#### **Chancellor's Report:**

ARC: ARC student Marya Wozniuck is a winner of the Sherwin-Williams 2020 Student Design Challenge, receiving a \$2,500 cash prize as a result of her award-winning work. An Interior Design major at ARC, Marya received the 1st place award in residential design with her eclectic New York penthouse. She was competing against top students from collegiate programs across the country. ARC's Interior Design program also received a \$1,000 contribution as a result of Marya's success. The Sherwin-Williams Student Design Challenge is a professional competition that celebrates

excellence in interior design by students in both residential and commercial categories. More info at http://www.swstudentdesign.com/2020/eclectic-nyc-penthouse/.

CRC: CRC will kick off celebrations for its 50th anniversary next Monday, Sept. 14, which was the opening day of the college back in 1970. This year's celebrations will be via videos, including an opening statement by president Ed Bush and the opening of a time capsule, which was buried on the 25th anniversary. Interviews of former presidents, administrators, faculty and students were conducted over the last year to prepare for these celebrations. The CRC Theatre Department recently took home a number of Elly Awards for the productions, "Servant of Two Masters," and "Getting Out." The annual Elly Awards honor outstanding achievements of community theaters and artists in the Sacramento area. Elly Awards are named for the late Eleanor McClatchy, who was a devoted patron of the local arts. The most notable is the Outstanding Achievement Award for Overall Production of "Getting Out." Other Outstanding Achievement awards were given for costume design, direction, leading and supporting female and others.

FLC: Folsom Lake College's Innovation Center continues to be recognized as a leader in the Maker movement and was recently accepted into two prestigious national programs. "Making Spaces: Expanding Maker Education Across the Nation" aims to sustainably integrate Making into educational institutions and build a national resource network. As a member of the program's new cohort, FLC's makerspace will lead a regional partnership with local schools, libraries, community organizations, and other educational institutions to help these new Maker sites launch and maintain programs. In addition, the Innovation Center has been chosen as a placement location for the "Makers + Mentors Network: Maker Fellows" program that will connect FLC students with underrepresented and underserved youth to serve as mentors for Maker-centered learning experiences that will help K-12 students build the academic and social skills key to their success in school, postsecondary enrollment, and workforce placement. These unique opportunities will allow the Innovation Center to continue and expand its efforts to bring "Making" deeper into the community that we serve.

SCC: Sacramento City College has been awarded a five-year, \$2.9 million Developing Hispanic Serving Institutions (DHSI) grant to support our work as an HSI. The federal grant will support an early college program focused on introducing local Latinx and low-income high school students to college through participation in dual enrollment. Dual enrollment allows high school students to enroll in college-level courses and earn college units and high school credit simultaneously. With dual enrollment programs, some students can earn an Associate Degree or Certificate and be prepared for employment or transfer to a four-year institution upon graduating from high school. This shortens a student's time to degree completion and ultimately allows them to enter their careers sooner.

#### **COURSE PROPOSALS**

#### **Course Deletions**

#### American River College

#### 1. ECE 356 Programs for the School-Age Child (3.00 units)

**Justification:** As part of a comprehensive effort to streamline our course offerings and provide direct pathways to employment, this course is being deleted. It is not required for employment and many of the topics are covered in other courses. We are beginning work on new courses and pathways that will provide the coursework required for those interested in transfer and Transitional Kindergarten-6th grade teaching.

#### 2. ECE 358 Activities for the School-Age Child (3.00 units)

**Justification:** In response to changing workforce demands, we are revising our School Age Certificate and removing this course. Several course topics are being incorporated in to ECE 356: Programs for the School-Age Child.

#### 3. ECE 407 Curriculum and Strategies for Children with Special Needs (4.00 units)

Justification: This course no longer meets the needs of our students and program.

#### 4. ECE 455 Environment Rating Scales in Early Childhood Programs (1.00 unit)

**Justification:** This course was originally developed and offered through a grant on a rotating basis among the four Los Rios colleges. The course is no longer offered and there are now community options available for students to receive this training. Content for this course is embedded throughout all of our Early Childhood Education courses.

## Folsom Lake College

#### 1. BIOL 392 Principles of Heritage Interpretation (3.00 units)

**Justification:** This course is cross-listed in Anthropology. It will continue to exist in that department. Removing the Biology cross-listing may make it easier for students to find an open spot when registering for classes.

#### 2. ENGRD 16 Basic Reading Skills (3.00 units)

**Justification:** Due to the implementation of AB 705 and the deletion of basic skills classes, this course is no longer being offered at Folsom Lake College.

#### 3. HIST 392 Principles of Heritage Interpretation (3.00 units)

**Justification:** This course is cross-listed in Anthropology. It will continue to exist in that department. Removing the History cross-listing may make it easier for students to find an open spot when registering for classes.

## Sacramento City College

#### 1. ANTH 320 Introduction to Archaeology and World Prehistory (3.00 units)

**Justification:** This course has been replaced with ANTH 323 and 324 to better align with courses at CSU and UC.

#### 2. ESL 34 Novice-High Skills Lab (0.50 - 1.50 units)

41.00 hours lecture, 39.00 hours laboratory

This course introduces how to operate, maintain, and troubleshoot mobile drilling machines. Topics include safety, horizontal and vertical drilling, lubrication, and maintenance.

**Justification:** This course is required as part of the Operating Engineer Apprenticeship. This course is being added based on current industry needs for safety, operation, and maintenance procedures for mobile drilling.

#### PROGRAM PROPOSALS

## **New Programs**

## American River College

#### 1. RCFE Administrator Training

This program prepares students for the duties, roles, and responsibilities of administrators working in a residential care facility for the elderly (RCFE). These non-medical assisted living and board and care residences are required to have at least one currently Certified Administrator. To become certified requires passing the state Administrator Exam and other requirements. Prior to applying to take the Administrator Exam, applicants must successfully complete a state approved Initial Certification Training Program (ICTP). After completing the ICTP, they have 60 days to pass the exam. This course is an approved ICTP. Every two years this program is reviewed by the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) for approval as an ICTP to confirm all the required curriculum and all the current state and federal laws and regulations are included. Upon successful completion of this course, students receive a certificate of completion from the Gerontology department confirming their completion of this approved ICTP. The certificate of completion is submitted with their application to take the state Administrator Exam.

Justification: This is a new certificate that corresponds to an existing state-approved vocational course. GERON 220 RCFE Administrator Training is a long-standing career education course for which students are issued a department certificate, but it is not currently wrapped in a program certificate, which has two negative consequences that impact students and the program: 1) Without being established as a program on the new website this career education certificate course does not appear on the Degree/Certificate list, which makes it difficult for students to find. 2) Because it is not currently set up as a program the district does not track annual certificate completions for this successful career education course like they do for all other GERON certificate completions.

#### Folsom Lake College

#### 2. Small Winery Marketing Certificate

The program offers comprehensive marketing and management training and workforce development to wine growers, vintners and tasting room operators in the El Dorado and Amador wine.

**Justification:** After completing a needs assessment addressing local employer needs in the winemaking areas of Amador and El Dorado Counties, faculty developed a program addressing training needs in winery management and marketing.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, on March 12, 2020 the District announced the suspension of all on-campus services effective March 18, 2020. The District's Board of Trustees issued a Declaration of Emergency for the District on March 17, 2020. On March 18, 2020, all campus facilities, including the Child Development Centers (CDCs) were closed to all students, faculty, staff and community members.

#### **STATUS:**

The California Department of Education (CDE) has issued guidance that continues to fund the Child Development programs for offering remote services during the District closure. The District submitted a plan to the CDE for meeting the requirements for the provision of quality distance learning services. CDC leadership is preparing a plan for safely reopening the early learning and care programs as soon as safely possible, but no later than when LRCCD campuses open for inperson instruction. That plan will be submitted to the Board of Trustees for public comment and approval before its implementation and reopening. In the interim, the CDCs will offer distance learning services and support the Early Childhood Instruction Program with guidance from the CDE during this physical closure.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the attached Resolution 2020-12, authorizing the continued closure of the Child Development Centers, the offering of distance learning services to children and families, and to support the Early Childhood Instruction Program during remote operations.

#### BACKGROUND:

The Public Employees' Retirement Law (PERL) requires that all reported pay rates to CalPERS be pursuant to publicly available pay schedules. All pay schedules must contain specific information as outlined under the California Code of Regulations (CCR) section 570.5. Based on this and guidance from CalPERs, if any positions are eliminated and the impacted employees are moved to a lower position/classification but are allowed to retain the higher pay rate, the following is required:

- 1. The Agency must continue to reflect the eliminated position(s) and its pay rate(s) on a pay schedule(s), but add a note to indicate when it was "eliminated and y-rated" and include the date it was eliminated and y-rated.
- 2. Ensure there is language reflected in the written labor policy or agreement that identifies/defines Y-Rating, including information clarifying that future COLAs, equity increases, etc. are not granted to Y-Rated positions. This information is applicable for employees with Classic and PEPRA membership with CalPERS.

#### **STATUS:**

The Y-Rate salary schedule will originally display six (6) positions that are currently Y-Rated at the Los Rios Community College District. The schedule references the effective date, salary schedule, and pay range in effect at time of Y-rating. Each year the Human Resources department will review and update the Y-rated salary schedule as necessary and obtain the Board of Trustees approval per the standard salary schedule process.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the salary schedule for Y-Rated employees effective July 1, 2020.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

As specified in Board Policy P-8252, within three months of the close of each fiscal year, an annual investment report of all District directed investments shall be presented to the Board of Trustees.

The purpose of the investment report is to inform the Board regarding District directed investments, consisting primarily of assets of the Retiree Health Benefits Trust, Bookstore, and certain fiduciary funds. The majority of the District's monetary assets – cash, cash equivalents, and investments – are required to be held in appropriate Sacramento County Treasury accounts and investments of such assets are directed by the County. For comparative purposes and a complete overview of investment and interest income earned by the District in 2019-20, the attached annual investment report shows both District and County directed monetary assets and their earnings.

#### **STATUS:**

District directed assets were invested in compliance with Board Policy P-8252. Detail regarding those investments for the year ended June 30, 2020 follows.

#### Retiree Health Benefits Trust (Trust):

On November 7, 2007 the Board established an irrevocable trust in response to accounting standards issued by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB), specifically GASB 43 and 45. Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. was appointed trustee and investment manager of the Trust. As the sponsor and sole contributor of monies to the Trust, the District has primary responsibility for the management of the Trust for the benefit of its current and future retirees. Under review by the Oversight Committee, established by the Board, and within investment guidelines and restrictions of Board Policy P-8252, the Wells Fargo Bank investment manager has invested Trust monies in various mutual and index funds. As of June 30, 2020, approximately 70% of the \$143.0 million portfolio was invested in bond funds and 30.0% in equity funds. The Committee meets quarterly with the investment manager to review the portfolio. As is good practice, returns are evaluated against benchmarks for similar investments.

Due to the consistency of the bond market and the continued strength of equity markets during the past fiscal year, the Trust had a net gain of \$10.2 million or approximately a 7.6% gain in asset

value. The net return for the past five years is 5.8% and the return since inception of the trust is 5.4%. The District goal for average return is currently 5%. An actuarial study is required every two years which allows for current economic conditions to be factored into the goal for annual returns.

## **Annual Investment Report:**

The first page of the attached report summarizes both District and County directed investment balances as of June 30, 2020 and the related earnings during fiscal year 2019-20. Only \$5.8 million of the total District funds (excluding Retiree Health) of nearly \$450.3 million is directed by the District. District funds have earned a weighted average annual percentage rate (APR) of 2.8%. Most of the District directed assets are invested in the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF).

The second page provides more detailed information about District directed investments. This includes trust assets that are professionally managed by Wells Fargo Bank since inception. The investment advisor meets regularly with the Retiree Health Benefits Trust Oversight Committee.

The third page of the report shows similar information regarding County and Escrow directed investments. Except for the Bond Projects and Bond Interest and Redemption Funds, County directed assets are invested in the County's pooled account, which earned 1.85% in 2019-20. Proceeds from the District's sale of General Obligation (GO) Bonds are separately invested by the County in commercial paper, government agency notes and other authorized investment instruments. Earnings on these separately invested GO Bond monies ranged from 1.56% - 2.46% in fiscal year 2019-20. Investment earnings for the Bond Projects or Bond Interest and Redemption funds may only be expended for bond project costs or bond debt service, respectively.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees accept the District's Annual Investment Report for fiscal year 2019-20.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The 2020-21 General fund tentative budget, adopted by the Board of Trustees in June, has been revised to reflect the enacted State budget. The Board is required to hold a public hearing on the proposed budget for the fiscal year on or before the 15th day of September. For 2020-21, this date has been extended by one month. Budget revisions will be brought to the Board as needed, typically at least twice during the year.

The Governor's May Revise proposal for California's Community Colleges was the basis for the tentative budget. The enacted State budget is substantially similar to the May Revise, but it defers \$1.5 billion in CCC funding to 2021-22. Of the \$1.5 billion deferral, up to \$791 million would be rescinded if Congress approves a fourth stimulus package with sufficient funding by October 15, 2020. These deferrals we're in exchange for the massive cuts proposed for the Student Centered Funding Formula and categorical programs in the May Revision.

The enacted budget increases the Tentative Budget by approximately \$10.6 million under the Student Centered Funding Formula, which is the hold harmless level. All three budgets project the formula would yield the same funding as 2019-20. The X budget assumes a 10% decrease in full-time equivalent students, the Y budget assumes a 7.5% decrease in full-time equivalent students served. While the decline will not impact our overall apportionment from the state, it will impact the level of funding we believe will be on-going and will force us to ensure our on-going expenditures match our projections of on-going revenues.

The District's fiscal health is strong. The budget is balanced and reserves are in line with board policy. The District is strategically using funds provided by the federal government (CARES Act) and state government (COVID-19 Block Grant) to mitigate and offset impacts caused by the disruption. Additionally, there are sufficient resources in the Capital Outlay Projects Fund that could be accessed to support operational needs if needed. Further, the District continues to fund and refine projections to mitigate the impact of increasing employer contributions required by CalPERS and CalSTRS.

#### **STATUS:**

The budget scenarios for the General Fund are titled the X, Y, and Z budgets. All three budgets project the formula would yield the same funding as 2019-20, which is the hold harmless level. The X budget assumes a 10% decrease in full-time equivalent students, the Y budget assumes a 7.5% decrease in full-time equivalent students, and the Z budget assumes a 5% decrease in full-time equivalent students served.

The variations in the X, Y and Z budgets are captured in the appropriation area entitled Program and Salary Improvement and the three budgets are summarized on the attached General Fund schedule. The District is currently operating at the X budget level.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees conduct a public hearing to receive comments on the proposed budgets and adopt the 2020-21 proposed budgets for the General Fund (Z budget), Instructionally-Related, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, Debt Service, Enterprise, Internal Service, Fiduciary, Trust and Auxiliary Funds of the District for filing with the appropriate County/State agencies.
