COURSE PROPOSALS

Course Deletions

American River College

1. MATH 311 Mathematical Concepts for Elementary School Teachers - Number Systems (3 units)

Justification: The course has never been offered and no longer meets the needs of our students.

Folsom Lake College

1. BUSTEC 102 Computer Keyboarding 10-Key (1 unit)

Justification: This course is no longer a part of the accounting certificate. This change was made some time ago. Since the change enrollments have dropped. The relevant curriculum has been added to BUSTEC 307. This course is no longer part of any degrees/certificates. There are no longer any current articulation agreements with local high schools for this course. The BUSTEC department at FLC has decided to delete this course.

2. BUSTEC 110 Business Procedures for Professional Success (3 units)

Justification: As part of a district wide review of curriculum in the BUSTEC department, we have decided to delete this course. BUSTEC 305 will be the replacement class when needed. BUSTEC 305 has been recently updated. This class is not listed in any cataloged degrees or certificates.

3. ENGLT 313 Arthurian and Chivalric Literature (3 units)

Justification: Course has reached its 6 year revision cycle and has not been taught since last revision. The person who taught it was fairly specific to the class (author I believe) and will not be teaching it again. Because of its specificity, it is unlikely to be taught by our other faculty. It is also on our General Electives list for degrees and poses a liability as it goes out of compliance.

4. FITNS 352 Core Conditioning IV: Power Sculpting (1 unit)

Justification: This course has not filled well in recent years, and we've created newer FITNS curriculum since the introduction of this course.

5. HEED 351 Personal Health and Wellness (3 units)

Justification: This course has not filled well in recent years, and we have written newer and more relevant curriculum.

6. SPORT 340 Golf, Intercollegiate-Men (3 units)

Justification: We no longer have a men's golf team at FLC.

7. SPORT 341 Off Season Conditioning for Golf (0.5 - 3 units)

Justification: We no longer have a golf team at FLC.

8. TMACT 302 Soccer - Outdoor (1 unit)

Justification: The course had not been offered in recent years, and we've created newer TMACT curriculum since the introduction of this course.

9. TMACT 303 Outdoor Soccer II (1 unit)

Justification: The course had not been offered in recent years, and we've created newer TMACT curriculum since the introduction of this course.

New to District Courses

American River College

1. CARPT 161 Acoustical Blueprint Reading Basic (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a registered Carpenter Apprentice.

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course covers acoustical blueprints, conventions, lines, symbols, measurements, and specifications used for acoustical construction. It also covers the layout of acoustical ceilings. This course is the equivalent of course number 702 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the Carpenters' Apprenticeship program at American River College. It is a required course for acoustical apprentices in the State of California Carpentry Apprenticeship program.

2. DRLTH 104 Introduction to Apprenticeship II (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Must be a registered carpenter apprentice.

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course introduces the beginning carpenter drywall/lather apprentice to industry safety procedures for aerial lift use, Occupational Health and Safety Administration (OSHA) regulations, construction fall protection, and scaffold user safety. It also covers harassment and discrimination in the workplace. This course is the equivalent of course number 103 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the American River College Carpenters' Apprenticeship program. It is a required course in the State of California mandated Drywall/Lather Apprentice program.

3. DRLTH 141 Building Envelope (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a Registered Drywall-Lathing Apprentice.

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course covers application and identification of exterior building envelope and metal panel systems. This course is the equivalent of course number 117 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the State of California mandated Drywall Lathing Apprenticeship, covering exterior building envelope systems.

4. FT 215 SFT Fire Fighter 1 Academy (11 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Public Safety First Aid and CPR per California Health and Safety code 1797.182 or equivalent

125.75 hours lecture, 218.25 hours laboratory

This course provides the knowledge necessary to assume the role of fire fighter with the ability to work effectively and safely within a fire agency. Topics include introduction to the fire service, fire fighter health and safety, self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA), emergency scene operations, ropes and knots, hand and power tools, building construction and related hazards, fire behavior, fire hose use and maintenance, ground ladder operations, forcible entry, structural search and rescue operations, structural firefighting operations, ventilation techniques, overhaul, fire fighter survival, wildland firefighting techniques, tools and equipment, hazardous materials, and weapons of mass destruction. Students who have successfully completed FIRE 1500 are not eligible to take this course. Pass/No Pass only.

Justification: This course provides the State of California's minimum requirements for new firefighter recruits. As requirements change, this course is updated as needed.

5. FT 216 Fire Fighter 2 Academy (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: FIRE 1500 or FT 215; Students may enroll in FT 216 in the same semester they enroll in FT 215.

20 hours lecture, 28 hours laboratory

This course provides the skills and knowledge needed for the fire fighter to take on increased leadership roles and responsibilities pertaining to fire department communications, fireground operations, rescue operations, and fire and life safety initiatives, preparedness, and maintenance. Pass/No Pass Only.

Justification: This course provides new and expands on existing skills learned during the Fire Fighter 1 Academy. This course is required for advancement to the journey-level or promotion within a fire agency.

6. FT 217 Fire Fighter 1 Academy Module 1A (8 units)

Prerequisite: Public Safety First Aid and CPR per California Health and Safety code 1797.182 or equivalent

80.25 hours lecture, 193.75 hours laboratory

This course is the first of a three-course series to prepare students for a career in the fire service. It provides the skills and knowledge needed for the entry-level fire fighter to perform structural suppression activities. Key learning concepts include fire fighter safety; communications; cleaning, maintaining, and utilizing equipment and tools; building construction and fire behavior; water supply; ladder operations; forcing entry into a structure; conducting search and rescue operations; attacking an interior structure fire; horizontal and vertical ventilation; property conservation; fire scene overhaul; fire fighter survival; and fire suppression with Class A materials, vehicles, and ground cover. FT 217, FT 218, and FT 219 must be completed prior to testing for the Fire Fighter 1 certification. Pass/No Pass Only.

Justification: This course proposal is at the request of our Fire Academy Coordinator. It will allow the delivery of the Fire Fighter 1 Academy in a modular format to meet the needs of agencies who are part of our Advisory Committee.

7. FT 218 Fire Fighter 1 Academy Module 1B (1 unit)

Prerequisite: None.

15.5 hours lecture, 16.5 hours laboratory

This course is the second of a three-course series to prepare students for a career in the fire service. It provides the awareness skills and knowledge needed for the entry-level fire fighter to recognize and identify hazardous materials and weapons of mass destruction (WMD), isolate hazards and deny entry, and initiate required notification. At the operations level, this course provides the skills and knowledge needed to identify incident scope; select, use, and inspect

personal protective equipment (PPE); perform emergency decontamination; perform assigned tasks at a hazardous materials/WMD incident including product control techniques; and evaluate and report incident progress. FT 217, FT 218, and FT 219 must be completed prior to testing for the Fire Fighter 1 certification. Pass/No Pass Only.

Justification: This course proposal is at the request of our Fire Academy Coordinator. It will allow the delivery of the Fire Fighter 1 Academy in a modular format to meet the needs of agencies who are part of our Advisory Committee.

8. FT 219 Fire Fighter 1 Academy Module 1C (2 units)

Prerequisite: FT 217; If student takes Fire Fighter 1C as a stand-alone course.

Corequisite: FT 217; If a student takes Fire Fighter 1C – Wildland within an academy program or if co-enrolled in Fire Fighter 1A.

30 hours lecture, 36 hours laboratory

This course is the third course of a three-course series to prepare students for a career in the fire service. It provides the skills and knowledge needed for the entry-level fire fighter to recognize hazards and unsafe situations; don, doff, and maintain wildland personal protective equipment; deploy a fire shelter; maintain suppression hand tools and equipment; assemble and prepare for response; construct and secure a fireline; reduce the threat of fire exposure to improved properties; and mop up and patrol a fire area when working with wildland fires. FT 217, FT 218, and FT 219 must be completed prior to testing for the Fire Fighter 1 certification. Pass/No Pass Only.

Justification: This course proposal is at the request of our Fire Academy Coordinator. It will allow the delivery of the Fire Fighter 1 Academy in a modular format to meet the needs of agencies who are part of our Advisory Committee.

9. INSUL 120 Blueprint for Insulator I (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a registered Insulator Apprentice.

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course introduces Insulator Apprentices to blueprints used in the insulation industry. Fire barrier, smoke barrier, and Underwriters Laboratory (UL) systems are also covered. This course is the equivalent of course number 503 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the American River College Carpenters' Apprenticeship program. It is a required course in the State of California mandated Insulator Apprentice program, covering blueprints for insulators.

10. INSUL 124 Advanced Submittal and Blueprint with Plan Grid and Field Wire (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a registered Insulator Apprentice.

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course offers Insulator Apprentices an introduction to Plan Grid, Pro Core, and Field Wire. It also covers the plan submittal process. This course is the equivalent of course number 510 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the American River College Carpenters' Apprenticeship program. It is a required course in the State of California mandated Insulator Apprentice program, covering plan submittal processes.

11. SCFLD 101 Introduction to Scaffolds (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a registered Scaffold Erector Apprentice.

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course introduces the Scaffold Erector Apprentice to the industry safety procedures when assembling welded frame and rolling scaffolds. This course is the equivalent of course number 303 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the Carpenters' Apprenticeship program at American River College. It is a required course in the State of California mandated Scaffold Erector Carpentry Apprenticeship program.

12. SCFLD 102 Hazard Awareness and Confined Space (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a registered Scaffold Erector Apprentice.

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course introduces the Scaffold Erector Apprentice to the appropriate safety procedures when using scaffolds and working in a confined space. It also covers the use and maintenance of hand tools. This course is the equivalent of course number 302 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the Carpenters' Apprenticeship program at American River College. It is a required course in the State of California mandated Scaffold Erector Carpentry Apprenticeship program.

13. SCFLD 107 Rigging Awareness for Scaffold (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a registered Carpenter Apprentice

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course familiarizes scaffold apprentices with the equipment and the procedures to safely rig and hoist various loads on the job-site. Topics include tying knots, splicing rope, calculating loads, hand signals for cranes, and inspecting rigging hardware. This course is the equivalent of course number 312 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the Carpenters' Apprenticeship program at American River College. It is a required course in the State of California mandated Scaffold Erector Carpentry Apprenticeship program.

14. SCFLD 110 Welded Frame and Mobile Tower Scaffold (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a registered Scaffold Erector Apprentice.

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course introduces the Scaffold Erector Apprentice to the industry safety procedures when assembling welded frame and rolling scaffolds. This course is the equivalent of course number 305 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the Carpenters' Apprenticeship program at American River College. It is a required course in the State of California mandated Scaffold Erector Carpentry Apprenticeship program.

15. SCFLD 111 System Scaffold I - Cuplock (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a registered Scaffold Erector Apprentice.

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course introduces the Scaffold Erector Apprentice to industry safety procedures when erecting Cuplock system scaffold. This course is the equivalent of course number 306 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the Carpenters' Apprenticeship program at American River College. It is a required course in the State of California mandated Scaffold Erector Carpentry Apprenticeship program.

16. SCFLD 112 System Scaffold II - Safway (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a registered Scaffold Erector Apprentice.

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course introduces the Scaffold Erector Apprentice to industry safety procedures when erecting system scaffold, rolling scaffold, and supported scaffold. This course is the equivalent of course number 307 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the Carpenters' Apprenticeship program at American River College. It is a required course in the State of California mandated Scaffold Erector Carpentry Apprenticeship program.

17. SCFLD 113 Systems Scaffold III - Ring Lock (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a registered Scaffold Erector Apprentice.

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course introduces the Scaffold Erector Apprentice to the safety procedures and industry rules and regulations for suspended scaffolds. This course is the equivalent of course number 308 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the Carpenters' Apprenticeship program at American River College. It is a required course in the State of California mandated Scaffold Erector Carpentry Apprenticeship program.

18. SCFLD 115 Suspended and Cantilevered Scaffold (1.5 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a registered Scaffold Erector Apprentice.

22.5 hours lecture, 13.5 hours laboratory

This course covers the use of leveling devices. It includes reading and interpreting an engineer's rod, horizontal and vertical setting circles, and vernier scaling. Additional topics include construction layout of horizontal and vertical angles. Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) practices for erosion control are also covered. This course is the equivalent of course number 310 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the Carpenters' Apprenticeship program at American River College. It is a required course in the State of California mandated Scaffold Erector Carpentry Apprenticeship program.

19. SCFLD 120 Scaffold Print Reading, Union Benefits, and First Aid (2 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Enrollment Limitation: Student must be a registered Scaffold Erector Apprentice.

36 hours lecture

This course introduces the Scaffold Erector Apprentice to scaffold blueprint reading. It also covers benefits offered by union membership and first aid/CPR. This course is the equivalent of course number 304 for the Carpenter's Training Center of Northern California (CTCNC).

Justification: This course is part of the Carpenters' Apprenticeship program at American River College. It is a required course in the State of California mandated Scaffold Erector Carpentry Apprenticeship program.

Folsom Lake College

1. BUSTEC 370 Business Information Technology Capstone (3 units)

Prerequisite: BUSTEC 305, 360, and 362 with grades of "C" or better

Advisory: ENGWR 300, ENGWR 480, ESLW 340, and MATH 300

54 hours lecture

The Business Information Technology Capstone course serves as the culminating experience for students in the field of business information technology. Building upon foundational knowledge acquired throughout their academic journey, this course integrates theoretical concepts with practical applications to prepare students for real-world challenges in the rapidly evolving business landscape.

Justification: The Business Information Technology Capstone course serves as a pivotal academic endeavor aimed at synthesizing theoretical knowledge and practical skills to equip students with the competencies needed for success in the dynamic field of business information technology. Through immersive learning experiences and real-world applications, this course facilitates the integration of business technology skills, strategic decision-making abilities, project management expertise, and professional communication acumen. By collaborating with industry partners and leveraging experiential learning opportunities, the course aims to cultivate students' marketable skills, enhance their employability, and prepare them for fulfilling careers as adept business information professionals. This course will be required in the A.S. Degree in Business Information Technology.

2. MATH 385 Calculus Preparation for STEM (4 units)

Prerequisite: None.

72 hours lecture

This class is designed for STEM majors who are not fully prepared for Calculus. It will focus on graphical and intuitive development of ideas formally covered in calculus, especially limits. Topics will include graphing and function analysis polynomial, trigonometric, rational, exponential and logarithmic functions. This course will build algebraic skills required for success in Calculus and cover the topics of limits and continuity. Students will need access to the Internet to be able to use graphing utilities such as Desmos.

Justification: AB 1705 places limitations on students choosing a STEM pathway. This course, and its corequisite support will provide one possible option for STEM majors that have not passed high school precalculus.

3. MATHS 85 Support for Calculus Preparation for STEM (2 units)

Prerequisite: None.

Corequisite: MATH 385

36 hours lecture

This course provides intensive instruction and practice in the core mathematical skills, competencies, concepts, and study skills necessary for success in MATH 385. Students taking this course must be concurrently enrolled in the corresponding section of MATH 385. The content of this course is designed to provide arithmetic, algebra, geometry, trigonometry, and skills support to students as they learn preparatory concepts in their MATH 385 course. Topics and homework assignments may be connected to assignments in the MATH 385. This course is graded on a Pass/No Pass basis. Students will need access to the Internet to be able to use graphing utilities such as Desmos.

Justification: Due to the interpretation of AB-1705, the college may not require students to enroll in traditional transfer-level preparation courses (such as Precalculus). This course has been developed to provide just-in-time corequisite support to students who opt for a one-semester Calculus preparation course (Math 385)

PROGRAM PROPOSALS

American River College

1. Fitness Specialist

Justification: Upon review, the department has determined that this course/program no longer meets the needs of our students.

American River College

1. Fire Inspector 1

This program provides the knowledge necessary to assume the role of an entry level fire inspector within a fire department's fire prevention division.

Justification: This program provides the knowledge necessary to assume the role of an entry-level fire inspector within a fire department's fire prevention division. Topics include the identification of administrative duties, performing inspections, and code/statute interpretation and application.

Folsom Lake College

2. Honors

The Folsom Lake College Honors Program is a community of students and faculty who are dedicated to the pursuit of intellectual and personal enrichment in a diverse and challenging academic environment. Students with a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 3.2 or better who have completed at least 15 units of approved Honors coursework earn a Certificate of Achievement noted on the transcript. A minimum of 9 units of Honors coursework must be earned at FLC. A maximum of 6 units of Honors coursework may be transferred from other colleges. Most courses in the certificate fulfill requirements for the AA, AS, AA-T, AS-T degrees, and CalGETC Pattern. Honors students should meet with a counselor to ensure completion of FLC graduation and/or transfer requirements. Honors students should meet regularly with an Honors faculty coordinator to ensure completion of the Honors Certificate.

Justification: The goal of an Honors Program is to provide students with an opportunity to take a minimum of 15 units in Honors courses and transfer with the Honors designation. Honors courses are designed to increase and enhance rigor, engagement, leadership, and accountability. Students who have received the Honors Certificate will have priority admission to their transfer institution. Los Rios Honors students already benefit from an agreement with CSU Sacramento. Upon development of an Honors Program at FLC, the long-term goal is to offer a Transfer Alliance Program (TAP) with a UC, such as UCLA.

The Los Rios Community College District operates Child Development Centers at three of the colleges - American River College, Cosumnes River College, and Sacramento City College. Each site is primarily funded by contracts from the State of California. Due to changes in the organization of subsidized childcare, the funding is now divided between the Department of Education which funds State Preschool (CSPP) and the Department of Social Services which funds General Child Care (CCTR). Each year Los Rios applies for the funding and receives contracts to offer subsidized childcare services, in accordance with the contracts, at the three colleges named above.

STATUS:

Resolution No. 2024-12 is required by the Department of Education and the Department of Social Service as part of the application process. The contract will not require a separate resolution.

BACKGROUND:

At the September 11, 2024 Board Meeting, the Board of Trustees voted on the intention to enter into a contract with CalPERS to provide School Safety Members pension. The future annual cost was shared with the Board, as well as the contract provisions and a summary of the major provisions of the plan. After Board approval, an employee election by secret ballot was to be held to determine if a majority of the employees affected by this change voted in favor or against it.

STATUS:

On September 12, 2024, a secret ballot was sent to current employees in the Los Rios Police Department Office, Captain and Sergeant positions. Voting was open until September 30, 2024. On September 30, 2024, 13 of 14 employees had voted. Eight (8) votes in favor were needed for the provision to pass. Thirteen (13) votes were cast in favor of the change. The effective date of the change will be December 1, 2024. To move forward, the Board must approve the final Resolution authorizing a contract.

For the employee PERS contributions to be processed as pre-tax deductions, the Board must pass a Resolution for Employer Pick-up.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the attached Resolution No. 2024-14, Authorizing a Contract and approve the attached Resolution No. 2024-15, for Employer Pick-Up.

- 1. All words and terms used herein which are defined in the Public Employees' Retirement Law shall have the meaning as defined therein unless otherwise specifically provided. "Normal retirement age" shall mean age 57 for local safety members.

Public Agency shall participate in the Public Employees' Retirement System from and after <u>December 1, 2024</u> making its employees as hereinafter provided, members of said System subject to all provisions of the Public Employees' Retirement Law except such as apply only on election of a contracting agency and are not provided for herein and to all amendments to said Law hereafter enacted except those, which by express provisions thereof, apply only on the election of a contracting agency.

- Public Agency agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the Public Employees' Retirement System and its trustees, agents and employees, the Public Employees' Retirement System Board of Administration, and the Public Employees' Retirement System Fund from any claims, demands, actions, losses, liabilities, damages, judgments, expenses and costs, including but not limited to interest, penalties and attorney fees that may arise as a result of any of the following:
 - (a) Public Agency's election to provide retirement benefits, provisions or formulas under this Contract that are different than the retirement benefits, provisions or formulas provided under the Public Agency's prior non- Public Employees' Retirement System retirement program.
 - (b) Any dispute, disagreement, claim, or proceeding (including without limitation arbitration, administrative hearing, or litigation) between Public Agency and its employees (or their representatives) which relates to Public Agency's election to amend this Contract to provide retirement benefits, provisions or formulas that are different than such employees' existing retirement benefits, provisions or formulas.
 - (c) Public Agency's agreement with a third party other than CalPERS to provide retirement benefits, provisions, or formulas that are different than the retirement benefits, provisions or formulas provided under this Contract and provided for under the Public Employees' Retirement Law.
- 4. Employees of Public Agency in the following classes shall become members of said Retirement System except such in each such class as are excluded by law or this agreement:
 - a. School Safety Members (herein referred to as local safety members).
- 5. Any exclusion(s) shall remain in effect until such time as the Public Employees' Retirement System determines that continuing said exclusion(s) would risk a finding of non-compliance with any federal tax laws or regulations. If such a determination is contemplated, the Public Employees' Retirement System will meet with the Public Agency to discuss the matter and coordinate any required changes or amendments to the contract.

In addition to the classes of employees excluded from membership by said Retirement Law, the following classes of employees shall not become members of said Retirement System:

a. MISCELLANEOUS MEMBERS.

- 6. The percentage of final compensation to be provided for local safety members for each year of credited prior service is 0% and the percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited current service is 100% and determined in accordance with Section 7522.25(d) of said Retirement Law (2.7% at age 57 Supplemental to Federal Social Security).
- 7. Public Agency elected and elects to be subject to the following optional provisions:
 - Section 20444 ("School Safety Member" shall include any officer or employee of a school district or community college district as described in Government Code Section 20444).
 - b. Section 20042 (One-Year Final Compensation) for classic members only.
- 8. Public Agency shall contribute to said Retirement System the contributions determined by actuarial valuations of prior and future service liability with respect to local safety members of said Retirement System.
- 9. Public Agency shall also contribute to said Retirement System as follows:
 - a. A reasonable amount, as fixed by the Board, payable in one installment within 60 days of date of contract to cover the costs of administering said System as it affects the employees of Public Agency, not including the costs of special valuations or of the periodic investigation and valuations required by law.
 - b. A reasonable amount, as fixed by the Board, payable in one installment as the occasions arise, to cover the costs of special valuations on account of employees of Public Agency, and costs of the periodic investigation and valuations required by law.
- 10. Contributions required of Public Agency and its employees shall be subject to adjustment by Board on account of amendments to the Public Employees' Retirement Law, and on account of the experience under the Retirement System as determined by the periodic investigation and valuation required by said Retirement Law.

11. Contributions required of Public Agency and its employees shall be paid by Public Agency to the Retirement System within fifteen days after the end of the period to which said contributions refer or as may be prescribed by Board regulation. If more or less than the correct amount of contributions is paid for any period, proper adjustment shall be made in connection with subsequent remittances. Adjustments on account of errors in contributions required of any employee may be made by direct payments between the employee and the Board.

BACKGROUND:

The State has fully allocated the remaining funds from Proposition 51, passed in 2016, which provided bond authorizations for educational facilities. As a result, no further state funding is available to support critical projects addressing health and safety, modernization, and growth needs across the system.

STATUS:

For Los Rios, the passage of Proposition 2 would have a direct and significant impact, particularly on the health and safety renovation project for Davies Hall at American River College. Due to a lack of remaining funds from our local bond authorization, state support is essential to meet these facilities' needs.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution 2024-16 supporting the passage of Proposition 2, School and Community College Bond.

Proposition 2: Kindergarten Through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities, Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024

WHEREAS, the California Community College system is the largest postsecondary system of education in the world, enrolling approximately 2 million students each year; and

WHEREAS, California's 116 community colleges and 72 centers are located in nearly every community in the state, serving more than 70 percent of California's public postsecondary undergraduate students; and

WHEREAS, the primary mission of the California Community Colleges is to offer academic and vocational instruction, by granting certificates, associate degrees, and select Baccalaureate degrees, and providing transfer opportunities to four-year institutions; and

WHEREAS, the California Community College Chancellor's Office estimates unmet community college facilities needs of approximately \$27.5 billion over the next five years; and

WHEREAS, Proposition 2, the Kindergarten Through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities, Modernization, Repair and Safety Bond Act of 2024, provides \$1.5 billion to community colleges for constructing new classrooms to accommodate growth and provide job training, repairing health and safety issues, renovating facilities, and equipping learning spaces with essential technology; and

WHEREAS, facilities support student success and basic needs for our students, providing spaces to access important services like food, health care, counseling and financial aid; and

WHEREAS, 13,000 middle class jobs, including almost all building trades, are created for each \$1 billion in school facility infrastructure investments; and

WHEREAS, quality community college facilities enhance the education and training of a skilled 21st Century workforce, in furtherance of the State's academic and economic goals; and

WHEREAS, Proposition 2 will not raise State taxes, and state matching funds reduce the need for additional local property taxes for college facilities: Now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the Los Rios Community College District supports Proposition 2, The Kindergarten Through Grade 12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024.

BACKGROUND:

Joseph Mohamed grew up on a family farm in the Lodi area where they raised row crops and had a dairy. He started a landscape and construction business in 1959 while attending American River College and was hired by the college to pour the concrete in front of the Bill J. Priest Administration building. Joe transferred to Sacramento State University where he graduated with a BS in Business Administration. He retired as an Army Colonel with 32 years of service, including 2 years of active duty and 30 years in the Army Reserve. Joe also attended the Army War College and was actively involved with a Civil Affairs Unit. Joe had a successful career in construction, finance, and real estate development in subdivisions, commercial and residential. In 1999 he was honored with the Distinguished Service Award by CSUS. Joe was actively involved in military and community organizations, and he also served as a Reserve Depot Sheriff for over 40 years.

STATUS:

Joseph Mohamed served on the American River College Foundation board from 1998 to 2005. During this time, he and his wife, Shirley, donated nearly \$20,000 and actively supported various college events, including hosting the ARC culinary arts fundraisers at their home. In 2022, they donated a property to ARC as an unrestricted gift that was valued at \$660,000 and sold in 2024 with sales proceeds of \$403,346. After his passing in 2023 at the age of 94, Shirley requested that the college name the Veteran's Resource Center in Joe's honor to recognize his legacy as a veteran and generous alumnus.

The proceeds from the sale of the property will be used primarily for direct student support, including "welcome backpacks," tutoring services, and book vouchers. Additionally, they will cover professional development opportunities, such as attending the Veterans in Business Network conference, and support various events like the veteran's graduation ceremony, PTSD Awareness Month, and Fall Welcome Back Month. Some funds may also be allocated for furniture and technology for the expanded space.

CONSIDERATIONS:

LRCF closely follows Board Policies when soliciting and accepting significant gifts that could result in a naming opportunity. To that end and based on recommendations pursuant to Board Policy 8431:

- 2.1 Buildings and areas may be named in honor of friends, benefactors, and persons who have made significant contributions to the College, the District, or to education in California or the nation.
 - The real estate donation, initially valued at \$660,000, with sales proceeds of \$403,346, qualifies as a basis to honor Col. Joseph Mohamed, Sr. pursuant to BP 8431 2.1 as a "significant contribution."
- 2.3 Buildings and areas may be named for persons who: have rendered significant, permanent service to education in California or the nation; who have distinguished themselves in the work of a College, campus, discipline, or department within the District; who are indigenous to the area and hold a unique place in history; or have made a substantial gift to the College or the District through its official fundraising arm, the Los Rios Colleges Foundation.
 - ARC, LRCCD, and LRCF staff concluded that the Mohamed family's real estate donation to American River College, originally valued at \$660,000 and later sold with sales proceeds of \$403,346, qualifies as a "substantial gift." This donation, along with Joe Mohamed's personal connections to the college and community contributions, supports the policy basis for naming opportunities at the college. However, staff notes that the policy does not specify a precise dollar amount that defines "substantial."
- 3.1 Names of facilities or areas should lend prestige to the District/College, and to staff, students, and community. The credentials, character, and reputation of each individual for whom the naming of a building is being considered shall be carefully scrutinized and evaluated. Nominations submitted to the Board of Trustees for consideration shall be accompanied by appropriate supporting documentation.
 - ARC, LRCCD, and LRCF staff concluded that Joseph Mohamed's military service, long-standing connection to and support of American River College, and his standing in the community meet the criteria outlined in BP 8431 3.1.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended the Board of Trustees approve the naming of the American River College Veteran's Resource Center as the Col. Joseph Mohamed, Sr. Veteran's Resource Center in recognition of Joseph and Shirley Mohamed's generous gifts and passion for American River College.

BACKGROUND:

The Department of Theatre and Cinema Arts offers a dynamic range of classes in theatre and cinema, including an AA-T in Theatre Arts and a unique Technical Theatre Certificate program. With a full production and class schedule, the department provides students with a comprehensive foundation in theatre history, diversity, and production techniques. Courses cover the fundamentals of acting, theatre design, technology, and the historical and social context of the performing arts.

Students gain hands-on experience in the state-of-the-art Harris Center for the Arts, a world-class facility that prepares them for real-world opportunities. The Technical Theatre Certificate program equips students with specialized skills in stagecraft, welding, scenic painting, CNC design and operation, lighting, audio, video, and scenic automation. The program culminates in a paid internship allowing students to work alongside industry professionals on touring productions and to gain invaluable journeyman-level experience. Graduates thus are well-prepared to begin their careers in the entertainment industry.

The department's productions offer students exceptional opportunities to apply their performance, design, and technical skills. Highlights include a touring children's theatre show for local elementary schools, an outdoor Shakespeare production performed at a picturesque El Dorado County winery, and mainstage performances in Stage 1 and Stage 2 at the Harris Center.
