Chancellor's Report:

ARC: ARC alum Sean Groark has been honored with the 2020 Coast Guard Aeronautical Engineering Officer of the Year Award. This annual award, presented by the Assistant Commandant for Engineering and Logistics and sponsored by the Coast Guard Aviation Association, recognizes individual accomplishments and achievements within the Aeronautical Engineering Program. Sean, who is a Lieutenant Commander with the Coast Guard, is serving as the Air Station Clearwater Assistant Aeronautical Engineering Officer. During Hurricane Dorian he established an international base of operations supporting Coast Guard response. Stepping up to serve as the acting Engineering Officer for 109 days, he faced unprecedented challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. Due to Department of Defense COVID-19 policy, Sean rapidly coordinated the evacuation and relocation of the Atlantic Undersea Test and Evaluation Center to Exuma Island, enabling continuity of operations and sustaining international partnerships. Sean was an ARC student athlete 2001-03 (swimming); his senior year at Sac State he returned to ARC to serve as an assistant coach.

CRC: The CRC Music Department found a unique way to serve students during the fall semester, which proved very successful. So much so, that they will continue it this spring semester. The music department created the "In the Studio," online weekly series, which featured innovative artists pushing the boundaries in their fields. The series also highlighted student voices through a series of open mics and student ensemble performances. Performers from New York to Philadelphia to Vancouver to Sacramento participated in the series, bringing world-class artists to the CRC Community to talk about their craft. The unique series got the attention of local media as well and two of CRC's music professors were interviewed on Good Morning Sacramento and KCRA. The music department plans to do another series this spring semester.

FLC: Folsom Lake College's Emergency Medical Technology (EMT) program recently received approval as an official EMT Training Program by the El Dorado County Office of Emergency Medical Services. This college-community collaboration brings several benefits, including enhanced utilization of the Los Rios eLearning opportunities, patient simulation assets, and use of the region's Mobile Sim Lab. Thank you to Professors Jim Wold and Reynando Accooe and Dean of Career Education Vicky Maryatt for their efforts in pursuing this certification.

SCC: Former Panther Roshaun Davis was honored as one of Sacramento Business Journal's 40 Under 40 for his work as the founder and CEO of Unseen Heroes, an event marketing and management company. While an emcee for hip-hop group Righteous Movement, Roshaun realized that there weren't any artist management agencies representing or hiring people of color, like him, so he learned how to do it himself. As he delved into the industry he realized this was not unique to the Sacramento music industry and in 2008 launched Unseen Heroes to be able to create unforgettable moments by bringing together local businesses, entrepreneurs, designers, artists, makers, farmers, and chefs.

COURSE PROPOSALS

Course Deletions

American River College

1. FREN 401 Elementary French (4.00 units)

Justification: As part of a comprehensive effort to streamline our offerings and offer languages that serve our student population, we are deleting our French courses. French is offered at both FLC and SCC for students that wish to study the language.

2. FREN 402 Elementary French (4.00 units)

Justification: As part of a comprehensive effort to streamline our offerings and offer languages that serve our student population, we are deleting our French courses. French is offered at both FLC and SCC for students that wish to study the language.

3. FREN 411 Intermediate French (4.00 units)

Justification: As part of a comprehensive effort to streamline our offerings and offer languages that serve our student population, we are deleting our French courses. French is offered at both FLC and SCC for students that wish to study the language.

4. FREN 412 Intermediate French (4.00 units)

Justification: As part of a comprehensive effort to streamline our offerings and offer languages that serve our student population, we are deleting our French courses. French is offered at both FLC and SCC for students that wish to study the language.

5. FREN 495 Independent Studies in French (1.00 - 3.00 units)

Justification: As part of a comprehensive effort to streamline our offerings and offer languages that serve our student population, we are deleting our French courses. French is offered at both FLC and SCC for students that wish to study the language.

6. FREN 499 Experimental Offering in French (0.50 - 4.00 units)

Justification: As part of a comprehensive effort to streamline our offerings and offer languages that serve our student population, we are deleting our French courses. French is offered at both FLC and SCC for students that wish to study the language.

7. GERON 330 Communicating with and Validating Older Adults (3.00 units)

Justification: Based on program review, this course has been determined to not meet the needs of our students.

8. GERON 334 Reminiscence Therapy (3.00 units)

Justification: Based on program review, this course has been determined to not meet the needs of our students.

New to District Courses

American River College

1. CALJA 101 Fire Fighter 101 (2.50 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Registered Fire Fighter Apprentice

31.50 hours lecture, 40.50 hours laboratory

This course is the first in a series for an apprentice Fire Fighter. This course provides information on jobs and duties of an apprentice Fire Fighter. Topics covered in the course are based on the needs of the apprentice and the fire agency, with focus on the related and supplemental instruction specified by the Rules and Regulations of the California Firefighter Joint Apprenticeship Committee (CAL-JAC).

Justification: This course is part of a new apprenticeship program we are creating at American River College. It is a required course in the State of California Fire Fighter Apprenticeship program.

2. CISP 455 Intermediate Enterprise Software Development and Engineering (4.50 units)

Prerequisite: CISP 451 with a grade of "C" or better

81.00 hours lecture

This is the second in a series of two courses that focus on the development and engineering of software products in an enterprise environment. This course introduces DevOps practices, introductory level programming, web development, and design patterns.

Justification: This course is a part of a proposed Enterprise Software Engineering and Development certificate that forms the RSI (related supplementary instruction) of two apprenticeship programs. These apprenticeship programs develop individuals into journey-workers in the IBM z mainframe software development and engineering industries. Specifically, this course introduces knowledge, concepts, and skills that are fundamental to the development and engineering of IBM z System software.

3. SLPA 116 SLPA Therapy Techniques: Neurogenic Communication Disorders (2.00 units)

Prerequisite: SLPA 300 with a grade of "C" or better

36.00 hours lecture

This course explores specific neurologically-based disorders of communication and their causes and characteristics as acquired by adult clientele. Specific materials and strategies are emphasized for therapeutic service delivery within the realm of speech, language, and cognition. It covers anatomy, neurological etiologies, remediation techniques/material/equipment, rationales for commonly used therapeutic approaches, individual vs. group therapy, service provision sites, data collection, clinical documentation and record keeping, and the role of the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant (SLPA).

Justification: This course provides the SLPA student the opportunity to have more direct instruction in the field of adult neurogenic communication disorders - treatment materials and therapeutic intervention. The national governing body is working on developing medical billing codes for Speech-Language Pathology Assistants (SLPAs). Once completed, the SLPA will be able to bill for therapy services affiliated with rehabilitation facilities and home health agencies. This course meets industry standards per the SLPA Advisory Committee.

4. SLPA 117 SLPA Therapy Techniques: School Age (2.00 units)

Prerequisite: SLPA 300 with a grade of "C" or better

36.00 hours lecture

This course explores specific disorders of communication and therapeutic service provision with the school-aged population. Specific materials and strategies regarding service delivery are emphasized, with a focus on evidence-based practice. It covers remediation techniques and rationales for commonly used therapeutic approaches, strategies for service delivery in school and clinic environments, materials management, proxemics, data collection, safety, and communication with caregiver, colleagues and supervisor. This course also reviews service delivery models, scope of responsibilities, and the role of the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant (SLPA) in intervention.

Justification: This course provides the SLPA student the opportunity to have more direct instruction in the field of communication disorders occurring with the school-aged population - treatment materials and therapeutic intervention. Private practices, Non-Public Agencies (NPAs), and educational institutions offer a wide variety of intervention services and this course would further prepare the SLPA student for fieldwork and employment opportunities. It meets industry standards as per the SLPA Advisory Committee.

5. SLPA 118 SLPA Therapy Techniques: Early Intervention (1.50 units)

Prerequisite: SLPA 300 with a grade of "C" or better

18.00 hours lecture, 27.00 hours laboratory

This course explores specific disorders of communication and therapeutic service provision with the Early Intervention (EI) population. Specific materials and strategies regarding service delivery are emphasized, with a focus on evidence-based practice. It also covers remediation techniques and rationales for commonly used therapeutic approaches, strategies for service delivery in home and clinic environments, materials management, proxemics, data collection, safety, and communication with caregiver and supervisor. This course reviews the scope of responsibilities and the role of the Speech-Language Pathology Assistant (SLPA) in intervention.

Justification: This course provides the SLPA student the opportunity to have more direct instruction in the field of communication disorders occurring in the pediatric realm of Early Intervention (EI) - treatment materials and therapeutic intervention. Private practices and Non-Public Agencies (NPAs) in the industry offer a wide variety of EI services and this course would further prepare the SLPA student for employment opportunities. It meets industry standards as per the SLPA Advisory Committee.

Sacramento City College

1. NUTRI 333 Food Safety and Sanitation (3.00 units)

Prerequisite: None.

54.00 hours lecture

This course encompasses all phases of food sanitation: food safety principles and application, causes of food borne illnesses, sanitary practices in food preparation, microbiology of food safety, sanitation of kitchen and dining areas, infection control, and kitchen safety issues. Laws and regulations related to consumer and foodservice operations

will also be examined. Lastly, this course will prepare students for the national foodservice sanitation certification exam (Servesafe).

Justification: Offering this course has several goals: 1. for our students to earn a Serve Safe Certificate after completion, which is needed to work in most aspects of the food industry, 2. to provide our students with the opportunity to put nutrition and food science theory into practice.

PROGRAM PROPOSALS

New Programs

Folsom Lake College

1. Business Analyst

The program content includes: customer service and stakeholder analysis, problem solving and critical thinking, the role of the business analyst, business analyst tasks, written and verbal communications, and the use of data and information in making business decisions.

Justification: The Business Analyst certificate program meets the minimum requirements for state workers to move into an entry level position as a staff services analyst position. This program prepares students for career preparation and college transfer. The program will stack to three degree programs including the AA Business Analysis/Data Analytics, the AS-T Business Administration, and the AA Public Management.

BACKGROUND:

In 1998, the District and Los Rios Colleges Foundation (Foundation) adopted a Master Agreement whereby the Foundation became an auxiliary organization of the District. All college foundations' investment activities were combined under the Foundation. Morgan Stanley is the investment consultant for the Foundation.

As an auxiliary organization, the Foundation is not required to operate under GC 53600 investment restrictions. The Foundation Board has a Statement of Rules, Objectives and Guidelines (Statement) to govern the investment of funds, last revised June 2018. The funds should be invested with care, skill, prudence and diligence with the goal of producing returns equal to or exceeding prevailing standards among foundations of similar asset size, as well as for the protection of funds held in perpetual duration. The Statement defines the investment guidelines for specified asset classes for endowed funds as follows: equities, defined as common stock, convertible preferred stock, convertible bonds, and convertible stock, shall represent 25-60% of the total fund assets; fixed-income securities, defined as investments with maturities greater than one year that pay a fixed rate of return, shall represent 17-50% of the total fund assets; and cash, defined as maturities shorter than one year, shall represent 2-10% of the total fund assets. In addition, the Statement provides guidelines for investing non-endowed funds based upon the purpose of the donation and the horizon of time for the use of funds. The three non-endowed portfolio funds available are cash management, fixed income and balanced funds.

STATUS:

The Foundation Quarterly Investment Report, including realized and unrealized earnings, represents the investment activity for the fiscal year through December 31, 2020. The Los Rios Colleges Foundation Finance Committee directs the investments of the Foundation. The fiscal year-to-date return for the endowed portfolio of \$11.7 million was 15.41% compared to 15.99% for the composite benchmark. The fiscal year-to-date return for the total managed portfolio of \$15 million was 11.60% compared to 12.18% for the composite benchmark. In accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, investments are restated to market value as of each fiscal year-end.





BACKGROUND:

On October 14, 2020, the Governing Board adopted the 2020-21 maximum funding level (Z Budget) for the General Fund. The attached Schedule I details modifications to this funding level since adoption. General Fund revenues and appropriations are budgeted \$31.3 million higher than the adopted level due to the recognition of additional general purpose, and restricted/special programs revenues. General fund unrestricted revenue increased by \$10.3 million, which is predominantly due to the allocation of the Program Development Funds presented to the Governing Board at the December 2020 meeting. Restricted revenues increased by \$21.0 million, which is predominantly due to additional awards received since the budget was adopted as shown on Schedule II. Additional CARES funding award letters are still in process and will be included in the next budget revision.

Neither the final calculation for fiscal year 2019-20 nor the first principal apportionment (P1) for 2020-21 have been released as of February 2nd. The P1 is based upon attendance reporting submitted Jan. 15th along with projected enrollment fee and property tax revenues. Under the new formula, attendance, outcomes, and demographic data from the three most recent prior years are used to calculate the District's entitlement. The District's hold harmless entitlement, which is the basis for the X budget, remains at \$324 million. Staff will update 2020-21 projections when the P1 is issued and adjustments will be included in budget revision No. 2, scheduled for the June meeting. As usual, the District continues to operate at the X budget level.

STATUS:

Revisions to the adopted budget for the General Fund are necessary for the following reasons:

- 1. Schedule I summarizes changes to revenues, appropriations and fund balance for the general fund. The change in restricted fund balance is the appropriation of restricted lottery funds.
- Schedule II provides specific adjustments to restricted and special program revenues. Restricted revenues reflect new awards for Federal and State programs, as well as augmentations to existing programs for federal, state and local. The changes in appropriations reflect the allocation of those additional resources as well as re-alignment

across object codes as expenditure plans are formalized.

Revisions to other District funds due to:

- 3. Instructionally-Related Activities (Schedule III): Increases to revenue and appropriation of uncommitted fund balance.
- 4. Capital Outlay Projects (Schedule IV): Increase in local revenues reflect donations from Foundation and increases in transfers from other funds. Changes in appropriations reflect the allocation of the donations, program development funds, and miscellaneous spending plan adjustments.
- 5. Bond Projects Measure M (Schedule V): Estimated increase to bond service costs.
- 6. Self Insurance (Schedule VI): Increase in insurance premium and minor change in funding and appropriations for dental program.
- 7. Student Financial Aid (Schedule VII): Increase in State Categorical programs transferred from the General Fund.
- 8. Student Associations Trust (Schedule VIII): Appropriation of beginning fund balance.
- 9. Scholarship & Loan Trust (Schedule IX): Appropriation of beginning fund balance.
- 10. Los Rios Colleges Foundation (Schedule X): Increase to estimated donations and updates to fund balance.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the revised budgets for the General, Instructionally Related Activities, Capital Outlay Projects, Bond Projects, Self Insurance, Student Financial Aid, Student Associations Trust, Scholarship & Loan Trust, and Los Rios Colleges Foundation funds shown on the attached schedules, and that the related documents be filed with the County Superintendent of Schools.

BACKGROUND:

Education Code Section 72023.5(a) requires the board of trustees of each community college district to have at least one non-voting student member to be chosen by the students in a manner determined by the board. Education Code Section 72023.5(b)(3) provides that the Student Trustee may receive compensation for board service, at the discretion of the governing board, up to the amount allowed for elected board members.

Los Rios Board Policies provide for payment to the Student Trustee in two areas: (1) travel reimbursement/mileage while performing services on behalf of the District; and (2) a monthly stipend. The Student Trustee is also eligible for District health, medical, and dental insurance policies through plans adopted by the District.

Los Rios Board Policies provide for the Student Trustee to receive reimbursement for mileage in the same manner and to the same extent as other Board of Trustee members. Los Rios Board Policies set the Student Trustee stipend at seventy-five percent (75%) of the stipend received by elected members of the Board, and specifically except the Student Trustee from receiving the full amount allowed under the Education Code.

STATUS:

The proposed Policy amendments, if adopted, would provide the Student Trustee with a monthly stipend equal to other members of the Los Rios Board of Trustees. The Student Trustee would continue to be eligible for District health, medical and dental insurance and travel reimbursement/mileage in the same manner and to the same extent as other Board of Trustee members.

RECOMMENDATION:

The attached amendments to Board Policies P-3123 Student Trustee Rights and Responsibilities and P-3221 Compensation and Reimbursement are presented for first reading.

1.0 Rights and Privileges of the Student Trustee (Ed. Code, § 72023.5.)

- 1.1 The Student Trustee shall be acknowledged to have the following rights:
 - 1.1.1 The right to attend all meetings of the Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees, except closed sessions.
 - 1.1.2 The right to be seated with the members of the Board of Trustees and to be recognized as a full member of the Board of Trustees at the meetings, including receiving all materials presented to the Board of Trustees members, except confidential materials and to participate in the questioning of witnesses and the discussion of issues with all parliamentary rights, except for the right to cast a binding vote.
 - 1.1.3 The right to make or second a motion to be acted upon by the Board of Trustees.
 - 1.1.4 The right to place items on the agenda to the same extent as other Board of Trustees members.
 - 1.1.5 The right to cast an advisory vote.
 - 1.1.6 The right to receive all health benefits provided by the District to other members of the Board of Trustees.
- 1.2 The Student Trustee may serve on committees appointed by the Board of Trustees, and consisting of Board of Trustees members.
- 1.3 The Student Trustee shall not serve as president of the Board of Trustees.
- 1.4 The Student Trustee shall not be included in determining the vote required to carry any measure before the Board of Trustees.
- 1.5 The Student Trustee shall not be liable for any acts of the Board of Trustees.
- 1.6 The Board of Trustees, by majority vote, may on a case by case basis permit the Student Trustee to attend closed sessions where the Student Trustee's input could be useful to the Board of Trustees.
- 1.7 The Student Trustee shall receive orientation and inservice regarding Board of Trustees procedures.

2.0 Responsibilities of the Student Trustee

2.1 The Student Trustee shall meet with the student association officers of the Colleges at the Student Advisory Committee meeting once each month. The Student Trustee will chair the Student Advisory Committee meetings.

- 2.1.1 If the Student Trustee is unable to attend the Student Advisory Committee meeting, the Student Trustee shall appoint a designee to chair the meeting.
- 2.2 The Student Trustee may make a brief report to the Board of Trustees at Board of Trustees meetings.
- 2.3 The Student Trustee shall keep the students informed through articles or a column in the various student newspapers on a regular basis.
- 2.4 The Student Trustee shall serve on committees as assigned by the Board of Trustees. (See P-3134.)
- 2.5 The Student Trustee is expected to read and become familiar with Los Rios Board Policies and Administrative Regulations.

3.0 Expenses

- 3.1 The Student Trustee shall receive reimbursement for mileage in the same manner and to the same extent as other Board of Trustees members.
- 3.2 When acting as a representative of the Board of Trustees or performing services directed by the Board of Trustees, the Student Trustee shall receive payment for travel expenses in accordance with the schedule for reimbursement, Administrative Regulation (R-8341), Section 3.0. Such travel assignments shall be limited to travel within the State of California.
- 3.3 The Student Trustee shall receive a monthly stipend equal to seventy-five percent (75%) of the stipend received by the members of the Board of Trustees elected through the general election processes in the State of California. This stipend shall be based on attendance at meetings as prescribed for the Board of Trustees in Board Policy (P-3221), Section 1.2. The Student Trustee does not attend closed sessions, and is not expected to attend Board of Trustees retreats or special Board of Trustees meetings which consist of only a closed session.

Compensation and Reimbursement

1.0 Remuneration (Ed. Code, § 72024)

- 1.1 Compensation for Services
 - 1.1.1 Compensation for services rendered shall be determined by legal provisions governing such payment.
 - 1.1.2 Each member of the Los Rios Community College District Board of Trustees, <u>except-including</u> the Student Trustee, shall receive as compensation for services the full amount as provided for in Education Code, section 72024.
 - 1.1.3 The Board of Trustees may increase the compensation beyond the limits delineated in this section, in an amount not to exceed five (5) percent based on the present monthly rate of compensation.
- 1.2 Absence from Meeting
 - 1.2.1 Any Trustee who does not attend all meetings held by the Board of Trustees in any month may receive no more than a pro rata share of the number of meetings actually attended based upon the compensation established in section 1.1.2 above.
 - 1.2.2 A Trustee shall be paid for any meeting when absent if the Board of Trustees adopts a resolution that at the time of the meeting the Trustee was performing other services for the Los Rios Community College District, was ill, was on jury duty, or the absence was due to a hardship deemed acceptable by the Board of Trustees. This Board of Trustees shall consider this resolution once a year for the prior year's meetings. Trustees that report an excused absence shall regularly receive compensation for the meeting(s) missed during the year; however, if an absence is deemed unexcused, the Trustee shall be required to reimburse the District for that absence.
 - 1.2.3 A Trustee, including the Student Trustee, may be paid in any calendar year for the first two absences in a calendar year if the Board of Trustees adopts a resolution that, at the time of the meeting, the Trustee was ill, on jury duty, or the absence was due to a hardship deemed acceptable by the Board of Trustees.
- 1.3 Payment
 - 1.3.1 Warrants for the payment to Trustees for services rendered shall be paid in the same manner as all other service is paid.

Compensation and Reimbursement

2.0 Reimbursement Authorization

- 2.1 The District provides the reimbursement of expenses incurred by Trustees for the following:
 - 2.1.1 Travel to and from Board of Trustees meetings.
 - 2.1.2 In-District travel to perform District business relating to assignments delegated by the Board of Trustees.
 - 2.1.3 Out-of-District travel and accommodations for conferences and professional meetings.
- 2.2 Authorization to attend meetings and to conduct District business shall be in accordance with approval given at the organization meeting held in conjunction with the first regular meeting in December each year.

3.0 Reimbursement Guidelines

- 3.1 A Trustee shall receive reimbursement for necessary and reasonable expenses as follows:
 - 3.1.1 Payment of mileage on personal cars for travel to and from Board of Trustees meetings shall be at the per mile reimbursement rate established by the Internal Revenue Code.
 - 3.1.2 Payment for in-District travel to perform District business relating to assignments delegated by the Board of Trustees shall be paid at a monthly rate. This payment shall be considered as reimbursement for mileage on personal cars and incidental expenses related to performance of assigned responsibilities. Monthly payment rates are as follows:
 - 3.1.2.1 Board of Trustees President: \$120.00 per month
 - 3.1.2.2 Board of Trustees Vice President: \$70.00 per month
 - 3.1.2.3 Trustee with a delegated assignment: \$60.00 per month
 - 3.1.3 Payment for travel related to attendance at official out-of-District conferences or professional meetings shall be in accordance with Administrative Regulation <u>R-8341</u>.

4.0 Health and Dental Coverage

4.1 Coverage for health, medical, and dental insurance is provided for members of the Board of Trustees, including the Student Trustee, through plans adopted by the District.

Compensation and Reimbursement

4.2 The District makes a monthly contribution toward the cost of premiums in accordance with the contribution level for management employees.

5.0 Public Employees Retirement System (PERS)/Social Security

- 5.1 Trustees elected after July 1, 1994 are not eligible to participate in PERS (SB 53).
- 5.2 Trustees are automatically covered under Social Security and Medicare.

The Board of Trustees' Policy 3115 requires the Board to annually adopt a Statement of Legislative Principles.

STATUS:

The District's Strategic Plan remains the same and the legislative work that will further that plan remains largely the same. As a result, staff has not made any changes to the District's existing Statement of Legislative Principles.

RECOMMENDATION:

The draft Statement of Legislative Principles is submitted for the Board of Trustees' review and discussion. It is recommended that the Board of Trustees discuss the proposed draft and provide further direction for the approval of the final document at its next regular board meeting.

Annual Statement of Legislative Principles

This Statement of Legislative Principles is adopted by the Board of Trustees for the Los Rios Community College District on behalf of itself and its four separately accredited Colleges (American River College, Cosumnes River College, Folsom Lake College and Sacramento City College) under Board Policy P-3115. This Statement is intended to support the District's Strategic Goals: to establish effective pathways that optimize student access and success; to ensure equitable academic achievement across all racial, ethnic, socioeconomic and gender groups; to provide exemplary teaching and learning opportunities; to lead the region in workforce development; and to foster an outstanding working and learning environment.

This Statement of Legislative Principles provides guidelines for the Chancellor when addressing matters before the California Legislature and Congress, and constitutes the core principles guiding the development of the District's position on legislation.

The District shall not support or oppose legislation unless the outcome will have a significant effect on the District, its students or its employees. The District will remain neutral on most matters affecting local collective bargaining. However, the District will take appropriate positions where that legislation will have a material impact on the District. The District will remain neutral on matters affecting only another single district or small group of district(s), except where policy precedents, or resource allocations, have the significant potential of affecting the Los Rios Community College District or the California Community College System generally. Where issues are raised in the budget process, the District shall seek legislative support or opposition in accordance with the principles established in this document. Where legislation is likely to impede the policy principles set forth, the District is likely to oppose that legislation unless there are significant countervailing reasons.

The Board of Trustees' Legislative Principles align with the District's Vision, Mission, Values, Goals and Strategies, as enumerated in the District's Strategic Plan, as follows, but do not reflect every strategy under each goal area. The District will support those legislative efforts enumerated under each Goal.

1. ESTABLISH EFFECTIVE PATHWAYS THAT OPTIMIZE STUDENT ACCESS AND SUCCESS.

- Obtain resources to support pathway programs.
- Implement appropriate measures to improve student success.
- Support the provision of comprehensive student support services.
- Strengthen the academic preparation of K-12 students to support success at a community college.
- Support collaborative efforts with four-year institutions designed to provide additional transfers for our students and legislation that promotes transfers.

- Support flexibility for dual enrollment and remove barriers as appropriate.
- Expand student financial aid opportunities (including, but not limited to, Cal Grants and CA Promise Programs) that reduce the total costs of attending college for students.
- Assist students with the application process for attending a community college and transferring to a four-year institution of higher education.
- Support the enhancement of existing successful educational programs and the development of needed new programs
- Support high quality online education while minimizing regulatory barriers and additional reporting requirements.

2. ENSURE EQUITABLE ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT ACROSS ALL RACIAL, ETHNIC, SOCIOECONOMIC AND GENDER GROUPS.

- Close the achievement gap.
- Support the Dream Act and efforts to expand the institutional capacity for diversity.
- Increase effective delivery of English, ESL and mathematics.
- Enhance opportunities for underserved constituencies.

3. PROVIDE EXEMPLARY TEACHING AND LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES.

• Support professional development for faculty, staff and administrators that is designed to support student success inside and outside of the classroom.

4. LEAD THE REGION IN WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT.

- Develop effective and relevant career and technical programs in collaboration with external partners.
- Increase efforts that align career technical education curriculum and program development among community colleges, K-12 and industry.
- Integrate community colleges in the Workforce Investment Board and provide for community college courses to qualify for state and federal funding of workforce development activities.
- Support the efforts of the Los Rios Colleges Foundation in its efforts to develop additional funding resources for the District, Colleges, faculty, staff and students.

5. FOSTER AN OUTSTANDING WORKING AND LEARNING ENVIRONMENT.

- Maintain local authority and control in the administration of the District and its Colleges.
- Maintain locally elected Board of Trustee governance in the administration of the District and its Colleges.

- Promote the health, safety and welfare of students, faculty, staff and administrators, including mental health.
- Support the District's and its Colleges' efforts to attract, recruit and retain the most qualified and diverse employees, and assure appropriate staffing levels.
- Support participatory decision making.
- Increase the District's efforts in sustainable practices, including energy and resource conservation, while retaining appropriate flexibility.
- Strengthen the District's ability to use its capital outlay, infrastructure bonds and property management funds efficiently.
- Support the elimination of duplicative and/or needless regulatory oversight and reporting obligations, and provide adequate funding for the oversight and reporting requirements that are necessary.
- Protect the fiscal integrity of the system.
- Support funding sustainable mechanisms for reducing the unfunded liability in the CalSTRS and the CalPERS programs.
- Support backfill of property tax shortfalls.
- Provide information and support for students, faculty, staff and administrators in the DACA programs to support inclusivity and ensure that the District and its Colleges remain a place where all students are provided with an opportunity to fulfill their educational goals and dreams.
- Support a model for alignment of accreditation that improves outcomes for our students.

BACKGROUND:

Per Education Code § 84040, the governing board of each community college district shall provide for an annual audit of all funds, books, and accounts of the district in accordance with regulations of the Board of Governors. The audit shall be made by certified public accountants licensed by the California Board of Accountancy. The audit consists of the examination of the District's financial statements, a review of the systems of internal accounting controls, and a review of state and federal compliance areas mandated by the Federal Single Audit Act and the State Audit Manual. Pursuant to Title 5 CCR § 59106, each district governing board shall review the annual audit at a public meeting and submit the audit report to the California Community College Chancellor's Office. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the audit report submission deadline to the Chancellor's Office was extended to February 28, 2021.

Eide Bailly LLP completed the June 30, 2020 annual audits of the District, the June 30, 2020 annual financial and performance audits of the Measure A and Measure M bond funds, the June 30, 2019 annual audit of the retiree health benefits trust, and the June 30, 2020 annual audit of the Foundation. The audits were successfully completed without any significant deficiencies, material weaknesses, or findings for the ninth consecutive fiscal year.

A representative from Eide Bailly will be present to comment and respond to questions concerning the annual audits.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees receive the annual audits for the 2019-20 fiscal year.

BACKGROUND:

Education Code 76140 requires governing boards to establish a nonresident tuition fee for the succeeding fiscal year no later than March 1st of each year. Since the District does not receive any State funds for the education of out-of-state and international students, the District is required to assess these students for the cost of their education.

As prescribed in statute, the governing board may choose between these six (6) specified fee calculation options:

- Los Rios' Current Expense for Education (CEE) per unit of Full-Time Equivalent Students (FTES) for 2019-20, increased by the projected compounded factor for the increase in the U.S. Consumer Price Index (USCPI) for the current and succeeding fiscal years (two-yearperiod).
- 2. The statewide average CEE per unit of FTES (2019-20) increased by the two-year projected USCPI increase.
- 3. A unit rate no greater than a contiguous district's established rate.
- A unit rate greater than the statewide average and less than the district's calculated rate. (This option is only available to districts whose calculated rate is greater than the statewide average rate.)
- 5. Highest statewide calculated average rate for the succeeding, current and the past four years (highest calculated rate during these six years).
- 6. No more than the average of the nonresident tuition fees of public community colleges in no less than 12 states that are comparable to California in cost of living.

Districts may also elect to charge a capital outlay fee to nonresident students.

The District's 2020-21 nonresident tuition is \$290 per unit and the 2020-21 capital outlay fee is \$17 per unit.

The rates proposed for 2021-22 by contiguous districts were not available at the time the agenda was prepared.

Since at least 2011-12, the Board has adopted nonresident tuition rates based upon option 5. In some years, more than one option may yield the same result but option 5 is the most consistent as far as being reasonably stable with moderate increases. Option 1 has spiked up and down in recent years due to the shifting of summer term FTES. Without contiguous district information, the range for 2021-22 is \$307 to \$328, as option 6 is not consistent with the District's interest to provide access to non-resident students to augment the diversity of our students. The recommendation is to select option 5 at \$307 per unit.

B. Capital Outlay Fee:

by CCCCO)

In addition to the nonresident tuition fee, Education Code 76141 authorizes districts to charge nonresident students a capital outlay fee not to exceed the prior year's expenditures for capital outlay per unit of instruction. The calculated capital outlay fee for 2021-22 is \$42 per unit, which is the maximum rate that may be used. It is recommended that the capital outlay fee be set at the rate of \$17 for 2021-22.

Historical data regarding nonresident tuition and international student capital outlay fee and other informational schedules are attached.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt for 2021-22, a nonresident tuition fee rate of \$307 per unit effective for the summer 2021 term. In addition, it is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt for 2021-22, the student capital outlay fee of \$17 per unit to be assessed to all nonresident students also effective for the summer 2021 term.
