## **Chancellor's Report:**

<u>ARC</u>: ARC Funeral Service Education students Ally Pawelczyk and Benjamin Cardinelli are volunteering in New York City, where more than 10,000 people have been killed by COVID-19. Ally and Benjamin will be spending two weeks there helping funeral homes flooded by the surge in deaths. The two learned of a call for assistance from the National Funeral Directors Association and they quickly stepped forward. After volunteering for two weeks, Ally and Benjamin will have to quarantine there for another two weeks. Then, participants are given the option to volunteer again — and Ally and Benjamin are considering that opportunity.

<u>CRC</u>: Former CRC MESA students Riana Menezes was very recently offered a full-time position as an Aerospace Structural Analysis Engineer with Kratos Defense in Roseville. She has a BS in Aerospace Structural Engineering from UC San Diego. Her identical twin sister, Tiana, has been

working as an Associate CAD (Computer Aided Design) Engineer with Lyft since early March and has been working on autonomous vehicle technology. She also has a BS in Aerospace Structural Engineering from UCSD.

FLC: Folsom Lake College IT Systems/Database Administration Analyst II Jim Cosentino is commended for his solution-based approach to supporting online learning in his role as the NETLAB+ Administrator for the North/Far North Regional Consortium. As part of California's Strong Workforce Program, North/Far North provides leadership in the creation and implementation of career education programs in the region's fifteen community colleges. NETLABs allow students and instructors to access specialized networking equipment, server operating systems, and software from off-campus. Jim is responsible for the installation and maintenance of the complex system which contains more than 1,400 virtual computers. To increase opportunities for continuing student learning while campuses are closed due to the pandemic, Jim and the Consortium are making its NETLAB Virtual Networking Environment available to college professors, middle and high school teachers, and their students throughout the region.

SCC: SCC recently received \$4,545 from the Foundation for California Community Colleges' First Response Fund to support our nursing students with emergency grants to help support the people who will be our future medical workforce, particularly during the pandemic. By combining the funding with our Hulda Mae Stone endowment (\$7,350), we were able to award \$350 each to all 34 RN and VN final semester students who applied, to help them pay for their testing and license registration (or other emergency needs, if they have more pressing priorities). We are pleased to be able to support our students and our community by helping to add vital medical personnel to the workforce!
