Chancellor's Report:

ARC: American River College's Respiratory Care program is among a select group of programs recognized by the Commission on Accreditation for Respiratory Care (CoARC) to receive the Distinguished RRT Credentialing Success Award. The Commission views the RRT credential as a measure of a program's success in inspiring its graduates to achieve their highest educational and professional aspirations. This is the second consecutive year ARC's program has been recognized.

<u>CRC</u>: Cosumnes River College has been notified that it has been awarded a state grant that will allow CRC to transform how instruction in basic skills is delivered, with a goal of increasing access and success for more students. CRC requested \$1.5 million. Through the basic skills initiative, instruction at the college will be completely and thoroughly enhanced by transforming how, where and when basic skills students are taught. Many CRC faculty, staff and administrators were instrumental in the writing and preparation of this grant. In all, 85 California community colleges applied for funding, and 43 – including Sacramento City College – were awarded some level of funding. Precise dollar amounts are pending BOG approval.

<u>FLC:</u> Folsom Lake College's Work Experience & Internship Program was named the "College Program of the Year" for two-year colleges by the California Internship & Work Experience Association (CIWEA). FLC's program, under the guidance of coordinator Julie Collier, was recognized at a special luncheon during the annual CIWEA conference held in San Diego on April 7. Highlights for the program during the past academic year included hosting the college's first large-scale Career Fair, a successful partnership with Dignity Health's Mercy Hospital of Folsom placing students as volunteer staff in the hospital's emergency department, and serving as one of 10 pilot schools for "New World of Work" that incorporates soft skills training into Work Experience courses.

SCC: Sacramento City College has been awarded the 2016 Yolo County Excellence in Education Award in Program Excellence for the "Kinders Go to College" event at the SCC West Sacramento Center. This is a new program that began in May 2015 in partnership with the Washington Unified School District, city of West Sacramento and Yolo County Office of Education. It focuses on hosting the entire kindergarten class and parents from one elementary school in the district. The goal is to expose children early on to the concept of college by bringing them to a campus. Each kindergartener has the opportunity to rotate through several activity workshops on topics including nutrition, nursing, the environment and recycling, art, law enforcement, and the library. The model also engages middle and high school students by assigning them as "mentors" to the kindergarteners. Mentors are asked to guide the younger children throughout the day by helping them with the activities and answering their questions. This year's Kinders Go to College event is next Friday, May 20, 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

BACKGROUND:

Currently, the District has no formal policies recognizing Emeriti faculty, staff, and administrators or the Emeriti Associations at the four colleges.

STATUS:

New board policies are proposed to identify who qualifies to be an Emerita or Emeritus of the colleges and sets forth the requirements to join the Emeriti Associations at each of the four colleges.

Emerita and Emeritus status is an honorary title awarded for distinguished service to the academic community. To qualify, a faculty, staff, or administrator must have worked for the college or District for at least five years and have retired or left the college or District in good standing.

To join the Emeriti Association, the applicant must fill out an application and pay the membership fee for the Association. Benefits of the Emeriti Association include the use of an email account, library access, parking privileges, a membership card, complimentary or discounted admission to college/District events at the discretion of the event sponsor, and use of college computer resources.

Additionally, since the first reading of these proposed policies by the Board of Trustees, a clarification was made in section 3.2 that clarifies that the eligibility requirements to join the association are both those listed in sections 1.0 and 2.0 of the policies.

1.0 Policy on Emerita and Emeritus Status

- 1.1 Emerita/Emeritus status is an honorary title awarded for distinguished service to the academic community. The Los Rios Community College District Chancellor or College President may bestow the title on a faculty member, classified staff member or administrator who is entering retirement or permanently severing his or her employment relationship with the District and meets the eligibility criteria below. The bestowal of Emerita/Emeritus status is a distinctive honor, not a right.
- 1.2 Emerita/Emeritus may join his or her College Emeriti Association and obtain the benefits designated by this District Policy.

2.0 Eligibility

- 2.1 Emerita/Emeritus status is limited to tenured faculty members, adjunct faculty members, regular classified staff members or administrators who meet all of the following criteria:
 - 2.1.1 Have been employed by the College/District for at least five (5) years; and
 - 2.1.2 Retired or resigned from their employment with the District (adjunct faculty members may submit a letter stating that they intend to no longer seek further employment with the College/District [hereafter separation]); and
 - 2.1.3 Upon resignation, retirement, or separation are in good standing with no disciplinary issues outstanding.

3.0 Procedures for Joining the College Emeriti Association

- 3.1 Upon the resignation, retirement or separation, the person seeking to join the Emeriti Association shall submit an application for membership in the College's Emeriti Association.
- 3.2 If the person meets the eligibility requirements of Sections 1.0 and 2.0 above and submits the required fee, he or she shall be a member of the Emeriti Association at the College.
- 3.3 To maintain Emeriti Association Membership, the Emerita/Emeritus must submit the required fee to the College's Emeriti Association.

4.0 Benefits for Emeriti Association Member

Separation 2 of 2

- 4.1 As a member of the College Emeriti Association, a faculty member, classified staff member or administrator qualifies for the following benefits from the Colleges/District:
 - 4.1.1 Use of a District email account;
 - 4.1.2 Access to the College/District libraries with checkout privileges and access to databases when allowed by vendor licenses;
 - 4.1.3 A Emerita/Emeritus parking permit good for parking at the College where he or she is a member of the Emeriti Association;
 - 4.1.4 A Emerita/Emeritus membership card;
 - 4.1.5 Complimentary or discounted admission to College/District athletic and cultural events at the discretion of the sponsoring group; and
 - 4.1.6 Use of college computer resources at the College.

5.0 Revocation

5.1 The College Presidents are authorized to revoke Emerita/Emeritus status in their absolute discretion at any time.

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LRCCD

BACKGROUND:

In April 2015, the Board of Trustees amended the board policies to provide individualized consideration of employment applicants possessing felony convictions due to Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) guidance. The EEOC concludes that a blanket exclusion of applicants from employment due to felony convictions has a disproportionate impact on persons of color and is therefore discriminatory. To avoid a claim of discrimination, each applicant that has a felony conviction must be reviewed to determine if exclusion of the applicant from employment is job-related and consistent with business necessity. This requires reviewing the nature of the conviction, the time since the person was convicted, and the nature of the job sought.

STATUS:

The proposed policy changes add the same individualized consideration given to persons with felony convictions to persons with the drug and sex crime convictions identified in the Education Code. The changes allow the District to consider persons with certain controlled substance or sexual offenses to be hired or retained if the person demonstrates he or she has been rehabilitated for five years or has been pardoned. In the accompanying regulations, the Board of Trustees will use the same analysis recently enacted for those with felony convictions (nature of crime, date of conviction, and nature of position sought) to make the determination as to whether an employee has been rehabilitated. The policies delegate the authority to make that determination to the Chancellor, who shall develop the administrative regulations to carry out this policy.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the proposed revisions to the attached policies.

BACKGROUND:

The Sacramento Area Flood Control Agency (SAFCA) operates and maintains the levees and flood control projects that surround and protect the greater Sacramento region. According to SAFCA, they must complete a number of projects to provide all of the Sacramento region 100-year flood protection as quickly as possible, meet the state's 200-year flood protection requirements by 2025, and improve the resiliency and structural integrity of the flood control system to provide more than 200-year protection over time. These projects will require an estimated \$1.2 billion more than was anticipated in 2007, of which \$371 million must come from local property owners. As a result, SAFCA has proposed creating a new assessment district to replace the current assessment district.

STATUS:

For the Los Rios Community College District properties (excluding Sacramento City College), the total of the District's current SAFCA assessments is \$8,099.74. If the new SAFCA assessment district is approved, the total of those assessments is projected to increase to \$9,309.37.

Currently, according to SAFCA, the Sacramento City College property has been significantly under-assessed because of an error in the calculation of square footage of SCC since 2007 (SAFCA incorrectly assessed SCC as having zero square feet of buildings). Even without the approval of a new SAFCA assessment district, SCC's assessment will increase from its current level of \$3,942 to approximately \$45,000. If the new SAFCA assessment district is approved, SCC's assessment will increase from \$3,942 to a proposed amount of \$51,006. With the correction of the SCC error and approval of the new SAFCA assessment district, the District's assessments will increase from \$12,041 to \$60,316.30.

A sample copy of the official ballot is attached. A public hearing has been scheduled for Monday, June 13, 2016 for SAFCA to consider this proposal.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees support the proposed assessment of District property and authorize the Chancellor or his designee to sign and submit the official ballots to the agency.

The teaching staff and supervisors from each of the Los Rios Community College Child Development Centers, American River College, Cosumnes River College and Sacramento City College completed each of the required instruments during the 2015-16 fiscal year.

Supervisors met with their respective teaching staff in August 2015 to review findings from the 2014-15 Program Self Evaluation and planned accordingly.

Each site (ARC, CRC, SCC) gathered data throughout the 2015-16 fiscal year to develop program action plans based on the findings from the Program Review Instrument, Desired Results Parent Survey, Age Appropriate Environment Rating Scale and Desired Results Developmental Profile.

Each site supervisor met with their teaching staff the week of August 17, 2015 and again the week of January 11, 2016 to review the group reports from the Desired Results Development Profiles. Findings were used in planning both group and individual activities to guide children's continued development and growth. An agency training to address part

of the DRDP summary of findings from 2014-15 was provided to all teaching staff at Sacramento City College on January 14, 2016.

The Site Supervisors, with input from agency director Laurie Perry, met May 31, 2016 to review agency findings to complete the PSE for 2015-16. Data from each of the instruments was aggregated from the respective sites to determine areas that both met and did not meet standards. An action plan was developed based on the agency findings.

Our Desired Results Developmental Profile group reports showed 92% of children were at the developmental level of building earlier or higher in History-Social Science. Specifically, one-third of children in our centers rated at Building Middle. Within History-Social Science, our children rated particularly low in the two measures Conflict Negotiation and Responsible Conduct as a Group Member.

Environment Rating Scales also showed that staff responses to children need to be more consistent, with staff interactions with children rating below at 4.0 at one classroom at Sacramento City College. Modeling language-rich conversations encouraging children to expand ideas and plans is one suggestion from ECRS findings.

Parent survey results show that the majority of families would like more information on parenting skills as well as community resources. Specifically, 32% of families at American River College responded in the negative to receiving information on community services; 68% of Sacramento City College families and 27% of Cosumnes River College families.

We will be addressing this throughout the 2016/2017 school year. First, we will hold an agency-wide training in August 2016 to address conflict negotiation and conduct in a group in preschoolers. Agency Director Laurie Perry will provide teachers with current research and updated skills in this area. Second, each site will follow-up with teaching teams throughout the fall semester and coordinate a follow-up discussion in January 2017. Supervisors will hold at least one event for parents and staff to attend which will provide information on how families can increase social skills for young children and what community resources is available in this area.

 Provide a summary of areas that met standards and a summary of procedures for ongoing monitoring to ensure that those areas continue to meet standards. Environment Rating Scales illustrated how rich and complex environments are at every site. Math, literacy and science are evident throughout every classroom. Teachers consistently bring in natural materials for children to explore. DRDP results show the majority of children at Building Later or Integrating Earlier for Literacy Development, Mathematics and Science. Agency-wide, over 80% of families are satisfied with equipment and materials. All families surveyed were satisfied with the environment provided.

Supervisors will continue to encourage teaching teams by complimenting engaging activities and allowing staff time and resources to create successful environments. When meeting as a team to plan curriculum, teaching teams will use the environment as a tool to gather evidence for Desired Results assessments.

BACKGROUND:

The State Chancellor's Office has a prescribed capital outlay process and calendar for requesting State funds for capital outlay projects. Each year, the District must file a Five Year Construction Plan which lists all proposed projects, whether State-funded or not. Additionally, Final Project Proposals (FPPs) to request State funding for projects listed in the Five Year Construction Plan are also to be submitted with the Five Year Construction Plan. The deadline for submission of the five year plan and any FPPs is July 1.

Although a project may qualify for State bond funding, all districts compete with each other for the limited funds available. There is currently a multi-billion dollar backlog of funding requests for capital projects on file with the State. Facility capacity/load ratios (enrollment growth) and the amount of local funds a district contributes are key factors in the State's prioritization for funding capital projects. The District considers these criteria in selecting which FPPs to submit to ensure our projects will be competitive. An additional criterion is that the State only allows one project per college or center to be submitted in a given year. However, if the college or center will have a project funded for the upcoming year, then it must wait one year before submitting its next project. Only the Natomas Center is currently approved for funding, so all our other colleges and centers are eligible to submit or re-submit projects.

STATUS:

The draft Five Year Construction Plan and the four FPPs were presented to the Board of Trustees as a first reading on May 11, 2016. The attached executive summary describes the Five Year Construction Plan and FPPs.

The four FPPs for submission this year are: American River College, Technical Education Building Modernization; Elk Grove Center, Phase 2 Building; Folsom Lake College, Instructional Building Phase 2.1; and Sacramento City College, Lillard Hall Modernization.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the Five Year Construction Plan and FPPs and supporting Resolution No. 2016-08 for submission to the State on July 1, 2016.

State Five Year Construction Plan And Final Project Proposals

Executive Summary

State Five Year Construction Plan:

The basic intent and purpose of the Plan is to analyze enrollment forecasts and determine the amount and type of spaces that will be needed to meet increases in enrollment and changes in the educational program. The Plan is used to determine overall estimated costs and identify possible funding sources.

The major components of the Plan are: Forecasted student load (enrollment/WSCH), facilities capacity to handle load, proposed new space, proposed modernizations and possible funding sources. The first three components are compiled into "capacity/load ratios". Capacity load ratios represent, as a percentage, the facility capacity to handle forecasted student load (or demand). These ratios are the primary tool used by the State to determine which projects will be approved. Also the State uses a priority system resulting in districts competing against each other to offer the State the least cost alternative. Because of this many of the projects have a local contribution indicated. The local contribution is included to make our projects more competitive for scarce State funding.

This year's State Five Year Construction Plan lists 21 projects, comprised mainly of new construction projects and modernization projects.

Possible Sequencing of State Funded Projects

The State has not had a bond measure on the ballot for several years. This has caused a multiyear delay in the funding schedule for FPPs. A bond will be on the November 2016 ballot. If approved by the voters, then the funding schedule for Los Rios FPPs could be as follows:

FPPs previously submitted and scheduled for 2017-18 State funding

ARC Natomas Center Phase 2 & 3

FPPs to be submitted this year for potential State funding in 2018-19

- ARC Technical Education Building Modernization
- CRC Elk Grove Center Phase 2
- FLC Instructional Building Phase 2.1
- SCC Lillard Hall Modernization

Following is a brief Description of these FPPs:

ARC Natomas Center Phase 2 and 3 This project combines Phase 2 and 3 into one project and will provide approximately 35,400 ASF of new instructional and related support space at Natomas Center. This new building will be connected to the existing Phase 1 building at Natomas. The estimated total cost of this project is \$37,573,000. The total request for State funding is \$26,271,000 for portions of the Preliminary Plans, Working Drawings and Construction of this project. Los Rios is proposing to fund the remaining cost of this project, to include portions of the Preliminary plans, Working drawings and Construction and all of the Equipment; for a total District contribution of \$11,266,000.

ARC Technology Building Modernization This project will modernize, by replacing, the existing Technology building. The current use of the building, primarily Automotive, Welding and Electronics will remain the same in the new modernized building. The size of the new building will be 60,552 ASF by incorporating the space from several portable buildings adjacent to the Technology building that will be removed as part of this project. The estimated total cost of this project is \$44,576,775. The total request for State funding is \$22,539,057 for portions of the preliminary plans, working drawings and construction of this project. Los Rios is proposing to fund the remaining portion of the preliminary plans, working drawings, construction and all of the equipment, totaling \$22,037,718.

CRC Elk Grove Center Phase 2 This project will construct the second phase of the new educational center in Elk Grove. It will provide 15,200 ASF of instructional, office and related spaces in a new multi-story building near the current Phase 1 building. The estimated total cost of this project is \$13,241,734. The total request for State funding is \$6,753,821 for portions of the preliminary plans, working drawings and construction of this project. Los Rios is proposing to fund the remaining portion of the preliminary plans, working drawings, construction and all of the equipment, totaling \$6,487,913.

<u>FLC Phase 2.1 Instructional Buildings</u> This project will provide new science instructional space for Folsom Lake College. The project adds 48,900 ASF of instructional, office and related spaces in a new multi-story science building near the front of the campus. The estimated total cost of this project is \$45,933,830. The total request for State funding is \$23,417,222 for portions of the preliminary plans, working drawings and construction of this project. Los Rios is proposing to fund the remaining portions of the preliminary plans, working drawings and construction costs and the entire equipment cost, totaling \$22,516,608.

<u>SCC Lillard Hall Modernization</u> This project will modernize the existing Lillard Hall science building. The current use of the building, primarily chemistry and biology will remain the same in the new modernized building. The size of both the current and planned building is 28,230 ASF. The estimated total cost of this project is \$18,260,358. The request for State funding is \$9,135,217 for portions of the preliminary plans, working drawings and construction of this project. Los Rios is proposing to fund the remaining portion of the preliminary plans, working drawings, construction and all of the equipment, totaling \$9,125,141.

BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to Article XIII-B of the Constitution and Government Code Section 7900, all community college districts are required to compute an annual appropriation limit. That appropriation limit is adjusted annually for changes in price index, population, and other applicable factors. This requirement is also known as the Gann Limit.

Staff has calculated the 2016-17 appropriation limit as specified in the Government Code Section 7908. The calculated spending limit is \$376,592,579. The District's 2016-17 appropriations subject to this limit are calculated at \$273,502,052, which indicates that the District's tentative budget is \$103,090,527 below its appropriation limit. For 2015-16 the District's appropriations subject to the limit were \$88,205,720 below the appropriation limit of \$357,471,683.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the appropriation limitation of \$376,592,579 for 2016-17 by adopting the attached Resolution No. 2016-09.

BACKGROUND:

On September 9, 2015, the Governing Board adopted the 2015-16 maximum funding level (Z Budget) for the General Fund. The Board approved budget revision #1 on February 17, 2016. The attached Schedule I details further modifications to this funding level since the first revision. General Fund revenues and appropriations are budgeted \$10.7M higher comprised of \$1.54M in additional general purpose revenues and transfers, and additional categorical revenues of \$9.12M.

The final funding calculation for the 2014-15 year was received following budget revision #1. The District was funded for just \$16,565 less in restoration (growth) than had been anticipated. The good news is that we were fully funded (no deficit) for 2014-15. We had closed the records projecting a shortfall of \$828,973. In addition to that adjustment, the 2014-15 year resulted in the system as a whole having an apportionment revenue excess of \$15 million due to property taxes exceeding the budgeted level. The funds were distributed based upon FTES resulting in \$731,921 for the District as a one-time resource paid this year. Those two adjustments account for most of the change in unrestricted general fund revenues shown on schedule I.

For 2015-16, the first principal apportionment (P1) resulted in funding close to the District's X budget. The difference between P1 and X budget is the deficit factor. For the X budget, the projection is a deficit factor of 0.5% and the shortfall at P1 is 1.2%. It is typical that the P1 deficit is larger than the final due to counties conservatively forecasting property tax revenues. The second principal apportionment (P2) issued in late June will provide a more accurate picture as far as enrollment fees and property tax revenues as well as the Chancellor's Office's projections of what the deficit may be when the 2015-16 calculation is finalized in February 2017.

The restricted and special programs revenue changes are detailed in schedule II. The largest changes since February are the recognition of the U.S. Department of Labor grant and the finalization of the Student Success and Support funding for the 2015-16 year.

STATUS:

Revisions to the adopted budget for the General Fund are necessary for the following reasons:

1. Adjustments to general purpose and restricted/special programs as described above (Schedules I and II) including recognition of augmentations and new awards for restricted programs and re-alignment across major object codes as expenditure plans are finalized and,

Revisions to other District funds due to:

- 2. Instructionally-Related Activities (Schedule III): Increase in transfer from Bookstore fund; Increase in transfer out to general fund, increase in projected ending fund balance.
- 3. Child Development (Schedule IV): Revenue changes to reduce projected state contract earnings and increase to fees and adjustments to appropriations.
- 4. Capital Outlay Projects (Schedule V): A revenue line item had been established in the event of a property sale that will not transpire this year resulting in a \$4 million change and corresponding reduction in appropriations. Increase in transfers from general fund.
- 5. Self-Insurance (Schedule VI): Increase in self-funded dental program.
- 6. Bookstore (Schedule VII): Increase in projected expenses and transfer to Instructionally Related Activities. Decrease in projected ending fund balance.
- 7. Regional Performing Arts (Harris) Center (Schedule VIII): Reduction in revenues and expenditures reflective of programming changes. Small decrease in projected ending fund balance.
- 8. Student Financial Aid (Schedule IX): Increase in inter-fund transfer from restricted general fund for student aid, such as book vouchers, supported by State categorical programs.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the 2015-16 Budget Revision № 2 for the General, Instructionally Related, Child Development, Capital Outlay Projects, Self-Insurance, Bookstore, Regional Performing Arts (Harris) Center, and the Student Financial Aid Funds shown on the attached schedules, and that the related documents be filed with the County Superintendent of Schools.

BACKGROUND:

The Education Code regulates the procedures by which a community college district can dispose of real and personal property. Education Code section 81452 provides that the Board of Trustees may, by unanimous vote, dispose of items valued at \$5,000 or less by private sale without advertising or selling the items at public auction. The District has held previous auctions but they have generally cost more than they have netted for the District. In 1998, the District began transferring such surplus items to the State of California since the cost to store and sell such surplus items is greater than potential revenues.

STATUS:

The District has a quantity of surplus materials that need to be disposed, such as outdated desks and computers. The State of California has accepted some of the surplus items but will not take surplus items deemed unsaleable. The District has located a scrap dealer who will take the remaining surplus items for recycling.

The surplus items to be disposed of are either irreparable, obsolete, in poor condition, or not needed for district/college operations and include the following: 4 amplifiers; 1 audio station; 1 audio visual box; 1 battery; 1 board; 22 brackets; 2 cabinets; 6 cables; 14 cards; 1 cart; 17 chairs; 1 clock; 1 coffee maker; 78 computers; 2 data transfer units; 1 desk; 12 disk drives; 1 drawer; 4 drives; 7 electrodes; 7 faceplates; 5 fax machines; 2 file racks; 1 film-to-video converter; 6 folder organizers; 8 graphic projectors; 1 hard drive; 2 heating elements; 3 heating pads; 1 incubator; 1 injection system; 1 investment machine; 11 keyboards; 3 kilns; 1 lamp; 3 laptops; 1 box of lenses; 1 mantle; 2 microscopes; 29 misc computer parts; 6 modem cards; 34 monitors; 1 monitor shield; 5 mouses; 1 PH meter; 1 box Physics parts; 3 pickle pots; 1 box of pipets; 1 pipette; 5 printers; 8 projectors; 1 rack; 7 safety shields; 1 scale; 2 scanners; 1 Scantron machine; 1 slide projector; 1 spectrometer; 1 stamp; 1 stand; 31 tapes; 2 televisions; 1 vacuum jar; 3 vials and 1 whiteboard. These items have a value of less than \$5,000.

BACKGROUND:

As part of the continuing review of the District's policies and administrative regulations by the Vice Chancellors, this policy on auxiliary organizations required some minor changes.

STATUS:

Section 10.3.2 has been amended to clarify that the annual audited statements of financial conditions for auxiliary organizations that primarily serve the Board of Trustees (i.e. the Los Rios Foundation) must be presented to the Board at a board meeting (which is the current practice). College-serving auxiliaries (which the District currently does not have) would be required to publish notice about the existence and availability of those statements in the college newspaper or college bulletin. Sections 9.3 and 11.2.12 have been updated with the correct Education Code references, and section 10.3 reflects a change in the name of the California Community College Auxiliary Organization Accounting Reporting Manual. Additionally, a handful of nonsubstantive formatting changes have been made to the policy.

RECOMMENDATION:

This policy is presented for first reading.

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1.0 Recognition and Establishment-

- 1.1 Recognition of the establishment of an auxiliary organization by the Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees pursuant to Education Code, Section section 72672(c) and California Code of Regulations, Title 5, Sections sections 59255 et seq. shall require:
 - 1.1.1 That a recommendation is submitted to the Board of Trustees by the Chancellor:
 - 1.1.2 A public hearing on the recommendation;
 - 1.1.3 Approval of the establishment of the auxiliary organization by the Board of Trustees, including a designation of the recognized services, programs and functions, and an identification of the number and categories of members of the Board of Directors of the organization; and
 - A written agreement between the Los Rios Community College District and the organization specifying which functions described in California Code of Regulations, Title 5, Section 59259 are to be performed.

2.0 Recognized Services, Programs, and Functions-

- 2.1 Organizations may be established for provision of support services and specialized programs for the benefit of the Los Rios Community College District or any of the programs of the Los Rios Community College District.- Services, programs, and functions which may be undertaken by auxiliary organizations include:
 - 2.1.1 Student association or organization activities;
 - 2.1.2 Alumni activities;
 - 2.1.3 Gifts, bequests, devises, endowments, and trusts;
 - 2.1.4 Public relations programs.
- 2.2 No organization shall be authorized to engage in any other function unless the Board of Governors amends Section section 59259 of Title 5 by adding said function to the list of approved functions of auxiliary organizations; or unless said function is essential to satisfy the nonprofit corporation or tax laws of the State of California or the Federal tax laws.
 - 2.2.1 In accordance with Education Code, Section section 72671, functions may be performed by an auxiliary organization as part of a joint powers agreement with any Federal, State, or local government entity pursuant to Article 1 (commencing with Section section 6500) of Chapter 5 of Division 7 of Title 1 of the Government Code.

3.0 Composition of Board of Directors-

- 3.1 The Board of Directors of each auxiliary organization shall have the following composition:
 - 3.1.1 Student Associations or Organizations.

The Board of Directors shall consist of students. -The District Chancellor may attend and participate in meetings of the Board of Directors in order to advise on policy and to provide for the control and regulation required by Education Code, sSection 76060.

3.1.2 Other Auxiliary Organizations-

Any other organization established pursuant to Section 72670 et seq of the Education Code shall have a Board of Directors as specified by the organization's Articles of Incorporation or Bylaws and consisting of voting membership from at least one of the following categories:

- a. Administration and staff;
- b. Faculty;
- c. Members of the community;
- d. Students.
- 3.1.3 Size of Board of Directors.

The size of the Board of Directors shall be determined by the Bylaws or Articles of Incorporation of the organization.

3.1.4 Professional Assistance.

Each organization formed pursuant to Section 72670 et seq of the Education Code shall have the benefit of the advice and counsel of at least one attorney admitted to practice in this State and at least one licensed certified public accountant; however, neither the attorney nor the certified public accountant need be a member of the Board of Directors.

4.0 Business Meetings.

- 4.1 The Board of Directors of each auxiliary organization shall conduct business in public meetings in accordance with Section 54950 <u>et seq</u> of the Government Code; and shall, during each fiscal year, hold at least one business meeting each quarter.
- 5.0 Salaries, Working Conditions, and Benefits of Full-time Employees.
 - 5.1 Except as otherwise provided in this Section section 5, the Board of Directors of each organization shall, pursuant to Education Code, Section section 72672(c),

provide salaries, working conditions, and benefits for its full-time employees comparable to those provided District employees performing similar services.- For full-time employees whose duties are not comparable to classes in the District, salaries shall be at least equal to salaries prevailing in other area educational institutions or commercial operations of like nature.- The organization may withhold retirement benefits or permanent status benefits or both from temporary employees. For the purposes of this Sectionsection, a temporary employee is:

- An employee for a research project, workshop, institute, or other special project funded by any grant, contract, or gift;
- An employee whose contract is for a fixed term not exceeding three years. b.
- 5.2 The Board of Directors of each organization may withhold permanent status and benefits from executive employees.- For the purposes of this Sectionsection, an executive employee is any management employee with responsibility for the development and execution of auxiliary organization policy and includes, but is not limited to, general managers, managers, directors, etc., as determined by the Board of Directors of each organization.
- 5.3 Should retirement benefits be provided, they may but need not be provided by the Public Employees' Retirement System.- A newly created organization is exempted from the requirement of providing retirement benefits for three years from the date on which the Board of Trustees recognizes the establishment of such organization.

6.0 Expenditures and Appropriations-

6.1 The Board of Directors of an auxiliary organization shall approve expenditure authorizations.- Appropriations of funds for use outside of normal business operations of the organization shall be approved in accordance with regulations and policies of the State Chancellor and District Board of Trustees.

7.0 Accounting and reporting Reporting.

- 7.1 The Board of Directors of an auxiliary organization except those exempted in Section section 72673 of the Education Code, shall:
 - 7.1.1 Utilize standard accounting and reporting systems established by the State Chancellor.
 - 7.1.2 Implement financial standards to assure fiscal viability of auxiliary organizations.- Standards shall include provisions for professional management, adequate working capital, adequate reserve funds for current operations, capital replacements, contingencies and adequate provisions for new business requirements. Organizations shall submit programs and budgets for review by the District Chancellor.- If the Chancellor determines that a program or appropriation planned by an organization violates District policy, the program or appropriation shall not be implemented.- Programs and appropriations shall be reviewed for

compliance with policies of the Board of Governors and the District.

Non-complying programs or appropriations shall be discontinued at the direction of the Chancellor.

7.1.3 The District Chancellor shall submit organization programs and budgets to the State Chancellor.

8.0 <u>Funds</u>-

- 8.1 Funds of Student Auxiliary Organizations.
 - 8.1.1 Money collected by or on behalf of a student body auxiliary organization, except money collected from commercial services, shall be deposited in trust by the chief fiscal officer of the District.- Funds of student auxiliary organizations shall, subject to the Chancellor's approval and approval of the organization's financial officer, be deposited or invested, pursuant to Sections sections 76063 and 76064 of the Education Code.
 - 8.1.2 The chief fiscal officer of the District shall be the custodian of unexpended funds and money collected by or on behalf of a student body auxiliary organization and shall provide accounting records and controls for such funds.- Funds may be expended by the custodian upon the submission of any appropriate claim schedule by officers of the organization.
- 8.2 Trust funds shall be used for the purpose designated in the trust instrument.
- 8.3 An organization's funds shall be used for purposes consistent with District **P**policy, and shall not be used:
 - a. To support or oppose candidates for public office, or to support or oppose any issue before the voters of this State or any subdivision thereof, except where the organization determines that an issue will have a direct benefit on education.
 - b. To make personal loans for non-educationally related purposes, except when specifically authorized by a trust instrument under which the funds were received.
- 8.4 An indemnity bond shall be obtained by organizations for fiscal officers who are responsible for handling funds.
- 8.5 Grants, bequests, trusts, donations and gifts accepted by an organization shall be maintained in accordance with the State Chancellor's policies and regulations.
- 8.6 Funds derived by an organization from indirect cost payments which are not needed to provide adequate working capital, reserve funds for current operations, capital replacements, contingencies and adequate provisions for new business requirements shall be appropriated according to District policy; and regularly reported to the

Board of Trustees by the District Chancellor.

8.7 No funds or resources, except those derived from gifts or bequests, shall be transferred by the District, or by any program within the District, to any organization for the purpose of either avoiding laws or regulations which constrain community college districts or providing the District with an unfair advantage with respect to the application of any State funding mechanism. -State funding mechanisms include, but are not limited to, general apportionment funding, capital outlay funding, Extended Opportunity Programs and Services funding, and funding for programs and services for disabled students.

9.0 Authority and Responsibility of Auxiliary Organizations-

- 9.1 Organizations shall not offer courses or programs for which State funding is received.
- 9.2 Services, programs and activities undertaken by organizations shall be maintained for the general benefit of the education program of the District.- Upon Board of Trustees approval, an organization may assume any of the services, programs and activities listed in Section 2 of these regulations in order:
 - To provide fiscal means and management procedures that allow the a. District to carry on educationally related activities not normally funded by the State:
 - To provide effective operation and to eliminate undue difficulty arising b. from governmental budgetary, purchasing and other fiscal controls;
 - To provide fiscal procedures allowing coordination of the auxiliary c. activities with the District in accordance with sound business practice.
- 9.3 The District Chancellor shall decide whether a donor's proposed unallocated gift to the District should be accepted by the District or referred to an auxiliary organization. Gifts to the District shall be accepted pursuant to Education Code, Section section 72241 or 7230372205.- Gifts to an organization shall be accepted as authorized by these regulations.
- 9.4 An organization may not enter into any contract or other business arrangement involving real property either by lease involving payments of more than \$25,000 per annum and duration terms of more than one year, or by purchase without prior consultation with the District Chancellor.
- 9.5 Student loans, scholarships, stipends, and grants-in-aid to be awarded by an auxiliary organization shall only be given to currently admitted students.- No scholarship, stipend, or grant-in-aid shall exceed the amount necessary to cover books, school fees, and living expenses, except as provided under Section 8.2 of these regulations. Records of financial assistance shall be sent to the campus financial aid's office and documented on student financial aid recipient records of that office.- Financial assistance provided from student body organization funds shall be in accordance with

District policies Policies and shall not exceed amounts provided under regulations of Federal and State financial aid programs.

- 9.6 The District shall maintain a list of all auxiliary organizations in good standing.
 - 9.6.1 All auxiliary organizations which, after review as specified by Sections 10.2 and 10.3 of these policies, are found to be in compliance with applicable laws and regulations, shall be included.
 - 9.6.2 When the District Chancellor believes that an organization should be removed from this list, he/she shall give the Board of Directors of the organization notice of a conference to examine grounds for removal. Representatives of the Board of Directors may be heard at the conference. The District Chancellor shall decide whether the organization should be removed from the list, and shall report any action to the Board of Trustees.

10.0Record Keeping-

- 10.1Records and Annual Audit.
 - 10.1.1 An auxiliary organization shall maintain adequate records and prepare an annual report showing its operations and financial status.
- **10.2**Compliance Review by District Chancellor.
 - 10.1.210.2.1 The District Chancellor shall inspect and review organization procedures, practices, and activities for compliance with policies, rules and regulations of the Board of Governors and the District, and make recommendations to the Board of Directors of the organization at the end of the first complete year and at least every three years thereafter.- The District Chancellor shall determine compliance after comments from the Board of Directors of the organization.

10.3Audit.

- 10.3.1 Each organization shall have an annual fiscal audit performed by a certified public accountant in accordance with procedures prescribed by the Board of Governors, as contained in the <u>California Community College Auxiliary Organization Accounting Reporting SystemManual</u>. The annual audit report shall be submitted to the Board of Trustees and the Board of Governor's office within 30 days after receipt by the organization, and shall be a public record, except as otherwise provided by law.- Audits may be conducted as part of a fiscal audit of the District itself.
- 10.1.310.3.2 Organizations shall annually publish an audited statement of financial condition to be disseminated as widely as feasible and be available to any person on request.- A reasonable fee may be charged to cover the costs of providing a copy.- The organization shall comply by An

organization that primarily serves the Board of Trustees shall comply by distributing the audited statements of its financial condition at regularly scheduled Board of Trustees meetings. An organization that primarily serves a single College of the District shall comply by:

- a. Publishing the statement in a campus newspaper; or
- b. Publishing a notice in campus newspaper indicating the on-campus location where the financial statement may be obtained or reviewed; or
- c. Publishing or noticing the statement in a campus bulletin or other appropriate medium if a campus newspaper is unavailable.

11.0Written Agreement-

- 11.1 A written agreement between the Los Rios Community College District and each auxiliary organization is required for performance of any of the functions listed in Section 2.
- 11.2The written agreement shall provide for the following:
 - 11.2.1 The services and activities of the organization.
 - 11.2.2 The reasons said services and activities will be performed by the organization rather than the District.
 - 11.2.3 Areas of authority and responsibility of the organization and the District.
 - 11.2.4 Facilities and services to be made available by the District to the organization.
 - 11.2.5 Rental to be paid to the District by the organization for the facilities used or services provided. -The rental shall not require involved methods of computation, and should be determined in advance of the time it is incurred.
 - 11.2.6 Full reimbursement to the District for its services in support of the organization. -Student body auxiliary organizations may be exempt from full reimbursement. -Methods of proration shall be simple and equitable.
 - 11.2.7 A simple, equitable method of determining in advance the organization's liability for costs relating to federally-sponsored programs.
 - 11.2.8 Responsibility for maintenance and payment of operating expenses.
 - 11.2.9 Proposed expenditures for public relations. -The organization may expend such funds as approved by its Board of Directors. -The Board of Directors shall file with the District Chancellor a statement of policy on accumulation and use of public relations funds specifying procedures for

- solicitation of funds, sources of funds, amounts, purposes, allowable expenditures, and control procedures.
- 11.2.10 Proposed disposition of new earnings derived from the operation of facilities owned or leased by the organization and provisions for reserves.
- 11.2.11 Proposed disposition of new assets upon dissolution.
- 11.2.12 The covenant of the organization to operate in accordance with sections 72670-72682 of the Education Code and with the regulations contained in Chapter 5-4 (commencing with Section 59250) of Division-Chapter 10, Part IVDivision 6 of Title 5 of the California Administrative Code.

12.0Use of Program, College, or District Name-

12.1 Except for student body associations organized and operating under Education Code, Section 76060 et seq, no organization may use the name of the District or a college College of the District or otherwise represent a relationship with either unless it has been established as an auxiliary organization by the Board of Trustees and is in good standing.

13.0Amendment-

13.1 The District Chancellor shall provide and revise rules and procedures implementing these regulations.

14.0Definitions-

- 14.1 Board of Directors. -The term "Board of Directors" means the governing board of an auxiliary organization.
- 14.2 Board of Trustees. -The term "Board of Trustees" means the Board of Trustees of the Los Rios Community College District.
- 14.3 Board of Governors. -The term "Board of Governors" means the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges.
- 14.4 District Chancellor. -The term "District Chancellor" means the Chancellor of the Los Rios Community College District or designee of the Chancellor.
- 14.5 State Chancellor. -The term "State Chancellor" means the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges.
- 14.6 District. The term "District" means the Los Rios Community College District.

BACKGROUND:

Recent amendments to the Clery Act by the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act and subsequent regulations, and continued guidance on Title IX from the Department of Education, require changes to the District's policy on sexual assault.

STATUS:

The name of the policy has been updated to include sexual violence and relationship violence. In section 1.1, the policy is amended to more clearly state the District prohibits sexual assault, and explicitly adds sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking to this prohibition. This policy sets forth the District's plan for addressing these issues. Throughout the policy, specific references to sexual assault have been augmented to also specifically include sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. Definitions for these terms are added in section 2.0 and additional language is added to clarify the definition of affirmative consent.

New language on consent is added to section 3.0. Section 3.1 is amended to clarify that consent must be ongoing by both parties at all times during any sexual activity. Section 3.2 clarifies that a person's intoxication by drugs or alcohol does not diminish that person's responsibility to obtain consent. Section 3.3.2 adds language that defines incapacitation. Additionally, section 3.3.4 states the age of consent in California is 18 years old.

Section 4.0 provides the procedures the District will use to respond to reports of sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. Section 4.1 provides policy language to encourage the prompt reporting of all crimes to the police. It directs that sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking be reported to the college's Equity Officer, Title IX Officer and the police. The policy designates the Los Rios Police Department as responsible for reporting crimes for compliance purposes and for handling the criminal aspects of reported crimes. Section 4.2 moves language about reporting sexual assault from the definitions section into the procedures section. Section 4.3 identifies the District's existing discrimination and harassment procedures as the appropriate method for resolving complaints at the college level and for imposing discipline. Section 4.4 is amended to allow complainants and third parties to make confidential

reports. Section 4.5 requires de-identified data to be provided to the Los Rios Police Department and the Title IX Officer for those confidential reports. Section 4.13 is amended to require each college to continue developing prevention and awareness programs for all incoming students and new employees. In this area, the District has recently instituted the video "Not Anymore" program, which is required for all new students and employees. In addition, a trauma-informed approach to handling these matters has been shared with the Los Rios Police Department, the Title IX Officers, the Equity Officers and the Student Discipline Officers.

Sections 5.2 and 5.3 have been amended to state that ongoing prevention and awareness campaigns shall be made available to students, staff, and faculty, and that students, staff, and faculty may obtain information about registered sex offenders from the Los Rios Police Department.

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1.0 Statement of Intent

It is the intent of the Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees to 1.1 implement, at each of the Colleges in the Los Rios Community College District, written procedures to ensure, to the fullest extent possible, that students, faculty, and staff who are victims of The Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees prohibits sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalkingsexual assault, that is committed at or upon the grounds of, or upon off-campus grounds or facilities maintained by the Los Rios Community College District and its Colleges. This District Policy sets forth the District's comprehensive plan concerning sexual misconduct and its, educational programs and procedures to prevent and provide redress for sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking. Those who have experienced this misconduct at or upon the grounds of or upon off-campus grounds or facilities maintained by the District/College shall receive information and referrals to local community treatment centers.

2.0 Definitions Related to Sexual Assault (Ed. Code, § 67385)

- 2.1 "Complainant" is the person who alleges sexual assault occurred.
- 2.2 "Respondent" is the person alleged to have committed sexual assault.
- 2.3 "Sexual assault" is broader than sexual violence and includes, but is not limited to, rape, forced sodomy, forced oral copulation, rape by a foreign object, sexual battery, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, or threat of sexual assault. Sexual assault is a form of sexual harassment and should be reported under the District's Discrimination and Harassment Procedures Policy and Administrative Regulation (P/R-2423). It should also be reported to the District Police Department or other appropriate law enforcement.
- 2.4 "Relationship violence" is term that includes dating and domestic violence. Relationship violence is physical violence relating to a current or former romantic or intimate relationship regardless of the length of the relationship or gender/gender identity of the individuals in the relationship. Relationship violence includes conduct that would cause a reasonable person to be fearful for his or her safety.
 - 2.4.1 "Dating violence" is violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim; and where the existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on a consideration of the following factors: (a) the

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length of the relationship; (b) the type of relationship; and (c) the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship. Dating violence does not include acts covered under the definition of domestic violence.

- 2.1.12.4.2 "Domestic violence" means abuse committed against an adult or a minor who is a spouse, former spouse, cohabitant, former cohabitant, or person with whom the suspect has had a child or is having or has had a dating or engagement relationship. For purposes of this subdivision, "cohabitant" means two unrelated adult persons living together for a substantial period of time, resulting in some permanency of relationship. Factors that may determine whether persons are cohabiting include, but are not limited to: (1) sexual relations between the parties while sharing the same living quarters; (2) sharing of income or expenses; (3) joint use or ownership of property; (4) whether the parties hold themselves out as husband and wife; (5) the continuity of the relationship; and (6) the length of the relationship. (Pen. Code, § 13700, sub. (b).)
- 2.5 "Stalking" means willfully, maliciously, and repeatedly following or willfully and maliciously harassing another person and making a credible threat with the intent to place a person in reasonable fear for his or her safety, or the safety of his or her immediate family. (Pen. Code, § 646.9, subd. (a).)
- 2.6 "Affirmative consent" means affirmative, conscious, and voluntary agreement to engage in sexual activity. It is the responsibility of each person involved in the sexual activity to ensure that he or she has the affirmative consent of the other or others to engage in the sexual activity.
 - **2.6.1** Consent means positive cooperation in the act or expression of intent to engage in the act pursuant to an exercise of free will. Lack of protest or resistance does not mean consent, nor does silence mean consent.
 - 2.6.2 Affirmative consent must be ongoing throughout a sexual activity and can be revoked at any time. Consent to some form of sexual activity does not imply consent to other forms of sexual activity. The existence of a dating relationship between the persons involved, or the fact of past sexual relations between them, should never by itself be assumed to be an indicator of consent.
 - 2.6.3 Consent must be given without coercion, force, threats, or intimidation.
 - 2.1.22.6.4 Consent cannot be given when a person is incapacitated or

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otherwise unable or incapable of providing consent. A person cannot consent if she or he is unconscious or coming in and out of consciousness. A person cannot consent if she or he is under the threat of violence, bodily injury or other forms of coercion. A person cannot consent if her or his understanding of the act is affected by a physical or mental impairment.

- 2.2 "Complainant" is the person who alleges sexual assault occurred.
- 2.3 "Respondent" is the person alleged to have committed sexual assault.

3.0 <u>Evaluation Standards</u>

- 3.1 Valid Aaffirmative consent must be given by both parties to sexual activity at all times during the sexual conduct.
- 3.2 In the evaluation of complaints in any **investigation or** disciplinary process, it shall not be a valid excuse to alleged lack of affirmative consent that the respondent believed that the complainant consented to the sexual activity under either of the following circumstances:
 - 3.2.1 The respondent's belief in affirmative consent arose from the intoxication or recklessness of the respondent. Being intoxicated by drugs or alcohol does not diminish one's responsibility to obtain consent.
 - 3.2.2 The respondent did not take reasonable steps, in the circumstances known to the accused at the time, to ascertain whether the complainant affirmatively consented.
- 3.3 In the evaluation of complaints in the any investigation or disciplinary process, it shall not be a valid excuse that the respondent believed that the complainant affirmatively consented to the sexual activity if the respondent knew or reasonably should have known that the complainant was unable to consent to the sexual activity under any of the following circumstances:
 - 3.3.1 The complainant was asleep or unconscious.
 - 3.3.2 The complainant was incapacitated due to the influence of drugs, alcohol, or medication, so that the complainant could not understand the fact, nature, or extent of the sexual activity. Incapacitation is defined as the physical and/or mental inability to make informed, rational judgments. States of incapacitation include, but are not limited to, unconsciousness, sleep, and blackouts. Where alcohol or drugs are involved, incapacitation is defined with respect to how the alcohol or other drugs consumed affects a person's decision-making capacity,

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awareness of consequences, and ability to make fully informed judgments. The factors to be considered when determining whether consent was given include whether the person accused (respondent) knew, or whether a reasonable person should have known, that the complainant was incapacitated.

- **3.3.3** The complainant was unable to communicate due to a mental or physical condition.
- 3.3.33.3.4 The complainant was under eighteen years old. (Pen. Code, § 261.5.
- 4.0 <u>Procedures Upon the Receipt of a Report of Sexual Assault, Relationship Violence, or Stalking</u>
 - 4.1 The District/Colleges encourage the accurate and prompt reporting of all crimes to the Los Rios Police Department and the appropriate local police agencies where the victim wants to or is unable to make such a report. The District/Colleges encourage the accurate and prompt reporting of all incidents of sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking to the College's Equity Officer or Title IX Officer and the Los Rios Police Department and the appropriate local police agencies. The Los Rios Police Department shall be responsible for reporting crimes as required by Federal and State law and coordinating the criminal aspects of the report.
 - 4.2 Sexual assault is a form of sexual harassment or sexual discrimination and should be reported under the District's Discrimination and Harassment Procedures Policy and Administrative Regulation (P/R-2423). Domestic violence, dating violence and stalking which are based on gender are also forms of sexual harassment or sexual discrimination and should be reported under the District's Discrimination and Harassment Procedures Policy and Administrative Regulation (P/R-2423).
 - 4.3 The District/College shall utilize its Discrimination and Harassment Procedures Policy and Administrative Regulation (P/R-2423) and the Student Due Process Policy and Regulation (P/R-2442) to resolve complaints of sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking and to impose the appropriate discipline. These procedures shall provide a prompt, fair, and impartial investigation and resolution of the matter.
 - 4.4 Complainants and third parties may make confidential reports of sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual

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assault and stalking. The District/College shall respect the privacy of individuals involved in a-these reports of sexual assault and shall keep the name of the complainant confidential. If compelled to reveal the complainant's name to the respondent, the District/Colleges shall inform the complainant prior to the commencement of the investigation. Complainants and third parties may make confidential reports to designated confidential reporters.

- 4.14.5 If the complainant requests confidentiality or asks that a complaint not be pursued, the District shall take all reasonable steps to investigate and respond to the complaint consistent with the request for confidentiality or request not to pursue an investigation. De-identified data shall be provided to the Los Rios Police Department and the College's Title IX Officer. At the same time, the District shall evaluate the request in the context of its responsibility to provide a safe and nondiscriminatory environment for all students. The request for confidentiality shall be weighed against the following factors: the seriousness of the alleged harassment; the complainant's age; whether there have been other harassment complaints about the same respondent; and the respondent's rights to receive information about the allegations if the information is maintained by the District/College. Generally, the District/College shall conduct an investigation, despite a request that it not do so, if:
 - 4.1.14.5.1 The respondent is alleged to have committed one or more prior sexual acts of sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalkingassaults, or used a weapon in those reported sexual assault prior act(s); or
 - 4.1.24.5.2 Sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalkingexual assaults that occur repeatedly in a particular location or against a particular group.
- **4.24.6** In its initial response, each College shall provide the complainant with information to assist the complainant. This information shall include written documentation about preserving evidence and the identification and location of witnesses.
- 4.7 The District/Colleges shall respond to reports of non-stranger sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalkingsexual assault in the same manner as it does to reports of a stranger sexual assaultcommitting those acts. This response shall include appropriately reporting the matter to the police as well as engaging the discrimination and harassment complaint procedures and discipline procedures.
- 4.34.8 The review of the any incident of sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking shall examine

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the role that alcohol or drugs may have played in the incident. Further, complainants and witnesses in an investigation of **sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalkingsexual assault shall not be subject to discipline for under the student Standards of Conduct unless the violation was egregious. An egregious violation is an action that places the health or safety of any other person at risk or involves plagiarism, cheating, or academic dishonesty.**

- 4.44.9 The complainant shall be interviewed by District/College personnel with annual training in responding to sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalkingsexual assault. The District/College personnel shall coordinate their response with law enforcement to the extent feasible to minimize the impact of the investigation on the complainant. The Colleges shall develop a complainant interview protocol, which shall include a comprehensive follow-up complainant interview, if appropriate. The complainant shall be asked about the identities and location of witnesses. The complainant shall have the right to have the participation of complainant advocates and other supporting persons throughout the process.
- 4.54.10The respondent shall be contacted and interviewed by the District Los Rios Police Department or local law enforcement. Following those interviews, the respondent shall be interviewed by the District/College personnel with training on responding to reports of sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalkingsexual assault. The respondent shall be asked about the identities and location of witnesses.
- 4.64.11The complainant shall be provided with written notification about the availability of, and contact information for, on-campus and off-campus resources and services, and coordination with law enforcement, as appropriate. In addition, the complainant shall be provided with information about criminal prosecutions; civil prosecutions; the disciplinary process through the College; and the availability of mediation, academic assistance alternatives, and mental health counseling.
- 4.74.12The District shall provide a comprehensive, trauma-informed, training program for District/College officials involved in investigating and adjudicating sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalkingsexual assault cases.
- 4.84.13In addition to the foregoing, each College shall develop primary prevention and awareness programs for all incoming students and new employees and complainant-centered written procedures that shall contain, at a minimum, the following information:
 - 4.8.14.13.1 The primary prevention and awareness program shall include:

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Sexual Violence, Relationship Violence, Domestic Violence, **Dating Violence, Sexual Assault** and StalkingSexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, and Stalking

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> the District/College Policy regarding prohibiting sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalkingsexual assault; definitions of those terms; the definition of consent; and provide safe and positive options for bystander intervention that may be carried out by an individual to prevent harm or intervene in cases of a risk of sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking.on campus.

- 4.8.2**4.13.2** Personnel at the College who should be notified, and procedures for notification, with the consent of the complainant.
- 4.8.34.13.3 Legal reporting requirements and procedures for fulfilling them.
- 4.8.44.13.4 A description of College services and resources available to complainants, as well as appropriate off-campus services.
- 4.8.5**4.13.5** Procedures for ongoing case management, including procedures for keeping the complainant informed of the status of any student disciplinary proceedings in connection with the sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalkingsexual assault, and the results of any disciplinary action or appeal, and helping the complainant deal with academic difficulties that may arise because of the victimization and its impact.

5.0 **Dissemination** Education

- 5.1 The College written procedures shall be published in all student, faculty, and staff handbooks and shall be given to any student or employee who is the victim of a sexual violence, relationship violence, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalkingsexual assault.
- Ongoing prevention and awareness campaigns shall be made available to **5.2** students, staff and faculty.
- **5.3** Faculty, staff and students may obtain information about registered sex offenders from the Los Rios Police Department.

BACKGROUND:

In 2012, the District acquired a building located at 1788 Tribute Road, Sacramento, CA 95815 (further identified as Sacramento County Assessor's Parcel Number 277-0285-003-000) (Tribute Road Property) as the site for the relocation of the Workforce and Economic Development programs housed at Ethan Way. Since the purchase, programmatic changes, including the transfer of the Small Business Development Center to the Sacramento Metro Chamber, have made the Tribute Road Property no longer needed for its intended purpose.

STATUS:

As the Tribute Road Property is no longer necessary for Workforce and Economic Development purposes and the District has no other need for the property, it is appropriate for the District to declare it surplus and attempt to sell it. At its May 11, 2016 meeting in closed session, the Board of Trustees gave direction to the Chancellor and designee concerning the minimum price and terms for the Tribute Road Property. The first step in the multi-step process is to offer the property to public agencies and nonprofit corporations in compliance with Education Code, section 81363.5 and Government Code, section 54222. Following those offers and any negotiations, the District will proceed with the further steps necessary for the sale of the Tribute Road Property, including providing formal notice of its intention to sell the property in an open and public process pursuant to the Education Code.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees Approve Resolution No. 2016-10 authorizing the Chancellor or designee to commence the process for the offering of the Tribute Road Property to the entities listed in Education Code, section 81363.5 and Government Code, section 54222 and engage in negotiations as appropriate.

WHEREAS, the District desires to sell its interest in the Tribute Road Property; and

WHEREAS, once the appropriate time periods described in Education Code, section 81363.5 and Government Code, section 54222 have lapsed, and no other offers have been made on the Tribute Road Property by the entities described in said sections, the District desires to sell the Tribute Road Property pursuant to Education Code, section 81360, and following: Now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees, hereby find, determine, declare and resolve as follows:

- 1. That all the recitals above are true and correct;
- 2. That the Board of Trustees hereby declares the Tribute Road Property as surplus because it is not now, nor will it be, needed by the District for classroom purposes;
- 3. That the Board hereby declares its intention to sell the Tribute Road Property;
- 4. That the Chancellor, or designee, is hereby authorized and directed to send written offers to sell the Tribute Road Property at its fair market value and to post and publish public offers as required by Education Code, section 81363.5 and Government Code, section 54222;
- 5. In the event public agencies listed in Education Code, section 81363.5 and Government Code, section 54222 express an interest in the Tribute Road Property, the Board of Trustees directs the Chancellor, or designee, to engage in good faith negotiations to attempt to arrive at a mutually satisfactory price and terms for the sale of the Tribute Road Property;
- In the event no public agencies listed in Education Code, section 81363.5 and Government Code, section 54222 express an interest, or any entity that does express an interest is not able to come to mutually satisfactory price and terms with the District, the Board of Trustees authorizes the

Chancellor, or designee, to commence the next steps of the public process for the sale of the Tribute Road Property under Education Code, section 81360 and following.

BACKGROUND:

The Board of Trustees approves all salary schedules for district employees. In August of 2011, CalPERS issued new regulations defining compensation for retirement benefit purposes that further specify the requirements for Board approval of salary schedules for employees (Title 2 added section 570.5).

The regulations state that the format identify the title for every job classification; the pay rate for each job classification; the time base (i.e. hourly, daily, monthly, etc.) and indicate the effective date and date of any revisions. All salary schedules are available in the Human Resources department during normal business hours and on the Human Resources website.

STATUS:

The following salary schedules have been developed or revised:

New Salary Schedules:

- 1) Employment Service Agreement (ESA) Academic: For many years, the District has used Employment Service Agreements (ESAs) to pay for extra assignment work which was usually categorically-funded. A flat hourly rate was recommended but occasionally the hourly rate was based on the experience/expertise of the individual performing the assignment or was a stipend paid as a flat amount for completion of a task or assignment. Under the requirements of the Affordable Care Act, the stipend method is no longer an option as hours worked must be reported. In addition, to ensure a consistent process in paying for extra assignment work, an ESA Salary Schedule has been developed providing hourly rates based on a faculty member's adjunct/overload placement to compensate for experience and education level.
- 2) Professional Expert Agreement: For many years, the District has hired individuals who have specialized knowledge to perform temporary work on a specific project, performing duties not found in the classified or certificated service (Education Code section 88003). These individuals are considered Professional Experts. A flat hourly rate was

recommended but, similar to the ESA process, occasionally the hourly rate considered the experience/expertise of the individual performing the assignment or a flat stipend was paid. To ensure a consistent process in paying Professional Experts, a new salary schedule has been developed, the Professional Expert salary schedule. This schedule provides for flexibility given the individual's level of expertise, as well as flexibility for the Ethan Way Center professional expert trainers.

Revised Salary Schedules:

1) <u>Special Rate – Temporary Classified</u>: This existing salary schedule has been revised to reflect needed flexibility for temporary classified special projects, removing unused temporary classified job titles, and adding the game technician temporary job title.

BACKGROUND:

The Accrediting Commission standards call for a college to have a statement of mission that defines the institution's broad educational purposes, its intended student population, and its commitment to achieving student learning and to review its mission statement on a regular basis and revise as necessary.

STATUS:

Cosumnes River College governance and decision-making processes include a required review of its vision, mission, and values statement on a six-year cycle, with an option of conducting mid-cycle review(s) as needed. The most recent review and Board action on the mission occurred in May of 2014. This action was not in response to a full review of the College's mission. The May 2014 action resulted from a "mid-cycle" review process necessitated by a one-time extension of the College's planning cycle from 6 to 7 years, an extension made to ensure alignment between the college's planning and accreditation cycles and the college's and district's strategic planning cycles. The current CRC full review process began in September of 2015 under the purview of the college's participatory governance group, the College Planning Committee. The review process included a campus survey to assess the degree to which the current mission resonated with the campus community and met the criteria of an effective mission outlined in planning literature. The College Planning Committee spent several meetings editing the statement in response to the survey data, and then distributed the statement for constituency review and comment in spring 2016.

The attached updated CRC vision, mission, and values statement was approved by the constituency groups and affirmed by the Participatory Governance Committee during April and May of 2016.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended the Board of Trustees approve the proposed mission statement of Cosumnes River College.

BACKGROUND:

In 2014, the California legislature established a system of indicators and goals that is intended to encourage improvement in institutional effectiveness at California community colleges. Pursuant to Education Code section 84754.6, the Board of Governors adopted the Year-Two goals framework at its November 16, 2015 meeting to measure the ongoing condition of each community college's operational environment which requires that as a condition of receipt of Student Success and Support Program funds, each college develop, adopt and post a goals framework that addresses at a minimum: student performance and outcomes, accreditation status, fiscal viability, and programmatic compliance with state and federal guidelines. In addition, each year the state Chancellor is required to post by June 30 the annually developed system wide goals adopted by the Board of Governors and the locally developed and adopted college/district goals.

STATUS:

During this second year of the institutional effectiveness initiative, colleges are required to submit short-term (1-year) and long-term (6-year) goals for each of the required Year-Two indicators. In addition to the required goals, colleges/districts may choose to adopt some or all of the optional goals. Each Los Rios college has proposed goals for the required successful course completion indicator and accreditation status, as well as chosen one of four student achievement indicator options. All four colleges have proposed goals for the student achievement (degree, certificate, and transfer) indicator for unprepared-for-college students. In addition, the district will submit required short- and long-term fund balance goals and short- and long-term goals for three indicators regarding audit findings: audit opinion financial statement, state compliance, and federal award/compliance. The proposed 2016-17 college and district institutional effectiveness goals are provided in the attachment.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the institutional effectiveness goals for American River College, Cosumnes River College, Folsom Lake College, Sacramento City College, and the Los Rios Community College District for submission to the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office by the June 15, 2016 submission deadline.

BACKGROUND:

The State of California is statutorily required to enact a State Budget by June 30. Similarly, the Board of Trustees is required by law to adopt a tentative budget for the upcoming fiscal year no later than July 1 for all district funds. This requirement is in place regardless of whether the State budget has been finalized. For 2016-17, the Governor has issued the May Revise budget proposal and the normal process of review and amendment by the legislature is occurring. Given the timing for preparation of the budget prior to a formal budget proposal from the legislature, the May Revise is the basis for the tentative budget.

The May Revise proposal for California's community colleges retained the basic structure of the Governor's January proposal. The Governor continues to be conservative in the allocation of revenues by appropriating on-going resources for one-time expenditures. This approach is intended to minimize the budget impact from revenue swings that result from the State's heavy reliance on personal income taxes derived from a relatively small number of Californians. Whereas 2015-16 was an exceptionally good budget for the community colleges, the 2016-17 budget is far less robust due to a couple of factors. One is the economy appears to be cooling and the other is that the Governor has paid down much of the debt for K-14 that had accumulated during the downturn.

On-going funding retained from the January proposal is statewide growth at 2% or \$114.7 million. The May Revise proposal reduced the COLA from the January estimated statutory rate of 0.47% to Zero. The May Revise includes an allocation of \$75 million to increase base funding rates. The 2015-16 budget funded \$266.7 million for this purpose but the January proposal for 2016-17 did not include any allocation. For categorical programs, there is \$248 million for Workforce and Career and Technical Education Pathways. The discussion surrounding this allocation is the split between district directed and regional initiatives. The Basic Skills Initiative is slated for a \$30 million increase. With this allocation, the discussion centers on whether the allocation to districts should be made based upon service levels or outcomes.

In the Governor's January proposal, Scheduled Maintenance/Special Repairs and State Instructional Equipment and Library Materials were proposed at \$289 million. That was reduced to \$219.4 million to support other initiatives. The one-time allocation for past

mandated cost claims is \$105.5 million compared to \$626 million in 2015-16. These one time funds are an opportunity to shore up infrastructure and reserves to prepare for the next potential downturn.

The budget proposal will help with addressing the increased pension costs for both the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS) and the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS). The challenge is designating funding for those increases while also maintaining salaries and other benefits for employees. Another challenge is achieving our growth goal. To qualify for available growth funding in 2014-15, the District shifted attendance from summer 2015 to the 2014-15 year. This was because the District's enrollment in 2014-15 was essentially flat. In 2015-16, the plan was to increase attendance by adding sections and expanding our public safety and apprenticeship programs. However, to date the District has only realized a small increase over 2014-15 achieved levels. This most likely means that our reported attendance will be below our base attendance level for 2015-16. In that regard, there will be no impact to revenues as the State funds districts at their base level for one year. This is known as Stability. In 2016-17, revenues could be reduced if the base attendance level is not achieved. The 2016 summer term instructional program has been increased by 20%. Fall and spring are budgeted at the 2015-16 level with productivity improvements planned to achieve more attendance through better utilization of resources. Even if enrollment is flat, the District should be able to avoid a reduction in 2016-17 by shifting summer 2017 to the 2016-17 year. However, the goal is to minimize any shift and grow to at least the base level.

It appears that the enacted budget will likely be very close to the May Revise. Any changes will be incorporated into the Adopted Budget in September.

STATUS:

The budget scenarios for the General Fund are titled the X, Y, and Z budgets. The X budget is the worst case revenue scenario, forecasting only the receipt of the basic allocation increase for the Rancho Cordova Center, the increase in the base rates, as well as some one time funds, including the allocations for both current year and past claims for mandated costs. The Y and Z budgets both include additional lottery and growth. The Y Budget reflects growth funding at 0.6%. The Z budget is the most optimistic with another 0.6% in growth.

The 2016-17 budget is balanced. There is no draw on reserves projected at this time and there is no reliance on one-time funds to support on-going costs. The variations in the X, Y and Z budgets are captured in the appropriation area entitled Program and Salary Improvement and the three budgets are summarized on the attached General Fund schedule. The District will start the year operating at the X budget level.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt the 2016-17 tentative budgets for the General Fund (Z budget), Instructionally-Related Sub-Fund, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, Debt Service, Enterprise, Internal Service, Fiduciary, Trust and Auxiliary Funds of the District for filing with the appropriate County/State agencies.
