The Sacramento K-16 Collaborative

- Awarded \$18.1 million from the California Regional K-16
 Collaboratives Grant Program for five years (now \$18.6M)
- One of thirteen regional collaboratives in California
- A multi-county partnership between K-12 County Offices of Education and districts, higher education institutions, and employers
- Advancing educational equity and workforce opportunities through college and career pathways

Regional Grant Goals



Achieve **Hispanic Serving Institution** (HSI) status for colleges and universities through the full postsecondary continuum.



Send 1300 additional **young men of color** to UC Davis and Sacramento State by 2025 and 2026 respectively.



Triple the number of the region's students who can **graduate from high school** with both a **diploma** and the freshman year of college completed by 2026.



Triple the number of students who can graduate high school from healthcare and engineering pathways that articulate to apprenticeships or stacked post secondary certificates and degrees.



Award 2,000 **degrees** and/or **certificates** (**earned but not claimed**), 2,000 degrees and/or certificates to **comebackers**, "**reverse transfer**" 4,000 community college degrees and/or certificate programs.



- Sacramento Regional K-16 Collaborative featured in the Governor's Master Plan for Career Education
- One of two K-16
 Collaboratives highlighted in the Master Plan
- Data sharing project serving as a model for California
- Aligns with Cradle to Career data system

The Sacramento Regional K-16 Education Collaborative is building education pathways in sectors such as health care, computer science, and engineering. This effort focuses on learners at many different stages of life, from high school students who are taking college courses ("dual enrollment") to community college students who are seeking to transfer and earn a bachelor's degree to adults who started but did not complete their educational objectives. To support stronger communication between TK-12 and college partners, members of the collaborative have agreed to share information about their students, including course-taking histories and their contact information.

This individual-level data will help institutions provide more targeted outreach, identify reasons for missed enrollment, and support advising on academic opportunities. Information will be made available to educators through dashboards, as well as to researchers to conduct studies, and will complement information that is being compiled in the C2C analytical data set. The data-sharing agreement will provide a strong foundation for regional efforts to support career pathways in other strategic sectors, while ensuring educators can provide the types of supports that are appropriate to different learners.





eTranscript Instructure Project (eTIP)

- Streamline the transfer and reverse transfer of students who take classes at multiple institutions
- Enable institutions to apply external course credit quickly
- Save students time and money as they earn their degrees or certificate at two and fouryear institutions

 Education omnibus trailer bill (AB 121) includes K-16 extension to 2030

Joint Powers Agreement (JPA)

- Multiple public agencies can agree to jointly exercise any power common to the contracting parties (Cal. Gov. Code § 6500 et seq.)
- Provides a mechanism for the Data Sharing Agreement to be sustained after Grant funds are expended
- Legal structure allows us to obtain funding from both public and private sources
- Future action item for the LRCCD Board
