### Chancellor's Report:

ARC: Students at ARC's Design Hub – the college's maker space – are being paired up with Sacramento startups as part of an innovative partnership with the McClellan Innovation Center, a co-working space located in McClellan Park. The McClellan Innovation Center started successfully matching students with its tenants last year. The partnership program will continue in 2019, giving ARC Design Hub students the opportunity to work on real development projects and then migrate their experience back to ARC to develop the Hub's capability to do college-centered work. One of the 2018 student projects involved building a next-generation 4G/LTE router that allowed a local business to anticipate temperature control needs in its buildings, regulate temperatures, and reduce energy costs by 30 to 40 percent.

CRC: CRC alumna Maria Medina recently graduated from the School of Business at Arizona State University where she was named the Outstanding Graduating Senior by the W. P. Carey School of Business, an award that goes to undergraduates who have a grade point average of at least 3.6 and show leadership on campus and off. Medina is a human resources major and president of the ASU student chapter of the Society for Human Resource Management.

At the age of 8, she and her family fled their native Venezuela as the political situation there deteriorated. They settled in California, and Medina excelled academically. She always wanted to pursue higher education, so one week after she had her son, she started classes at CRC, eventually graduating with an associate degree in business administration and then enrolling at Sacramento State University. When her husband's employer told him he had to relocate to Arizona two years ago, they did, and that's how Medina ended up at ASU.

FLC: Folsom Lake College's student-veteran success programs continue to grow, thanks in part to support from community partners. In December, the El Dorado County Veterans Alliance and the Serrano Salute to Valor Committee presented the college with a check for \$10,000 to support the Veterans Success Center (VSC) and its El Dorado County veterans. The organization has now fully endowed a perpetual scholarship through the FLC Office of Philanthropy to help student-veterans with expenses not otherwise covered through VA benefits or the GI Bill. The local non-profit, the Wounded Warrior Run, also visited the VSC during the holidays to provide student-veterans with lunch and \$5,000 in gas cards. In total, over \$60,000 has been donated towards FLC veterans programs this fiscal year.

SCC: For the first time, Sacramento City College offices will be lightly staffed during Convocation in order to allow as many staff and faculty as possible to attend. This year's Flex and Convocation have a strong focus on equity, including special professional development activities on Thursday that were designed by the President's Office, Staff Resource Center, and the Division of Equity and Student Success. Convocation will build on Thursday's activities, and President Michael Gutierrez has asked deans to limit division meetings and department chairs to suspend their meeting times in order to allow participation on Friday.

### COURSE PROPOSALS

#### Course Deletions

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#### *Cosumnes River College*

1. **ECE 455 Environment Rating Scales in Early Childhood Programs (1.00 unit)**

**Justification:** This class is being deleted by the department as there are many community resources available to teach the content of this course. Additionally, the content of this course is integrated in areas of the ECE curriculum elsewhere.

2. **HORT 310 Nursery Practices (3.00 units)**

**Justification:** HORT 310 is specific to the Nursery Operations certificate and Nursery Management degree. Due to historic low enrollment and low regional needs, those programs are being deleted as well as the courses specific to those programs.

3. **HORT 314 Greenhouse Operations (3.00 units)**

**Justification:** HORT 314 is specific to the Nursery Operations certificate and Nursery Management degree. Due to historic low enrollment and low regional needs, those programs are being deleted as well as the courses specific to those programs.

4. **HORT 315 Nursery Crop Production and Management (3.00 units)**

**Justification:** HORT 315 is specific to the Nursery Operations certificate and Nursery Management degree. Due to historic low enrollment and low regional needs, those programs are being deleted as well as the courses specific to those programs.

5. **HORT 341 Landscape Design (3.00 units)**

**Justification:** HORT 341 is specific to the Sustainable Landscape and Irrigation Systems Design degree. Although landscape design careers are seasonally available in our region, we have not experienced the enrollment to justify resources toward maintaining this program, and it will be deleted as well as the courses specific to that program.

6. **HORT 344 Sustainable Landscape Design (1.00 unit)**

**Justification:** HORT 344 is specific to the Sustainable Landscape and Irrigation Systems Design degree. Although landscape design careers are seasonally available in our region, we have not experienced the enrollment to justify resources toward maintaining this program, and it will be deleted as well as the courses specific to that program.

7. **HORT 345 Landscape CAD Design (3.00 units)**

**Justification:** HORT 345 is specific to the Sustainable Landscape and Irrigation Systems Design degree. Although landscape design careers are seasonally available in our region, we have not experienced the enrollment to justify resources toward maintaining this program, and it will be deleted as well as the courses specific to that program.

8. **WELD 290 Advanced Student Projects (2.00 units)**

**Justification:** WELD 145 Basic Welding Shop Fabrication Skills will be replacing the WELD 290 Advanced Student Projects course to align curriculum training to meet industry standards.

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*Folsom Lake College*

1. **CISC 323 Linux Operating System (1.00 unit)**

**Justification:** This one unit course, as well as its sister courses CISC 324 and 325, have been consolidated into a three unit course (CISC 326). Historically, these courses were taken in sequence; requiring 3 semesters to complete. Students can now complete this in a single semester, thus expediting program completion.

2. **CISC 324 Intermediate Linux Operating System (1.00 unit)**

**Justification:** This one unit course, as well as its sister courses CISC 323 and 325, have been consolidated into a three unit course (CISC 326). Historically, these courses were taken in sequence; requiring 3 semesters to complete. Students can now complete this in a single semester, thus expediting program completion.

3. **CISC 325 Adv. Linux Operating System (1.00 unit)**

**Justification:** This one unit course, as well as its sister courses CISC 323 and 324, have been consolidated into a three unit course (CISC 326). Historically, these courses were taken in sequence; requiring 3 semesters to complete. Students can now complete this in a single semester, thus expediting program completion.

4. **CISP 353 Application Development in a Client Server Environment (3.00 units)**

**Justification:** This course no longer meets student needs. The department is more effectively redeploying resources to other areas.

## New to District Courses

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### *American River College*

#### 1. **GENSCI 90 Science Skills and Strategies I (0.50 units)**

*Prerequisite:* None.

*Corequisite:* Current enrollment in a science, nutrition, or nursing course.

*27.00 hours laboratory*

This course offers individualized instructional modules designed to acquire or improve study strategies and skills for various science, nursing, or nutrition courses. A partial list of skills and strategies may include the following: science textbook comprehension, principles of learning and retention, note taking, annotating, discipline-based vocabulary, paraphrasing, reading graphics, test taking, scientific writing, and problem solving. This course is offered in a flexible TBA format of 27 laboratory hours in order to accommodate the student's schedule. Registration is open through the tenth week of the semester. This course is not open to students who have previously passed BIOL 490. Pass/No Pass only.

**Justification:** We are renumbering BIOL 490 and moving it into the GENSCI designator.

#### 2. **HM 326 Intermediate Baking Retail Bakery Products (2.00 units)**

*Prerequisite:* HM 320 with a grade of "C" or better

*Advisory:* Eligible for ENGRD 310 or ENGRD 312 AND ENGWR 300; OR ESLR 340 AND ESLW 340.

*18.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory*

This course covers the theory and principles of baking and pastry with an emphasis on products commonly found in retail bakeries. It focuses on rich doughs, cookies, chocolate and puff pastry applications. This course is intended for students interested in commercial applications in bakeries, restaurants, and other food service facilities.

**Justification:** This course meets the needs recommended by the baking advisory group of local pastry chefs, bakers, and restaurateurs to expand the baking certificate with additional focus on job skills and techniques. This course will be a requirement for the HM Baking Certificate.

### 3. **HM 328 Intermediate Baking American and European Cakes (2.00 units)**

*Prerequisite:* HM 320 with a grade of "C" or better

*18.00 hours lecture, 54.00 hours laboratory*

This course covers the theory and principles of both American and European cake tradition. It focuses on baking methods, ingredient selection, filling, and finishing components and techniques. This course is intended for students interested in commercial bakery application.

**Justification:** This course is being created and added to the baking certificate at the request of the industry driven advisory board. Local bakeries are requesting deeper skills in cake production.

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## *Cosumnes River College*

### 1. **AH 498 Work Experience in Allied Health (1.00 - 4.00 units)**

*Prerequisite:* None.

*Enrollment Limitation:* Students must be in a paid or unpaid internship, volunteer position or job related to career goals in one of the allied health professions.

*60.00 - 300.00 hours laboratory*

This course provides students with opportunities to develop marketable skills in preparation for employment in their major field of study or advancement within their career. It is designed for students interested in work experience and/or internships in transfer level degree occupational programs. Course content includes understanding the application of education to the workforce; completion of required forms which document the student's progress and hours spent at the work site; and developing workplace skills and competencies. Appropriate level learning objectives are established by the student and the employer. During the semester, the student is required to participate in a weekly orientation and 75 hours of related paid work experience, or 60 hours of unpaid work experience for one unit. An additional 75 or 60 hours of related work experience is required for each additional unit. Work Experience may be taken for a total of 16 units when there are new or expanded learning objectives. Only one Work Experience course may be taken per semester.

**Justification:** The Cooperative Work Experience Education and Internship program is a unique academic program in which the student, employer, and college cooperates to combine study and practical work experience to develop students' marketable skills and prepare them for a career. This course meets the Living Skill: Life Development Skills requirement for an Associate Degree. This course meets transfer requirements to the CSU system.

## PROGRAM PROPOSALS

### Program Deletion(s)

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#### *Cosumnes River College*

#### 1. **Horticulture, Nursery Management**

**Justification:** Working with our industry partners and examining regional trends for the local Horticulture Industry, it has been determined that students completing a degree in Landscape Technology have, and will continue to find job placement and rewarding careers in all sectors of Horticulture including nursery operations. Due to historically low enrollment in this program and the inability to fill the required courses needed to complete a degree in Nursery Management, this program is currently not needed at CRC. Key courses and student learning outcomes from this program shall be added to a revised Landscape Technology Degree to strengthen that program and meet industry needs.

#### 2. **Horticulture, Nursery Operations**

**Justification:** Working with our industry partners and examining regional trends for the local Horticulture Industry, it has been determined that students completing a certificate in Landscape Technology have, and will continue to find job placement and rewarding careers in all sectors of Horticulture including nursery operations. Due to historically low enrollment in this program and the inability to fill the required courses needed to complete a certificate in Nursery Operations, this program is currently not needed at CRC. Key courses and student learning outcomes from this program shall be added to a revised Landscape Technology certificate to strengthen that program and meet industry needs.

#### 3. **Horticulture, Sustainable Landscape and Irrigation Systems Design**

**Justification:** Working with our industry partners and examining regional trends for the local Horticulture Industry, it has been determined that students completing a

degree in Landscape Technology will be prepared for entry level employment in landscape design, and will have the knowledge and skills for transfer into a landscape design program. Due to historically low enrollment in this program at CRC and the inability to fill the required courses needed to complete a degree in Sustainable Landscape and Irrigation Systems Design, this program is currently not needed at CRC. Key courses and student learning outcomes from this program shall be added to a revised Landscape Technology Degree to strengthen that program and meet industry needs.

## New Programs

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### *Cosumnes River College*

#### 1. **Entrepreneurial Arts: Independent Music Instructor**

This certificate provides real world tools for the aspiring music teacher to earn a living as a thriving and successful independent music instructor.

**Justification:** This certificate provides much needed training to CRC music students who enter the workforce as independent music instructors, but do so without the proper tools, instruction, and guidance.

#### 2. **Entrepreneurial Arts: Music Composition**

The Entrepreneurial Arts: Music Composition Certificate prepares students for all aspects of a thriving music career, from performance to music creation to business skills. We give you the tools to grow and survive as an independent contractor in a gig economy.

**Justification:** This new certificate program allows our Department to better serve the needs of our students as the CRC Music Department currently doesn't offer a single certificate program, unlike our sister colleges. A certificate program allows us to retain students who otherwise regularly transfer enrollment to other colleges to meet their academic needs and interests, as well as providing portfolio building opportunities for those students interested in transferring to music composition programs at four-year colleges and institutions.

#### 3. **Horticulture, General Horticulture**

This program provides students with the essential knowledge and skills for entry level employment in the Horticulture industry. Students gain core knowledge and

skills in basic plant science, soil science, integrated pest management, and plant identification and use. Students then complete two advanced horticulture courses of their choice. This is the base certificate in a stackable series that leads to an additional certificate or degree in Horticulture.

**Justification:** The certificate in General Horticulture will serve as the base of a stackable-certificate/degree program offered through the Horticulture Department. Our regional industry is searching for qualified individuals to meet their growing needs, and skilled labor is currently extremely scarce. This program will quickly provide candidates with valid, industry-desired knowledge and skills to meet that industry demand.

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*Sacramento City College*

#### 4. **Entrepreneurship**

Designed for current and aspiring entrepreneurs, the Entrepreneurship Certificate is a one-year program. Students will gain the knowledge, insights, and confidence of entrepreneurship through application of business concepts and ideas in the creation of a business plan. Improve your chances for success by developing skills and insights for evaluating, articulating, refining, and pitching a new product or service, either as a physical brick and mortar business, or as a virtual, online business. Learn to identify and evaluate opportunities, develop strategies, learn the basics of entrepreneurial finance, develop the professional competencies necessary for small business ownership, and launch your business.

**Justification:** As a result of program review the entrepreneurship offerings have been revised. This new certificate program offers students the opportunity to develop their ideas for an entrepreneurial venture.

The District’s Strategic Plan remains the same and the legislative work that will further that plan remains largely the same. As a result, staff has only made minor changes to the District’s existing Statement of Legislative Principles.

**RECOMMENDATION:**

# LOS RIOS COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT BOARD OF TRUSTEES

## *Annual Statement of Legislative Principles*

This Statement of Legislative Principles is adopted by the Board of Trustees for the Los Rios Community College District on behalf of itself and its four separately accredited Colleges (American River College, Cosumnes River College, Folsom Lake College and Sacramento City College) under Board Policy P-3115. This Statement is intended to support the District's Strategic Goals: to establish effective pathways that optimize student access and success; to ensure equitable academic achievement across all racial, ethnic, socioeconomic and gender groups; to provide exemplary teaching and learning opportunities; to lead the region in workforce development; and to foster an outstanding working and learning environment.

This Statement of Legislative Principles provides guidelines for the Chancellor when addressing matters before the California Legislature and Congress, and constitutes the core principles guiding the development of the District's position on legislation.

The District shall not support or oppose legislation unless the outcome will have a significant effect on the District, its students or its employees. The District will remain neutral on most matters affecting local collective bargaining. However, the District will take appropriate positions where that legislation will have a material impact on the District. The District will remain neutral on matters affecting only another single district or small group of district(s), except where policy precedents, or resource allocations, have the significant potential of affecting the Los Rios Community College District or the California Community College System generally. Where issues are raised in the budget process, the District shall seek legislative support or opposition in accordance with the principles established in this document. Where legislation is likely to impede the policy principles set forth, the District is likely to oppose that legislation unless there are significant countervailing reasons.

The Board of Trustees' Legislative Principles align with the District's Vision, Mission, Values, Goals and Strategies, as enumerated in the District's Strategic Plan, as follows, but do not reflect every strategy under each goal area. The District will support those legislative efforts enumerated under each Goal.

### 1. ESTABLISH EFFECTIVE PATHWAYS THAT OPTIMIZE STUDENT ACCESS AND SUCCESS.

- Obtain resources to support pathway programs.
- Implement appropriate measures to improve student success.
- Support the provision of comprehensive student support services.
- Strengthen the academic preparation of K-12 students to support success at a community college.
- Support collaborative efforts with four-year institutions designed to provide additional transfers for our students and legislation that promotes transfers.

- Support flexibility for dual enrollment and remove barriers as appropriate.
  - ~~Enhance~~ ~~Expand~~ student financial aid opportunities (including, but not limited to, Cal Grants ~~Funding~~ and ~~CA~~ Promise Programs) ~~and that~~ reduce the ~~overall~~ total costs of attending college for students.
  - Assist students with the application process for attending a community college and transferring to a four-year institution of higher education.
  - Support the enhancement of existing successful educational programs and the development of needed new programs
  - Support high quality ~~distance~~ online education while minimizing regulatory barriers and additional reporting requirements.
2. ENSURE EQUITABLE ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT ACROSS ALL RACIAL, ETHNIC, SOCIOECONOMIC AND GENDER GROUPS.
- Close the achievement gap.
  - Support the Dream Act and efforts to expand the institutional capacity for diversity.
  - Increase effective delivery of English, ESL and mathematics basic skills education.
  - Enhance opportunities for underserved constituencies.
3. PROVIDE EXEMPLARY TEACHING AND LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES.
- Support professional development for faculty, staff and administrators that is designed to support student success inside and outside of the classroom.
4. LEAD THE REGION IN WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT.
- Develop effective and relevant career and technical programs in collaboration with external partners.
  - Increase efforts that align career technical education curriculum and program development among community colleges, K-12 and industry.
  - Integrate community colleges in the Workforce Investment Board and provide for community college courses to qualify for state and federal funding of workforce development activities.
  - Support the efforts of the Los Rios Colleges Foundation in its efforts to develop additional funding resources for the District, Colleges, faculty, staff and students.
5. FOSTER AN OUTSTANDING WORKING AND LEARNING ENVIRONMENT.
- Maintain local authority and control in the administration of the District and its Colleges.
  - Maintain locally elected Board of Trustee governance in the administration of the District and its Colleges.

- Promote the health, safety and welfare of students, faculty, staff and administrators, including mental health.
- Support the District's and its Colleges' efforts to attract, recruit and retain the most qualified [and diverse](#) employees, and assure appropriate staffing levels.
- Support participatory decision making.
- Increase the District's efforts in sustainable practices, including energy and resource conservation, while retaining appropriate flexibility.
- Strengthen the District's ability to use its capital outlay, infrastructure bonds and property management funds efficiently.
- Support the elimination of duplicative and/or needless regulatory oversight and reporting obligations, and provide adequate funding for the oversight and reporting requirements that are necessary.
- Protect the fiscal integrity of the system.
- Support funding sustainable mechanisms for [reducing the unfunded liability in the CalSTRS and the CalPERS liabilities programs](#).
- Support backfill of property tax shortfalls.
- Provide information and support for students, faculty, staff and administrators in the DACA programs to support inclusivity and ensure that the District and its Colleges remain a place where all students are provided with an opportunity to fulfill their educational goals and dreams.
- Support a model for alignment of accreditation that improves outcomes for our students.

**BACKGROUND:**

In 1998, the District and Foundation adopted a Master Agreement whereby the Foundation became an auxiliary organization of the District. All college foundation investment activities were combined under the Los Rios Foundation. Morgan Stanley is the investment consultant for the Foundation.

As an auxiliary organization, the Foundation is not required to operate under GC 53600 investment restrictions. The Foundation Board has a Statement of Rules, Objectives and Guidelines to govern the investment of funds, last revised October 2016. The funds should be invested with care, skill, prudence and diligence with the goal of producing returns equal to or exceeding prevailing standards among foundations of similar asset size, as well as for the protection of funds held in perpetual duration. The Statement defines the investment guidelines for specified asset classes for endowed funds as follows: equities, defined as common stock, convertible preferred stock, convertible bonds, and convertible stock, shall represent 25-60% of the total fund assets; fixed-income securities, defined as investments with maturities greater than one year that pay a fixed rate of return, shall represent 17-50% of the total assets; alternative investments, defined as fund-of-fund investments, shall represent up to 20% of the total fund assets; and cash, defined as maturities shorter than one year, shall represent 2-10% of the total fund assets. In addition, the Statement provides guidelines for investing non-endowed funds based upon the purpose of the donation and the horizon of time for the use of funds. The three non-endowed portfolio funds available are cash management, fixed income and balanced funds.

**STATUS:**

This report represents the investment activity for the quarter ended December 31, 2018. The investments are directed by the Los Rios Foundation Finance Committee and realized and unrealized earnings are shown in the accompanying schedules. The return for the quarter ended December 31, 2018 for the endowed portfolio of \$9.4 million was <8.70%> compared to <10.18%> for the composite benchmark. The return for the quarter ended December 31, 2018 for the total managed portfolio of \$12.5 million was <6.57%> compared to <6.47%> for the composite benchmark. In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, investments are restated to market value as of each fiscal year-end.

**RECOMMENDATION:**






**BACKGROUND:**

The Education Code regulates the procedures by which a Community College District can dispose of real and personal property. Education Code section 81452 provides that the governing board may, by unanimous vote, dispose of items valued at \$5,000 or less by private sale without advertising or selling the items at public auction. The District has held previous auctions, but they have generally cost more than they have netted for the District.

**STATUS:**

The District has a quantity of surplus materials that needs to be disposed of, such as outdated desks and computers. The District has located a scrap dealer who will take selected surplus items for recycling. Any items remaining will be disposed.

The surplus items to be recycled or disposed of are either irreparable, obsolete, in poor condition or not needed for district/college operations and include the following: 54 computers; 2 controllers; 5 data service units; 2 disk array enclosures; 2 iMac's; 8 laptops; 13 monitors; 2 printers; 12 projectors; 16 servers and 2 switches.

These items have a value of less than \$5,000.




**BACKGROUND:**

Sue Lorimer served Los Rios for over 29 years. She worked as VP of Instruction at FLC before moving to the District Office to serve as Vice Chancellor of Education and Technology and subsequently as Deputy Chancellor. She retired in 2017. Ms. Lorimer is currently a member of the FLC and ARC Emeriti Associations and continues to support both institutions philanthropically. She played on a community college tennis team and has an affinity towards student athletic programs. Both Ms. Lorimer and her husband, Bob Bruns, will be making the donation and the name on the complex will include both names

**STATUS:**

Folsom Lake College opened its nine-court tennis complex in 2014 to compliment the athletics complex which was opened and dedicated in fall of 2013.

The Los Rios colleges are not reimbursed for athletics teams’ competition costs, only for the classes that are taught. While the Folsom Lake bookstore revenue and our College and Philanthropy Office funds help support our athletic teams, generous donations of the magnitude described below are rare and should be recognized.

Sue Lorimer and Bob Bruns are jointly gifting Folsom Lake College \$75,000 now and are including a \$50,000 planned gift to Folsom Lake College in their estate. The cash gift will be restricted for athletics and the subsequent planned gift will be endowed to support athletics. In both cases, the funds are to be used to pay for items that would otherwise not be covered by general funds.

**BACKGROUND:**

On September 12, 2018, the Governing Board adopted the 2018-19 maximum funding level (Z Budget) for the General Fund. The attached Schedule I details modifications to this funding level since adoption. General Fund revenues and appropriations are budgeted \$11.7 million higher than the adopted level due to the recognition of additional general purpose, and restricted/special programs revenues.

General fund unrestricted revenue increased by \$3.2 million. For apportionments, the increase of \$1.97 million is the District’s share of funds for additional regular faculty positions. Los Rios’ obligation is to add at least 25 new positions. The District and LRCFT have agreed to a two-year timeframe for authorizing the new positions. The increase in other general purpose revenues is primarily the projection for the health services fee which was implemented for the spring 2019 term. Restricted revenues increased by \$8.4 million. Schedule II details the additional awards since the budget was adopted.

Neither the final calculation for fiscal year 2017-18 nor the first principal apportionment (P1) for 2018-19 have been released as of February 1st. The P1 is based upon attendance reporting submitted Jan. 15<sup>th</sup> along with projected enrollment fee and property tax revenues. Under the new formula, attendance for the current year will be combined with outcomes and demographic data from 2017-18 to calculate the District’s entitlement. The District’s hold harmless entitlement, which is the basis for the X budget, remains at \$312 million. The hold harmless amount is not projected to change as the District was in stability for 2017-18. However, staff will update 2018-19 projections when the P1 is issued. Any adjustments will be included in budget revision No. 2, scheduled for the June meeting. As usual, the District continues to operate at the X budget level.

**STATUS:**

Revisions to the adopted budget for the General Fund are necessary for the following reasons:

1. Schedule I summarizes changes to revenues, appropriations and fund balance for the general fund. The change in restricted fund balance is the appropriation of restricted lottery funds.

2. Schedule II provides specific adjustments to restricted and special program revenues. Restricted revenues reflect new awards for Federal and State programs, as well as augmentations to existing programs for federal, state and local. The changes in appropriations reflect the allocation of those additional resources as well as re-alignment across object codes as expenditure plans are formalized.

Revisions to other District funds due to:

3. Instructionally-Related Activities (Schedule III): Increases to revenue and appropriation of uncommitted fund balance.
4. Child Development (Schedule IV): Increase in State revenues in support of the centers and corresponding appropriations.
5. Capital Outlay Projects (Schedule V): Decrease in State revenues to reflect the final appropriation for Scheduled Maintenance Special Repairs (SMSR) and transfers from the General Fund. Changes in appropriations reflect the decrease for SMSR, the allocation of program development funds, and miscellaneous spending plan adjustments.
6. Self Insurance (Schedule VI): Minor change in funding and appropriations for dental program.
7. Bookstore (Schedule VII): A transfer from discretionary funds for Folsom Lake College to support operational cash requirements.
8. Student Financial Aid (Schedule VIII): Increase in State Awards and State Categorical programs transferred from the General Fund.
9. Regional Performing Arts Center (Schedule IX): Minor change in operating expenses and transfers.
10. Student Associations Trust (Schedule X): Changes in revenues as well as appropriation of beginning fund balance.
11. Scholarship & Loan Trust (Schedule XI): Change in interest income.
12. Los Rios Colleges Foundation (Schedule XII): Reduction to estimated donations.

**RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the revised budgets for the General, Instructionally Related Activities, Child Development, Capital Outlay Projects, Self Insurance, Bookstore, Student Financial Aid, Regional Performing Arts Center, Student Associations Trust, Scholarship & Loan Trust, and Los Rios Colleges Foundation funds shown on the attached schedules, and that the related documents be filed with the County Superintendent of Schools.
