appoint a single representative to CAERC and has the option to appoint alternate representatives for instances when the primary representative is unable to attend official CAERC meetings. Board approval of the primary and alternate representatives and CAERC approval of a Governance Plan must be completed no later than October 31, 2015.

STATUS:

During CAERC's planning grant phase, Vice Chancellor Sue Lorimer served as CAERC Co-Chair and each Los Rios college had a designated CAERC representative. Although AB 104 limits each community college district to a single member representative and optional alternates, CAERC's Governance Plan proposes a voting structure in which each member school district and county office of education will have a single vote and Los Rios will have four votes (one for each college). College representatives may still attend CAERC meetings and are committed to doing so.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the appointments of Vice Chancellor Sue Lorimer as the Los Rios member representative and Associate Vice Chancellor of Instruction Jamey Nye and Associate Vice Chancellor of Finance Rose Ramos as alternate representatives to the Capital Adult Education Regional Consortium.

BACKGROUND:

At its June 10, 2015 meeting, the Board of Trustees approved budget revision #2 to the District's 2014-15 budget. Subsequent to that, the Chancellors' Office of California Community Colleges issued the second principal apportionment (P2) with revenue that exceeded the level of the revised budget. In addition, there were minor increases in other areas of the general fund, including restricted revenues. For the Capital Projects fund, the District received authorization to increase State funding for Phase II of the Davis Center.

Pursuant to the provisions and restriction of Title 5 California Code of Regulations, section 58307, the Board of Trustees may authorize, by means of Resolution, budgetary transfers to align the District budget to facilitate the closing of the District's financial records at the fiscal year end.

Additionally with the second principal apportionment, the District was notified that the amount of Education Protection Account (EPA) funds for 2014-15 was higher than the advance apportionment amount that was used as the basis for the 2014-15 adopted budget item for EPA funds.

STATUS:

The District received notice of an additional \$1,338,949 in revenues for the General fund following budget revision #2. Schedules I and II detail the sources and uses of those funds. The Capital Outlay Projects Fund (schedule III) reflects the increased authorization from the State for the Davis Center as well as additional inter fund transfers, primarily from the General fund as a result of some of the increased revenues for that fund.

The Chancellor's Office of the California Community Colleges (CCCCO) distributes EPA funds to districts based upon their proportionate share of total computational revenue. This basis results in a more equitable distribution of EPA rather than distributing on the relative share of general apportionment. For 2014-15, EPA funds accounted for 16.5% of the total State-wide revenue. As of June 2015, Los Rios' share was \$47,868,841, up from the \$40,638,016 estimated by the Chancellor's Office at the Advance apportionment in August, 2014. Districts have sole authority to determine how the moneys received from the EPA are spent, provided that the governing board makes these spending determinations in open session of a public meeting of the

governing board and with the limitation that EPA funds cannot be used to pay administrative salaries and benefits and other administrative costs. Each entity receiving funds must annually publish on its internet web site an accounting of how much money was received from the EPA and how that money was spent. Additionally, the annual independent financial and compliance audit required of community colleges shall ascertain and verify whether the funds provided from the EPA have been properly disbursed and expended as required by law. Consistent with the recommendation adopted by the Board last September, staff recommends that the additional EPA funds be designated to support compensation costs for classroom instruction services for both faculty and classified staff.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution No. 2015-19 authorizing the increase in General Fund revenues and appropriations of \$1,338,949 and the increase in Capital Outlay Projects Fund revenues and appropriations of \$2,761,891.

Additionally, it is recommended that the Board of Trustees ratify the use of the additional \$7,230,825 in EPA funds for 2014-15 for compensation cost for classroom instruction services for both faculty and classified staff.

BACKGROUND:

Earlier this year, President Obama announced an initiative to make two years of community college free to all students who are working toward a certificate or associate's degree. The Obama Administration's effort followed the actions of California's political and higher education leaders, who have worked diligently for years to keep down the cost of a community college education. Indeed, California's master plan has always envisioned free higher education, even as the state has struggled with the volatility of state funding. Today, more than 60 percent of California students qualify for a waiver for all fees, but thousands of students still cannot afford a community college education due to the high cost of living, textbooks and transportation. In addition, they live complicated lives as they juggle full- and part-time jobs, caring for their children, their spouses and, in some cases, their parents and in-laws.

STATUS:

On Wednesday, September 9, 2015, President Obama is expected to launch the College Promise Campaign, renewing his effort to secure free community college for all Americans. The focus of the campaign is not to simply enroll more students, but to graduate more students and help them succeed inside and out of the classroom. The proposal calls for using community resources and energy to engage and embrace proven methods to achieve student success, including K-12-to-college partnerships and pathways efforts, dual enrollment programs for high school students, coaching and mentoring programs. The goal is to rally Californians to support free community college tuition and fees and other like-minded efforts to help all students willing to work for an associate's degree or certificate.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution No. 2015-20, declaring its support for President Obama's College Promise Campaign and any and all efforts to keep community college affordable and debt-free for all students.

BACKGROUND:

Proposition 30, The Schools and Local Public Safety Protection Act of 2012, passed in November 2012. This proposition temporarily raises the State sales and use tax by .25 cents for four years and raises the income tax rate for high income earners (\$250,000 for individuals and \$500,000 for couples) for seven years to provide continuing funding for local school districts and community colleges. The Education Protection Account (EPA) was created in the State's General Fund to receive and disburse these temporary tax revenues. Funds from the EPA are not new or increased resources for districts. Rather EPA replaces base State General apportionment. In essence, the three revenue sources traditionally supporting California Community Colleges: general apportionment, local property taxes, and student enrollment fees, now include a fourth source, EPA. EPA funds are paid quarterly.

Districts have sole authority to determine how the moneys received from the EPA are spent, provided that the governing board makes these spending determinations in open session of a public meeting of the governing board and with the limitation that EPA funds cannot be used to pay administrative salaries and benefits and other administrative costs. Each entity receiving funds must annually publish on its internet web site an accounting of how much money was received from the EPA and how that money was spent. Additionally, the annual independent financial and compliance audit required of community colleges shall ascertain and verify whether the funds provided from the EPA have been properly disbursed and expended as required by law. Expenses incurred to comply with these additional audit requirements may be paid from the EPA.

STATUS:

The Chancellor's Office of the California Community Colleges (CCCCO) distributes EPA funds to districts based upon their proportionate share of total computational revenue. This basis results in a more equitable distribution of EPA rather than distributing on the relative share of general apportionment.

For 2015-16, the estimated amount of EPA funds the District is scheduled to receive is \$43,957,318. As was the case for 2014-15, the amount may change as the year progresses and entitlements modified. The Board must adopt its plan for the use of the funds as described in

the background section relying on the best information available. Consistent with the message to voters that Proposition 30 would allow districts to maintain their instructional programs and the requirement that EPA not be used for administrative costs; staff recommends that EPA funds be designated as supporting compensation costs for classroom instruction services for both faculty and classified staff. Over the course of the year classroom instructional salaries and benefits up to the actual amount received for EPA will be transferred to separate accounts within the unrestricted general fund to identify those costs as funded by EPA.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt for the 2015-16 fiscal year the plan to designate compensation costs for classroom instruction as funded by EPA. Upon approval, the District will update its website to reflect the Board's action.

BACKGROUND:

The tentative budget for the General Fund for 2015-16, adopted by the Board of Trustees in June, has been revised. The revised budget reflects the enacted State budget for 2015-16 which was signed by the Governor on June 24. The Board is required to hold a public hearing on the proposed budget for the fiscal year on or before the 15th day of September. Subsequent budget revisions will be brought to the Board as needed, but are typically presented at least twice during the year.

The Governor's May Revise proposal for California Community Colleges was the basis for the tentative budget. The enacted budget is very similar to the May Revise with Growth (Access) funding at 3% and the cost of living adjustment (COLA) at 1.02%. The full-time faculty allocation was reduced from \$75 million to \$62.3 million. The primary changes in categorical line items included Student Equity funding at \$85 million rather than \$115 million and Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS) received a \$33.7 million augmentation.

In addition to the Mandated Programs Block Grant funding which is for budget year costs, the enacted budget includes a one-time allocation of \$604 million toward reducing the State's liabilities for prior year mandated cost claims. This funding will be allocated on an FTES basis rather than based on actual claims. The District is projected to receive \$28.9 million from this allocation.

Even with the 2015-16 appropriation for access, the system is still funded below the 2008-09 service level. Access in 2015-16 is allocated on the basis of the new formula for the distribution of growth funding to districts that uses factors such as adult population without a college degree and unemployment rates. The intent is to align community college funding with each community's need for access to community colleges.

Excluding growth funds which must be earned, the District anticipates approximately \$53.9 million more in funding for 2015-16 compared to 2014-15. Of that, \$27.2M is continuing and \$26.7 million is one-time funding. Under the three revenue scenarios, the Z budget revenue level can be achieved if the District can grow sufficiently to earn its cap at 2.29%. The Y budget

scenario still reflects growth funding at 2%. All three scenarios include a projected deficit for 2015-16. The system still has a structural deficit primarily attributable to stability restoration from prior years. All three scenarios are updated to reflect amounts recognized for the 2014-15 fiscal year. As it was in the tentative budget, the general fund budget is balanced without reliance on reserves from the Capital Projects fund. The District is operating at the X budget level although some funds have been allocated for additional sections. The X budget is the District's base funding for the year in addition to COLA, the base augmentation and other revenues which do not need to be earned. Should the District not achieve its growth goals during 2015-16, the X budget is the level of funding that the State would maintain the District at for one year should it report a decline in enrollment. One note is that the X budget base funding reflects the 2014-15 funded level at the 2nd principal apportionment. The final calculation for 2014-15 will not be released until late January 2016.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees conduct a public hearing to receive comments on the proposed budgets and adopt the 2015-16 proposed budgets for the General Fund (Z budget), Instructionally-Related, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, Debt Service, Enterprise, Internal Service, Fiduciary, Trust and Auxiliary Funds of the District for filing with the appropriate County/State agencies.

BACKGROUND:

Since its initial accreditation in January 2004, Folsom Lake College (FLC) has offered Distance Education (DE) courses in a variety of modalities to best meet student needs, including courses that combine on-campus and online time ("hybrid" courses), fully online courses and instructional-TV (iTV). As of fall 2014, the college's curriculum committee had increased the number of courses approved for distance delivery modes to 236, in response to enrollment growth, limited space, and student interest. The additional courses approved resulted in a 27.9% increase in DE enrollment from spring 2013 to fall 2014 and 14 programs exceeding the ACCIC 50% threshold.

This growth is in keeping with nationwide trends in online course offerings and has been supported and managed by FLC to adhere with ACCJC Standard II.B.1 that states: "The institution assures the quality of student support services and demonstrates that these services, regardless of location or means of delivery, support student learning and enhance achievement of the mission of the institution."

STATUS:

The Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges requires that a Substantive Change Proposal be submitted when 50% or more courses required for a degree or certificate are offered online. A recent audit of FLC courses indicates that 14 additional programs have reached the 50% threshold since the last submission in 2013. FLC is submitting a proposal for the additional courses.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the submission of the proposal to the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges. The Commission will act upon the attached Substantive Change Proposal at their November 4, 2015 meeting.

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED CHANGE

Description of the Change

Folsom Lake College (FLC) is one of four colleges in the Los Rios Community College District (LRCCD). The college has a main campus in Folsom (FLC-Main), an educational center in Placerville (EI Dorado Center), and an outreach center in Rancho Cordova (Rancho Cordova Center). In fall 2014, the college had 7,855 students enrolled.

Folsom Lake College (FLC) offers courses in a variety of modalities to best meet student needs, including courses that combine on-campus and online time ("hybrid" courses), fully online courses and instructional-TV (iTV). As of spring 2015, the college's curriculum committee approved 239 courses to be offered in distance delivery modes. In fall 2014, 96 of those approved courses were offered via distance education. In fall 2015, 160 of those approved courses are being offered via distance education. In response to enrollment growth, limited space, and student interest, FLC has increased the number of its online course offerings. This growth is in keeping with nationwide trends in online course offerings and has been supported and managed by FLC to adhere with ACCJC Standard II.B.1 that states: "The institution assures the quality of student support services and demonstrates that these services, regardless of location or means of delivery, support student learning and enhance achievement of the mission of the institution."

The college has previously submitted three substantive change proposals for programs in which 50% or more of the coursework could be completed through online offerings. In preparation for this current substantive change report, the college reviewed all of its certificate and degree programs, including recently developed and approved Associate Degree for Transfer programs (AA-T and AS-T) that are compliant with the SB 1440 Student Transfer Achievement Reform Act. All of the college's courses and programs are catalogued in a district curriculum database. One report lists all FLC courses that have been approved for distance education, including the specific mode of delivery (Attachment 1). The database also provides a course listing report for each college certificate and degree program, with distance education courses marked (Attachment 2). Each program was reviewed using these two reports. As a result, it is apparent that additional programs are now beyond the 50% threshold outlined in the December 2014 ACCJC Substantive Change Manual, which defines a DE program as one in which DE "courses make up 50% or more of the credits required for a program".

The number of courses required for each certificate and degree was totaled. For certificate programs there were only the program courses to count, but for degree programs the count included program courses as well as general education courses and also any additional courses needed to meet the 60 unit minimum requirement for the associate degree. Following that, the number of required courses that have been approved for distance education was determined and then the percentage of distance education courses calculated.

It is important to note that many of these degrees and certificates meet the DE definition due to their GE and/or elective requirements. GE requirements account for approximately half, or in some cases, more than half of the units required for most degrees. An audit of GE offerings (Appendix A) found that students could potentially complete 90% of their FLC GE requirements using courses that have been approved for DE, if they were offered in this mode. The same audit

of the CSU GE requirements indicated students could complete 92% of their requirements (Appendix B).

FLC has reviewed all degree and certificate program requirements to establish each program's DE status based on the ACCJC definition. This Substantive Change Proposal includes the results of that review and an up-to-date listing of programs for which more than 50% of the total program units (combined core, General Education, and electives) are in courses that have been approved for DE.

FLC is requesting a substantive change to permit the offering of the distance education (DE) degrees and certificates that meet the ACCJC Distance Education Program definition, which were not included in the 2012 FLC Distance Education Substantive Change Proposal. Relationship of Change to Stated Mission

Distance education (DE) courses within the proposed programs include general education, transfer, and career technical education courses. The development of DE courses and programs aligns with the FLC mission because the DE modality increases educational opportunities for students, and enhances our ability to meet the needs of the communities we serve.

Folsom Lake College Mission Statement:

Folsom Lake College provides:

Programs

Rigorous academic programs for completion and transfer; training to enhance employment and career skills; preparatory programs for student success; and opportunities for lifelong learning and enrichment.

Support Services

Comprehensive support services to promote the success of all students

Opportunities

Opportunities for leadership; professional development; and involvement in the college and community.

Environment

A collaborative and innovative environment that promotes personal interaction as the foundation of learning; honors diversity; cultivates sustainability; and encourages civic engagement.

Rationale for Change

Folsom Lake College (FLC) is committed to increasing educational access for students in its service area, including those who may have difficulty traveling to college sites during regularly scheduled on-ground classes as well as those who may enjoy or benefit from a variety of teaching modalities. As of spring 2015, the college's curriculum committee has approved 239 courses for distance education offering, with the result that 50% or more of the courses for each of the 14 programs listed in this proposal could be offered via distance education. As instructed by the commission, the college is submitting this substantive change proposal.

PROGRAM CHANGES

Educational Purposes

The instructional departments that oversee the programs listed in this proposal have purposefully gained distance education approval for program content courses in order to provide improved access for students. Faculty in these departments have distance education training and experience as well as direct knowledge of student educational needs and are therefore able to determine the appropriateness of distance education offerings within their programs.

Such is not the case with the remaining degree programs included in this proposal, all of which have few or even no content courses approved for distance education. In these programs include GE and other elective courses, and in some instances the number of GE and elective courses outnumber the content courses. There are nine GE categories (or courses) that degree program

students must complete, and eight of those categories include courses that have been approved for distance education. In addition, since the college has 239 courses approved for distance education, all elective courses could also be taken via distance education. The *incidental* result is that at least 50% of the courses for almost all the college's degree programs can be taken via distance education, even in instances where *none* of the program major courses have been approved for distance education

Compliance with Eligibility Requirements, Accreditation Standards, and Commission Policies

The programs listed in this proposal meet, or are in compliance with, the eligibility requirements, accreditation standards, and commission policies that relate specifically to student learning programs and services.

Eligibility Requirements

- Eligibility Requirement 8, "Educational Programs:" The programs included in this proposal are congruent with the college mission in that they are intended to prepare students for transfer and completion. Additionally, the distance education offering of program courses improves access to students.
- Eligibility Requirement 10, "Student Learning and Achievement:" The programs included in this proposal assesses student achievement of those outcomes and uses the assessment results to make necessary improvements.

Accreditation Standards

- Accreditation Standard II.A.1.b, FLC uses delivery systems and modes of instruction compatible with the objectives of the curricula and appropriate to the current and future needs of its students. The FLC Technology and Distance Education Plan provides a comprehensive three-year plan. However, technology and distance education planning is not integrated with the annual College planning process.
- Accreditation Standard II.A.1.d, "The institution uses delivery modes and teaching methodologies that reflect the diverse needs and learning styles of its students:" The college has a very broad service area, ranging from eastern Sacramento to the western slope of the Sierra Nevada mountain range, with the result that some students must travel prohibitively long distances to take classes at one of the college's three sites. Other students have obligations or special needs that prevent them from attending classes on site. Offering courses via distance education addresses these diverse student needs.
- Accreditation Standard II.B.3.a, "FLC assures equitable access to all of its students by providing appropriate, comprehensive, and reliable services to students regardless of service location or delivery method. FLC provides comprehensive, quality student support services at all three of its sites. Given the small population and limited space available at RCC, an established schedule that provides on- site services two times per month should adequately support student needs. As a permanent center is constructed at RCC and more space becomes available (in late fall 2015), additional days and hours of service need to be provided to meet student needs.
- Accreditation Standard II.C.1.b, "The institution provides ongoing instruction for users of library and other learning support services so that students are able to develop skills in information competency. The institution provides students and personnel responsible for student learning programs and service adequate access to the library and other learning support services, regardless of their location or means of delivery." The college's libraries provide remote access to over 60 research databases, which include over 40,000 periodical

titles and more than 30,000 eBooks. Students, faculty and staff can access these databases from any district computer or from remote locations using their unique student, faculty or staff identification number and password. Individual database tutorials are available online 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and librarian assistance is available in-person, by phone, or via e-mail during open library hours. Additional materials and services that can be accessed remotely include internet subject directories, e Reserves (electronic course reserves), research guides, tutorials, handouts, inter-library loan requests, "Ask a Librarian" email service, telephone reference, and the ability to renew books and check one's library account online. Distance education students with no on-campus classes can apply online for a barcode to access the library's electronic resources and services.

Commission Policies

Certification of Compliance with Commission Policies

Policy on Distance Education and Correspondence Education

- *Policy Element:* Development, implementation, and evaluation of all courses and programs, including those offered via distance education or correspondence education, must take place within the institution's total educational mission,
- Compliance Statement: Development of Folsom Lake College (FLC) distance education
 courses and programs is overseen by the Distance Education Subcommittee of the
 Curriculum Committee in accordance with FLC's Technology and Distance Education Plan
 and the District's Distance Education Strategic Planning Resource Document.
 Implementation of distance education courses accords with FLC's mission, strategic plan,
 and enrollment management plan.
- *Policy Element:* Institutions are expected to control development, implementation, and evaluation of all courses and programs offered in their names, including those offered via distance education or correspondence education.
- Compliance Statement: FLC's Curriculum Committee controls development of all courses and programs, with special attention given to distance education courses and programs via the Distance Education Subcommittee. FLC controls implementation and evaluation of distance education courses and programs in keeping with the Technology and Distance Education Plan and faculty contract.
- *Policy Element:* Institutions are expected to have clearly defined and appropriate student learning outcomes for all courses and programs, including those delivered through distance education or correspondence education.
- Compliance Statement: All FLC courses and programs, including those delivered through distance education, have student learning outcomes that are documented in SOCRATES, the District's online curriculum management system.
- *Policy Element:* Institutions are expected to provide the resources and structure needed to accomplish these outcomes and to demonstrate that their students achieve these outcomes through application of appropriate assessment.
- Compliance Statement: All FLC courses and programs, including those delivered through

distance education, are assessed regularly with data and assistance provided by the District and College research offices. All outcomes are documented in annual unit/department plans.

- Policy Elements (2 combined): (1) Institutions are expected to provide the Commission advance notice of intent to initiate a new delivery mode, such as distance education or correspondence education, through the substantive change process. (2) Institutions are expected to provide the Commission advance notice of intent to offer a program, degree or certificate in which 50% or more of the courses are via distance education or correspondence education, through the substantive change process.
- *Compliance Statement:* The instruction office conducts an annual review of programs in the fall to determine which programs have over 50% of courses delivered through distance education. Following the review, the Accreditation liaison officer notifies the Commission of FLC's intent to file a substantive change proposal.
- Policy Element: Institutions which offer distance education or correspondence
 education must have processes in place through which the institution establishes that
 the student who registers in a distance education or correspondence course or program
 is the same person who participates every time and completes the course or program
 and receives the academic credit.
- Compliance Statement: Students registering at FLC are given unique student numbers functioning as their user ID for all technology services, including the Desire2Learn learning management system that supports distance education.

DESCRIPTION OF THE PLANNING PROCESS

Relationship to college planning, evaluation and stated mission

The 2011 Los Rios Community College District (LRCCD) Strategic Plan clearly states the mission, values and goals that provide a foundation for FLC's DE program. One of the District's core values is a commitment to providing educational opportunities to all who can benefit. One of the District's goals articulates the following: "In order to meet the challenges of population growth, we will pursue new delivery appropriate to provide a high level of access to education". In addition, a key strategy area in Teaching and Learning Effectiveness calls for supporting high quality distance education as an option for increasing access and promoting student success. Specific initiatives outlined in the plan include coordinating in DE to maximize student choice and access, expanding the use of data to inform scheduling and the identification of optimal delivery methods, further integrating DE planning with other planning efforts, and providing professional development to support increased student success.

Individual program planning processes take place at the department level and in the case of career technical education programs are informed by business and industry advisory committees. New curriculum and curriculum revisions are reviewed and acted upon by the college's curriculum committee, which is a committee of the academic senate. New-to-college and new-to-district curriculum must also be reviewed and acted upon by the district curriculum coordinating committee as well as the LRCCD Board of Trustees. As part of the college curriculum process, any course that faculty wish to offer in a distance education modality must be reviewed and receive a recommendation from the distance education subcommittee of the curriculum committee. The curriculum committee then acts upon the subcommittee's

recommendation. No course may be offered in a distance education modality without prior approval of the curriculum committee.

Departments are required to submit annual department plans each spring. As part of this process, departments identify upcoming changes in curriculum and the resources needed to support those changes. Resources may include additional staffing, facilities, equipment, operating budgets, and/or professional development training. Actual requests for new resources must be documented in the plan before the appropriate college committee will consider the request for approval.

General responsibility for online technology infrastructure support for all four LRCCD colleges is maintained by the district's Information Technology Department (DOIT). The district's Educational Technology Committee (ETC) has members representing DOIT and administration as well as college administration, faculty, and classified staff. Decisions regarding infrastructure needs and learning management system (LMS) support for distance education offerings, as well as in support of on-ground offerings, are made with input from ETC. LMS infrastructure and software needs are regularly assessed by DOIT with input from the college administrators, faculty, and staff who work closely with the LMS system. DOIT is responsible for requesting resources for technology updates and expansions to support district-wide computing needs. Funds are then appropriated through the district budget process and published in the annual budget. The college is responsible for funding college equipment and any specialized software used by individual academic disciplines.

Additional district and college plans and resource documents that support the ability to offer distance education classes include the following:

The programs included in this proposal are in keeping with the college's mission in that they prepare students for transfer and/or career technical work. Additionally, offering program courses via distance education increases student access to college programs.

Individual program planning processes take place at the department level and in the case of career technical education programs are informed by business and industry advisory committees. New curriculum and curriculum revisions are reviewed and acted upon by the college's curriculum committee, which is a committee of the academic senate. New-to-college and new-to-district curriculum must also be reviewed and acted upon by the district curriculum coordinating committee as well as the LRCCD Board of Trustees. As part of the college curriculum process, any course that faculty wish to offer in a distance education modality must be reviewed and receive a recommendation from the distance education subcommittee of the curriculum committee. This includes a separate review and approval by the Distance Education Subcommittee of the Curriculum Committee. The Course Outlines of Record (COR) include details of how a course approved for a given DE modality will maintain effective student contact – the allocation of instructional time and methods for effective instructor contact are specified on

the COR. The curriculum committee then acts upon the subcommittee's recommendation. No course may be offered in a distance education modality without prior approval of the curriculum committee.

Planning for DE is also integrated into the College's other planning processes. Planning in support of DE is also integrated into the College's planning processes through its program review process. The data provided to instructional programs for program review include program enrollment and student success data disaggregated by a variety of measures including delivery methods. College-wide enrollment and student success DE data is also provided for comparative purposes (Attachment 7). This data supports the assessment of and planning for DE at the instructional program level.

FLC DE courses must be approved by the FLC Curriculum Committee to ensure equivalent learning experiences and academic rigor to those offered on ground. The Distance Education Subcommittee of the Curriculum Committee performs a separate review of all courses containing a distance education modality. In particular, the subcommittee reviews sections of the curriculum outline to ensure that academic standards and learning outcomes are equivalent to those of the traditional in-person modality, and that regular, effective instructional contacts are included. This intensive review and approval process for our DE offerings ensure the academic integrity of all of the College's offerings.

Assessment of Needs and Resources

The number of courses offered through DE has increased from 12.7% in fall 2009 to 17.8% in fall 2014. Actual enrollment in DE courses has also increased from 13.6% in fall 2009 to 13.7% in fall 2014. Students who enroll in DE courses have slightly lower than but relatively close success rate to the face-to-face modality. Knowing this, faculty modify course content and assignments to ensure better understanding for improved success.

The college has offered distance education courses since its initial accreditation in January 2004 and has the following resources to support these offerings:

- Permanent and adjunct faculty who choose and are assigned distance education classes in accordance with the *Los Rios Community College District Collective Bargaining Agreement with Los Rios College Federation of Teachers* contract (<u>Attachment 8</u>, Article 4.4). Faculty costs are paid for out of the regular instructional budget for salaries through the annual departmental allocation process.
- One permanent full-time faculty, Instructional Design and Development Coordinator, who
 provides individualized and group training and consultation in the areas of instructional
 design, digital media and tools, teaching and learning, and online pedagogy. Particular
 emphasis is placed on continued development, training, and support for faculty use of the
 D2L LMS.
- Access to regular lecture classrooms with state-of-the-art media services, for any required on-ground orientations or exams for online courses.
- Readily available online reference materials, supplemental course materials, and media resources through the library, as well as online or on-ground dialogue with librarians.
- District and college technology support staff who maintain the infrastructure to support online and iTV courses, faculty, and students.
- Access to online and on-ground student and academic services that are available to all FLC

students. Online services include admissions (application), e-Services (online registration and related transactions), counseling, financial aid, follow up services (Early Alert), college orientation, and transfer assistance.

Anticipated Effect on the College

The college's existing distance education infrastructure is sufficiently robust to support additional distance education course offerings. The college anticipates that no additional resources will be needed.

Intended Benefits

The DE offering of courses for programs included in this proposal will provide options and increased access for students who may not be able or who choose not to attend on-ground courses.

Description of Preparation and Planning Process

The planning process for the programs in this proposal originated within individual departments and involved the annual department plan process, the processes of the curriculum committee and its distance education subcommittee. Planning and assessment has been informed by annual reports from the college's Office of Institutional Research and the Student Learning Outcomes Committee.

The LRCCD Educational Technology Committee (ETC) is actively involved in coordinating DE planning across the district. The ETC is currently discussing additional ways to strengthen student authentication in DE courses beyond the authentication by unique student username and password already required. They are also planning to update the District's DE Instructional Resources document.

EVIDENCE OF ADEQUATE RESOURCES

Folsom Lake College (FLC) has analyzed and provided for adequate human, physical, technological and financial resources and processes necessary to initiate, maintain, and monitor the change and to assure that the activities undertaken are accomplished with acceptable quality.

Student Support Services

FLC assures equitable access to all of its students by providing appropriate, comprehensive, and reliable services to students regardless of service location or delivery method. FLC provides equitable access to all students through appropriate, comprehensive, and reliable support services in accordance with board policy P-2113 and board regulation R-2113. Student services are available to students at each of FLC's three sites. Moreover, many student support services are also available online. For example, students can apply to FLC, register for classes, add/drop classes, purchase parking permits, and review their progress toward degree and certificate completion using Oracle/PeopleSoft's online degree audit application via the District's eServices. Financial aid services (FAFSA application and online BOG fee waiver application, financial aid orientation, and satisfactory academic progress workshops) are also available online. Students are provided with computer access at all three sites.

• **Application:** Students are able to apply to FLC online via http://www.losrios.edu/lrc/lrc_app.php.

- Assessment: Students can identify and prepare for assessment tests by accessing materials online via links at http://www.flc.losrios.edu/student-services/student-success/assessment Assessment test scores are portable across the LRCCD, students can take their assessment tests at any LRCCD campus. Students who cannot come to an LRCCD campus can work through Sacramento City College to take their assessment test at a remote location

- Faculty Office Hours: According to the LRCFT Contract, faculty who teach online may schedule one online office hour weekly per .2 FTE taught online during the given semester up to a maximum of two online office hours each week per semester. Some faculty use CCC Confer, the web conferencing platform supported by the Chancellor's Office, for their online office hours so that a synchronous component is available for DE students. Faculty members also communicate and assist online students via email.

- Finally, many faculty teaching online have selected course materials that have a variety of online support (including tutorial assistance)
- **Library:** The FLC Library offers many services for distance learners. Through the online Library Catalog, the currently registered students, as well as staff and faculty, may request books from other Los Rios libraries, place holds on books currently checked out (except for Reserve books), obtain copies of pages from books on reserve, renew the books they have checked out (one time only online) and access the electronic databases. All subscription databases may be accessed from off-campus. A variety of library materials and course reading may be accessed electronically through electronic reserves.
- **Pay Fees:** Students can pay fees for classes and purchase parking permits online at http://www.losrios.edu/lrc/lrc_feepay.php.
- **Transcripts:** Students can request transcripts online via https://lrccd-web.losrios.edu/transcript.aspx.

Admissions and Records

FLC provides in-depth Admissions and Records (A&R) services at the FLC-main campus, with more specific services at the El Dorado Center (EDC) and Rancho Cordova Center (RCC). A&R personnel are responsible for processing all educational records, including transcripts, academic records, and grade reports, as well as requests for official transcripts, enrollment verification, graduation petitions, name changes, address changes, residency, admission and registration. A&R also provides assistance for veterans and international students. A&R services at the two centers mainly involve enrollment steps, from application to registration in classes.

A variety of forms are available on the A&R webpage to assist students.

Faculty, Management, and Support Staffing

Folsom Lake College (FLC) has sufficient and qualified faculty, management and staff to support distance education. All full-time and adjunct faculty are hired and evaluated in accordance with the district policies and procedures, which comply with relevant local, state, and federal laws and regulations, as well as with the current collective bargaining agreement. Faculty have the ability to choose whether or not to teach using distance education modalities and have access to teaching support through the college's Innovation Center, facilitated by the college's Instructional Design and Development Coordinator. The Coordinator is responsible for working individually with faculty who are already teaching distance education courses as well as those who wish to explore distance education modalities to assess their training and support needs. Depending on the number of faculty involved in a given semester, training may occur one-on-one with the coordinator or in longer, multiple day sessions during the summer term. In addition, the coordinator offers regular in-service sessions throughout the semester to introduce faculty to new teaching and learning technologies; the coordinator also facilitates an active FLC online educators group that meets twice monthly to share best practices and discuss emerging technologies. Faculty providing nonclassroom academic or student support services are responsible for assisting students with successfully accessing their respective services in both online and on-ground environments.

Instructional Deans assign classes to faculty based on training, level of interest, availability and expertise. Folsom Lake College Guidelines for Online, Hybrid and Web-Enhanced Instruction (Attachment 7) includes responsibilities for Area Deans for ensuring instructors teaching in a DE format have adequate preparation; only those faculty members with DE experience and/or training are assigned to DE classes Scheduling of distance education courses is done in consultation with the appropriate discipline faculty department chair and area dean. All area deans are responsible for administrative oversight of their respective discipline faculty, regardless of teaching modality choices.

FLC participates with the district's other three colleges in using the D2L LMS for online, hybrid, and web-enhanced courses. The district information technology (DOIT) department, under the direction of the Associate Vice Chancellor of Information Technology, is responsible for all services related to district-wide technology infrastructure (WAN and LAN) and information systems (student services, business services, library system, telephone system, voicemail, internet, web services, e-mail, etc.), and distance education tools and support.

The majority of FLC's online classes utilize D2L. It is housed on a large server array at the district office, with a redundant server cluster located at the college, is used by all the district colleges. Students can log-on to one location (http://elearning.losrios.edu) for all online, hybrid, or web-

enhanced classes offered by any district college. Students are automatically linked to the course sites, which are archived at the end of each semester and preserved for at least three years. Server maintenance and support is managed by the DOIT staff, with both full-time staff and contractors maintaining the system and monitoring its operation. The entire system uses load balancing and bandwidth management to channel requests, maintain quick response times, and enhance instructional traffic efficacy. Backups are performed frequently in case of catastrophic failure, and daily backups are stored in case they are needed later.

Students and faculty have access to staff resources if they encounter problems with online classes. Calls are answered by trained staff and escalated to district IT staff as necessary. In addition, there is a help desk at the district office that operates weekdays from 7:30 am - 5:30 pm.

The college's iTV broadcast facility is staffed by a chief broadcast engineer and two audio/visual (A/V) production staff. Quality measures are in place, including regular evaluation of indicators such as student satisfaction, success, retention, and student learning outcomes. The Vice President of Student Services and the Dean of Student Success ensure that the College provides access to a range of comprehensive support services for distance education students that parallels, as closely as possible, those available to on-campus students.

The Instructional Design and Development Coordinator ensures continuity for maintaining an effective distance education program, is proactive in monitoring local, national and global trends in distance education online courses. The Coordinator is available for individual consulting, workshops, or department-specific workshops regarding distance education and educational technology. The FLC Curriculum Committee provides clear guidelines related to the provision of DE courses. The implementation of these principles and practices is overseen by the DE Subcommittee of the Curriculum Committee, which rigorously reviews the sections of the Course Outline to inform their recommendation regarding DE approval to the Curriculum Committee.

Professional Development for Faculty and Staff

Folsom Lake College (FLC) provides professional development for faculty and staff to effect and sustain the change. The college's Innovation Center provides training and resources to assist faculty in the design and development of distance education teaching methods. The center consists of an open computer lab, an editing studio, and a small classroom. It is staffed by FLC's Instructional Design and Development Coordinator, who provides individualized and group training in the areas of instructional design, digital media and tools, teaching and learning, and online pedagogy. Additionally, faculty teaching online and those considering teaching online are encouraged to attend the FLC online educators group, which is facilitated by the instructional design and development coordinator. The group meets twice monthly to share best practices and discuss emerging technologies.

Instructional television personnel provide training on equipment, the distance education model used, and strategies for classroom management and inclusiveness. Instructors with iTV experience also help train faculty who are new to this modality through observation and practice, often in conjunction with other training programs (e.g., the mentoring and faculty diversity internship programs). Media services also provides customized training on the use of sophisticated video teleconferencing facilities in several locations on campus, as well as technical support to other

district colleges and the district office. Media services staff members themselves attend regular trainings sponsored by professional organizations and vendors.

Appropriate Facilities

Folsom Lake College (FLC) has appropriate equipment and facilities to support the change. The facility and equipment infrastructure for providing online courses and services is already in place district-wide, is proving adequate, and has been updated over time as is demonstrated by ongoing online course and services development since the college was first accredited in 2004. DOIT carefully monitors LMS use and quality of system response time to determine whether additional resources and/or alternative strategies are needed to deliver services. The district's ETC is charged with ensuring that the needs of end-users, both faculty and students, are clearly communicated to district and college IT services staff.

Interactive Television (iTV) is managed by Media Services and brings a selection of synchronous classes to the Folsom campus, El Dorado Center, Rancho Cordova Center, and Amador County Transportation Center (ACTC). The system, which was completely updated in summer 2008, utilizes high performance production technology. A semi-automated production system allows a single operator at a single location to produce, direct and engineer all audio and video switching necessary for each class. Video teleconference capability is also provided, both for local and international events. Students benefit from three campus locations (plus an Amador County location) from which to participate in classes, and each is connected via cameras and microphones providing students and instructors with real time audiovisual communications. Home participants hear and view the class through live, online streaming technology and are able to ask questions via the CCC Confer phone bridge system. Students and instructors can view all center-based audiences simultaneously, without loss of conventional classroom functionality, although some aspects of on-site supervision are compromised due to the distance involved. Development of more diverse course offerings, supported by incentives for faculty, is being explored.

Initial and Long Term Fiscal Resources

Folsom Lake College (FLC) has allocated sufficient fiscal resources to support the current number of DE offerings. The salary costs for faculty teaching distance education courses are the same as that for on-ground courses. College and district IT support staff are already in place to provide support for both on-ground and distance education technology. The online infrastructure is funded and maintained by the district, while the college is responsible for the iTV infrastructure. The college's budget allocation processes ensure funding to maintain existing equipment as well as planned upgrades and/or replacement. Other financial needs are supported by the operating budgets established within the office of instruction and the specific instruction areas.

Financial support for online courses follows the same planning process as the support for oncampus courses. Financial resources for online courses are equal to those for other courses and are adequate to meet the needs of College programs. The college's financial stability is grounded in sound fiscal practices initiated at the district level. Historically, the district has maintained financial stability due to conservative business practices and solid accounting principles. The District budget is developed to ensure that spending is authorized only at the level of realized revenues. The District maintains fiscal reserves that meet or exceed minimum requirements, including a general fund reserve of three to five percent. The programs and services funded through the district are a reflection of the District's Strategic Plan, statutory obligations, and the requirements of the ACCJC.

DOIT, under the direction of the Associate Vice Chancellor of Information Technology, is responsible for all services related to district-wide infrastructure (network and cabling) and information systems (student services, business services, library system, telephone system, voicemail, Internet, Web services, etc.) and district systems which support DE, including the Help Desk resources.

Budget, Enrollment, and Resource Analysis

Folsom Lake College (FLC) and LRCCD budgets are sufficient to support online and iTV course offerings. The college is responsible for iTV infrastructure, the budgetary needs of which are addressed through the college's annual budget allocation process. Media services staff, in consultation with the area dean, creates an Annual Department Plan (ADP) that describes resource needs, including staffing, materials, building remodels and minor alterations. After reviewing all departmental ADPs, college administration reviews priorities and then allocates funding to address appropriately the needs across all instructional departments.

Online classes are typically capped at 40 students, which is consistent with on-ground class caps. Online sections are quite popular and fill faster than on-ground sections. iTV classes are capped based upon the broadcast and receiving room capacities (34 at FLC-main, 18 at RCC, and 16 at EDC), with enrollments averaging around 40 students per class (with some variance depending upon course and instructor). Retention and success rates in online sections are generally lower than that of on-ground sections of the same course, though there are some courses for which rates are better in online sections.

District and college resources are adequate to support distance education course offerings. D2L is well maintained by a sufficiently staffed DOIT department. The college's media services department is adequately staffed, and the iTV infrastructure has receives upgrades and repairs as needed. The college has made a commitment to provide the resources needed to continue iTV classes as a service to students and the community, including real-time class broadcasts, recorded class sessions, and community service offerings.

Evaluation and Assessment of Student Success, Retention, and Completion

The college produces annual reports on degrees awarded, course enrollments, and student success rates (<u>Attachment 9</u>). In addition, the college has a six-year cycle for all programs to undergo review (<u>Attachment 10</u>). In February 2010, the district produced a report that compares success rates of online and on-ground students enrolled in courses with similar TOP codes (<u>Attachment 11</u>). In June 2010 FLC created a report on online student success and retention rates by individual course (<u>Attachment 12</u> and <u>13</u>). That report is now run annually and the data shared with online faculty to use along with assessment of student learning outcomes to improve their courses and student outcomes. The college considered all of these reports when it developed a more comprehensive Technology and Distance Education Plan in fall 2014 (<u>Attachment 14</u>). In August 2011, the district produced a report that compares enrollments and success rates of students enrolled in online and on-ground writing, math, and business courses (<u>Attachment 15</u>).

EVIDENCE OF NECESSARY INTERNAL AND EXTERNAL APPROVALS

Statement of Required Approvals

The college's curriculum committee is responsible for approving all modalities by which courses may be offered. All courses offered in a DE modality have been approved for that method of delivery. All courses, degrees and certificates offered by the colleges of the LRCCD District are approved by the FLC Curriculum Committee, the District Curriculum Coordinating Committee, the Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees and the California Community College Chancellor's Office as defined in Board Policies and Regulations and established by the District Curriculum Coordinating Committee with District Academic Senate Approval (http://www.losrios.edu/legal/Regulations/R-3000/R-3412.pdf). The degrees and certificates described in this Substantive Change Proposal have received all necessary internal and external approvals.

When a faculty member submits a course that includes a request to teach the course through one or more DE mode(s), the faculty member must include additional information as justification for and in support of DE approval. Title 5 requires that the approval of courses offered in DE modalities must be approved separately from the normal curriculum approval process. To accommodate this, the FLC Curriculum Committee has a Distance Education subcommittee that reviews the DE sections of a course outline and then makes a recommendation that informs the review and approval of the course by the full Curriculum Committee.

All courses submitted to the Curriculum Committee must have the following information defined:

- Instructional methods and in-class activities the methods that are appropriate for presenting the class material based on outcomes and objectives and the in-class activities appropriate to support the outcomes and objectives.
- Typical homework assignments the types of homework assignments that are appropriate to strengthen the outcomes and objectives.
- Evaluation methods the methods that are appropriate for evaluating and assessing the student's understanding of the outcomes and objectives.

In addition to the above information, Distance Education approval requires the following information:

- Instruction methods and in-class activities, which describe how the instruction methods will be employed for the particular DE modality.
- Typical homework assignments, which describe how the typical homework assignments will be employed for the particular DE modality.
- Evaluation methods, which describe how the evaluation and assessment methods will be employed for the particular DE modality.
- Allocation of instructional time, which describes how the hours of instruction for the course will be allocated for the particular DE modality.
- Regular instructional contact, which describes the number and type of contacts the student, can typically expect to have with the professor for the particular modality. This could include onsite contacts such as orientation meetings as well as online contacts such as discussions, e-mails, chats, phone calls, etc.

Student authentication for DE courses is required and is based upon individual student ID and password necessary to participate in the course. In addition, many DE courses require students to attend an onsite orientation and/or to take onsite assessments (e.g. exams). In addition, many instructors require that all papers in their classes be submitted through Turnitin.com to support academic integrity.

FLC and LRCCD attend to changes in regulations for DE through a variety of means including CIO listserv and the work of the Instructional Design and Development Coordinator. The Instructional Design and Development Coordinator provides continuity for maintaining an effective DE program, and is proactive in monitoring local, national and global trends in DE, and advocates for compliance with external guidelines and regulations (such as the ACCJC, CCCCO, and US DOE). The College and District have exercised due diligence in complying with regulatory requirements and legal mandates.

Legal Requirements

There are no special legal requirements for these programs.

Evidence of Governing Board Action

This Distance Education Substantive Change Proposal was approved by the Los Rios Board of Trustees at its September 9, 2015 meeting (Attachment 16).

EVIDENCE THAT ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS ARE MET

Certification of Continued Compliance with Eligibility Requirements

1. Authority

Folsom Lake College is a public, two-year community college accredited by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. Folsom Lake College is authorized to operate as a degree granting institution by the State of California, the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, and the Board of the Los Rios Community College District.

2. Mission

Folsom Lake College's educational mission is clearly defined and published in the College catalog. The educational mission is aligned with the Los Rios Community College District's mission statement and is appropriate for a degree-granting institution of higher education and the constituency the College seeks to serve. The College's mission defines the College's commitment to supporting student learning with respect to programs, support services, opportunities, and environment. The Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees approved the College's most recent revision to its mission statement in June 2014.

3. Governing Board

Folsom Lake College is one of four colleges in the Los Rios Community College District. The District is governed by a publicly elected seven-member Board of Trustees, elected by area and joined by a non-voting student trustee. The Board of Trustees is an independent policy-making body overseeing the District and the four colleges. Meetings are held monthly and scheduled at each of the four colleges once per year. A majority of the board members have no

employment, family, or personal financial interest in the institution.

4. Chief Executive Officer

Dr. Rachel Rosenthal serves as the president and chief executive officer of Folsom Lake College. Dr. Rosenthal was hired for this position in July 2012 and reports directly to the Los Rios Community College District's chancellor, Dr. Brian King, who was hired 1 February 2013.

5. Administrative Capacity

Folsom Lake College has sufficient academic and support services and administrative staff members with appropriate preparation and experience to provide the administrative services necessary to support the College mission. Organizational charts for the College are included in the introduction of this report.

6. Operational Status

Folsom Lake College has been in continuous operation since 2004, when it received its initial Accreditation. The College serves approximately 8200 students across its main campus in Folsom, El Dorado Center in Placerville, and Rancho Cordova Center in Rancho Cordova. Most students are actively pursuing vocational certificates, associate degrees, and/or transfer opportunities to four-year institutions.

7. Degrees

Folsom Lake College offers 44 Associate of Arts, Associate of Science, and Associate Degree for Transfer degrees. Students are enrolled in courses required for a certificate or degree program and/or required for transfer to four-year institutions as described in the College catalog.

8. Educational Programs

Folsom Lake College's degree and certificate programs are congruent with its mission and are based on recognized higher education fields of study. All programs culminate in identified student learning outcomes that are assessed regularly. The Curriculum Committee, one of the College's participatory governance committees, ensures that the programs provide appropriate content and length and meet levels of quality and rigor appropriate to the degrees and certificates offered. The degree programs meet California Code of Regulations, Title5 curriculum requirements, and, when combined with the general education component, represent two years of full-time academic work. The College also offers 34 vocational certificates in career and technical education.

9. Academic Credit

Folsom Lake College awards academic credits based on the traditional Carnegie unit and accepted practices of California community colleges under California Code of Regulations, Title 5. The traditional classroom lecture class requires the equivalent of 1.1 hours per week for each semester unit awarded. Laboratory classes require 3.3 hours per week for each semester unit awarded. The traditional semester is sixteen weeks long. The College catalog and class schedules provide detailed information about academic credits.

10. Student Learning and Achievement

Folsom Lake College identifies course, program, and institutional student learning outcomes (SLOs) in all modalities. The College assesses student achievement of those outcomes and uses the assessment results to make necessary improvements. SLOs for all degree and certificate programs and courses are documented in SOCRATES, the District's online curriculum database. Program SLOs are also published in the College catalog, and course SLOs are included in all class syllabi.

11. General Education

Students must complete a minimum of 21 semester units of general education (GE) courses and demonstrate competency in writing, reading, and math to receive an associate degree. The GE units are designed to ensure breadth of knowledge, to promote intellectual inquiry, and to offer an introduction to major areas of knowledge. Degree credit for the College's general education courses is consistent with the levels of quality and rigor appropriate to higher education. The general education program has comprehensive student learning outcomes that are assessed regularly.

12. Academic Freedom

Faculty members and students at Folsom Lake College are free to examine and to test all knowledge appropriate to their discipline or area of major study. The Los Rios Community College District Board expresses its support for the principles of Academic Freedom in Board Policy P-7142, which states that "a college best serves its community, notes a stronghold of rigid tradition, but as an open intellectual forum where varying shades of opinion may be freely expressed and fairly debated." The College catalog (p.73) contains the American Association of University Professors Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom and also the Los Rios Colleges Federation of Teachers' Statement on Academic Freedom.

13. Faculty

Folsom Lake College has a substantial core of 100 full time faculty members and 186 adjunct faculty members, sufficient in size and experience to support all of the institution's educational programs. Faculty members must meet the minimum requirements for their disciplines based on regulations for the Minimum Qualifications for California Community College Faculty established in California Code of Regulations, Title 5. The faculty contract provides a clear statement of faculty responsibilities, which include assessment of student learning outcomes.

14. Student Services

Folsom Lake College provides a comprehensive array of student services for all students and provides basic skills courses for students who require preparation for college level work.

15. Admissions

Folsom Lake College has adopted and follows admission policies consistent with its mission as a public California community college and complies with California Code of Regulations, Title 5. Admissions policies are published in the College catalog and class schedules.

16. Information and Learning Resources

Folsom Lake College provides specific long-term access to sufficient print and electronic information and learning resources through its libraries and academic support programs to

meet the educational needs of students, including those enrolled in distance education programs and classes.

17. Financial Resources

Folsom Lake College, through the Los Rios Community College District, documents a funding base, financial resources, and plans for financial development that are adequate to support student learning programs and services, to improve institutional effectiveness, and to assure financial stability.

18. Financial Accountability

The Los Rios Community College District regularly undergoes an external financial audit for the District and its colleges by a certified public accountant. The audit, which the District makes available for viewing, is conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. The College demonstrates compliance with Title IV federal requirements.

19. Institutional Planning and Evaluation

Folsom Lake College assesses progress toward achieving its stated goals and makes decisions regarding improvement through an ongoing and systematic cycle of evaluation, integrated planning, resource allocation, implementation, and re-evaluation. The College systematically evaluates how well and in what ways it is accomplishing its purposes through various integrated processes that include strategic plan review, program review, student learning outcomes assessment, and annual department/unit plan review. College planning and evaluation processes align with Los Rios Community College District processes.

20. Integrity in Communication with the Public

Folsom Lake College publishes a print catalog that is also available on the College website. The catalog contains: current data regarding College name, location, and contact information; College mission and vision; course, program, and degree offerings; academic calendar; policies on the rights of individuals, including a statement of principles on academic freedom; student development programs and services, including financial aid and learning resources; names and degrees of faculty members and administrators; and names of governing board members.

21. Integrity in Relations with the Accrediting Commission

The Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees provides assurance that Folsom Lake College adheres to the Eligibility Requirements and Accreditation Standards and policies of the Commission, describes the College in identical terms to all its accrediting agencies, communicates any changes in its accredited status, and agrees to disclose information required by the Commission to accomplish its accrediting responsibilities.

EVIDENCE THAT THE ACCREDITATION STANDARDS ARE MET

Standard I: Institutional Mission and Effectiveness

A. Mission

FLC's educational purposes as indicated in its vision and mission statements are consistent

and aligned with those in the District vision and mission statement. Furthermore, FLC's educational purposes align with those listed in the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office mission, which includes programs for associate degrees and certificates; transfer education; basic skills and English language proficiency; economic and workforce development; and lifelong learning. The mission and purposes of the institution are therefore appropriate to an institution of higher learning.

FLC's mission statement infers an intended student population in the community, age 16 or older. This population includes but is not limited to high school students in their junior and senior years who are interested in taking transfer-level courses through FLC's advanced education program; high school graduates and older, re-entry students working on transfer and degree programs; employed and unemployed students enrolling in career and technical education programs designed to enhance employment and career skills; working professionals enrolling in specific courses to maintain work certificates and licenses; students enrolling in basic skills and ESL courses; and lifelong learning students of all ages enrolling in personal interest courses.

B. Institutional Effectiveness

Folsom Lake College (FLC) demonstrates a conscientious effort to produce and to support student learning, measures that learning, assesses how well learning is occurring, and makes changes to improve student learning. FLC organizes its key processes and allocates its resources to support student learning and demonstrates its effectiveness by providing 1) evidence of the achievement of student learning outcomes and 2) evidence of institution and program performance. FLC uses ongoing and systematic evaluation and planning to refine its key processes and to improve student learning. Student learning is the core of FLC's mission statement (Ref. I. 01), and all FLC processes are structured to support and to improve student learning. FLC's key performance indicators (KPIs), along with other assessment mechanisms like the California Community Colleges' Student Success Scorecard, are analyzed annually to inform decisions about student learning. FLC's planning, implementation, and evaluation processes align with Los Rios Community College District (LRCCD) processes and follow applicable federal and state laws, LRCCD board policies and regulations, and collective bargaining agreements.

FLC provides evidence of achievement of student learning outcomes and service area outcomes in a number of ways. The College' research office distributes its annual Key Performance Indicator (KPI) Report to all participatory governance committees and constituent groups within the College. Departments and operating units are asked to report on student learning outcomes assessment and to address how outcomes might be improved every year via annual department/unit plans and every six years via program reviews. Each spring the Institutional Planning Committee (IPC) reviews the annual College goals and achievements and helps the College president to identify resource allocations beneficial to student success. FLC processes are reviewed annually by the IPC, and modifications for improvement are discussed and made as necessary.

FLC produces and supports student learning, measures that learning, assesses how well learning is occurring, and makes changes to improve student learning. FLC organizes its key

processes and allocates its resources to support student learning and demonstrates its effectiveness by providing 1) evidence of the achievement of student learning outcomes and 2) evidence of institution and program performance. FLC uses ongoing and systematic evaluation and planning to refine its key processes and improve student learning.

Standard II: Student Learning Programs and Services

A. Instructional Programs

The quality and appropriateness of new instructional programs are maintained through FLC's program approval process for transfer and CTE programs. New program proposals are reviewed by the Curriculum Committee's Program Development and Planning (PDP) Subcommittee and by the District's Program Placement Council (PPC). Once program proposals are approved for further development, FLC administrators and faculty members converse with colleagues at transfer institutions and industry advisory boards to ensure the quality of course and program content. Programs and related courses are developed using SOCRATES, the District's online curriculum management system, which enables faculty members throughout the District to comment on proposals. Developed proposals go through

College and District review processes; the proposals, after gaining Board of Trustee approval, are then sent to CCCCO for final approval. CTE program and course proposals must also gain approval from the state's North/Far North Regional Consortium before they are sent to CCCCO. Additionally, information about all CCCCO approved programs is sent to the Commission, which determines whether a substantive change proposal is required.

Student learning needs are reviewed further through the annual department/unit plan process, which documents significant findings and needs emerging from departments' course and program level outcomes assessments. The Student Learning Outcomes Committee examines the results and provides an annual assessment report to the Academic Senate and to the Institutional Planning Committee. The report covers issues, themes, and needs arising across disciplines. This report, previously shared with the above committees in fall semesters, now is shared in spring semesters so that its content can inform College goals and prioritized planning for the coming year.

The quality, appropriateness, and currency of existing instructional programs are maintained through FLC's instructional program review process which occurs every six years for transfer programs and every two years for CTE programs. The program review process requires that discipline faculty members state the instructional program's mission, which, according to the program review requirements, should reflect and reinforce the College mission. Additionally, each instructional program review documents the following information: program overview, relevancy, currency, curriculum, student access to program courses, student achievement, program enrollment and productivity, required resources for improving program, and recommendations. Each review must be supported by enrollment and student achievement data, student survey data, department data, and any relevant and available labor market data. FLC also has a program appraisal and recommendation process by which declining programs can be appraised and subsequently be revised to enhance viability or be discontinued.

A. Student Support Services

The Folsom Lake College (FLC) mission defines the role of student support services as providing comprehensive "support services to promote the success of all students." Additionally, the Los Rios Community College District mission indicates that each college within the District shall provide "a comprehensive range of student development programs and services that support student success and enrich student life."

In keeping with both the District and College missions, FLC offers comprehensive support programs and services to its diverse student body. These include admissions and records/registration, assessment, California Work Opportunities and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs), career and transfer center, Cooperative Agencies Resources for Education (CARE), counseling and articulation, disabled students programs and services (DSPS), extended opportunity programs and services (EOP&S), financial aid, follow-up services and early alert, health and wellness services, student life, outreach, and a veterans resource center. These support services demonstrate a concern for all students, at all levels, and for all goals, from basic skills to graduation and transfer. Learning support services,

administered through instructional offices, include tutoring, libraries, and open computer labs at all three sites, the reading/writing center (RWC) at FLC-main and the English Center at the El Dorado Center (EDC), and SOAR Workshop Central at FLC-main. These services further contribute to a supportive learning environment.

Support services are provided to students at all three sites though some services are offered on a coordinated, as needed basis at EDC and the Rancho Cordova Center. Support services and programs are available to all students admitted to FLC. Admissions policies are consistent with state guidelines, and FLC admits any student who meets the eligibility criteria. As required in board policy P-2211 and as indicated in the catalog, FLC, in meeting its open access requirement, "shall admit any California resident, and may admit any nonresident, possessing a high school diploma or the equivalent thereof." Also in keeping with policy and regulations on advanced education, FLC admits eligible high school students who have completed the tenth grade and who are at least 16 years old.

B. Library and Learning Resources

Folsom Lake College (FLC) provides students and personnel responsible for student learning programs and services adequate access to the library and other learning support services, regardless of their location or means of delivery. The libraries provide on-site and remote access to over 40 research databases, which include over 14,000 periodical titles and more than 10,000 e-Books. Students, faculty members, and staff can access these databases from any District computer or from remote locations using their unique personal identification number and password. Individual database tutorials are available online 24 hours/day, seven days a week, and librarian assistance is available in- person, by phone, or through e-mail during open library hours. Additional materials and services that can be accessed remotely include eReserves (electronic course reserves), research guides, tutorials, handouts, ILL requests, "Ask a Librarian" e-mail service, telephone reference, online book renewal services and library account online service.

Standard III: Resources

A. Human Resources

Folsom Lake College (FLC) conducts its hiring processes in accordance with board policies P-5121 (full time faculty members), P-5122 (adjunct faculty members), P-6122 (regular and long term temporary classified), P-6123 (temporary classified), and P-9121 and P-9122 (administration). Hiring practices are also guided by the District's Equity Handbook, the District's Faculty Hiring Manual, and the FLC Academic Senate's Faculty Hiring Prioritization Process . FLC's hiring prioritization processes are designed so that new positions arise as a result of programmatic need.

B. Physical Resources

Folsom Lake College (FLC) and the Los Rios Community College District work together to plan, to build, to maintain, to upgrade, and to replace physical resources to assure effective use and the continuing quality necessary to support programs and services. Board regulation R-8417 describes the facility planning process. The District's facilities

management department (FM) coordinates facilities planning activities for all four colleges. FLC and the District have separate responsibilities. FM is responsible for determining the projected regional population and population growth by specific campus or site; determining the anticipated type and amount of space that will be needed at each site; determining the existing facilities types and capacities; developing state prescribed capacity load ratios; determining the best possible funding sources or funding options; and reviewing and communicating current space use. FLC is responsible for developing annual department/ unit plans (ADP/AUPs), assessing existing facilities, and determining new space requirements; coordinating department enrollment projections (growth/decline) to ensure that total projections for FLC correlate with enrollment projections and capacity load ratios provided by the District; and developing an overall educational master plan that indicates which programs are intended to grow and which programs are intended to decrease.

C. Technology Resources

FLC's Technology and Distance Education Plan describes the various technology components at FLC's three campuses and indicates whether responsibility for each component lies with the District or the College. The plan includes individual planning items for each component, and the items are presented in a matrix that includes timelines, success indicators, lead units, and status.

FLC and District provide significant technology infrastructure to support fully online, hybrid, web-enhanced, and interactive television (iTV) instruction. The District provides and manages the Desire2Learn learning management system, which supports online as well as conventional instruction. FLC's iTV system is managed by media services. The iTV system is semi-automated and allows a single operator at the FLC-main campus to produce, to direct, and to engineer all audio and video switching necessary for each class. Video teleconference capability is also provided for both local and international events. Each location is connected via cameras and microphones that provide students and instructors with real time audiovisual communications. Students and instructors can view all center-based audiences simultaneously, without loss of conventional classroom functionality. Current semester iTV classes are streamed live and are archived for on-demand student review.

Nearly all services and resources provided by the FLC's libraries have a technological component that provides necessary services to both on-campus and distance education students. To maximize the libraries' technology resources, FLC works together with other colleges in the District to leverage purchase and support in several areas, including subscription databases and e-Book collections, both of which are accessible by distance education students.

FLC's innovation center provides training and resources to assist faculty members and staff in the design and development of distance education classes. The innovation center facility consists of an open computer lab, an A/V studio, and a small classroom space. The center is staffed by an instructional design and development coordinator who provides individualized and group training on instructional design, digital media and tools, and online pedagogy. Particular emphasis is placed on continued development, training, and support for faculty members on the use of the District's learning management system.

D. Financial Resources

District and College financial planning is described in the Los Rios Community College District 2015- 16 Tentative Budget, also known as the Budget Book. The District reviews its mission and goals as part of the annual fiscal planning process. As indicated in the Budget Book's executive summary (p. 15), District financial planning is intended to reflect the educational programs of the Los Rios Community College District, which are consistent with the mission of the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO). The District and College's financial planning processes include review and consideration of the CCCCO mission as well as the values, vision, and mission statements. The annual fiscal planning process also includes identification of goals for achievement, as identified in the executive summary (p. 19). Each year, a Tentative Budget is presented to the Board of Trustees in the early fall, and, following Board approval, copies of the Adopted Budget are distributed throughout the District.

Standard IV: Leadership and Governance

A. Decision-Making Roles and Processes

The responsibilities and authority of faculty members and academic administrators regarding student learning programs and services are defined in College and District documents. The Collegial Consultation Agreement (outlines the collegial consultation process involving the Academic Senate and the College president as pertains to academic and professional matters, as they are defined in Section 53200 of Title 5. Specifically, the document addresses how academic and professional matters are determined and directed; how they are to be addressed by the Academic Senate and the participatory governance committees; and how they are directed to and accepted, amended, or rejected by the College president. The College president will normally accept the recommendations of the Academic Senate on academic and professional matters. In accordance with Title 5 (§53203), only in exceptional circumstances and for compelling reasons will the recommendations not be accepted. If the Academic Senate's recommendation on academic and professional matters is not accepted, the College president shall promptly communicate (within seven working days) the reasons in writing to the Academic Senate president.

B. Board and Administrative Organization

Los Rios Community College District board policies and regulations describe governing board expectations for quality, integrity and improvement of student learning programs and services. Board policy P-3112 "Supervision and Control" describes what the trustee responsibilities are and how the board exercises its leadership. Board policy P-3112 also lists trustee responsibilities: Leadership, Adoption of Policies, Evaluation, and Maintaining Relationships.

BACKGROUND:

On March 5, 2002, the electorate of the Los Rios Community College District approved Measure A, the District's \$265 million general obligation bond program. In November 2008, the electorate also approved Measure M in the amount of \$475 million. Both elections were conducted under Proposition 39, which requires the establishment of a Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee. The Oversight Committee Bylaws also require that an annual written report be presented to the Board of Trustees in open session.

STATUS:

The District's Oversight Committee was created in spring 2002 and concluded its thirteenth full year of operation on June 30, 2015. BACKGROUND:

The Cosumnes River College Jump Start Program began in 2012 as a partnership with UC Davis' Early Academic Outreach Program (EAOP). It was formed to reach out to African-American and Latino males and expanded to Filipino males this year. It is a two-week program offered during the summer. Jump Start was designed to give these students an opportunity to successfully transition from high school to college in a supportive environment and make them more aware of what is expected in college through students' participation in a variety of enrichment activities designed to build their academic and social skills, and create a sense of understanding about the differences between high school and college and give them a sense of community. It prepares these at-risk students to be successful not only at CRC, but as transfer students at the university level. Participants are able to visit UC Davis and Sacramento State as part of the program and find support in college faculty, staff and administrators and especially among themselves, leading to a higher rate of success among this group of students.

STATUS:

College administrators and students will provide an overview of this program and the goals for expanding it in the future.
