Vice Chancellor Theresa Matista presented an overview of the Governor's proposed budget for 2016-17 for the Board of Trustees' information and discussion.

B. 2015-16 Program Development Funds

Vice Chancellor Theresa Matista presented information on Program Development Funds, which are comprised of the District's discretionary funds per established formulas and certain categorical or special revenues for allocation to new, continuing and one-time only purposes.

7. BOARD MEMBER REPORTS

Trustee Weaver reported the activities of the student advisory committee, including the Lobby Day position paper regarding a proposed "Safety Day" at community colleges.

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Trustee Albiani attended the Chamber Installation Dinner honoring Los Rios officers.

The Trustees personally thanked Dr. Kathryn Jeffery for her service to Sacramento City College.

8. FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS

Trustee Scribner requested an update on how Los Rios is doing with its Career Technical Education (CTE) pathways and program partnerships, especially with K-12. Trustee Haynes added that she'd like to see a specific list with the status of the development of each pathway partnership, and if there is potential for any new funding.

Trustee Haynes also asked a board presentation on allied health and nursing programs, including student demographics by college for admission and completion.

Trustee Jones requested an update on Civitas in the next six months.

9. REPORTS AND COMMENTS

Chancellor's Report:

<u>ARC:</u> American River College's Chemical Dependency Studies Program has been named the #1 program in the state by the California Consortium of Addiction Programs and Professionals. ARC was ranked the highest out of 51 colleges and universities, and 10 private institutions. The Consortium gave ARC its "Spotlight Award," praising ARC's program for its outstanding contribution to substance abuse counselor education.

<u>CRC:</u> The Cosumnes River College Agriculture program was recently approved for funding through the California Career Pathways Trust Central Region Agricultural Education Career Pathway consortium for the Agricultural Mechanics, Agriscience and Ornamental Horticulture pathways. The grant—a total of \$186,000 over the next two years—will focus on improving the quality of high school and community college Agricultural Mechanics, Agriscience and Ornamental Horticulture pathway programs, and building on existing partnerships with regional employers to successfully transition students to agricultural careers.

<u>FLC:</u> The Folsom Lake College women's soccer team won its third consecutive Bay Valley Conference (BVC) championship title in three years—its first three years. In post-season play, the Falcons made it to the Elite Eight (the third round of state playoffs), furthest in the program's history. The National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) ranks the team 14th in the nation. Team Captain and Forward Sami Thomas was selected to the 2015 NSCAA Junior College Women's Scholar All-America Team and the 2015 California Community College

Athletic Association (CCCSA) All-State Team. She was also named Most Valuable Player by the Bay Valley Conference.

<u>SCC:</u> A new nursing program partnership among Sacramento State, Sacramento City College, American River College and Sierra College aims to fast track a limited number of students who will graduate by the end of this year. The first 40 students will graduate this spring from their respective community colleges, then earn a Sacramento State nursing diploma in December 2016. The Sacramento Bee recently reported on the partnership.

COURSE PROPOSALS

Course Deletions

American River College

1. DEAF 300 Introduction to Deaf Culture and ASL Studies Orientation (0.50 units)

Justification: This course no longer meets the needs of our students.

2. **DEAF 322 Classifiers I (0.50 - 1.00 units)**

Justification: Three courses, Fingerspelling I, Classifiers I & ASL Numbers I will be combined into one course instead of individual courses.

3. DEAF 324 ASL Numbers I (0.50 - 1.00 units)

Justification: Three courses, Fingerspelling I, Classifiers I & ASL Numbers I will be combined into one course instead of individual courses.

4. DEAF 400 Deaf Culture and ASL Studies Capstone (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course no longer meets the needs of our students.

Sacramento City College

1. ANTH 315 Cultures in Focus (3.00 units)

Justification: As a result of program review being conducted in Fall 2015, the anthropology department decided that we would like to delete this class because we have not offered it in several years and we have no plans to offer it again. We'd like to remove it from the course catalog so that we do not mislead anthropology students into thinking that this class will be offered. The content of this course is covered in our other anthropology course offerings.

2. ANTH 317 Cultures of Southeast Asia (3.00 units)

Justification: As a result of program review being conducted in Fall 2015, the anthropology department decided that we would like to delete this class because we have not offered it in several years and we have no plans to offer it again. We'd like to remove it from the course catalog so that we do not mislead anthropology students into thinking that this class will be offered. The content of this course is covered in our other anthropology course offerings.

3. CISA 308 Exploring Word Processing and Presentation Software (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course is no longer offered because entry-level students now have these skills.

4. CISC 110 Using ePortfolios (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course is no longer offered as the content is covered in CISC 306.

5. CISC 321 Intermediate Operating Systems (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course is no longer offered and students have not requested the course content in years.

6. CISW 325 Intermediate Web Site Development (4.00 units)

Justification: This course is no longer offered as the content is covered in CISW 323.

7. CISW 350 Imaging for the Web (1.00 unit)

Justification: This course is no longer offered as the content is covered in GCOM 360.

New to District Courses

American River College

1. MATH 311 Mathematical Concepts for Elementary School Teachers - Number Systems (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: MATH 120, 125, 129, or 133 with a grade of "C" or better, or placement through the assessment process.

54.00 hours lecture

This course focuses on the development of quantitative reasoning skills through in-depth, integrated explorations of topics in mathematics, including history of real number systems and subsystems, basic number theory, sets and relations, logic, mathematical induction, and current national and state curriculum standards for mathematics. It emphasizes comprehension and critical analysis of mathematical concepts and applications of logical reasoning.

Justification: The Math Department is creating this course because there is not one currently that matches C-ID MATH 120, which is a required course in the ADT for Elementary Teacher Education. This course will also provide more options for students who need to take transfer-level math courses.

2. SPAN 133 Intermediate Spanish Lab I (0.50 - 1.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Advisory: SPAN 132 or concurrent enrollment in SPAN 411.

27.00 - 54.00 hours laboratory

This laboratory course enables Spanish learners to develop, expand, and reinforce multiple Spanish language skills while working independently and/or in small groups. Coursework includes integrated study topics related to vocabulary, grammar, reading, writing, listening, and oral skills covered in third semester Spanish courses. Students may register until the sixth week of the semester. This course may be taken up to 2 times, for a total of 1.0 unit, using different topics. Pass/No Pass only.

Justification: This laboratory course extends contact with the Spanish language. It reinforces the learning process of another Spanish course. It also meets the needs of students who need further guided practice with the material covered in SPAN 411 before continuing on to SPAN 412.

Cosumnes River College

1. **DEAF 360 Deaf Art (3.00 units)**

Prerequisite: None.

54.00 hours lecture

This course introduces Deaf Arts such as drawings, sculptures, artifacts, painting, printmaking and films. We will examine the materials, methods, and design principles of creating Deaf Arts . Local field trips may be required. This course addresses the need and demand of this instruction for global recognition and its social and cultural affects toward Deaf Arts. It promotes global and cultural understanding to the relationship of Deaf Art and the expression of national, regional, socio-economic class, and gender identity.

Justification: This course provides students with information regarding the dynamics in our society, language and development as it affects Deaf people. The students will have the knowledge about these dynamics and developmental milestone in Deaf Arts.

2. ESL 24 Novice-Mid ESL Skills Lab (0.50 - 1.50 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Advisory: ESLL 20, ESLR 20, and ESLW 20; Concurrent enrollment in ESLL 20, ESLR 20, and/or ESLW 20 is recommended as ESL 24 is designed to supplement the instruction students receive in those courses.

Enrollment Limitation: Students may only enroll in one ESL Skills Lab per semester.

27.00 - 81.00 hours laboratory

This course develops, expands, and reinforces multiple English language skills at the novice-mid level in an independent and/or small group environment. Coursework includes integrated study topics relative to vocabulary and study skills, reading, grammar use, idiomatic language study and application, conversation and listening skills, and assorted integrated software programs. Late registration is allowed as long as space is available and with the permission of the instructor. This course is not a substitute for other ESL courses. Students will earn .5 units for each 27 hours of lab completed for a maximum of 1.50 units. This course is a Pass/No Pass course.

Justification: The ESL department is in the process of revising the curriculum for the entire program. One component of this revision includes a change from a lecture/lab delivery format to a lecture only format. The new, independent skills lab will provide opportunity for students to continue the development of their English language skills at the novice-mid level through a variety of resources including texts, software and webbased applications, and instructor created materials. Possible areas of study include grammar, listening/speaking, pronunciation, reading, and writing appropriate for students at the ESL 20 level. This is one of a series of lab courses that replaces ESL 90 due to changes in repeatability.

3. ESLG 51 Grammar for Intermediate ESL Writers (2.00 units)

Prerequisite: ESLG 41 with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent skills demonstrated through the assessment process.

36.00 hours lecture

This course reviews the form and use of the simple and continuous tenses in the present, past and future as well as the present perfect and present perfect continuous. It also provides instruction in other intermediate-level grammar topics such as gerunds and infinitives, modals, word forms, and conditionals. It is intended for students who need additional grammar instruction to support their development writers in English.

Justification: Through a comprehensive review of the current ESL course offerings at CRC, both students and faculty identified the need for supplemental courses in English grammar, especially verb form and use. Many ELL (English Language Learner) students assess into and enter the ESL W 40 or ESL W 50 with gaps in their knowledge of English grammar, which impedes their ability to succeed in ESL writing courses and other college level coursework. This two unit course gives the department an opportunity to provide "just -in-time" instruction for these students.

4. ESLP 41 The Basics of English Pronunciation (2.00 units)

Prerequisite: ESLL 30 with a grade of "C" or better

36.00 hours lecture

This course introduces the phonetic alphabet and focuses on the identification and production of the sounds of English. Students use basic pronunciation rules to begin to control pronunciation of words and sentences and add expression to their speech.

Justification: Through a comprehensive review of the current ESL course offerings at CRC, both students and faculty identified the need for more supplemental courses in ESL Pronunciation. ELL (English Language Learner) students do not receive sufficient instruction and practice in pronunciation in their ESL courses, yet many of them do not want to take a 4-unit course in this subject. Therefore, many of them exit the ESL program with minimal proficiency in English pronunciation, which impedes their ability to succeed in other coursework and the workplace. This two unit course gives the department an opportunity to provide "just -in-time" instruction for these students.

5. ESLP 51 Building English Fluency and Comprehensibility (2.00 units)

Prerequisite: ESLP 41 with a grade of "C" or better

36.00 hours lecture

This course builds on the skills learned in ESLP 41 while adding increased focus on sentence stress, rhythm, and intonation. Students use pronunciation rules to increase their ability to control pronunciation in a variety of situations and to make their speech more comprehensible and engaging.

Justification: Through a comprehensive review of the current ESL course offerings at CRC, both students and faculty identified the need for more supplemental courses in ESL Pronunciation. ELL (English Language Learner) students do not receive sufficient instruction and practice in pronunciation in their ESL courses yet do not want to take a 4-unit course in this subject. Therefore, many of them exit the ESL program with minimal proficiency in English pronunciation, which impedes their ability to succeed in other coursework and the workplace. This two unit course gives the department an opportunity to provide "just-in-time" instruction for these students.

6. HORT 313 Sustainable Agriculture (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

36.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This course provides a comprehensive study of sustainable agriculture that addresses many environmental and social concerns while providing innovative and economically viable techniques for growers. It integrates the theoretical aspects of sustainable agriculture, principles and practices with field-based laboratory and participatory learning of sustainable agriculture practices. This course may include field trips.

Justification: Students would like to have a working knowledge of sustainable agriculture/farming. This is part of the Certificate of Proficiency for Plant-Based Nutrition and Sustainable Agriculture program. The Program is helpful for individuals wanting to pursue careers in farming, urban farming, nutrition education, school nutrition/garden, restaurant or food service industry, and programs with an emphasis on plant-based nutrition and sustainable farm-to-fork campaign.

7. MUFHL 416 Studies in Contemporary Composition Techniques, Performance, and Literature (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student should have some familiarity with concert music and be able to read music. Audition is required for enrollment.

54.00 hours lecture

This course focuses on the creation, performance, and literature of 20th and 21st Century concert music. Students will both create original works and analyze existing compositions as we research trends in art and music. This class will focus primarily on music as it developed and evolved from the European classical tradition and took new shape in the Americas. Topics may include: European classical music heritage, American classical and art music, jazz, film music, European avant garde, world music, and minimalism.

Justification: This course provides advanced study in music composition, performance, and literature of 20th and 21st Century concert music. Music majors taking this course will develop a better understanding of contemporary artistic trends when transferring to four year music programs.

8. NUTRI 303 Plant-Based Nutrition (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

54.00 hours lecture

This course studies the science of plant-based nutrition and its application to health promotion, chronic disease reduction and the sustainability of the environment. It examines the sources and functions of micro- and macronutrients in plant foods and how

the body digests, absorbs, transports and stores them. Emphasis is placed on the health implications associated with the standard American dietary intake, phytonutrient intake, whole foods/plant foods consumption, the impact of processing, and consequences of under and overconsumption. The course will also include topics on how plant-based nutrition significantly reduces the ecological footprint, how food choice can influence public policy, weight loss, food safety, and the diet-disease relationship, among others. An evaluation of personal dietary habits using current dietary guidelines and nutritional assessment methods will be completed to help students assess their own plant-based nutritional health.

Justification: Students need to master the knowledge and skills in plant-based nutrition to improve overall health and the health (and sustainability) of the environment. Students will attain and apply the principles of plant-based nutrition to health promotion and prevention of chronic diseases. In addition, students will attain the knowledge and application of how plant-based diet improves the sustainability of the environment. The course is part of the Certificate of Proficiency for Plant-Based Nutrition and Sustainable Agriculture Program and is helpful for individuals wanting to pursue careers in farming, urban farming, nutrition education, school nutrition/garden, restaurant or food service industry, and programs with an emphasis on plant-based nutrition and sustainable farm-to-fork campaign.

9. NUTRI 331 Plant-Based Food Principles and Preparation (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Advisory: ENGWR 51 and MATH 20 with grades of "C" or better

36.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory

This course provides a comprehensive study of plant-based food ingredients and the basic principles and techniques involved in plant-based food preparation. Students will examine the factors that influence taste and the changes that occur in foods during preparation. In the laboratory, basic cooking skills and theoretical applications will be emphasized. Additionally, importance is placed on the reasons for recipe procedures and the prevention and correction of cooking failures.

Justification: Students need to master the knowledge and skills in plant-based nutrition to improve overall health and the health (and sustainability) of the environment. Students will attain and apply the principles of plant-based nutrition to health promotion and prevention of chronic diseases. In addition, students will attain the knowledge and application of how plant-based diet improves the sustainability of the environment. The course is part of the Certificate of Proficiency for Plant-Based Nutrition and Sustainable Agriculture Program and is helpful for individuals wanting to pursue careers in farming, urban farming, nutrition education, school nutrition/garden, restaurant or food service industry, and programs with an emphasis on plant-based nutrition and sustainable farm-to-fork campaign.

Folsom Lake College

1. HUM 370 Women and the Creative Imagination (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

54.00 hours lecture

This course examines the creative powers of women throughout the history of art from antiquity to the present. The course offers an interdisciplinary perspective on the contributions of women artists as evidenced in literature and the visual and performing arts. Using gender as the primary lens of analysis, this course seeks to uncover the broader contexts of female experience by probing the relationship women artists had to the historical periods in which they lived and worked. Students at FLC may be required to attend a cultural event at their own expense.

Justification: This course satisfies General Education requirements for four-year colleges and universities. It serves as a transfer course for all students planning to continue into a Bachelor of Arts or Sciences program at four-year institutions. This is a new course that will introduce and highlight the accomplishments of women in the arts.

Sacramento City College

1. ENGWR 90 Preparation for English Writing - Success Academy (1.00 unit)

Prerequisite: Placement through the assessment process

18.00 hours lecture

This course provides an introduction to student learning expectations and the outcomes of higher education. This course has a specific focus on English writing preparation through the implementation of individualized group instruction for students.

Justification: The Summer Success Academy (SSA) has the intended purpose of providing recent high school graduates with specific resources, support, and programming to allow for a successful transition and acclimation into Sacramento City College and higher education in general. In the past, SSA offered an HCD 299 course, and the HCD course had three main components: HCD, Math, English, taught by HCD, Math, and English instructors at different times in different classrooms. However, the English and Math instructors do not met the requirements to teach an HCD course. Therefore a new English course needed to be developed for the SSA students.

PROGRAM PROPOSALS

New Programs

American River College

1. Automotive Emissions Inspection and Repair Technician

This certificate prepares students for entry-level positions in the automotive industry as emissions inspectors or emissions repair technicians. It meets the state of California requirements for students seeking to apply for a California state smog inspector and/or repair license(s).

Justification: This certificate will help meet the needs of industry based on the advisory committee's recommendation and help students earn their smog license.

2. Curriculum Specialist

This certificate provides the educational coursework that serves as the core curriculum for the early childhood education field. Topics include an introduction to the profession, observation techniques, age-appropriate curriculum, and two supervised field/lab experiences. Additionally, this specialization provides a choice of coursework focusing on curriculum areas for teaching young children.

Justification: Based on the recommendation of our Advisory Committee, this new Specialist Certificate provides an opportunity for students in early childhood education to focus on appropriate curriculum experiences for young children.

3. Special Needs Specialist

This certificate provides the educational coursework that serves as the core curriculum for the early childhood education field with a specific focus on working with children with special needs. Topics include an introduction to the profession, observation techniques, age-appropriate curriculum, and a supervised field/lab experience in a fully-inclusive classroom. Additionally, this specialization includes a course introducing the student to issues relating to speech and language development.

Justification: This new certificate provides an opportunity for students to specialize in work with children with special needs. It includes a lab component in a fully inclusive classroom and coursework in speech and language development.

Cosumnes River College

1. A.S. for Transfer (AS-T) Agricultural Business Degree

The Associate in Science in Agricultural Business for Transfer degree fulfills the general requirements of the California State University for transfer. Students with this degree will receive priority admission with junior status to the California State University system, although not necessarily to a particular campus or major.

Justification: The AS-T Agricultural Business Degree is being offered to provide opportunity for our students and to fulfill a state mandated requirement.

2. A.S. for Transfer (AS-T) Nutrition and Dietetics Degree

The Associate in Science in Nutrition and Dietetics for Transfer (AS-T) degree in Nutrition and Dietetics at Cosumnes River College allows students interested in pursuing a degree in Nutrition and Dietetics to complete their first two years of requirements at the community college before transferring to a California State University which offers a B.S. degree. Each California State University may have slightly different requirements for transfer so it is critical for students interested in this major to work with their counselor to develop an individual academic plan.

Justification: This Associate in Science in Nutrition and Dietetics for Transfer (AS-T) degree has been developed in response to SB 1440 and allows students who are interested in pursuing a degree in Nutrition and Dietetics to complete their first two years of study at Cosumnes River College and then transfer to a California State University that offers a B.S degree in Nutrition and Dietetics.

3. Plant-Based Nutrition and Sustainable Agriculture

The Plant-Based Nutrition and Sustainable Agriculture Certificate Program brings farm-to-fork into the classroom. It provides the science that supports the benefits of whole plant-based foods to the health of the individual as well as the environment. Students will gain knowledge in the function of plant-based foods towards the treatment and prevention of chronic diseases. The program addresses the environmental and social concerns with strategies and principles of sustainable agriculture. Students will master the theories and skills of plant-based food preparation bringing the food to the fork and into everyday food choices.

Justification: The Department of Nutrition and Foods in conjunction with the Department of Agriculture and Horticulture offer a Plant-Based Nutrition & Sustainable Agriculture Certificate Program that is rewarding and is industry supported. The Program provides the coursework to master the knowledge and skills in plant-based nutrition, plant-based food preparation, and sustainable agriculture. Students will attain and apply the principles of plant-based nutrition to promote health for the individual as well as the environment. The Program is helpful for individuals wanting to pursue careers in farming, urban farming, nutrition education, school nutrition/garden, restaurant or food service industry, and programs with an emphasis on plant-based nutrition and sustainable farm-to-fork campaign.

Folsom Lake College

1. Biological Sciences

The Associate in Science in Biology for Transfer Degree program provides students with a major that fulfills the general requirements for transfer to the California State University (CSU). Students with this degree will receive priority admission with junior status to the California State University system. Students should work closely with their Folsom Lake College counselor to ensure that they are taking the appropriate coursework to prepare for majoring in Biology at the institution they wish to transfer to because

major and general education requirements may vary for each CSU, and the degree does not guarantee admission to a specific CSU campus. This program has the following completion requirements: (1) Completion of 60 semester units that are eligible for transfer to the California State University, including both of the following: (A) The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC), IGETC for STEM, or the California State University General Education – Breadth Requirements. (B) A minimum of 18 semester units or 27 quarter units in a major or area of emphasis, as determined by the community college district. (2) Obtainment of a minimum grade point average of 2.0. Associate Degrees for Transfer also require that students must earn a C or better in all courses required for the major or area of emphasis.

Justification: Developing this ADT fulfills the Life Science department's obligation to comply with Senate Bill 1440 (Padilla, 2010). Students may find that completing this degree makes their application to a CSU campus more competitive. It is also possible that this degree at least partially fulfills lower-division Biology major requirements at a CSU campus.

2. Emergency Medical Studies

This Certificate program is based on the EMT Basic course with additional education in related topics. This course of study prepares the student to sit for the National Registry or EMT exam. The student will have the basic building blocks for a career in the Fire Service as well as a career in Emergency Medical Services.

Justification: To bolster the EMT Basic Course and give students a broader preparation for a career in Emergency Medical Services.

Sacramento City College

1. Business Information Worker

The Business Information Worker Certificate is designed to prepare students for entry-level office and administrative support in a variety of organizations.

Justification: The Business Information Worker Certificate is implemented as part of a statewide effort to standardize ICT-related California Community College offerings and thereby make it easier for employers to identify qualified workers. The goal of this Certificate is to prepare students for entry-level office and administrative support in the following areas: basic oral and written business communications; basic computer application skills, including beginning Excel and Word; the fundamentals of computer systems; and critical thinking and problem solving.

BACKGROUND:

BACKGROUND:

Staff has continued its regular review of district policies and administrative regulations. As part of the review of the 7000 series and 8000 series, Policies 7121, 7131 and 8511 were identified as needing title, nomenclature, and other nonsubstantive changes. Additionally, policies 1312, 8252, 8323 and 8431 were identified as needing title and other nonsubstantive changes.

STATUS:

The recent shift in the Deputy Chancellor's position from the business side of the institution to the education side of the institution required rethinking the ways in which responsibilities and signature authority were accounted for across the policies and regulations. Policies 1312, 8252, 8323 and 8431 specify the Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration as the responsible person for the areas covered by those Policies.

Policy 7121 reflects the change in nomenclature from "vocational" instruction to "career technical" instruction. It also deletes section 1.3.1, because that provision is redundant. Policy 7131 deletes the mention of a "Superintendent" of the District and contains two other formatting changes. Policy 8511 reflects the change in nomenclature from "certificated" personnel to "academic" personnel, and contains a handful of other nonsubstantive formatting changes.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed revisions to the attached board policies.

1.0 <u>Campus Visitors</u>

- 1.1 Campus Visitor Defined An individual who is neither an employee of the Los Rios Community College District, nor a currently enrolled student of a particular College, shall be considered in this and other sections of the District Policies and Administrative Regulations as a visitor to the campus.
- 1.2 Visitors and telephone callers, whether business person, parent, student, alumnus, or others, should receive a cordial and courteous reception on each campus. A well-informed receptionist should greet all campus visitors and provide every assistance possible in directing them to the person or information they desire.
- 1.3 Visitors are welcome on all campuses at any time during business hours, so long as they do not interfere in any way with the conduct of classes, student or campus activities, and/or school business. Visitors that commit any act likely to interfere with the peaceful conduct of the activities of the District/College or its facilities, or have entered the campus or facility for the purpose of committing any such act, the College President, Deputy Chancellor (or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, if there is no Deputy Chancellor), or designee, may direct the person to leave the campus or facility. Visitors may attend classes only with the permission of the instructor conducting the class, or club meetings with permission of the advisor.
- 1.4 Visitors are welcome at all public meetings held on campus but may not attend classes, meetings or convocations intended only for faculty, staff and/or students unless permission has been obtained from the College President of the College pursuant to section 1.3 above.
- 1.5 Unsupervised children shall not be permitted on the campuses or inside the District/College buildings.

2.0 <u>Construction Sites</u>

- 2.1 Unauthorized personnel shall not be permitted on construction sites on College campuses.
- 2.2 The Chancellor may establish regulations to permit entry on a limited basis to employees and/or the general public for the purpose of observing the progress of the construction (see also <u>R-8451</u>).

Because the extent of the activities is directly related to community needs, components of the program include, but are not limited to the following: credit and non-credit classes, adult education, continuing education, community services and development activities, and contract programs.

2.4 General Education

2.4.1 A selected program of study to acquaint students with the great traditional fields of knowledge, including the study of language and rationality, natural sciences, social and behavioral sciences and humanities.

- 2.5 General Learning Skills
 - 2.5.1 Courses which enable students to correct general learning skills deficiencies.
- 2.6 Counseling and Guidance
 - 2.6.1 Vocational Career technical, educational, personal and health counseling directed toward personal efficiency, identification of aptitudes and self-realization and realistic self-appraisal by students.
- 2.7 Supervised Tutoring
 - 2.7.1 A non-credit course available for students who are assigned on the basis of an identified learning need by a counselor or an instructor.

1.0 <u>Purpose</u>

1.1 The purpose of the Los Rios Community College District investment of funds District Policy is to delineate the responsibility for investment of District funds between the County Treasury and the District. The purpose also is to establish cash management and investments guidelines for District officials responsible for the stewardship of District funds maintained outside the County Treasury.

2.0 Funds Held at County Treasury

- 2.1 Pursuant to provisions of the California Community Colleges <u>Budget and Accounting Manual (BAM)</u>, the District shall use the County Treasury for deposits and disbursements of moneys except for those funds noted below:
 - 2.1.1 Agency funds
 - 2.1.2 Enterprise funds
 - 2.1.3 Moneys held for payment of security of bonds or other indebtedness
 - 2.1.4 Fund designated for retiree health benefits
- 2.2 To facilitate depositing and transfer of funds to the County Treasury, the District may establish clearing bank accounts. All moneys in such accounts shall be moved to the County Treasury within a reasonable time period. Certain refundable deposits may be held in clearing accounts until they are refunded or forfeited.

3.0 <u>County Treasury Investment</u>

- 3.1 Investment of funds maintained in the County Treasury shall be delegated to the County Treasury and invested by the County Treasurer following appropriate Government Code and investment policies adopted by the County Board of Supervisors.
 - 3.1.1 In accordance with County procedures, District funds may be pooled with other local agencies and invested by the County Treasurer in accordance with Government Code, section 53635.
 - 3.1.2 The County Treasurer may separately invest in accordance with Government Code, section 53601, District funds deposited in the County Treasury not required for the immediate needs of the District, such as General Obligation Bond proceeds and Tax Revenue Anticipation Notes.

4.0 District-Directed Investments

Investments/Gifts 2 of 5

4.1 District officials responsible for the stewardship of District funds have fiduciary responsibility and are subject to prudent investor standards for all investment decisions. District investments shall be made with care, skill, prudence and diligence.

- 4.2 Agency and Enterprise funds not required for immediate needs.
 - 4.2.1 Agency and Enterprise funds not required for immediate needs may be invested in the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) per Government Code, section 16429.1.
 - 4.2.2 The College President or Vice President of Administration is authorized to invest Agency and Enterprise funds at his/her College.
 - 4.2.3 The Chancellor, Deputy Chancellor (or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, if there is no Deputy Chancellor), and Associate Vice Chancellor, Finance are authorized to invest all Agency and Enterprise funds.
 - 4.2.4 Funds deposited with the LAIF shall be invested by the State Treasurer in securities prescribed by Government Code, sections 16430 and 16480.4.
 - 4.2.5 Funds invested with LAIF shall not exceed fifty million dollars at any one time or the maximum amount as specified by the State Treasury guidelines, whichever is greater.
- 4.3 Moneys held for payment or security of bonds or other indebtedness
 - 4.3.1 The Chancellor, Deputy Chancellor (or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, if there is no Deputy Chancellor), and Associate Vice Chancellor, Finance are authorized to invest moneys held for payment or security of bonds or other indebtedness.
 - 4.3.2 Moneys held for payment or security of bonds or other indebtedness, including certificates of participation, may be deposited with the County Treasury or invested separately under the provisions of Government Code, section 53601.5, subdivision (l).
- 4.4 Funds designated for retiree health benefits
 - 4.4.1 Funds designated for retiree health benefits shall be invested pursuant to Government Code, sections 53620-53622 and District Policy.
 - 4.4.2 Authority to Direct Investments of Trust Assets.
 - 4.4.2.1 The Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees serves as the administrator of the Plan and has designated that the Chancellor or designee(s) shall oversee the investment of the Trust assets.

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4.4.2.2 The Chancellor or designee(s) is responsible for the selection of an investment manager. The investment manager shall be approved by the Board of Trustees.

- 4.4.2.3 The Chancellor or designee(s) shall provide a copy of the District Policy governing the investment of the funds to the investment manager. In addition, the Chancellor or designee(s) may further define investment objectives and limitations within District Policy.
- 4.4.2.4 The Chancellor or designee(s) shall review investment activity no less than monthly.
- 4.4.2.5 The Chancellor or designee(s) shall meet no less than semiannually with the investment manager regarding investment activity and returns.
- 4.4.2.6 The Chancellor or designee(s) shall establish, with the investment manager, benchmarks for measuring the relative performance of the manager in managing the assets. The benchmarks should measure both return and risk.
- 4.4.3 Investment Objectives for Retiree Health Benefit Trust Assets
 - 4.4.3.1 The specific objectives for the investment of Trust assets are as follows:
 - 4.4.3.1.1 Safety of Principal The preservation and safeguarding of principal is the primary investment objective.
 - 4.4.3.1.2 Liquidity The investment portfolio should remain sufficiently flexible to meet cash requirements that may be reasonably anticipated.
 - 4.4.3.1.3 Public Trust District officials shall avoid any transactions that might impair public confidence in the District. Investments shall be made with precision and care, considering the probable safety of the capital as well as the probable income to be derived.
 - 4.4.3.1.4 Rate of Return The investment portfolio shall be designed to attain a rate of return at the market average or better through budgetary and economic cycles, consistent with the risk limitations, asset allocation, prudent investment principles, and cash flow characteristics identified herein.

4.4.4 Asset Allocation

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4.4.4.1 The table below provides the maximum asset allocation for each type of investment instrument. The asset mix may vary within the maximum limits based upon market conditions and the recommendation of the investment manager. At times, the asset allocations may exceed the maximum due to changes in market values. In those cases, the investment manager will re-balance the portfolio within the allocation limits expressed below within fifteen calendar days.

Asset Category	Maximum %
All Stocks (Domestic and International)	35% (International Stocks may comprise up to 10% of total assets)
Fixed Income	85%
Cash Investments	100%

- 4.4.4.2 Within each category, the investments shall be adequately diversified consistent with the prudent investor standard.

 Diversification should include geographic and sector diversity and also include limiting concentration in groups of securities subject to a single significant economic, social or political event.
- 4.4.5 Investment Restrictions and Prohibited Investments
 - 4.4.5.1 The Chancellor or designee(s), subject to Board of Trustees approval, may restrict specific investments from the portfolio on grounds other than economic risk and reward. Should the Chancellor or designee(s) restrict security investments, a list of the prohibited investments shall be given to the investment manager. This list may be periodically updated.
 - 4.4.5.2 The investment manager shall not make any investment jeopardizing the tax-excluded purposes of the Trust within the meaning of the Internal Revenue Code, or engage in any prohibited transaction based on federal, state or other governing regulation.
 - 4.4.5.3 Investment in the following types of assets is prohibited:
 - Speculative, non-hedging transactions involving stock options, futures, or similar investments
 - Commodities
 - Letter stock, private placements, or direct placements
 - Intra-state stock offerings
 - Real estate

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- Closed-end investment trusts
- Purchase of securities on margin, or lending or borrowing money
- Short sales, or substantially similar transactions
- Exotic derivatives that would materially change the duration, leverage or risk characteristics of the portfolio
- Investments with limited market liquidity

5.0 Annual Investment Activity Report

- 5.1 No later than October 1 following the fiscal year end, the Chancellor or designee(s) shall prepare and present to the Board of Trustees an annual report of investments.
- 5.2 The annual report shall include all District-directed investments including earnings from funds maintained and invested by the County Treasury and the Local Agency Investment Fund.

6.0 Internal Audit

6.1 The Internal Auditor may be directed to review the investment portfolio for compliance with the Board of Trustees investment District Policy on a periodic basis.

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1.0 Equal Opportunity

- 1.1 It is the intent of the Los Rios Community College District to make its business procedures conform to the practices of a model government entity to the extent feasible.
- 1.2 The District shall attempt, in all areas, to fulfill by its own example the principles that it seeks in others with whom it does business.

2.0 Purchasing of Supplies and Equipment

- 2.1 The matter of District spending, including the purchase of supplies and equipment, is one to which the Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees gives most critical attention.
- 2.2 The Board of Trustees seeks in every case to purchase, for the least expenditure of funds, optimum quality for the function to be served.
- 2.3 The Board of Trustees is guided by appropriate legal provisions for purchase of supplies and equipment, and for work to be done. (Ed. Code, §§ 81641-81656 and Pub Cont. Code, § 20651)
- 2.4 Other things being equal, purchases shall be made within the area served by the District.

3.0 Bidding and Quotation Procedure

3.1 Where it is legally required or if it is determined by the Deputy Chancellor (or Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration, if there is no Deputy Chancellor) to be in the best interest of the District to do so, supplies and work to be done shall be purchased on a competitive bid or quotation basis.

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1.0 Authority

- 1.1 The Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees shall approve the naming of the facilities and areas of the Los Rios Community College District and its Colleges.
- 1.2 The Board of Trustees may seek the advice of the Los Rios Foundation in making a decision to name a particular building or area.
- 1.3 The Chancellor and the Los Rios Foundation may recommend approval of exceptions to this District Policy.

2.0 Principles

- 2.1 Buildings and areas may be named in honor of friends, benefactors, and persons who have made significant contributions to the College, the District, or to education in California or the nation.
- 2.2 The naming of a building or place is a matter of serious, long-term commitment. The choice to give a personal name to a building implies permanence of that designation—both in terms of the designation itself and to the maintenance and refurbishment of the building. The naming opportunity thus has both moral and financial implications. The District reserves the right to remove the name of a building in the appropriate circumstances.
- 2.3 Buildings and areas may be named for persons who: have rendered significant, permanent service to education in California or the nation; who have distinguished themselves in the work of a College, campus, discipline, or department within the District; who are indigenous to the area and hold a unique place in history; or have made a substantial gift to the College or the District through its official fundraising arm, the Los Rios Foundation.
- 2.4 Buildings and areas may not be named for current District employees. When an area or building is proposed to be named for individuals associated with the District or California education, a period of not less than three years should elapse between the end of the individual's service to the District or California education and consideration by the Board of Trustees.
- 2.5 In all instances where the word "person," "individual," or "donor," is used in this District Policy, the same shall be deemed to include corporations, foundations, or other appropriate legal entities.

3.0 Guidelines

3.1 Names of facilities or areas should lend prestige to the District/College, and to staff, students, and community. The credentials, character, and reputation of each individual for whom the naming of a building is being considered shall be

- carefully scrutinized and evaluated. Nominations submitted to the Board of Trustees for consideration shall be accompanied by appropriate supporting documentation.
- 3.2 The College Presidents shall consult with the appropriate College constituencies (including, but not limited to, the Academic Senate, the Classified Senate, the Student Body Associations, etc.) before bringing a recommendation to the Chancellor to name a building or an area under this District Policy. The Presidents shall also consult with the Deputy Chancellor (or, if there is no Deputy Chancellor, the Vice Chancellor, Finance and Administration), and the Vice Chancellor, Resource Development prior to presenting recommendations to the Chancellor. The Chancellor shall present recommendations for naming to the Board.
- 3.3 A financial gift shall not automatically result in the naming of a building for an individual. The other criteria of this District Policy must also be met.
- 3.4 In addition to the permanent nature of a facility named to honor an individual, shorter-term issues, such as name plaques, stationery, catalog listings, maps, ceremonial action, and publicity shall be considered.
- 3.5 A suitable plaque should be located in the lobby or other significant location, giving the full name and brief biography of the person honored.

4.0 <u>Use of Names</u>

- 4.1 A uniform system of marking of buildings and outdoor areas should be adopted by location.
- 4.2 Plaques and signage should be tasteful, discrete, and consistent with other campus signage as determined by the Associate Vice Chancellor of Facilities Management.
- 4.3 To minimize exterior lettering, listings in directories, mailing addresses, and the like, as well as to ensure that the use of the new name becomes commonplace within the lexicon of the College and District, the naming of a building to honor an individual should use the surname only, as in "Raef Hall" and "Rodda Hall."

5.0 Portions of Buildings

- 5.1 Subunits of a new or existing building may be named separately to recognize an outstanding individual or a donor wishing to contribute the cost of a portion of a building, a room in a building, a major equipment item, a major art feature or water feature, and the like.
- 5.2 In cases where the feature is named after an individual pursuant to this District Policy, the committee or group making such a recommendation shall identify, or provide the source for the full cost of changing the name, such cost being determined by the Associate Vice Chancellor of Facilities Management.

5.3 Small landscape features such as trees, benches, and drinking fountains are excluded from the naming requirements.

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1.0 Attendance Accounting Standards

- 1.1 The Los Rios Community College District shall maintain the necessary records for accurate reporting the attendance information in accordance with the Education Code, the California Community Colleges Student Attendance Accounting Manual (Manual) and Title ¥5.
- 1.2 The Attendance Accounting Procedure Manual shall be adhered to in order to ensure that proper attendance records and system supporting documentation, and record retention procedures are maintained.

2.0 Basic Attendance Requirements for State Apportionment Purposes

- 2.1 The Chancellor or his designee shall prepare an academic calendar for each college College annually. The calendar shall be adopted by the Governing Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees before January 15 of each year and as further described in Board-Districty Policy (-P-7123). Such calendar shall contain the statutory number of days required in an academic year as defined for complete attendance reporting for student census information.
- 2.2 Student attendance information reported for State apportionment purposes shall be generated from courses or programs approved by the Governing Board, comply with applicable Title V-5 requirements (Sections sections 58100-58308) and as further prescribed by Board-District Policy.
- 2.3 Such courses reported for State apportionment purposes shall be conducted by appropriate certificatedacademic personnel who shall maintain immediate supervision and control of the instructional activities. (Title V5, §§ 58056 and, 58058).
- 2.4 All such courses shall be open to enrollment by the general public and in accordance with Education Code, section 84500 and Title V5, Sections sections 58100-58110, unless expressly exempted by statute.
- 2.5 Attendance related to State apportionment funding shall be reported for California students only as defined in the Education Code and Title ¥5.

3.0 <u>Basic Attendance Reporting Responsibility</u>

- 3.1 The <u>colleges</u> colleges shall be responsible for the accurate reporting and maintenance of student enrollment/attendance data regarding the following:
 - a) student registration
 - b) residency status category
 - c) student enrollment and disenrollment

- d) course categories—census and actual hours of attendance including apprenticeship hours and as further described in the District Attendance Accounting Procedures Manual.
- 3.2 College administration and faculty shall be responsible for maintaining accurate enrollment information. In particular, as of designated census weeks, attendance information for courses reported on a census basis shall include only those students who are enrolled and actively engaged in the educational activity of such course.
- 3.3 The District Office shall be responsible for the coordination and preparation of required attendance reports as prescribed by the California Community Colleges. Established filing dates for required attendance reports shall be followed.

BACKGROUND:

The Board of Trustees' Policy on Legislative Matters, Board Policy P-3115, requires the Board to annually adopt a Statement of Legislative Principles.

STATUS:

Staff received input from the Board of Trustees at its October 2015 and January 2016 meetings, and has reviewed the bills pending in the legislature at the end of the last term. Staff believes the existing Statement of Legislative Principles is appropriately focused and has not offered any amendments to the existing Statement of Legislative Principles for the upcoming legislative session.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed 2016 Statement of Legislative Principles.

LOS RIOS COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Annual Statement of Legislative Principles

This Statement of Legislative Principles is adopted by the Board of Trustees for the Los Rios Community College District on behalf of itself and its four separately accredited Colleges (American River College, Cosumnes River College, Folsom Lake College and Sacramento City College) under Board Policy P-3115. This Statement is intended to support the District's Strategic Goals: student success; teaching and learning effectiveness; access and growth; community, economic and workforce development; and organizational effectiveness.

This Statement of Legislative Principles provides guidelines for the Chancellor when addressing matters before the California Legislature and Congress, and constitutes the core principles guiding the development of the District's position on legislation.

The District shall not support or oppose legislation unless the outcome will have a significant effect on the District, its students or its employees. The District will remain neutral on most matters affecting local collective bargaining. However, the District will take appropriate positions where that legislation will have a material impact on the District. The District will remain neutral on matters affecting only another single district or small group of district(s), except where policy precedents, or resource allocations, have the significant potential of affecting the Los Rios Community College District or the California Community College System generally. Where issues are raised in the budget process, the District shall seek legislative support or opposition in accordance with the principles established in this document. Where legislation is likely to impede the policy principles set forth, the District is likely to oppose that legislation unless there are significant countervailing reasons.

The Board of Trustees' Legislative Principles align with the District's Vision, Mission, Values, Goals and Strategies, as enumerated in the District's Strategic Plan, as follows, but do not reflect every strategy under each goal area:

A. PROMOTE STUDENT SUCCESS: The District's and its Colleges' primary goal is to promote student success. This is defined as students achieving their educational goals. The District supports those legislative efforts that promote student success:

- Close the achievement gap.
- Implement appropriate measures to improve student success.
- Support the provision of comprehensive student support services.
- Provide for realistic accountability metrics based on valid and verifiable data.
- Strengthen the academic preparation of K-12 students to support success at a community college.
- Support collaborative efforts with four-year institutions designed to provide additional transfers for our students and legislation that promotes transfers.
- Support flexibility for dual enrollment and remove barriers as appropriate.

- B. PROMOTE TEACHING AND LEARNING EFFECTIVENESS: The District and its Colleges are committed to providing the highest quality instructional programs in transfer, vocational and general education, using the best current and emerging instructional methods and technologies. The District supports flexible teaching and learning methods to support the success of its diverse student population. The District supports those legislative efforts that promote teaching and learning effectiveness:
 - Support professional development for faculty, staff and administrators that is designed to support student success inside and outside of the classroom.
 - Support high quality distance education while minimizing regulatory barriers and additional reporting requirements.
 - Support the enhancement of existing educational programs and the development of needed new programs.
 - Increase effective delivery of English, ESL and mathematics basic skills education.
 - Support accreditation.
- C. PROMOTE ACCESS AND GROWTH: The District and its Colleges strive to be responsive to growing communities of the Greater Sacramento Region. The District and its Colleges pursue new delivery approaches that provide a high level of access to higher education and strive to provide comprehensive support services to assure access by reducing or eliminating significant barriers and promoting diversity. The District supports those legislative efforts that promote access and growth:
 - Enhance student financial aid opportunities (including, but not limited to, Cal Grant Funding) and reduce the overall cost of attending college for students.
 - Assist students with the application process for attending a community college.
 - Support the Dream Act and efforts to expand the institutional capacity for diversity.
 - Support the passage of a Statewide Educational Bond.
 - Support the District's educational centers.
 - Enhance opportunities for underserved constituencies.
 - Support equalization of apportionment for distance education.

- D. PROMOTE COMMUNITY, ECONOMIC AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT: The District and its Colleges seek to promote the health and economic vitality of the greater Sacramento Region through partnerships, staff involvement in civic affairs and programs open to the public. Further, the District and Colleges support economic development through their occupational programs and partnerships with business, labor and industry. The District supports those legislative efforts that promote community, economic and workforce development:
 - Develop effective and relevant career and technical programs in collaboration with external partners.
 - Increase efforts that align career technical education curriculum and program development among community colleges, K-12 and industry.
 - Integrate community colleges in the Workforce Investment Board and provide for community college courses to qualify for state and federal funding of workforce development activities.
 - Create and support a regional P-20 council.
 - Support the efforts of the Los Rios Foundation in its efforts to develop additional funding resources for the District, Colleges, faculty, staff and students.
 - Support improvements to the Adult Education System with our K-12 partners.

- E. PROMOTE ORGANIZATIONAL EFFECTIVENESS: The District and its Colleges strive to continually improve their institutional effectiveness to ensure fiscal accountability and integrity. The District supports those legislative efforts that promote organizational effectiveness:
 - Maintain local authority and control in the administration of the District and its Colleges.
 - Maintain locally elected Boards of Trustee governance in the administration of the District and its Colleges.
 - Promote the health, safety and welfare of students, faculty, staff and administrators.
 - Support the District's and its Colleges' efforts to attract, recruit and retain the most qualified employees, and assure appropriate staffing levels.
 - Support participatory decision making.
 - Increase the District's efforts in sustainable practices, including energy and resource conservation, while retaining appropriate flexibility.
 - Strengthen the District's ability to use its capital outlay, infrastructure bonds and property management funds efficiently.
 - Support the elimination of duplicative and/or needless regulatory oversight and reporting obligations, and provide adequate funding for the oversight and reporting requirements that are necessary.
 - Protect the fiscal integrity of the system.
 - Support funding sustainable mechanisms for CalSTRS and CalPERS liabilities.
 - Support backfill of property tax shortfalls.

BACKGROUND:

On September 9, 2015, the Governing Board adopted the 2015-16 maximum funding level (Z Budget) for the General Fund. The attached Schedule I details modifications to this funding level since adoption. General Fund revenues and appropriations are budgeted \$4.5M higher than the adopted level due to the recognition of additional general purpose, and restricted/special programs revenues.

Growth revenues for general fund unrestricted revenues have been reduced from the \$5.5 million recorded at Adopted. This reflects that the attendance results for the year will most likely be less than our base level. In that case, stability funding is provided for the initial year of decline. Stability is a provision to fund a district at its base funding level plus COLA and any other base adjustments to which it is entitled. Once in stability, the District needs to report at least its base funding level in 2016-17 to avoid a reduction in funding. Other adjustments to unrestricted include moving the allocation for full-time faculty positions of \$2.8 million to the apportionment category from the Apprentice/Other General purpose category. This change partially offsets the reduction of growth revenues. In addition, the estimate for apprenticeship programs has been increased. Neither the final calculation for fiscal year 2014-15 nor the first principal apportionment (P1) for 2015-16 had been released as of February 9th. The P1 is based upon attendance reporting submitted Jan. 15th along with projected enrollment fee and property tax revenues. Typically, general fund revenues are adjusted based upon those two reports, including any funding shortfall (deficit). Any adjustments will be included in budget revision No. 2 which is scheduled for the June meeting. As usual, the District continues to operate at the X budget level.

STATUS:

Revisions to the adopted budget for the General Fund are necessary for the following reasons:

1. Schedule I summarizes changes to revenues, appropriations and fund balance for the general fund. Schedule II provides specific adjustments to restricted and special program revenues. Restricted revenues reflect new awards for Federal and State programs, as well as augmentations to existing programs for federal, state and local. The changes in appropriations reflect the allocation of those additional resources as well

as re-alignment across object codes as expenditure plans are formalized. The increase in committed fund balance is the set-aside from program development funds for future increases to STRS/PERS; and,

Revisions to other District funds due to:

- 2. Instructionally-Related Activities (Schedule III): Increases to revenue and appropriation of uncommitted fund balance.
- 3. Child Development (Schedule IV): Minor changes to State revenue. Appropriations reflect that change as well as additional resources from the general fund in support of the centers.
- 4. Capital Outlay Projects (Schedule V): Increase in State revenues in support of Prop. 39 (Clean Energy) projects. Increase in transfers from the general fund from the finalization of the allocation of program development funds.
- 5. Self Insurance (Schedule VI): Minor changes in funding and appropriations for dental program.
- 6. Regional Performing Arts Center Enterprise Funds (Schedule VII): Change to beginning fund balance to reflect actual ending balance for 2014-15; minor change in inter-fund transfers and appropriations.
- 7. Student Financial Aid (Schedule VIII): Increase in SEOG, State Awards for the Full Time Student Success Grant and State Categorical programs transferred from the General fund.
- 8. Student Associations Trust (Schedule IX): Changes in revenues as well as appropriation of fund balance.
- 9. Los Rios Foundation (Schedule X): Change in fund balance to reflect actual ending balance for 2014-15.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the 2015-16 Budget Revision № 1 for the General, Instructionally Related, Child Development, Capital Outlay Projects, Self Insurance, Regional Performing Arts Center, Student Financial Aid, Student Associations Trust, and Los Rios Foundation funds shown on the attached schedules, and that the related documents be filed with the County Superintendent of Schools.

BACKGROUND:

Since 1998, the District and Foundation adopted a Master Agreement whereby the Foundation became an auxiliary organization of the District. All college foundation investment activities were combined under the Los Rios Foundation. UBS Financial Services Inc. is the investment consultant for the Foundation.

As an auxiliary organization, the Foundation is not required to operate under GC 53600 investment restrictions. The Foundation Board has adopted a Statement of Rules, Objectives and Guidelines to govern the investment of funds. The funds should be invested with care, skill, prudence and diligence with the goal of producing returns equal to or exceeding prevailing standards among foundations of similar asset size, as well as for the protection of funds held in perpetual duration. The Statement defines the investment guidelines for specified asset classes for endowed funds as follows: equities, defined as common stock, convertible preferred stock, convertible bonds, and convertible stock, shall represent 15-70% of the total fund assets; fixed-income securities, defined as investments with maturities greater than one year that pay a fixed rate of return, shall represent 20-50% of the total assets; alternative investments, defined as fund-of-fund investments, shall represent up to 20% of the total fund assets; and cash, defined as maturities shorter than one year, shall represent 2-10% of the total fund assets. In addition, the Statement provides guidelines for investing non-endowed funds based upon the purpose of the donation and the horizon of time for the use of funds. The three non-endowed portfolio funds available are cash management, fixed income and balanced funds.

STATUS:

This report represents the investment activity for the quarter ended December 31, 2015. The investments are directed by the Los Rios Foundation Finance Committee and realized and unrealized earnings are shown in the accompanying schedules. The return for the endowed portfolio of \$7.5 million for the quarter ended December 31, 2015 was 2.94% compared to 3.19% for the composite benchmark. The yield for the quarter ended December 31, 2015 for the total managed portfolio of \$10.1 million is 2.27%. This compares to the composite benchmark of 2.40% for the same period. In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, investments are restated to market value as of each fiscal year-end.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees receive the Foundation Quarterly Investment Report for the quarter ended December 31, 2015.






Los Rios Foundation Account Summary as of December 31, 2015

BACKGROUND:

Board Policy 8431 calls for the Board of Trustees to approve the naming of college facilities and areas. Buildings and areas may be named in honor of friends, benefactors, corporations, or other appropriate legal entities who have made significant contributions to the College. Folsom Lake College opened its nine-court tennis complex in 2014 as Phase II of the college's Athletics Complex. Phase I, which included track and field as well as soccer, baseball, and softball fields, was dedicated in fall 2013. Phase II expanded the athletics complex with the addition of a tennis complex, cross country track, and interpretive trail. In June 2014, the Board of Trustees approved the naming of the main court of the tennis complex as the "Broadstone Racquet Club Center Court" in recognition of their past support as well as a financial contribution.

STATUS:

Mr. Matt Hunt, self-employed business owner of Global Floor Designs, Inc. of Diamond Springs, has a commitment to give back to the community in which he works and lives. Matt has three children that are actively engaged in sports and he supports their teams with financial contributions. Mr. Hunt understands the need for additional funding for community college intercollegiate teams to grow and thrive and has provided a generous donation of \$10,000 to name court 2 of the FLC Tennis Complex as "Global Floor Designs Incorporated Court 2."

Consistent with LRCCD P-8431, the College President has consulted with the Academic Senate, Classified Senate, Student Body Association, and Deputy Vice Chancellor. As all constituencies were in support of this naming opportunity, the recommendation was then forwarded to the Chancellor for consideration by the Board.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the naming of Court 2 of the Folsom Lake Tennis Complex as "Global Floor Designs Incorporated Court 2."

BACKGROUND:

Board Policy 8431 calls for the Board of Trustees to approve the naming of college facilities and areas. Buildings and areas may be named in honor of friends, benefactors, corporations, or other appropriate legal entities who have made significant contributions to the College. Folsom Lake College opened its nine-court tennis complex in 2014 as Phase II of the college's Athletics Complex. Phase I, which included track and field as well as soccer, baseball, and softball fields, was dedicated in fall 2013. Phase II expanded the athletics complex with the addition of a tennis complex, cross country track, and interpretive trail. In June 2014, the Board of Trustees approved the naming of the main court of the tennis complex as the "Broadstone Racquet Club Center Court" in recognition of their past support as well as a financial contribution.

STATUS:

Ms. Jeanine Neves believes in investing in the community colleges and recognizes the impact that philanthropic donations can have on college programs. She attended community college, and her daughter currently attends Folsom Lake College and is a member of the FLC tennis team, planning on transferring to CSUS. Ms. Neves is retiring after 28 years in healthcare with the California Department of Correction's Folsom Women's Facility and owns A.N.G. Home Health Care in Folsom. Ms. Neves has provided a generous donation of \$5,000 to name court 5 of the FLC Tennis Complex as "A.N.G. Home Health Care Court 5."

Consistent with LRCCD P-8431, the College President has consulted with the Academic Senate, Classified Senate, Student Body Association, and Deputy Vice Chancellor. As all constituencies were in support of this naming opportunity, the recommendation was then forwarded to the Chancellor for consideration by the Board.

BACKGROUND:

The Education Code regulates the procedures by which a community college district can dispose of real and personal property. Education Code section 81452 provides that the Board of Trustees may, by unanimous vote, dispose of items valued at \$5,000 or less by private sale without advertising or selling the items at public auction. The District has held previous auctions but they have generally cost more than they have netted for the District. In 1998, the District began transferring such surplus items to the State of California since the cost to store and sell such surplus items is greater than potential revenues.

STATUS:

The District has a quantity of surplus materials that need to be disposed, such as outdated desks and computers. The State of California has accepted some of the surplus items but will not take surplus items deemed unsaleable. The District has located a scrap dealer who will take the remaining surplus items for recycling.

BACKGROUND:

Each year at their May meeting, the Board of Governors of California Community Colleges honor classified employees who demonstrate the highest level of commitment to professionalism and community colleges. Recipients are nominated by their colleagues and endorsed by the local Board of Trustees. Award winners are selected by representatives of the Community Colleges Board of Governors, Chancellor's Office, and the Foundation for California Community Colleges.

STATUS:

Each local Board of Trustees may forward to the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office the name of one nominee for the Community College Classified Employee of the Year Award. This year the District is recommending the nomination of Kim Goff, Admissions and Records Supervisor, at Sacramento City College.

Kim attended SCC as a student. She has served in multiple capacities at the Public Safety Center, Clerk and Administrative Assistant in the Behavioral and Social Sciences Division, worked with Veterans and was promoted to the Supervisor in Admissions and Records position in 2002.

Ms. Goff is known for her strong work ethic, dedication, initiative, and leadership both at the college, district and statewide level. She is a resource for classified matters with the District Human Resources Office. She is also a resource for District General Counsel for Title V, District policy and regulation matters, FERPA, subpoenas, and providing expert testimony as requested. In addition, she currently serves as the SCC representative for the Los Rios Supervisor's Association.

Kim consistently goes above and beyond in all areas. BACKGROUND:

The Cosumnes River College swimming pool was constructed in 1970. An emergency repair was required to rebuild the original pump that is obsolete. The pump that failed is no longer manufactured. While the District's scheduled maintenance and special repairs funds, allow for the replacement and improvement of such systems, catastrophic failure occur sporadically in these aging systems prior to their scheduled replacement. The continuous operation of the pump is required by State regulations to assure health and safety of all those who use the pool facility. The emergency repair was needed for instructional purposes.

STATUS:

Public Contract Code section 20654 authorizes emergency work without advertising for or inviting bids when repairs are necessary to permit the continuance of existing college classes or to avoid danger to life or property. This code section requires unanimous approval by the Board of Trustees. If approved, the award is then sent to the County Superintendent of Schools for approval as well. The District engaged Commercial Pump Service Inc. to complete emergency repairs between December 2015 through February 1, 2016. Those repairs have been completed and the system is operational at this time.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that, by unanimous vote, the Board of Trustees ratify the emergency repairs by Commercial Pump Service Inc. in the amount of \$21,134.57 for the Cosumnes River College swimming pool pump.

BACKGROUND:

To further support the academic needs of our students, Folsom Lake College offers learning skills programs at the main campus, El Dorado Center, and the Rancho Cordova Center. Programs include scheduled, drop-in, and online tutoring at all three sites as well as the Science Skills Center, Science Shop, SOAR Central, and Math Boot Camp at the main campus.

The learning skills programs have been expanded this year to include a new Student Athlete Success Center at the main campus and an English as a Second Language (ESL) Peer Mentor program at the Rancho Cordova Center. These programs have been designed to increase student success for specific student populations within an environment of collaboration and personal growth, and provide leadership opportunities for student tutors through service as a peer tutor.

STATUS:

Learning Skills faculty, staff, and students will present an overview of the new Student Athlete Success Center and the ESL Peer Mentor program, including student success data and the impact on underrepresented students as well as those from diverse backgrounds. Alignment with the District and College's Strategic Plans, as well as the Folsom Lake College Student Equity Plan, will also be highlighted.
